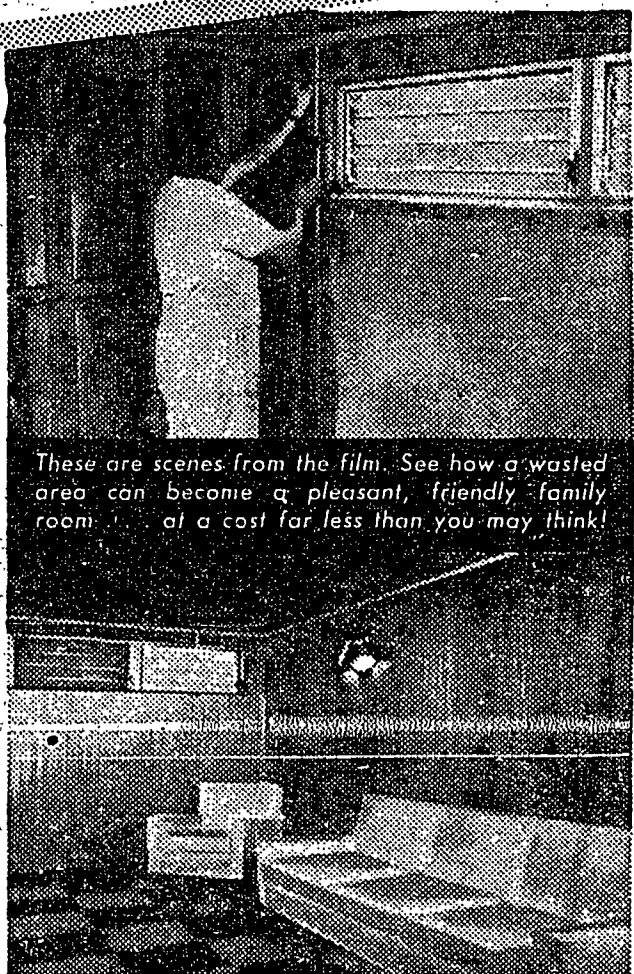

May Vote On Park Taxes In April

This Saturday evening, January 25, the Niles Firemen's Benevolent Association holds their third annual dance at Bunker Hill. Money received from the tickets distributed to all homes in the village goes into the fund to aid firemen and their families in the event they have financial problems resulting from a fireman's injury or death caused in the line of duty.

At a time when neighboring Morton Grove is scandal-ridden in their police department it's nice to be able to look home-ward and find a model public force such as our fire dept., which goes far beyond the call of duty in giving Niles much to be proud of.

In exchange for the tremendous effort Chief Pasek and his men have made to give Niles the finest department in the area I hope every resident will make some contribution to the Association so the firemen and their families will have a bit more security in a very risky business.

In a hands-across-the-table-meeting the Trustees and the Park Board met last week and pledged to work cooperatively toward a common goal. There has always been somewhat less than cordial feelings between the two groups and the new spirit of harmony is certainly worth recognition.

One topic of major import that both groups agreed to was concerning the 0-5 Recreation Tax which was so soundly defeated at the polls. It is quite likely that the referendum may come up for a vote again this spring and its chances for success are as good as its presentation to the voters. Last time the "tot parks" were to be purchased with much of the tax monies, this helped cause the vote for the tax to be defeated. Residents actively rang doorbells asking to defeat the bill over this issue. Backyard owners could not understand the need for "tot parks" in a residential area such as Niles.

THE BUGLE would certainly actively participate in a campaign for the passage of a much-needed tax to enable the Park Board to add muscle to an improved park program. The present successful winter program is indicative of the great need for an enlarged program that can only be had with these much-needed monies. And this winter program shows the definite de-

Meters In Cabs

Trustee Denis Nielsen, at the January 8 Board meeting, suggested local cab companies should have their license withheld if they charge an illegitimate fare in transporting passengers about the Village.

Nielsen stated that local cab companies don't have meters in their cabs and that an ordinance should be passed insisting that meters be installed and that the companies charge a fair price in using these meters.

Nielsen stated he recently rode in one of the cabs for two-and-a-half blocks and was charged fifty-five cents for this distance. He said the new ordinance was necessary, "so people won't get beat out of their dough."

Village Attorney Wells said he will prepare an amendment to the now existing ordinance which covers this area and it will be presented at the next Board meeting (January 22).

Trustees Back Park Tax Need

Park Board Commissioners met with the Board of Trustees last week in a meeting which resulted in a pledge of support by the Trustees for future park activities.

At the special meeting the subject of the 0-5 tax, a tax to be used for recreational purposes, was revived and the Trustees promised the Commissioners they would lend their support to such a tax action which would enable the Park Board to hire professional supervisors for future activities.

In a previous Village election this referendum suffered a smashing defeat. At the time the Park Board had spent \$3000 for a survey of areas to be used for "tot" parks. They desired money for these parks as well as for the recreation tax. Organized resistance to the "tot" parks caused the referendum to be defeated.

Today, the only money available for Niles park program must be used for maintenance of parks and park equipment. Supervised programs such as the highly successful Arts and Crafts program and the athletic activities at the Niles school requires money for the teachers. Niles Days provided about \$3500 two years ago and the money has been used for just such activities. Future plans for such activities will go begging unless money is forthcoming.

Local Red Cross Chairman Named

Thomas W. Evans, vice president of Continental Illinois National Bank and Trust Company has been named chairman of the March 1958 Red Cross fund campaign in 105 communities of Cook and DuPage counties, according to Mrs. Ernest Dettmar, 8331 North Osceola Ave., Red Cross Public Information representative for Niles.

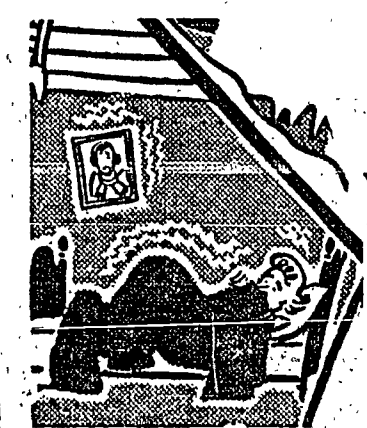
In appointing Evans, James E. Rutherford, chairman of the Chicago Red Cross chapter, stated that "Our March campaign will provide the opportunity for suburban residents to give their support to the Red Cross organization — an organization which is the symbol of the spirit of people helping people."

"Red Cross annually spends some \$36,000,000 — over a third of its budget — to help servicemen, veterans and their dependents when problems disrupt normal living, and to provide needed funds or communications when emergencies arise," Rutherford explains.

"Almost \$9 million," he said, "is required to provide the people of the United States with health and safety services, and to continue the school activities of 22 million members of the American Junior Red Cross."

Another large portion of the Red Cross budget goes for emergency relief and long-term rehabilitation aid to disaster-stricken families. In the last two years these expenditures have totaled about \$51 million.

Better Schools Hold Second Meeting

The Citizen's Committee for Better Schools in E. Maine School Dist. 63 had their second general meeting of the school year on Tues. Jan. 14 at the Oak School. There were about 75 people present to hear the distinguished speaker, and member of the board Mr. John Press, in a very informative talk on "How do School Taxes Affect You?"

Mr. Press's lecture was very clear to all present and presented the subject in a manner for the layman to understand. The school board now levies close to one-half of our real-estate taxes and also receives state-aid based on assessed valuation and average daily attendance during the school year. However, these sources of revenue will not be enough in view of the fact that our district is sadly lacking in industry which contributes — tax money without adding more children.

In order to keep up with the increased enrollment we will need 78 more classrooms by 1962 (82 with kindergartens); according to the recent population study completed by the Citizen's Committee and also presented at this meeting. (These figures, incidentally, are based on a 35 pupil classroom which is not ideal).

Sometime this spring there will be a referendum for floating a bond issue and you, the voter, will be asked to approve it overwhelmingly for no one can deny our children need and deserve the best education we can give them.

Since the annual figure needed is approximately \$12,000 two months sales tax money would fulfill the necessary needs for the recreation program. Attorneys Wells and Orphan, legal advisors of the two groups, will study this plan and report on the possibilities of exploiting this proposal.

Niles residents have for a greater program. It also proves that the Board can operate with efficiency with little money. The Board has not always shown results in the spending of Village money, but the present display of success lends optimism that there are greener valleys ahead.

With the hiring of the Gardiner City Planners it is evident that the City Fathers are interested in expanding the village area. Obviously the unincorporated area north of Dempster is the coveted land we will be seeking in the not too distant future. The Cuneo project, the shopping plaza at Milwaukee and Golf, which will include a Sears and Roebuck, is going to make this neighboring land highly valuable. The addition of the shopping plaza to any municipality is a prize highly desirable.

When the Trustees approved the contract which will enable the plaza to receive water transmitted through our water mains, they wisely insisted that in the event this surrounding area petitioned for annexation the Plaza itself would "actively engage" in this petitioning into Niles. Other areas competing for this annexation would have trouble in convincing them their facilities are superior to Niles.

I spoke to an attorney, Edward Lawlor, Wednesday, and he said Morton Grove had an interest in this area some time back. He stated that a candidate for Mayor or who was defeated had been in favor of annexing this property. He stated that in addition to lack of interest for this land Morton Grove water and sewer facilities were woefully inadequate to handle this future project.

Mr. Lawlor, who I believe is a landowner in the unincorporated area, said Niles is more progressive and inviting and "is of a nice character" in lauding our town's assets. He said we had more adequate facilities than Morton Grove... the latter also including that able fire department that now services part of the area to the north of us.

Since Niles residents hear mainly criticism about our town (of which I contribute my fair share) I thought Mr. Lawlor's opinions were worth a mention.

He added that the Rizzo project west of Milwaukee may be organized for the purposes of petitioning into Niles but that it is the only organized movement he has heard of. A petition by all residents and landowners in an area would make petitioning the main requirement prior to being admitted to an area; however, if 50% of these same people desire admittance than the County Court would assign an election for the purpose so mentioned.

Living near the Maryhill cemetery here in Oakton Manor I realize the importance of this area to the north. Residents in Maine Township are badly in need of revenue for School District 63 and only industry can provide these much needed tax dollars. And only in this northern area can we hope for land for industry.

The Trustees have started in the right direction with the hiring of the Gardiner Company. However, since Morton Grove,

Harlem Ave. Zoning

Tonight a request for rezoning of an area between 7200 and 7300 on Harlem and extending to Nora Avenue will be heard at the Board of Trustees meeting. Richard Schaul, the petitioner, desires the area be rezoned from class A residential to class E commercial.

This request had been rejected by the Zoning Board some months back. One of the reasons for this rejection was because the petitioner was indefinite as to why he desired the rezoning. Residents on Nora and Neva will be in attendance tonight and the results of the meeting should prove enlightening.

We have received letters in the past stating that the Zoning Board has been overruled too many times and that even the existence of a Zoning Board seems farcical in view of the many reversals by the Trustees.

The zoning of Harlem Avenue has always been a cause of wonderment to THE BUGLE. Amidst a residential area there exists tanks for gas which certainly arouses curiosity as to previous zoning decisions in Niles. It would seem logical that if these storage tanks were to be allowed the entire area should not have remained residential. A second company on Harlem has many more employees on the premises than is allowed in the zoning there.

Tonight's decision will be watched with much interest.

Mid-States Telephone Users

Twenty-two users of the Middle States Telephone Company filed a complaint with the Illinois Commerce Commission last week citing grievances they experienced while using this service. The hearing was continued until April 15 at which time the phone company will present its side of the case.

Oakton Manor and Park Lane residents, who are users of this phone service, have an excellent opportunity to present their grievances to the ICC between now and the April date. THE BUGLE believes it would be a worthwhile project for the two homeowners associations to accumulate grievances of homeowners in their areas and present these to the ICC.

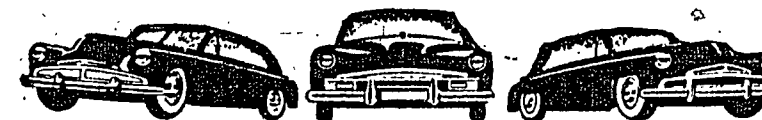
As a resident in Oakton Manor we have had many frustrating experiences with this phone service. Twice we phoned Chicago numbers and received a Hammond, Indiana number. The inability to make a phone call without dialing several times has been commonplace. And equally disturbing is the inability of incoming calls from reaching us.

The problem that is most disturbing however concerns the toll calls within our Village. All phone calls east of Milwaukee Avenue are extra charge calls for residents in northwest Niles. Even an emergency call to the Niles Fire Department is a toll call.

In addition to the added expense and the inadequacy of the service this phone service has proved harmful to business on the west side of Milwaukee Avenue north of Oakton Street. Businesses interested in moving into this area have been deterred from doing so because of the aforementioned problems.

Oakton Manor and Park Lane residents have an opportunity to explain their grievances to the right authority NOW. It is our hope that an organized action will lend its weight in expressing these grievances.

Park Ridge and other areas have also hired them the ball-carrying must still be done by the elected officials. The time for decision is now... may they move with alacrity.
