## Board Members 'Pressured' Teachers

### District 63 Vote On 3 Propositions

School District 63 is voting on three propositions April 12th.

In addition to the election of board members, for which there is no contest, voters of district 63 are being asked to approve three propositions.

Voters are being asked to approve a levy to repay the State School Building Commission if a school is built for the district. Because of the legal complications in this new law, it will not be possible to start a building with this aid until at least late this fall. The School Board wants to be sure that we do everything possible to get this interest free aid and are asking for approval of this levy to clear one of the legal steps required.

If the proposed state building aid does not materialize, there would of course be no tax levied for this proposition. In the meantime, the school that was approved at a bond referendum will be built.

The board is also asking that the maximum permissible levy of the unrestricted building fund be increased from .12% to .25% and the maximum educational levy from 1.25% to 1.40% per \$100 of assessed valuation.

These levies would be increased gradually. It is estimated that a home that now pays \$300 taxes would have a \$15 increase on their tax bill next year.

District 63 cost per child in school is the lowest 25% in Cook County according to a recent survey.

It is necessary to approve these increases if we are to continue to provide a reasonable education for our children.

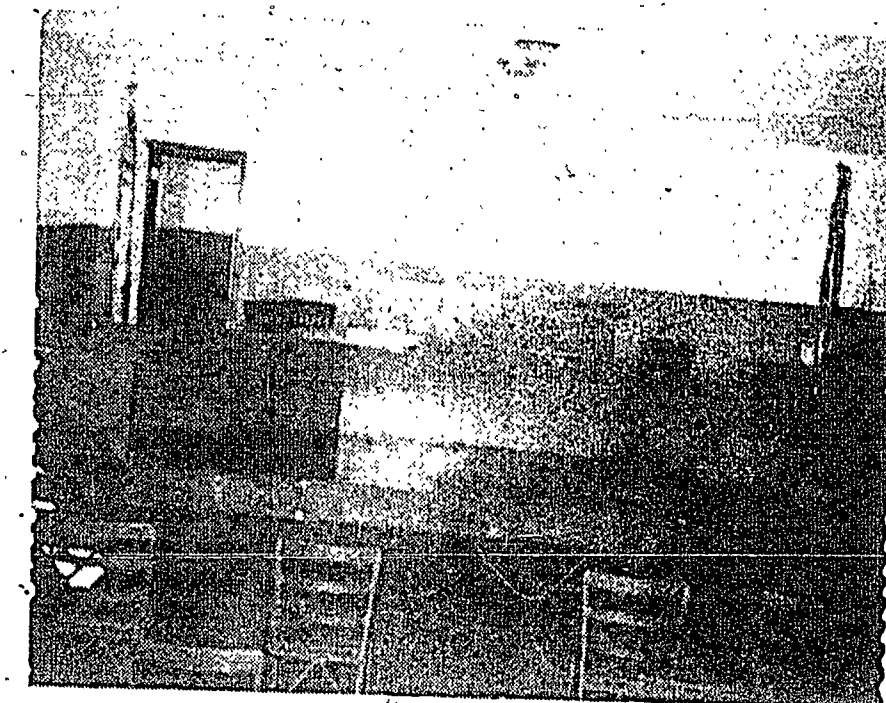
### Jaycees Campaign Against Lewd Literature

A village-wide campaign to prevent lewd literature from falling into the hands of children has been started by the Niles Jaycees.

"During the past few months," according to President, Chuck Kveton, "various experiences have been reported to the Jaycee board of directors of young children reading and buying these magazines with no difficulty whatsoever. It is not the desire of the Jaycees to censor literature but to show to our merchants and the community a problem that can very definitely affect the moral thinking of the youth of Niles," said Kveton.

### Engineers' Peace Token



This chamber-desk in the Village Hall was a gift of the village engineers. In a secret meeting between Trustees and the engineers last October the engineers allegedly offered these furnishings to the Village. This meeting concerned the error in the water tank which was built ten feet higher than the first tank. The meeting resulted in the Village purchasing an altitude valve at a cost of \$4,424 to correct the error. This was the time when the engineers promised the new Village furnishings.

### District 64 Vote For New Jr. High April 12

"The proposed new junior high school is the last new building project this school district needs to consider for the next three or four years," said Mr. Andrew Boemi, President of the Elementary School Board, District 64. "We have opened six new buildings in the last eight years, as well as building additions to three or four buildings," he continued. "The elementary classroom need has been met until there is a great deal more home building in the school district. The final need, however, is a second junior high to complete the basic facilities."

Blair Plimpton, Superintendent of Schools, reports that the present enrollment in the Lincoln Junior High is 1,002 pupils. This is an average of 31 pupils per room. Every classroom in the building is now in use, including some sub-standard classrooms on the third floor. The following enrollments are forecast for the junior high grades:

1958-59	1,126	1961-62	1,233
1959-60	1,128	1962-63	1,230
1960-61	1,203	1963-64	1,330

The new junior high school needs to be started now to avoid more than one year of overcrowding at Lincoln. A nine-classroom building will probably meet the junior high school needs until 1963. The Board of Education will seek approval of a bond issue for the construction of the second junior high at the April 12 school board election. The building will be constructed on Oakton Street near Cumberland Avenue and serve the northeast portion of the school district.

### N.Y.O. Dance April 12 At Bunker Hill

The Niles Youth Organization under the sponsorship of Mr. Jim Schick and under the guidance of Juvenile Officer Homer Becker, will present its first Annual Spring Dance at Bunker Hill Country Club, Friday evening, April 11th, from 8 P.M. to 12 P.M.

The Niles Youth Organization is an active teenage group, with a membership of 120 youngsters. The majority of this group has been participating in the Friday night teenage dances held in the Grennan Heights fieldhouse under the supervision of Jim Schick.

According to Dance Chairman Judy Vosmik this is to be a formal dance with proceeds going to future youth projects. All members, their friends from Niles and the surrounding communities are invited to attend.

A soft drink bar will be at the disposal of the teenagers and as a special refreshment attraction hors d'oeuvres will be served. A refreshment bar for adults will be in service and located in an adjoining part of the club.

Music will be by the favorite Rhythm R's and admission will be \$1.00 per person.

### Faculty Tell Of Board Interference

At the March 10th meeting of School Board 71 Dr. Walter Kramer accused Mrs. Ruth Merriman and Willis Larson of behavior unbecoming school board members. They answered the charges as merely being "politics."

In the face of all the charges and counter-charges THE BUGLE decided to investigate the most serious of several charges — intimidation of the faculty, pressures brought upon them and interference with the teachers by School Board members.

Interviewed at their homes were nine faculty members of the school. Some spoke readily, others only after a promise of anonymity was given.

Three of those interviewed said they experienced no personal pressure and felt there was no morale problem as far as they were concerned.

The remaining six interviewees stated there was a very bad situation at the school.

One teacher stated "this is not my year to get whipped." The teacher said if Merriman, Larson and Manum win this election several of the teachers will look for other jobs. The teacher added "these members are against progressivism and are 100% against any project that will cost money." Other remarks included that there was definite pressure at the junior high level, and that the children were not getting the proper discipline.

Another teacher commented on the homework controversy that had been created by these members.

## EDITORIAL

### Teachers Or Incumbents?

The central issue facing voters in School District 71 in the April 12 election evolves about the teachers' statements as to the pressures brought about them by Board incumbents Larson and Merriman.

Mrs. Merriman placed herself in an untenable position by her being in the school every day. A faculty member said she was constantly "under foot," snapping around the school throughout several times to discuss her child's work is not behavior becoming of a Board member. Her threatening the science teacher over her daughter's grade, and the science teacher's revision of his grading system to satisfy Mrs. Merriman questions Mrs. Merriman's right to serve as a Board member.

Mr. Larson rebuked the music teacher so severely last year he threatened to quit her job at this time. His defense condoning his "unusual" behavior as a Board member questions his value as a future member.

Most important in an interview with Larson and Merriman was were concerned with their contemptuous attitude regarding the superintendent. Larson mentioned that he had occasion "to chew out" the superintendent only recently. This utter lack of respect for the superintendent as well as the teachers makes this situation explosive. (All nine teachers emphasized to us that the superintendent was doing an excellent job.)

One of the teachers mentioned that if "these two" are re-elected several of the teachers would look for other jobs.

THE BUGLE, which was devoted fair in presenting these issues in the March 19 edition by both Larson and Merriman, accepts the opinions of the teachers that an intolerable situation exists at the school. We believe since both Larson and Merriman approved the teachers thru the years they must believe the teachers are competent. Unfortunately, the teachers do not have the same opinion regarding these Board members. In light of these disclosures by the teachers, THE BUGLE accepts the majority of their opinions. The Bugle recommends the residents in District 71 reject Larson and Merriman at the polls April 12. A vote for them is a vote against the teachers.

bers. While the teacher had not experienced any opposition to the homework given to the students there was definitely "insidious rumors and political issues" which were undermining the homework program.

The teacher continued that (she-he) personally experienced undue pressure was felt personally and that it emanated from the Board members (Larson and Merriman) who were up for reelection. The teacher stated this was "an incredible situation, that in (his-her) years of teaching experience it had never before been encountered and that it was certainly an abnormal situation."

Another teacher stated that morale was low last year as well as this year. The teacher stated that it was implied directly that (his-her) teaching job now held may be in jeopardy. This charge was made by Board member Merriman.

Mrs. Merriman had been accused of bringing pressure upon science teacher Rupe who had given her daughter a failing grade. He stated he was stopped in the hall by Mrs. Merriman from 3 to 5 times to discuss this problem. (Mrs. Merriman was working in the cafeteria of the school).

Mr. Rupe stated it was necessary to change the entire grading system to satisfy Mrs. Merriman. This penalized all the other students one month's grades in deference to Mrs. Merriman's demands.

Our last interviewee stated this problem was "tragic in a community." (He-she) stated because of these problems it was a difficult "row to hoe" for the faculty. In a moment of sheer exasperation (he-she) added, "God help me if I mention this and they find out who said this."

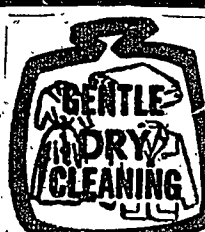

Election week is really a great thing and everyone should get out and participate.

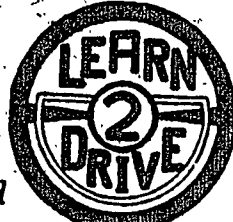

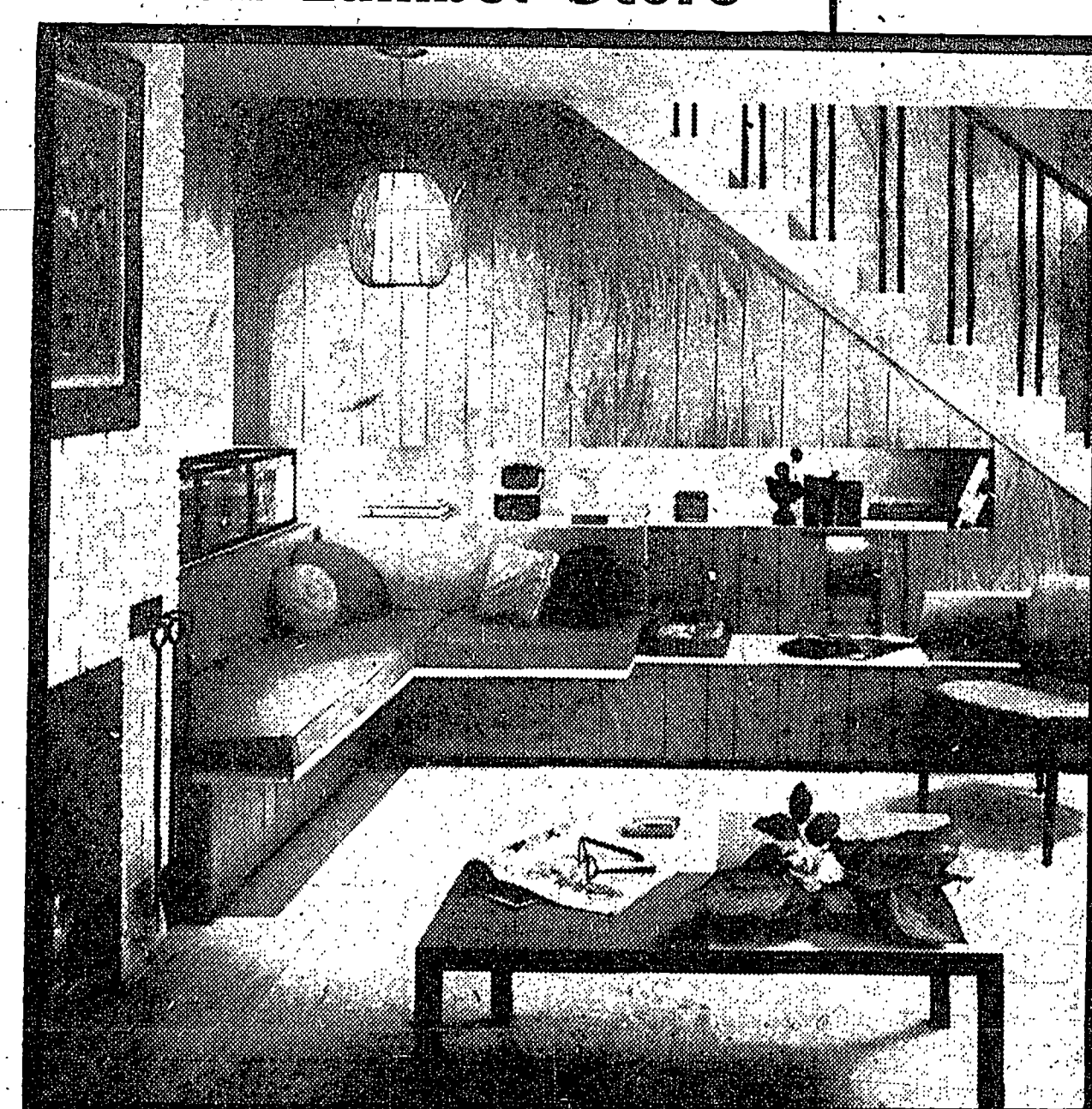
