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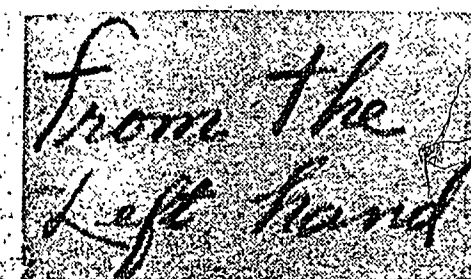

To show just how closely-knit a community we must be the boys west of Harlem squeezed to the most narrowest of victories, winning by one run, from the boys east of Harlem.

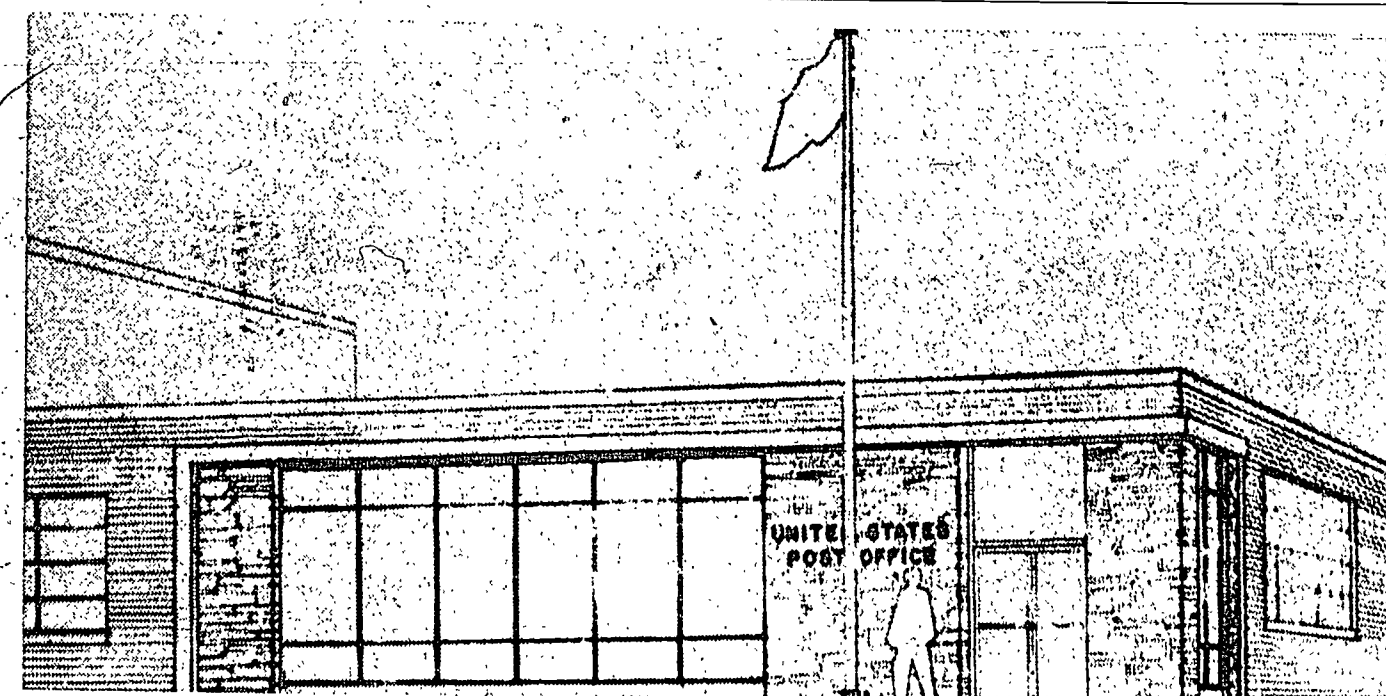

### Post Office Plans To Be Announced In 2-3 Weeks

"Niles should know within two or three weeks of the acceptance of a bid for the proposed Post Office building to be located at the northeast corner of Milwaukee and Octavia," stated Arthur C. Chandler, regional real estate manager for the Chicago Post Office, in an interview with THE BUGLE.

Chandler added that the evaluation of the seven or eight bids received for the building is a complex problem which requires deliberation before a decision can be reached. The problem was referred to Washington where the answer will be forthcoming.

A Mr. Larson, head of the operational department of the Chicago Post Office, mentioned that the forthcoming Niles building will only serve the Village north of Touhy. The area south of Touhy will continue to be served by the Norwood Park station.

Chandler said that after the proposal has been accepted for the new building, the bidder will have to draw up specs and exercise his option for the land. He said the breaking of ground would then follow in thirty days. He believed this branch office would then be in operation by Christmas. THE BUGLE assumes the means in 1958. Mr. Chandler's previous predictions have proved somewhat premature.

Dear Editor:

More than a year ago taxpayer's money was used to pay the Village Engineers, Consoer and Townsend, to perform a survey of Niles' flood problems. Postcard questionnaires mailed to all homeowners formed the basis for determining the extent of our problem. Consoer and Townsend submitted an eye appealing, well-designed, impressive looking brochure individually addressed, one to each Trustee.

The brochure, reported on the extent of our flood problem in Niles and made recommendations on several alternate means of alleviating these conditions.

It would seem logical, having received the "expert's" advice, our Village Fathers should have immediately taken the initiative in following one or more of the recommended solutions in order to spare Niles citizens from any future flood damages. You and I know that we have flooded on several occasions since then. (Three subsequent to the big July 12th disaster to my knowledge). Apparently floods are still very much with us.

Could it be that the Trustees do not feel safe in following Consoer and Townsend's recommendations because of certain other experiences (such as the famous altitude valve on the water tower). Of course that incident netted the village a free gift of ultra modern council chamber furniture from the firm of Consoer and Townsend).

When I am sick I see a doctor. If I have faith in that doctor I follow his advice . . . and get cured. If the doctor's advice is followed and I am not cured, or if I lose faith in my doctor's ability to solve my problem, I don't go to him anymore and pay him hard-earned cash for advice which is either worthless or which I will not follow anyway. I CHANGE DOCTORS.

WHAT WILL THE VILLAGE TRUSTEES DO?

I hear that the Trustees have requested the Village Engineers make another survey, paid once again with taxpayer's money. Will this new survey show that we now have more flood problems than the last survey showed? Do surveys solve our problem? Are we going to be blessed with a new survey every time our basements are converted into filthy swimming pools?

Perhaps our Trustees have done all they can do! Perhaps the Village Engineers and Attorney Wells have done their utmost! But . . . was our flood problem solved? Perhaps it is you and I, the citizens, who are to blame for lack of progress in solving our flood problems.

## Trustees Meeting Of June 4

The June 4 Board of Trustees meeting convened at 9 P.M. Trustee John Poeschl was acting president pro tem in the absence of Mayor Staniewicz. Trustee Ken Coughlin was also absent.

The first hour of the meeting was devoted to the sewer problems of local residents (Story on Page 1).

Engineer Bill Cadigan reported the results of an inspection the village engineers made in the 7200 to 7400 blocks in the Greenleaf-Lili-Conrad area. (At the April 24 meeting a complaint was registered with the Board regarding the poor drainage in the sloping areas at these lots.) Cadigan stated that the homes, built by Fidelity Builders, were built in accordance to the plans, regarding the correct elevation. However, he added that there were definite deviations regarding the elevation in the rear of the lots. He added that the builder sets his own "points" regarding the markings for elevation. Cadigan emphasized that the village engineers are not involved in these activities since their work only concerns public improvements. He said the area is too built up now to determine who is at fault regarding the correct grading. (He said he could not say who created this problem but that the grading is not in accordance with the original plans.) Cadigan stated, "I am not here to fix responsibility, only to do an engineering job." The plans were approved by the FHA and the VA. He said that four catch basins in the area, which would cost from \$1000 to \$12000 each could alleviate the problem.

Poeschl said he would make an attempt to see Fidelity Builders and see what they would do about the problem. The Village will also send a letter, relating to a solution.

John Morgan, 6950 Niles Terrace, complained of what he described as a public nuisance. He said a burned out building on Niles Terrace is now resting on crumbing since a fire destroyed it March 27. He said the builder promised it would be removed within 60 days. Morgan complained that it is a hazard to children playing about the rubble. He added that charcoal is blowing on his property from the building. Attorney Wells explained there are three methods which can legally be taken to remove the rubble. The owner can be prosecuted, sued or the court can be petitioned to take the building away. However, it was decided as the result of a suggestion by Trustee Stanley that a letter be sent to the owner requesting the building be removed within fifteen days. If after fifteen days the rubble remains the police will be ordered to give the owner a ticket each day it remains on this property.

In other actions the Milwaukee-Golf water plans will be acceptable after they are checked by counsel.

Trustee Nielsen presented a request (we assumed from the public works department) for an auxiliary transmitter for the water tanks which would save two hours manual work twice a year, once in the summer and in the winter. The transmitter would cost \$1129 plus \$400 for installation. Trustee Stanley asked, "How much would it cost to gold-plate the Oriole water tank?" (This tank has resulted in a cost of \$424 for an altitude valve which was purchased as

a result of the Oriole tank which was built ten feet higher than the old tank, which work in conjunction with one another.) Stanley then added that at the forementioned costs the transmitter would pay for itself in 87 years. Trustee Marszalek stated during this was a lot of money for saving two hours work twice a year. Marszalek then made a motion that this subject be tabled at this time.

The Board then approved that bids be accepted for a fully automatic operated pump and generator which would pump a 2000 gallon minimum per minute in the event of a power shortage which would knock out the power to pump water to the Village. Stanley suggested that be considered for the Village Hall as well, protecting the radio and lights that might be affected by a power shortage. Further study of this need will be made.

Attorney Wells announced that one-third public funds plus \$37,500 would be available for the improvement of Ottawa and other streets.

An amendment to the vehicle license ordinance was adopted which places into law that no fee will be less than 1/2 of the annual fee. New residents will have to purchase a vehicle license within 30 days after they have moved into the area. An amount proportionate to the period remaining for the year will be paid by the new resident.

Stanley asked Wells how proceedings for annexation in the area north of Dempster are progressing. Wells said that his contact with the area, an attorney named Lawler, said a piece of property has now been sold which was holding up the an-

nexation proceedings. All but one or two of the homeowners in the area have been contacted. (It is necessary that the residents petition to the Village of Niles in order that they move into the incorporated limits of Niles.)

Wells said Lawler is a "substantial" lawyer and that he wants to come in to Niles. He added that he is keeping in close touch with Lawler.

Stanley then asked what would happen to the saloons in the event of annexation. Wells stated that they would become subject to our ordinances (which restrict their number) but that he believed Niles should make some concessions. (The tavern owners themselves would have to petition for the annexation and it would be hardly likely that they would desire annexation if their admittance would result in a closing down of their business establishments.)

Marszalek desired the attorney to investigate the ICC sewer rates in the Park Lane area which he said were excessive.

A final audit report will be presented at a trustees' meeting on Monday, June 16 at 7:30 P.M. Appropriations for the coming year will be "set-up" at this time.

The engineers were directed to set up specs for improvements for paving, curb and gutters, and sewers and water on Over-
