Vote On 0.6 Library Tax In Spring

Niles 48 Post Office Opened Mon.

The new Niles, Illinois Post Office was opened for business on November 17, according to an announcement made by Postmaster Carl A. Schroeder.

The new facility is located at 7727 Milwaukee Avenue. It is a part of the Post-Office Department's Commercial Leasing Program which uses private financing to obtain needed facilities.

Since these facilities remain under private ownership while leased to the Federal Government, they pay taxes to this City, as well as eliminate the need of large outlays of money from the Federal Treasury for construction purposes, the Postmaster explained.

The new facility will have an actual operating area of 5,400 square feet, in addition to deck space to accommodate six vehicles in an area of 63' by 12'.

This new postal facility symbolizes a new era in communication in postal zone 48. Schroeder commented. It will be a pleasant place for our patrons to do business, and a pleasurable place for our postal employees to provide an efficient service.

The Niles Station has the latest type of open counters permitting the patron to view the operations. The entire floor area will be devoted to financial transactions, deposit of letters, distribution by carriers according to mail routes, and the distribution of parcels for delivery in zone 48.

Approximately 25 carriers, 3 clerks and 1 collector were assigned to the delivery of the ever important letter and package.

This new facility will be another link with a postal system today which has more than 37,000 post offices, serving 170 million persons; handling about 23 billion dollars and 24 billion stamps a year.

In postal zone 48, the friendly postal carrier will make stops at about 6,000 addresses each day to deliver his daily messages.

Philip L. Loenertz of 6736 N. Ontario Avenue has been named by Postmaster Schroeder to head the operation at this, the latest in postal operations. He will be assisted by Lawrence W. (Continued on Page 4)

Kirk Laner Says Ph. Bd. Favors Grennan Heights

"What bothers me is that the Park Board likes to improve Grennan Heights... should the people of Grennan Heights get everything they want? ... we, here in Kirk Lane should be considered also". So spoke Len Szymanski, 7743 Waukegan Road, president of the Kirk Lane Home-owners' Association at their monthly meeting November 7 at the Village Hall.

Szymanski was referring to the new addition to the Grennan Heights' fieldhouse which is scheduled to be built this coming spring. He said whenever his group approaches the Park Board for buying land for the Kirk-Lane area the Board contends they don't have money for the land. "The new addition will cost \$20,000... we, the people of Kirk Lane would certainly thank the Board if they used this money for the purchase of land in Kirk Lane", said Szymanski.

The Kirk Lane group is interested in the park board acquiring property at the east side of Waukegan Road, south of the proposed shopping center. The property has a 116 foot frontage on Waukegan Road and extends 780 feet east along Jonquil Terrace.

The Park board now had the land appraised at \$25,000 whereas the landowners' appraisal has been for \$42,000. The Park Board has contended they would be interested in the property if they could purchase it for a fair price and have the payments extend over several years.

0.6 Tax Will Expand Facilities

The Niles Village Library Board has approved a 0.6 tax referendum election which will be held the first or second week of April in 1959.

The Board, meeting in the home of Mrs. Edward Walger, 8267 Wisner, November 6, started the wheels in motion for the referendum to set up a Niles Library District. A successful referendum will necessitate a second election within two or three months to elect six members to the Library Board.

The 0.6 tax, which is comparable to the Park District's 0.5 recreation tax will cost the average Niles homeowner about \$3.50. According to Rudy Hazucha, president of the Library Board, this one tax will enable the Board to meet the cost of expanding the facilities of the Library and to eventually build a library building without the need for a bond issue.

The approval of the 0.6 tax would bring in upwards of \$30,000 per year beginning late summer of 1960. The Board feels that it must get larger facilities soon, since it is now at the point where it can hardly find room for the limited number of new books it is currently buying. There is hope that the 0.6 tax rate can be lowered eventually once a new building and an adequate basic collection of books are obtained.

The present library, which is housed in the Grennan Heights Fieldhouse, was opened in April of 1957. The back-breaking work of getting a library started was done by the Woman's Club of Niles. They were the driving force behind the book drive in the fall of 1955 and the setting up of the Niles Village Library Board in the Spring of 1959. The Board is made up of representatives of the various civic, business and educational groups within the village.

The library is now circulating close to 2,000 books per month. It has a collection of over 3,500 books and is open to the public 13 hours a week. It is manned entirely by volunteers and operated on funds donated by most of the same groups which have delegates on the board. In addition, some 500 families pay a \$1 a year fee for using the library's resources.

The board feels that the need for better library services are extremely urgent. Being unable to help high school students with their homework assignments due to lack of books and space for study is just one example of the shortcomings of the present library. Hazucha told THE BUGLE "It is hoped that all parents who are interested in the future of their children will get behind this tax referendum and put Niles on the map in its library services."

Nov. 5 Review Of Trustees' Meeting

A resume of the November 5 Board of Trustees meeting:

Arcole-Midwest was awarded the contract for the improvement of Ottawa and Other Streets. Their low bid was \$233,411.56. Trustee Stanley voted against awarding the contract to this company. Stanley said the parkways in the Washington and Other Streets improvement were never restored to their original condition as the contract had guaranteed.

Ranieri Contracting Co. low bid of \$25,397.75 for the construction of a sanitary sewer in the Harris-Riverside Drive area was unanimously approved.

Four Pontiac Catalinas and one Rambler were approved for the 1959 police cars. The Rambler will be used for the radar-car. The \$7,244.99 low bid was less than bids for Ford and Plymouth cars.

Extension of water mains and sewers between Oakton and Dempster on Cumberland, were requested by homeowners. Engineers were authorized to draw up plans and specs.

Advertising for Greenleaf water main extension and auxiliary pump for the water station were approved.

Notified Civil Service

Board to hire three firemen effective December 1. This addition will conform with the Cook County Fire Inspection Bureau's recommendation, enabling Niles to be placed in a Class 4 rating. The rating will result in a lowering of insurance rates from 5 to 10 per cent.

The State of Illinois was to inspect the Oakton-Merrill area which has been flooding during rainfalls.

Stoplights for Milwaukee-Main, Monroe, Milwaukee and Howard-Waukegan would be requested of the state at the suggestions of Trustees Poeschl and Coughlin. Mayor Stankowicz said the state will be reminded that the increased traffic warrants these safeguards. He said the Village would provide the energy for the lights.

The revised and corrected taxi-cab ordinance was approved. The fee for each cab will be \$25 and no more than ten cabs will be allowed per company. A taximeter will be installed in all cabs.

Referred to committee the possibility of curbing and sidewalks on Oakton Street between Washington Street and the Standard station to the west.

Approved a public commendation to the heads of the Fire and Public Works Departments for their efficiency.

Approved a permit for the Central Sheet Metal Company to dig a well at Howard and Lehigh.

Approved the drawing up of an ordinance making the 7000 block on Main Street a one-way street going to the west.

Discussed the desirability of a fire station at the north end of Niles. Trustee Marszalek thought the Dempster-Milwaukee corner "might" be the more desirable location. Trustee Stanley said a new station might place Niles in a number 3 rating (only Oak Park, Evanston and Chicago have these ratings in Cook County).

A sewer line paid for by Ben Mattion on the west side of Milwaukee south of Oakton was approved. A request for a franchise ordinance was granted subject to the petitioner's (Mattion) willingness to pay for the drawing up of the ordinance.

The misdemeanor ordinance was approved 6-0.

Sewer and paving plans for a 13 lot subdivision east of St. John's Church, owned by Callero and Catino were approved.

Ramps leading into the new northwest highway will be at Canfield and Oriole, Natoma and Nagle Avenues. These will be the closest points for Niles suggest that Niles should take action to improve the ingress and egress to the highway by vastly improving the arterials leading onto the highway (Milwaukee and Harlem Avenues). Engineer Cadigan said the highway will have ramps every half a mile and that the finishing dates for this project should be some time in 1960. Cadigan said the new highway would change the entire pattern of traffic in our area. Trustee Poeschl will attend a meeting regarding this matter.

The trustees formally accepted the resignation of Joe Morheiser as Building Inspector. Mayor Stankowicz asked the question whether the building commissioner might take over the job. However, Stanley said, Frank DiMaria was the most qualified (DiMaria is Morheiser's business partner). He was unanimously approved by the board to fill the interim period until April.

Four trustees and Ed Bacher, head of the Public Works Department, were to attend the Illinois Municipal Convention at Springfield. The trustees approved \$700 for expense money for the convention.

A letter to Fidelity Builders to alleviate flood conditions in rear areas, was approved. Upon completing the request the village will no longer hold Fidelity responsible for future flooded conditions. Mr. Lewicki,

707. Olcott complained about water going into five homes in his area. Engineer Cadigan said standing water problems are the concern of the engineers. He said the building inspector should handle this matter. DiMaria will investigate this problem.

The trustees authorized Healy Bros. to connect the sanitary sewers at the manholes in the Jonquil-Milwaukee area as well as the Monroe-Milwaukee location.

The meeting then was adjourned until November 12.

November 12 Trustee Notes

Lee Schielka, owner of the property at 8333 Ottawa Avenue, requested the trustees reverse a zoning board decision which prevents him from building on a 30 foot lot at the November 12 meeting.

Schielka, a building contractor, acquired title to the property September 4 as the result of a tax foreclosure action. He requested a variation which, if granted, would enable him to build a home on the lot which would have a 22 foot frontage on Ottawa.

Schielka had been before the zoning board October 22 but was refused the variation by a 4 to 2 vote. Schielka had previously been granted variations on 30 foot lots at 8028 Wisner and 7620 Madison.

David Calder and Charles Pickup, the two neighboring property owners were at the meeting to protest Schielka's request. Calder stated Schielka should have known the building code now requires larger lots for building. Calder added that Schielka would be building between two 60 foot areas.

Mayor Stankowicz said that the code now requires 50 foot lots for residential building, whereas formerly, 25 and 30 foot lots were being used. Trustee Poeschl mentioned that in 1951 the 30 foot classification was

changed. However he added that the Village is not in the habit of condemning such property and using it for their own benefit.

Calder stated the intended home on this property would depreciate the value of the existing homes on the block and break-up the continuity of the existing neighborhood (most of the homes in the area are Georgian homes).

Trustee Trocki then asked Calder what he would do if he owned the lot, being in a similar position as Schielka. Calder said he would attempt to sell it to the neighboring homes. Both neighbors, Calder and Pickup, said they would be willing to buy the property at a reasonable price. After Schielka agreed to a conference with the neighbors Mayor Stankowicz called a short recess while the interested parties attempted to work out an agreement among themselves.

But when the meeting was reconvened no agreement could be reached. Pickup contended Schielka wanted \$4000 for the 30 foot lot which both neighbors considered "out of line." Schielka had stated several times during the meeting that he bought the property in order to build a home on it and was not interested in selling the lot as it was.

Calder then said he would stand the court costs if the Village rejected this request and were forced to "go into court" to settle the issue. Attorney Christopher Jones was unsure whether the Village could accept Calder's request regarding his payment.

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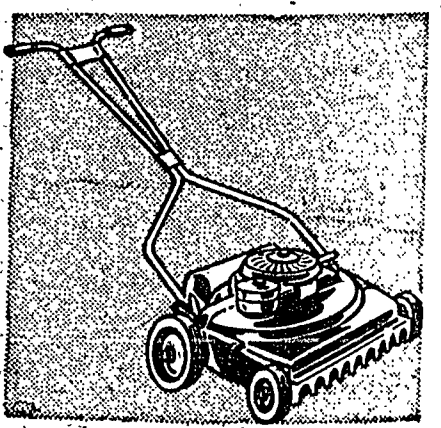

ing the legal cost which the Village was liable for. Action on this matter was thus deferred until December 3rd while Jones took this request under consideration.

In other actions a training program for Niles policemen was referred to the police and fire committee for further study.

Richard Schaul, owner of the Burgundy Inn, 7146 Milwaukee Avenue, which borders the Niles Fire Department section of the Village Hall, requested double parking along the north wall of his building be banned in the future. Schaul mentioned when the volunteer firemen come to the fire station they leave their cars in double rows blocking Schaul's customers' cars. While Schaul admitted most of the property is Village property he nevertheless stated that it would create a problem if one of the customers' cars was ever to catch on fire. Schaul said that the Village uses his property to the rear of his business and that he has never objected to this. He said he has spent several hundred dollars in improving the rear area which the village uses. He said he will continue cooperating in the two groups' use of each other's property but feels this double parking constitutes a hazard and a hardship. Schaul intimated that he wouldn't object if the Village wanted to pave the rear area behind his business but was primarily interested in the double parking at this time. This problem was referred to the Buildings and Grounds Committee.

The trustees then approved the "plans and specs" for the sidewalks, curbs and sewer improvements in the Gail Ann Subdivision.

The meeting was then adjourned until December 3.

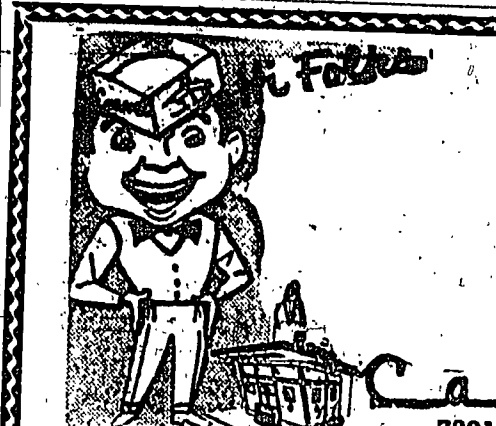

During the past week, members of the Niles Township High School Board of Education and the Citizens' Council for High Schools of Niles Township spoke to over two thousand voters.

Announce Niles Plans For Future

At a meeting with its architects held last week, the Niles Township High School Board of Education summarized its final decisions concerning the details of its expansion plans for Niles East and Niles West.

"Niles East was originally designed for only 1,200 students," stated Board President William Wise, "and, while additions have been made to some of its instructional facilities, the original provisions for physical education and music instruction have not been enlarged since 1939."

"Consequently," Wise continued, "the present physical education program is below the standards recommended by the state, and the same may be said for our provisions for the music department at Niles East. Furthermore, the Board feels it necessary in order to meet the needs of a future enrollment of 2,000 students to provide additional academic classrooms."

Accordingly, the Board has announced the following four-point expansion program for Niles East:

1. Construction of 12 new academic classrooms;
2. Construction of a music wing to include band, orchestra, choral, individual practice, and storage rooms;
3. Construction of six new physical education stations;
4. Installation of health, attendance, guidance, and administration service rooms and offices.

These proposed additions will cost \$775,000.

The Board stated that in order to convert Niles West, which was built as a two-year school for freshmen and sophomores, to a comprehensive four-year high school, it will be necessary to make the following installations:

1. Three industrial art shops for elementary and advanced instruction in woodworking, metal working, and automobile mechanics;
2. Equipment for the electric shops and drafting rooms;
3. Three physics and chemical laboratories;
4. Facilities for junior and senior instruction in business education.

Estimated cost of Niles West installations is \$350,000.

For both high schools the estimate comes to \$1,125,000. This is one of the three proposals on the \$8,625,000 bond issue.

about the \$8,625,000 high school bond issue, Board President William Wise, Board Secretary John Speer, Board Members Ernest Eisenberg, Kenneth Littrell, and Francis Saunders, and members of the Citizens' Council Speaker Bureau appeared before the PTA groups of the Cleveland, Upper Lincoln, Lower Lincoln, Lincoln Hall, Sharp Corner, East Prairie, Edison, Grove, Park View, and Devonshire schools, the East Side and Northwest Property Owner's Associations, and the League of Women Voters.

In their efforts to reach as many as possible of the registered voters in Niles Township, the High School Board and the Citizens' Council are offering speakers for appearances before all PTA and church groups, Civic and Fraternal organizations, Property Owners' Associations and any other organized groups that are interested in receiving information about the bond issue. It was announced that any groups desiring a speaker may make arrangements by calling Mrs. Lily Lubin at ORchard 6-3800, Ext. 37, who will relay requests to Mrs. Helen Goldstein, chairman of the Citizens' Council Speaker Bureau.

By December 13, the date set for the referendum on the \$8,625,000 bond issue, the Citizens' Council, through its Neighborhood Visitation Committee, Publicity Committee and Speaker Bureau, will endeavor to communicate its case for the High School expansion program to every segment of the voting public.

Both the Niles Township High School Board of Education and Citizens' Council for High Schools' Council for High Schools' Council Speaker stated their belief that the grant bond issue will be approved if the voters fully understand the facts concerning the urgent need

for the expansion of high schools in Niles Township.

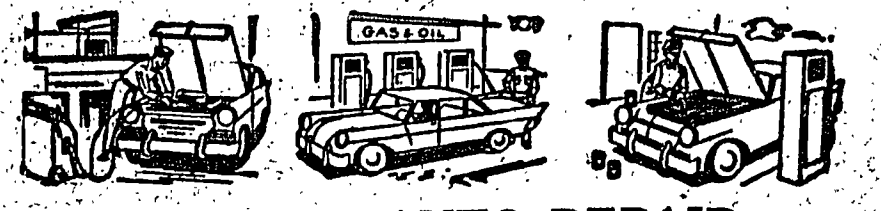
Here's how it works:

Mehring Completes N.U. Traffic Course

Sergeant Bill Mehring, Jr., 6949 Jarvis Ave., was one of a class of 35 traffic policemen who will complete three weeks of training Friday, Nov. 21, at the Traffic Institute of Northwestern University.

The short course, entitled "Fundamentals of Police Traffic Service," was conducted at the Institute's Training Center in Evanston, Ill. It was designed for police administrators and supervisors and officers selected by them to handle traffic operations.

The students represent city and county departments in seven states, and range in rank from patrolman to lieutenant. The class also includes a deputy sheriff and two officers each from Canada and the Republic of Korea.

The men studied three main areas of police traffic supervision: accident investigation, traffic law enforcement, and traffic control. The training also emphasized the management aspects of police traffic work. Ray Ashworth, director of the Traffic Institute, said the training "should help chiefs get the maximum yield from limited manpower in the traffic policing of their communities."

A number of the offers attended by means of grants from the Citizen's Traffic Safety Board of Chicago, the Chicago and the Cleveland Automobile Clubs, and the International Cooperation Administration.

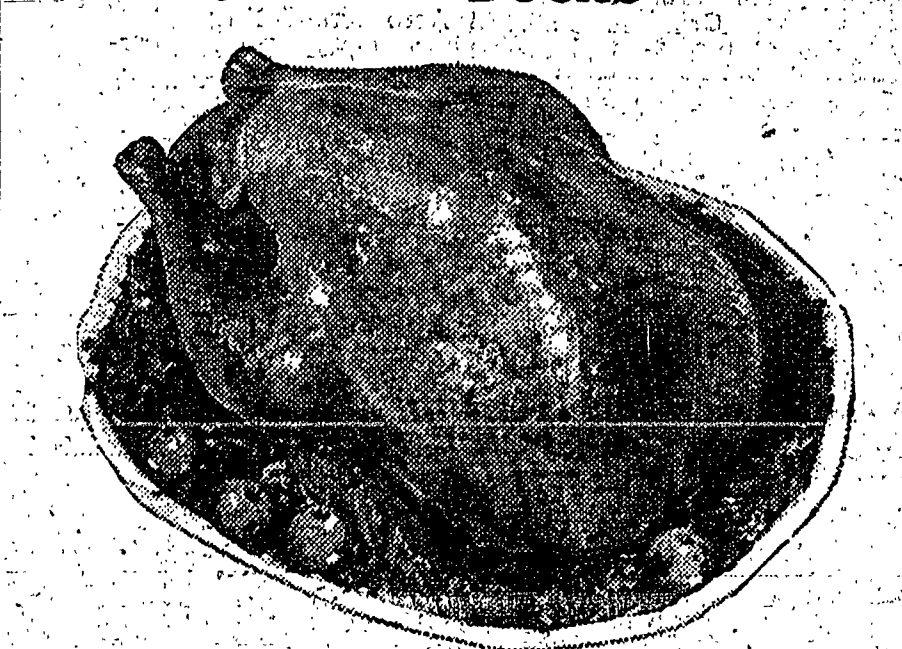

WAUKEGAN ROAD AND
SHERMER AVENUE A
ONE-WAY STREET

BE IT ORDAINED by the
resident and Board of Trustees
of the VILLAGE OF NILES,

First choice of servicemen overseas at Christmastime: to be at home. Short of that ideal gift, they would like home to come to them—in the form of homemade food, family photos, recordings of family gatherings, hometown papers and, above all else, more mail.

The results of an annual survey made by the Red Cross are reported this week by Mrs. Ernest Dettmar, 8331 Osceola ave., volunteer Red Cross Public Information Representative for Niles.

The survey reveals that most servicemen and women and their dependents can buy traditional gift items in their post exchanges and ships' stores. "A letter every week from the folks at home for the whole year is better than any single Christmas gift," they agree.

Another way to send a touch of home to servicemen overseas is through recordings of family members, friends, and neighbors telling about what goes on at home. "There's nothing like hearing the voices of your family, and a recording can be replayed many times." All have one admonition: Keep it cheerful!

The Home Service Department of the Chicago Chapter, American Red Cross, through its "Voices from Home" program, provides free recording facilities to families that want to extend holiday greetings in this unique, personal way. Mrs. Dettmar reports. Persons wanting to use the free service are asked to call for an appointment at Chapter Headquarters, 529 S. Wabash Ave. in Chicago, Wabash 2-7850, or at a branch office.

In Evanston, 615 Davis St., UN 4-9000 and HO 5-4090, records can be made from November 17-21.

Although the survey shows that most servicemen don't own a phonograph, "Voices from Home" recordings can be played at Red Cross recreation centers or at service clubs.
