homes were built before that apartment construction and a multiple dwelling units in Niles. He said small one and two bedroom apartments (especially of efficiency apartments) were needed. He said they would enhance the tax income to the town without increasing services rendered to the buildings. (As example, buildings in excess of four or six units now must use private scavenger service).

SCHOOL DISTRICTS

He said that there is a definite need for school district consolidation. He noted the great inequality of the various districts regarding industrial development. However he also said this is a very difficult task to get the districts realigned.

PARKS

While noting the need of an increase from 8 per cent to 11 per cent in park-school forest preserve area he noted that Niles park area was extremely low.

BORDERS

Niles has very definite borders (which we assume is unlike many neighboring areas). He pointed to the definiteness of the forest preserve, to the east Morton Grove to the north and Park Ridge to the west which gives Niles definite identification.

ZONING

Milwaukee Avenue is Niles prime problem. Niles is in need of modern planning and zoning. The strip type shopping extending along Milwaukee Avenue is poor. It is similar to Chicago shopping along street car lines. Gardner cited how this type of planning in Chicago has caused "marginal defunct activity" along streets such as Clark and Broadway. Shopping on both sides of the main street such as these areas, have given away to planned shopping areas.

He said the latest thinking for shopping areas is that they should be in compact clusters rather than cut-up by major highways.

Regarding four corners' shopping he said this is the worst place of any for shopping. Gardner said, "Old Orchard couldn't conceive of such planning". He reiterated that Milwaukee Avenue will have to be reclaimed... as a thoroughfare... and that by so doing it will improve the community as a whole.

The entire completed report will be forthcoming in about four weeks.

Jacobs, as secretary of the board, received petitions up to the 12 midnight deadline last Saturday night. Within five days, he must now certify the existing petitions in order of their filing and submit them to the Park Board.

Undoubtedly the legality of Jacobs' second petition will be questioned before the election. As of this writing it is unknown whether the word "petition" or "petitions" is applicable regarding the law governing the applications.

Editorials Think For Yourself Vote For The Man

If we can accept the popular cigarette ad which states that will agree with us that in next week's village election voters should vote for the "MAN" rather than for the "PARTY". Party have basic disagreements. More important, both parties have men who have opposed the Mayor in one election and then have re- ceived his support in a second election. Believing that the best qualified men will best serve the people of Niles it is our opinion that STANLEY, SCHEEL and BRUNO have the most proven qual- ifications to serve you and me.

The following is why these men are our choices:
JOHN STANLEY has undoubtedly made the greatest contribu- tion to Niles of any man ever serving on the village board. He was primarily responsible for annexation of the Golf Mill shopping. He property. Independent market researchers have stated that Niles will receive an annual revenue of from \$250,000 to \$400,000 annually from the center alone. We have checked with many people, attorneys, engineers and other non-political persons, who have all stated that it was John Stanley who was most responsible for this annexation. His voting record has supported the people's interests and he has been responsible in obtaining the services of the village planner whose professional advice has been sorely needed in Niles.

KEN SCHEEL, the independent candidate, we believe would make the greatest impact on the board since Stanley's invasion. Scheel is an extremely forceful person who I believe has proven leadership ability which would make him an able trustee.

Scheel, who admittedly has no funds available for the cam- paign and has a very limited group of people behind him, is a man we urge all residents to consider.
Normally we do not believe a man's war record is important in a political campaign. But in Scheel's case we think it is im- portant that all Nilesites should consider his accomplishments. He enlisted in the Marines during World War 2 as a private and received a commission overseas. He served as a captain in the Korean War overseas. While THE BUGLE's rank never exceeded know, and we showed great distaste for officers, nevertheless we be much respected. His rising to the rank of Captain in the Marines and leading a company in combat is certainly indicative of his leadership ability.

He is an intelligent business executive who is another man who "thinks for himself". He does not believe in having any man tachment to any party in a local election which we concur with. We believe if Scheel loses this election Niles will be the greater loser.

SANTO (SAM) BRUNO is our third choice for trustee. Like Scheel and Stanley, he has an excellent background which qual- ifies him for the trustee role. Bruno served as president of the Jonquil Terrace Association and is held in high regard in that area. He has been active in supporting the hospital drive and was instrumental in petitioning his area for the lowering of speed limits. Bruno has a fine business background, has an excellen- civic background, has a wide knowledge of village activities and would make an able trustee.

If there was a fourth trustee job open we would vote for BEN SOSNOWSKI. He has been active in the Kirk Lane Association for Sosnowski. He has been active in the Kirk Lane Association for several years and is held in high respect in his area. Sosnowski, who we know personally better than any of the candidates, is a man of integrity and certainly civic-minded. However, considering the background of all candidates we believe the three aforemen- tioned candidates are the best qualified to serve as trustee.

JOHN POESCHL, the incumbent who is seeking re-election, is probably the hardest worker of any trustee now serving on the board. However, as we mentioned in previous issues, Poeschl's business interests conflict with his role as trustee. In reviewing his voting record on the Board two examples, which we do not believe were in the best interests of the village, force us to reject him as a trustee candidate. A friend of the village fathers, George Heinz, requested his property alongside the Niles Public School property be rezoned Commercial. Since Poeschl rejected Commer- cial zoning at Milwaukee and Main, because he stated he was

Vote "Yes" For Library

This coming Saturday, April 18th, Niles will vote on a referen- dum to establish a tax-supported Public Library. Homeowner, civic and service groups and community leaders have all gone on record in favor of the Library.

By voting "YES" on the proposition, Nilesites will be taking advantage of a bargain: for approximately the price of one "best seller" per year (\$4 or \$5 for the average homeowner) a profession- ally staffed Public Library can become a reality in Niles.
Many of us moved to Niles in order to provide our children with a better atmosphere for growing up. But fresh air, plenty of sunshine and nice neighbors are not the only requisites for this "better atmosphere. After all, the primary "business" of our chil- dren is to learn. This is true whether they are in school, playing with their pals or participating in family life. Books are a "foun- tation of learning. Without an adequate public library, our chil- dren are being deprived of an essential source for learning which all of our surrounding communities offer their children.
Why a tax-supported Public Library? Because we have out- grown the tiny volunteer library we now have in the Gretna Heights Field House. Despite the terrific work done by the Wom- en's Club of Niles in giving birth to this library, and the wonder- ful volunteers working there, a volunteer library can no longer hope to meet the needs of our expanding community. One wish- to the Gretna Heights Field House on a busy Saturday morning is sufficient to show that a library in Niles is not just a resting place for dusty old books read only by a very few people. The eager faces of the kids and grown-ups bumping against each other in the tiny room as they search the short supply of books on the

Seek State Funds For Dredging

At the April 1 trustees' meet- ing a letter from the Illinois Di- vision of Waterways touched off a movement instigated by trust- ee John Trocki, which may aid Niles in their battle to prevent flood conditions within the vil- lage.

Trocki has been interested in eliminating a dam in the Tam O'Shanter property which he be- lieves has been detrimental to Nilesites. However, the letter from this state body stated that an inspection of the dam showed it was in accordance with spec- ifications approved when the state issued a permit for its con- struction in 1939. The letter also stated that it did not believe the dam was in violation of the pub- lic interest.

Trocki proposed that all towns and villages which are directly affected by drainage into the north branch of the Chicago river be contacted and that to- gether the towns can bring pres- sure to the state legislature which will result in state funds for dredging and widening the river.

Trustee Poeschl said Niles has been a collecting basin for 102 miles of river flow and he believed it was Niles' job to con- tact the other villages regarding bringing pressure to the state. Mayor Stankowicz stated that a letter from the Sanitary Dis- trict requesting villages along

Lee Cress, Pres. of the Niles Park Board: "... Our village certainly is large enough to war- rant the need-urgent enough to war- rant the support of every resi- dent in the area."

10 Village Polls Not For Park Vote

Why will most residents have to go to two different polling places next Tuesday if they want to vote in both the village election and the park election? Originally the Park Board ant- icipated joining with the village board in using their same ten precincts and splitting the costs of the election judges and elec- tion clerks. However, attorney Jim Orphan, park board attor- ney, stated the irregularities of the Niles park district borders, which do not coincide with the village borders, resulted in the necessity of setting up separate polls. He said that part of Park Ridge is in the Niles Park Dis- trict (an area bordering Oakton Manor) and that certain Niles village areas are not in the Niles park district area. The legal problems involved in these con- flicts resulted in the changing of the polls for the park elec- tion. As a result of the change all Niles residents who desire to vote in the park election liv- ing north of Oakton Street will vote at the Gretna Heights Fieldhouse. Persons living south of Oakton Street will vote in the park election at the Village Hall.

On this same day all residents voting in the village election will vote in one of ten precincts near their homes which are designat- ed specifically for the village election.

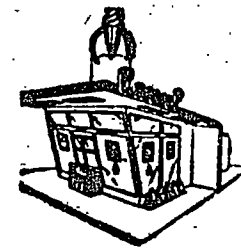

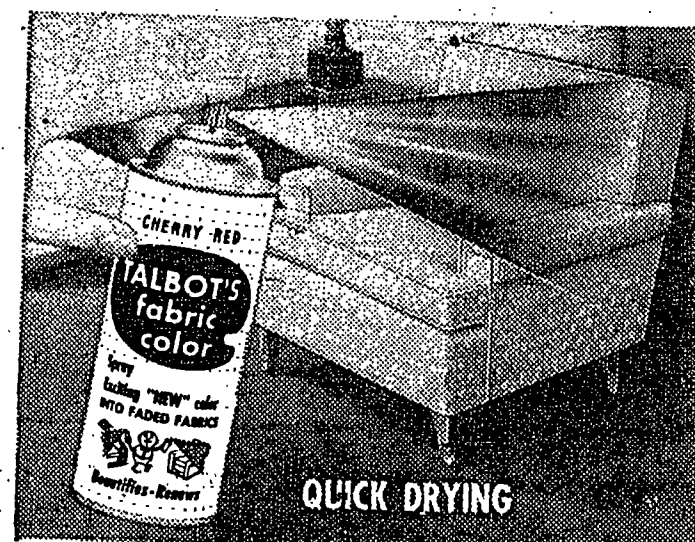

of the plans they submitted petitions to the Board which opposed the plans by about a 500 to 30 vote. In both these cases his running mate Stanley opposed these actions. Whereas, Stanley stood behind the people, Poeschl's vote seemed to disregard the public interest. This is a good example of why voting for a straight ticket is pointless.

Politicizing just before election-time is quite a game and I'll give you an example of how it's played in Niles. I dropped in at a meeting of the Mayor-backed United Taxpayers' Party ticket last week and was quite dismayed by many of those present. Several persons, including trustee Ed Marszalek, brought up the question that they were concerned because THE BUGLE was not getting the legal advertising from the village as of late. They ALL stated they were quite concerned about it and believed THE BUGLE should receive this advertising. While I believed THE BUGLE should receive it as well it was a sickening display of insincerity and was obviously aimed at prejudicing my opinion in favor of the Mayor-backed candidates. What had inspired this conversation was action which had transpired at the April 1 trustees' meeting. When I had criticized Poeschl's business interests in the last two issues of THE BUGLE the legal advertising was suddenly going into the other papers.
