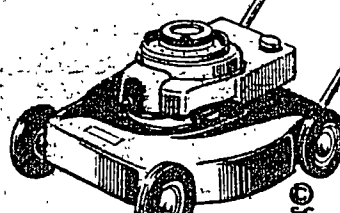

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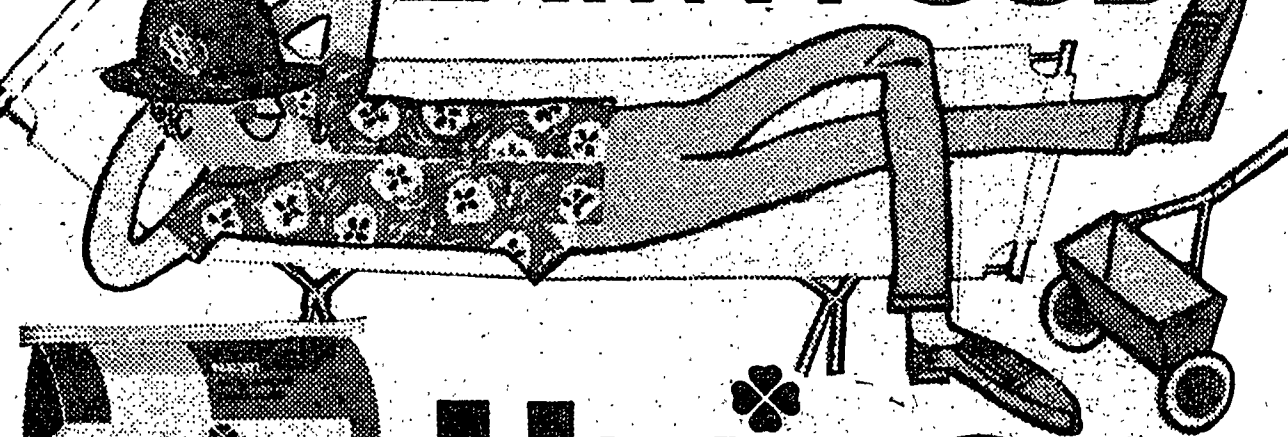
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Teen Dance At Bunker Hill June 5

Stanley Forces Win Committee Battle

Trustee John Stanley's forces showed superior strength to Mayor Frank Stankowicz's army two weeks ago with the resultant victory for the Stanley colors.

At the May 6 Trustees' meeting Mayor Stankowicz read his list of standing committees for the coming fiscal year. While trustees Marszalek and Bruno supported their leader's choices a loud rebel call went out from his adversaries. The Stanley army of Poeschl and Trocki were joined by Nielsen in rebelling against the Stankowicz choices. Militant John Trocki

was most vociferous in his denunciation of the Stankowicz choices. He was removed as head of the police and fire committee and he felt this was a "rank" demotion. The disagreement by the two forces resulted in a meeting two weeks ago to iron out the committee problems for the coming year.

At last Wednesday's meeting the standing committees were unanimously approved. The chairman of each committee is listed first: Finance and Claims, Marszalek, Bruno and Poeschl; Public Health, Judiciary and Ordinances, Bruno, Nielsen and

Stanley; Streets, Alleys and Sanitation, Poeschl, Trocki and Marszalek; Police, and Fire, Trocki, Nielsen and Stanley; Water, Sewer and Lights, Poeschl, Trocki and Marszalek; Plats, Subdivisions and Buildings, Nielsen, Marszalek and Bruno; Licenses, Permits and Special Assessments, Stanley, Nielsen and Trocki.

In other trustees' actions a public hearing for the installation of a water main extension at Howard Street will take place Tuesday, June 16. The estimated cost of the extension will be \$29,977.25. This Tuesday meeting

will be the first meeting when the board will change their meeting date from Wednesday. . . . Approved payment of \$7,659 to Arcole-Midwest for the first estimate on special assessment number 10 (Ottawa and other streets).

Approved a \$19,891.23 fee to the village attorney for his payment on this assessment. (Payment is based on five percent of the \$397,824.64 assessment.)

Approved ordinance for Morton Grove to construct a water main through Niles. It

Apartment Zoning Requested At East End Of Lawrencewood

Oakton St. Bank Site Zoning For Approved

The Lawrencewood shopping center interests requested at Wednesday's trustee meeting that part of their property be rezoned for multiple dwellings and that a 200 square foot corner be rezoned for the possible use of a gas station. The request was referred to the zoning board.

The area at the east end of the center's property, which borders the forest preserve area, is the location where the interested parties would like to build multiple dwelling units. It is likely that they would be six unit buildings. The property is 1713 feet from Oakton street to its southerly border. One tract for the multiple dwelling area extends 291 feet west from the preserve.

A second tract of property to be used for the same purpose extends from the westerly boundary of the first tract west an additional 266 feet. The property then extends 1104 feet to the rear of the school property which fronts on Oakton Street. The school property, which is about in the center of the east-west part of the area extends 604 feet south from Oakton Street.

At the southwest corner of the entire property (the corner of Oakton-Waukegan) a 200 square-foot area is being set aside for the likely use as a gas station. The request for rezoning is from A to Commercial E (this classification includes motels as well as gas stations).

The remaining area of approximately 30 acres is likely to be the location of the shopping center. It has been rumored that the center plans have been revised and possibly a 21 shopping store center would go into the remaining 30 acre tract.

Goldblatt's has been the major store that was to head the shopping center. It was predicted that the center anticipated an annual business of approximately \$20 million dollars.

Smigel told the zoning board that his group was first interested in leasing property. However, the minimum lease the group could receive for the bank would cost \$10,000 a year and a minimum lease of 12 years. He said the rent receipts, which would total \$120,000 for the period, resulted in the more prudent conclusion that it would be best to build a bank. He said the money given in rent could pay for the site, the building and the fixtures.

He then cited the need of finding suitable land at about \$2 per square foot. The land should have adequate depth to prevent traffic problems. Smigel said the building should be about 3500 square feet and about 23,000 square feet for parking and landscaping.

Smigel said his group had a time limit in which to choose a location for the bank, the date being July 5. He hoped the board could render a decision one way or the other so they can reach a conclusion regarding the bank site.

Smigel stated reasons why the bank would be desirable at this location. He said the banking hours from 9 until 2 were desirable since they

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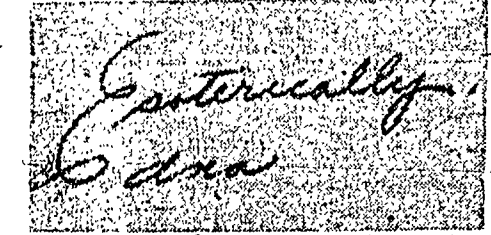

The new board of directors consists of: William Alles, Harry Bernstein, Harry Kordecki, John Mackin, Alfred Martin, and Melvin R. Farnell.

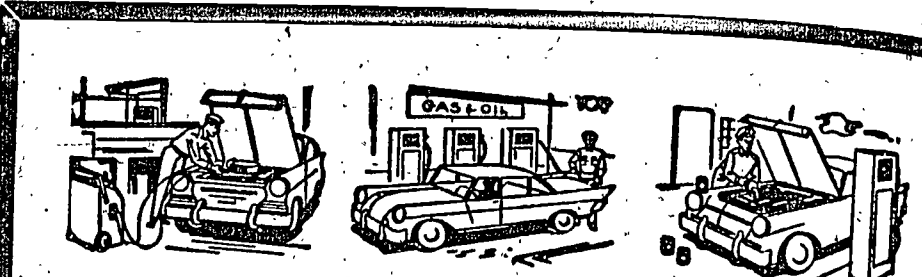

would not conflict with the heavy traffic hours in the area. He noted that a banking operation is a clean business since there is no garbage disposal problem.

Then he mentioned that the bank experts believe the Lawrencewood Shopping Center would be in by 1960 and this, he said, influenced the decision to locate the bank here.

Zoning Board member Ken Scheel then asked if there were any objections from anyone in the room. James Pecora, 7100 Oakton, the resident alongside the property said he had no objection to the bank proposal.

The Zoning Board then approved the rezoning for the express purpose of a bank. In the event the property is not used for this purpose then the land would revert back to its residential classification. The Board approved the rezoning by a 5 to 0 vote. Ed Baumbler, a zoning board member passed on the vote. He stated at the beginning of the discussion, he was one of the organizers of the bank and he did not believe he should be eligible to vote on the issue.

In other actions the Board approved the building of a home on a lot at 8128 Odell. . . . Approved a home on a 30 foot lot at 8041 Ottawa. The house will be 22 feet by 48 feet and the owner, Mr. Rauschenberg, promised to give a written assurance to the two neighbors that he would be responsible for any damage to their home resulting from the building. The Z. B. voted 5 to 0 for the variation. New board member Wente passed on his vote.

Unanimously approved a variation to permit the building of a home on a 39 foot lot at 7812 Harlem. The building will be 24 feet by 42 feet deep. There were no objections from neighbors Bergmann and Cooks, whose homes border the property.

Unanimously approved a variation of lots 16 and 17 at the rear of the Lone Tree Inn parking lot for an additional parking lot. Attorney Roland Lada, representing the petitioner, had three previous meetings with interested residents in the Jonquil Terrace area. They agreed that the Lone Tree Inn owner would build a 7 foot opaque fence along the westerly border of the property used for the parking lot. There was also agreement that there would be a 20 foot buffer zone at the westerly rear of the area which would be maintained by the Lone Tree interests and that a similar fence would also be built along the southerly limits of the property. Lada emphasized that there would be no horn blowing and that lights installed in the area would face away from the adjoining property. Franklin made the motion which led to the granting the variation as he emphasized that the area would be granted remain residential.

available and that was the end of that correspondence.

At the last two meetings of the trustees more liquor requests from old Niles businesses continued to come into the board. As of now, Rainbow Foods, 7960 Waukegan Rd. is seeking rezoning before the next zoning board meeting in anticipation of applying for a package liquor license. Meanwhile Riggio's had sent in a check for the amount of the license for the license. The money was returned. There were no licenses available. At last Wednesday's trustee meeting Riggio sent still another letter regarding clarification of the liquor restriction. The letter requested to know about a waiting list for a license. It queried as to the number of applicants on the waiting list and whose names preceded and anteceded her application. While the same old answer, "No license is now available" Riggio's might have won a small point. Mayor Stankowicz said occasional liquor brought into the premises from the outside for parties was permissible.

Meanwhile the board received a request for a license from the Capri Motel. The letter stated two years ago a request for a license was turned down with the answer that no more licenses were available. Since the recent increase in the present ordinance Capri felt entitled to a license for their establishment. Again the answer was, "No more licenses available".

Why has there been such a revival of interest for license? On February 4 the trustees had approved the increasing of licenses by eight more to enable the annexation to be completed. Six licenses were promised for the Golf Mill shopping center and two more were promised for two restaurants at Milwaukee and Dempster.

May 6 the trustees increased the liquor license ordinance an additional three more to give licenses to businesses which had

previously been operating on county licenses; their entry into the village required they receive the village licenses. Thus, in a 3-month period the liquor licenses within the village increased by 11. The older stores in the village, which had requested licenses years ago, were passed while the new stores received licenses. It is expected that another license will be issued to a store in the planned shopping center at Dempster and Harlem.

In addition to Rainbow Foods, Riggio's and the Capri Motel, Niles Drugs and the two Jewel Foods stores have all requested licenses. They were all rejected because there were none available. With the 11 licenses increase in three months it seems strange that for years many of these stores have been unable to sell liquor because no license was available.
