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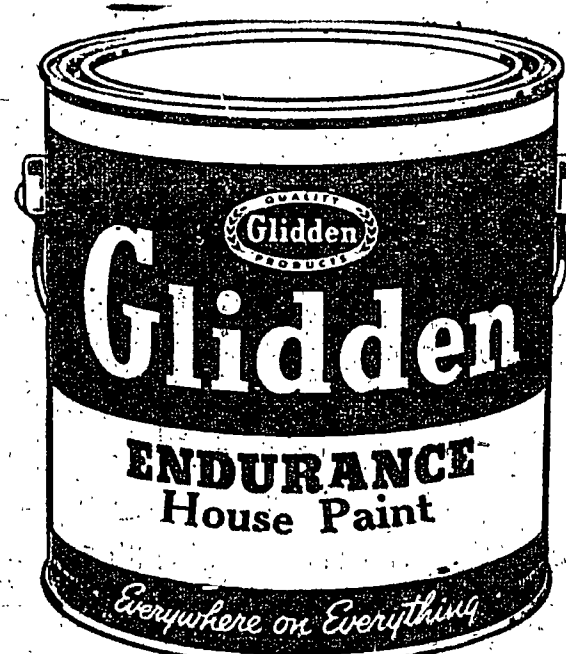
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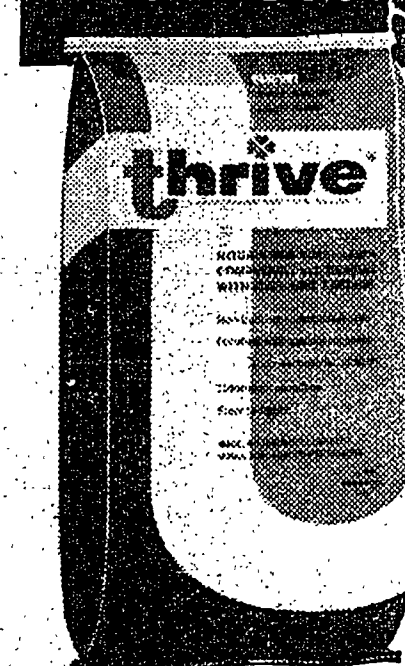
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## Proclaims This Week As Fire Prevention Week

THIS WEEK, October 4 thru 10, marks the 88th anniversary of the Great Chicago fire, and the 37th anniversary of the special week which marks the terrible destruction by fire — in 1871 — of one of the world's great cities.

This is Fire Prevention Week, so proclaimed by President Eisenhower in the United States.

In the last decade, fire has killed more than 100,000 persons, and burned and disfigured many hundreds thousands more.

Each year over 11,000 people in the United States die — needlessly — in fires, and more than twice that numbers are severely burned or disfigured for life, National Fire Protection Association records show.

Fire Prevention Week is set

aside to emphasize the year-to-fire safety — to stress again preventable, that human care around need for greater attention that very nearly all fires are lessness is the guilty party in

THE FIRE Marshall Association of North America, now a section of the National Fire Protection Association, sponsored the original fire prevention day on Oct. 9, 1911, anniversary of the Great Chicago Fire. In 1920, it became National Fire Prevention Day by presidential proclamation.

And in 1922, the entire week including Oct. 9, was officially named Fire Prevention Week in both the United States and Canada.

Bob Wente and Ken Scheel are the two most refreshing public servants we've come across in the 2 1/2 years THE BUGLE has been in business. They are two dedicated selfless men who have consistently opposed the more selfish interests of profit-seekers whose aim at making a quick buck in Niles, the legal, certainly has not been in the best interests of the village.

At the last Zoning Board meeting they opposed a motion for zoning which may lead to another motel, to 18 acres of multiple dwellings and to variations on small lots which would enable the fast-buck boys to reap a quick profit by building "cracker boxes" among more spacious lots.

Wente raised particular came with one realtor who desired an O.K. to build a single family dwelling on a corner lot. He had the petition tabled at the last meeting while Wente found out whether or not the next door neighbor to the questioned lot would be interested in selling. The neighbor agreed and at a reasonable price. The realtor, who has made a series of purchases of the smaller lots, amidst the larger ones, was quite chagrined to come up against Mr. Wente. In several similar cases he had clear sailing in having 30 foot lots o.k'd for buildings but this time he was unprepared for Wente.

Bob is the most conscientious person we've seen at any meetings in the village. He has passed on several votes in which he obviously felt unprepared to give a proper decision. I was told that he spends many of his Saturdays investigating property which will come up at impending meetings.

While the hard-headed realists and businessmen, whose ideals are so often motivated by compromise, often sneer at THE BUGLE for its "sophomoric utterings," we wave the flag for Mr. Wente, a guy to be reckoned with. If Wente and Scheel should ever graduate (this is: graduating?) to the village board I imagine a quick migration of Nilesites away from the village would be imminent.

THE BUGLE is considering making a major change (not changing its owner, you wishful thinkers). The venerable name of this paper has withstood the barrage from its tormentors since its inception. It has affectionately been referred to as the BUNGLE and we ourselves have often maligned it with the title "BAGLE" — a symbol of the owner's hard head with a hold

### Multiples Ok'd On Dempster

Zoning Board president Richard Cass voted in favor of more multiple dwellings breaking a 3 to 3 tie, for 67 units of townhouses on an 18 acre tract on Dempster Street between Cumberland and Greenwood, at the September 24 Zoning Board meeting.

Ray Ramon, \$500 Ozark and August Donash, 7110 Monroe, both opposed additional multiple dwellings in Niles. Ramon wanted specific answers to building and permit limitations and both men questioned the number of families which would live in the area. It was estimated that 260 families would live in the units on the 18 acre tract. Scheel, Wente and Maloney opposed the B2 zoning for the area while Franklin, Zimmerman, Baumer and Cass favored the multiple dwelling zoning. Since this meeting the trustees unanimously approved the ordinance for this zoning. Realtor William Alter, representing the landowner, had previously requested industrial zoning for the area about six months ago but re-petitioned for this new zoning at a more recent meeting.

In other actions the board tabled a petition for a variation to build on a 30 foot lot at the southwest corner of Keeney and (Continued on Page 2)

### Utility Co. Has Water Rights

Niles' drive to annex additional property at her northern borders was momentarily slowed down after it was disclosed at Monday's trustee meeting that Niles is now feeding water into Ballard Terrace Estates illegally. The confusion resulted from the fact that the Domestic Utilities Company, which services much of the surrounding area, has had a contract, which is three years old, which was signed by the original landowner, which granted the utility company the exclusive right to service the entire area bordered by Church, Ballard, Greenwood and Cumberland. Niles is only responsible to reimburse the utility company for the value of the water which was serviced to the area plus any incidental cost for the use of the pipes. Until the problem is reconciled no further "ans" will be permitted for additional homes there.

### Tornadoes Play Havoc In South Side Of Niles

A double tornado, with winds estimated from 80 to 100 M.P.H., played havoc in the Touhy Avenue area September 25, leaving in its wake damages which may cost as high as \$250,000 throughout the village.

The galing winds ripped off the roofing from the village hall sending the two inch insulation, which rested beneath the tar and gravel, flying across Milwaukee Avenue. The one-and-a-half foot parapet wall, the vita cotta coping and gutter, also were wrenched from the building and sent flying in all directions about the hall. Pebbles from the roof even made air rifle-like holes in a policeman's car windows, the car being parked on Newark Avenue.

The Milwaukee-Touhy intersection seemed to take the bulk of the vicious wind which tore into the village about 7:30 P.M. that Saturday evening. The Cities Service station's tanks on the southeast corner were a mass of twisted steel. Rubble from the southwest corner of the village hall roof blew across Milwaukee resting in the gas station. A "U-Haul It Yourself" trailer was

lifted across Touhy Avenue from the gas station and was lodged on the front lawn of Lee Mangum's home at 6954 Touhy Avenue.

On Mangum's front porch the brick column support was broken in two and laid limply in its tracks. To the east three windows at the Niles Public School were smashed. On Howard Street the Jarke Manufacturing Company had its east wall blown out and a huge hole at the southwest corner of the building attested to the vacuum built up inside the building.

On Caldwell just north of Touhy Ray Jacobs' brick garage was devastated by the wind storm. Trees at St. Hedwigs, many fifty years old or more, were jolted from the ground. On Milwaukee Avenue a live electric wire lay active by Vosmik's Monuments at 6955 Milwaukee.

Back at the village hall the bare roof let in water which poured into the council room. Holes were bored into the floor to prevent the entire floor from caving in. Outside the flagpole was bent and the antenna stack

# Vote Saturday On New East Maine Junior High Bond

Plans for the proposed new junior high school for East Maine School District No. 63 will be discussed by members of the Board of Education at various civic meetings during the next few days.

A bond referendum will be held Saturday, Oct. 10, for the purpose of seeking approval of the necessary \$600,000 bond issue so that the building can be constructed and placed in operation by September 1960.

The building will include 18 classrooms which have been designed to serve the junior high program in the district. The building will also have a dual purpose gymnasium and a lunchroom area. The building will be located on the newly purchased site at Greenwood and Ballard roads.

The present enrollment of 2303 children in the district has exceeded the projected increase anticipated by the Board of Education. It is apparent that at least 14 sections of seventh and eighth grades will be in attendance next year. The additional rooms in the new building as well as the entire present East Maine Junior high school building will be used to relieve the crowded conditions which are already apparent in the other three elementary schools in the district.

In addition to the appearance of board members at various meetings in the district, information will be distributed to parents in each of the schools.

## Maine High West To Be Dedicated On Sunday, November 8

At its regular Sept. meeting the Board of Education of Township High School District No. 207 listened to reports of progress on construction of Maine Township High School West, firming up plans for dedicating the new school, approved a request by Park Ridge Manor for widening a street, and directed the Superintendent to submit a tentative policy relative to the retirement of school employees reaching the age of 65 years.

Dr. E. F. Stolt, principal of Maine, reported that as of Sept. 8 there were 3091 pupils enrolled at Maine. Mr. R. J. Frost, Jr., principal of Maine West, indicated that the enrollment at Maine West was 2411 of which 665 were freshmen. This total enrollment of 5502 represents an increase of 495 for the same period a year ago.

Superintendent Earle W. Wiltse reported that Dr. Benjamin C. Willis, General Superintendent of the Chicago Schools, will be the main speaker at the dedication program for Maine Township High School West, which will take place Sunday afternoon, Nov. 8. Approval was given for the preparation of a dedication booklet for use in connection with the open house and dedication ceremonies.

The Board approved a request by Park Ridge Manor Association for the trustees to dedicate 33 feet of land south of Maine Township High School, between Dee Road and Potter Road along Farrell Ave., for use as a street.

There was considerable discussion of the need for an established policy relative to the retirement of school employees reaching the age of 65 years. At present the Board has no firm policy in this matter. Further study will be given to the problem before action is taken.

## East Maine School Board Review

A new voting precinct was established by the Board of Education for the bond referendum in East Maine School District No. 63 which will be held on Saturday, October 10. The Board has designated Washington School, 2710 Golf Road, Glenview, as the polling place for all residents of the school district living North of Golf Road and East of Milwaukee Avenue.

At the regular meeting of the Board held on Monday, the Board appointed judges for the election in connection with the \$600,000 bond issue for the purpose of building a new junior high school at Greenwood and Ballard Road. The Board reviewed the requirements for voters in a school election and found that voters need not be registered in order to vote. The requirement for voting is that a person must be a resident of the state for one year, the county 90 days, and the school district 30 days.

In other business, the Board accepted contributions from Suburban Builders, Joseph Zeonenas and Hollis Homes, Inc. The Board approved the appointment of an educational counselor to serve the schools on a part time basis beginning October 1.

Because of the recent ruling of the state superintendent of public instruction, the school calendar was revised so that school would close on June 7 rather than on June 9 as scheduled. The necessary 176 days of classroom attendance will be met by shortening both the Christmas and Spring holidays by one day.

Upon the counsel of Attorney Jack Osborn, the Board granted a 20' x 20' easement on the southeast corner of the newly acquired Schmid site which is

Wiser until it was determined if the petitioner could purchase the neighboring lot.

... Denied a petition to build a home on a 30 foot lot at 8223 Osceola because of a conflict resulting from the neighboring home being built too close to the lot line.

... Cass broke a second tie vote as the board approved E. Zoning for Richard Schaul for property at 7245 Milwaukee Avenue. The village board has since approved this request.

Harry Ross, part owner of motel property across from Schaul's property requested the board table their decision until after he has legal counsel representing his interests. He said he had a half a million dollars invested in the property across the street and objected to the same zoning for Schaul. Cass said he did not understand what rights Ross had regarding Schaul's property and cited that the legal notice had been published, giving Ross time to have counsel. Wentz, Scheel

and Zimmermann voted against the petition for Schaul but were over-voted by Baumer, Franklin, Maloney and Cass.

... A request to build five apartment buildings at 8437 to 8457 Osceola was unanimously denied by the Board. Scheel made the motion citing that it was an encroachment upon the surrounding homes in the area.

A. Ortmann, 8456 Ozark, presented a petition with 69 signatures objecting to the multiple dwelling petition.

... A variation to allow a 15 foot setback for property at 8900 Milwaukee was approved. It was limited to the present owner, Charles Bauer, and was not deemed transferable. The meeting then adjourned at 10:40 P.M.

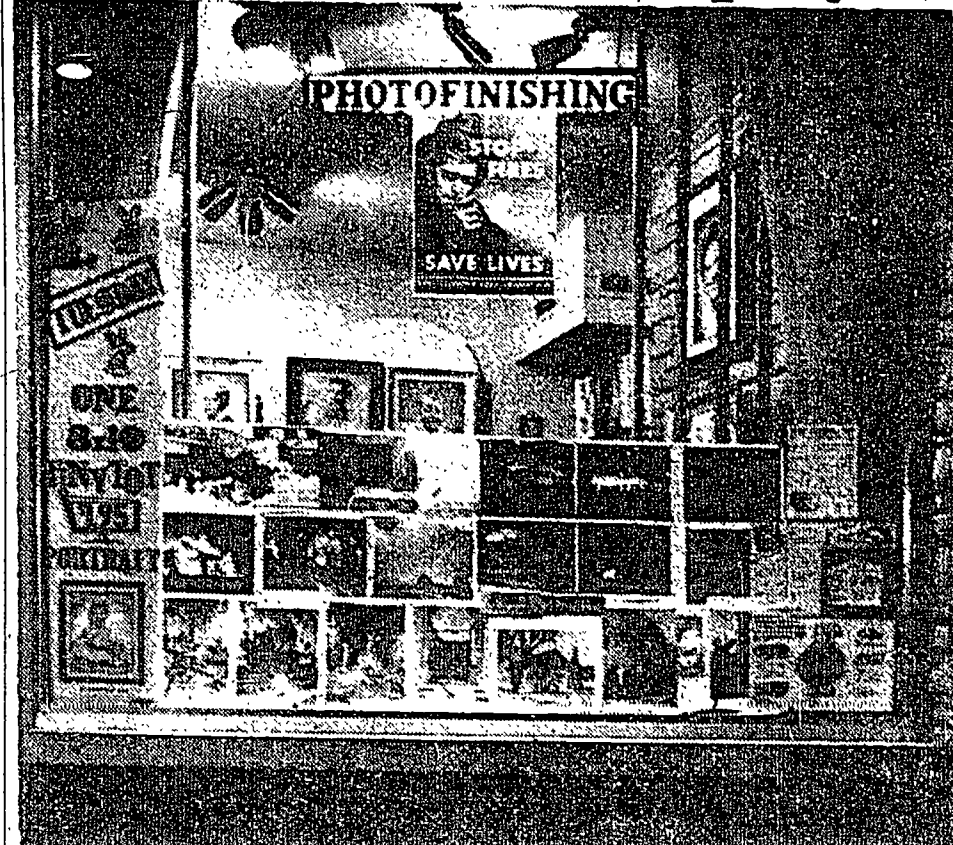

On October 1, 1959 the Niles Park District adopted an ordinance for the referendum on the \$1,400,000.00 community recreation center bond issue to be voted on Saturday October 24, 1959.

The polling place will be at the new Niles Public Library at 7944 Waukegan Road, just south of Oakton Street. in the middle. But the day has come when it must cast aside its first given name in favor of a more dignified one. . . (above all, what this paper needs most is dignity) . . . So to the ever-faithful . . . send along your suggestions for a more proper name . . . names such as the Flannel-Mouthed Gazette or the Pop-Off Poop Sheet . . . will be discounted on the grounds that they may be too close to the truth.

Good friend Ben Sosnowski, twice defeated candidate for village trustee, took us apart some weeks ago for our constant badgering of the public offices. Ben suggested we should attempt to lead the way with more constructive comment. But for what it is worth we'll try to add constructive comments which will likely be washed down the drain by the overseers at the village mahalla.

**Constructive Comment:** The Zoning Board members are decrying the lack of legal advice they have at their disposal at their meetings. They have made a request to the village board for such counsel but so far have been ignored by the trustees.

(This was approved at last Monday's meeting).

**Constructive Comment II:** The village board approved the hiring of a village engineer in July of 1958. No one has ever been hired nor even interviewed . . . why not?

**Constructive Comment III:** This village is badly in need of a full time village manager. Park Ridge has her city manager and even old Skokie has a village manager. If politically-racked Skokie can have a manager Niles could certainly live with one.

**Constructive Comment IV:** More than just a village manager Niles might consider switching to an aldermanic-type government. Two representatives from five to eight areas (depending upon her population) would serve the village. The present set-up was satisfactory for Niles ten years ago but it is certainly antiquated for today's Niles. If each area elected representatives from their neighbors they would have true representative government. The newly-annexed areas should have representation, as should the older areas. And it is time we traded in the political hacks for the Wentes, Scheels and the many many more whose qualifications would improve this town.

To show we're not sponsoring any particular persons how would you like a village board which included members such as Baunler, Marcheschi, Szymanski, Hill or Maloney from Kirk Lane. Or in Oakton Manor Tom Jones, Jim Nolan, Ron Pankau among others. An ordinance for \$559,000 for additional water facilities, based on her present water revenues and collections. This figure would cover a repayment period of 33 years for the additional facilities. Since the village engineers recommended costs would total from about \$550,000 to over a \$1,000,000 for water facilities for the contemplated annexation the voters would have to approve any figure beyond the \$559,000.

Attorney Wells, upon reading a letter from the utility company, said he believed the village could purchase the water company. He said it could likely be "paid off" in a number of years which he assumed was what the owner was interested in having done. In the event the village would purchase the company the village would then be in the water business outside the village limits since the company also services areas, both in unincorporated areas as well as in Glenview.

In other actions Trustee John Trocki publicly commended the public departments for their fine work during the tornado.

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## Lutheran Hospital Lays Cornerstone Sunday

The cornerstone of Lutheran General hospital will be laid in a public ceremony at 2:30 p.m. next Sunday at the hospital site, Dempster street and Western avenue, Park Ridge. After the ceremony the nearly completed hospital and nursing school building will be open for inspection.

Ray E. Brown, president of the Illinois Hospital association, will be the featured speaker. N. M. Nesset, president of the hospital board of trustees, will place in the corner stone a time capsule containing historical documents.

Documents for the capsule include the list of contributors to the hospital building fund, articles of incorporation, list of trustees, historical data on Lutheran Deaconess hospital and the school of nursing, building contracts, metropolitan and community newspapers, constitution, by-laws, and membership lists of the Lutheran Deaconess hospital auxiliary and the service league of Lutheran General hospital.

The 326 bed hospital and nursing school and 63 acre site cost 7.6 million dollars. Construction began in April, 1958, and the hospital is scheduled to open late this year. Lutheran General is a development of Lutheran Deaconess hospital, which was established at 1138 N. Leavitt st. 62 years ago.
