"It's good business to do your business in Niles" is a slogan every resident should heed. Supporting local merchants makes sense (& cents) for the merchants, the village and the residents.

Towns along the Northwestern Railway tracks are much more self-sustained economically than villages like Niles, Morton Grove, Skokie and Lincolnwood. Unlike these Niles township villages, the northwest towns are much more self-dependent. Park Ridge and Des Plaines, both towns relatively close to Chicago, seem to have greater drawing power among their own residents than the Niles Township villages.

In Niles case it seems most of the residents are transplanted Chicagoans who still have strong ties to their former neighborhoods. Since their neighborhoods seem to be mainly from the northwest side of Chicago, many residents still support their former local merchants. And while this is certainly understandable it makes it rough going for the smaller independent merchants who depend primarily on local trade.

Why is it good business to do your business in Niles? In the case of gas stations, local state taxes received from Niles' stations are returned in part to Niles through motor fuel taxes. This money is used for street construction and improvement. In Cook County only, this money also can be used for sidewalk construction.

In the case of other retail businesses, 1/2 cent of every dollar spent in Niles is also returned to the village. This money can be used for improving the village as well. In the upcoming referendum for a village hall it is expected that much of the money derived from the Gold Mill Center will be used for financing the new building and land. So it is apparent that money spent at home is returned for our own benefit.

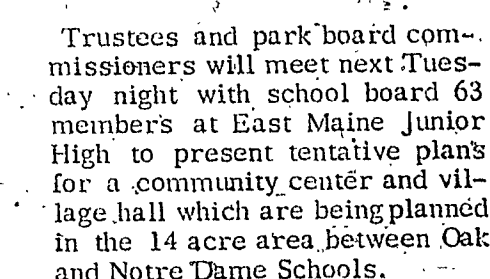
Again may I re-emphasize the first paragraph: "It is a good business to do your business in Niles". "It makes good sense... and cents."

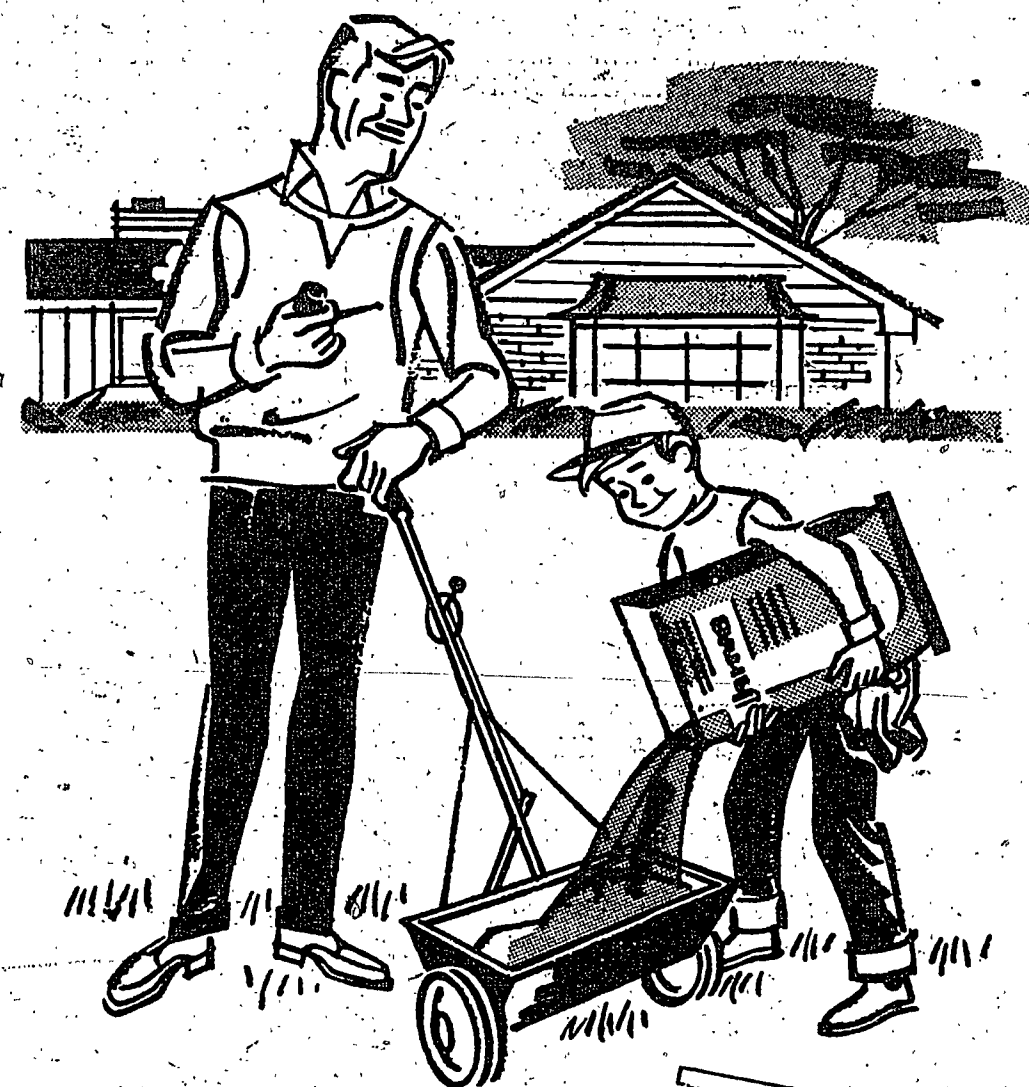

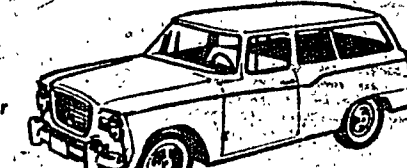

1st To Request New Service

Mrs. Floyd Nadler, 8501 W. Normal, Niles, was the first Talcott telephone subscriber contacted by Middle States Telephone Company in conjunction with the Extended Area Service program proposed for cutover in October, 1960.

By subscribing to Extended Area Service, Mrs. Nadler will receive the same unlimited dialing privileges to all of the adjoining exchanges that she now has to the Vanderbilt and Talcott telephones. The exchanges Mrs. Nadler will receive on an unlimited dialing basis are the suburban Franklin Park, River Grove, Skokie, and Glenview exchanges, as well as the Chicago Kildare and Newcastles exchanges. Mrs. Nadler will also receive the lower unit calling charge to 34 major surrounding metropolitan communities, including the balance of Chicago.

Suburban Water Utility To Face A Chemical Test

The Illinois Commerce Commission will ask the Illinois Public Health Department to make a chemical analysis of water supplied by a suburban utility.

The commission announced Tuesday dismissal of a rate reduction request brought by the Glenayre West Home Owners Assn. against the Domestic Utility Services Co., but said it took notice of complaints that the water had a bad odor and was colored by iron.

The commission said it was considering ordering the utility to put in water softening equipment and wanted the analysis to determine what was needed.

A big issue in suburban water cases was sidestepped by the commission. This is whether amounts donated by contractors and home buyers for the establishment of water companies can be considered capital on which rates are based.

The commission said that because Domestic Utility has not made money no reason exists now for setting new rates or fixing a rate base. An accountant for the company submitted a balance sheet showing a net loss of \$5,647.94 for 1958.

The utility serves 300 customers in an unincorporated area between Des Plaines, Morton Grove, Glenview and Niles.

However, all these suggestions
are only tentative. The 14 acre
property is now privately owned.
An appraisal of the property has
been made and an offer from the
city made and an offer from the
two village boards to purchase
the area will be forthcoming.
After plans have been completed
two referendums, one for the vil-
lage hall plans and a second park
referendum will be presented to
the voters. It is likely the dual
referendums will be held in Sep-
tember or October of this year.

At Monday's meeting Robert
Everly, a member of MacFad-
zean and Everly architectural
firm, presented the latest plans
for this area. Behind the Oak
School property the park recrea-
tion center and the village hall
will be on the Ozark Avenue side
of the area facing east into a mall
which will be the community center
buildings. The Ozark Avenue side
will be on the west and the village hall
building to the center mall. It
is estimated each building area
and its surroundings will be about
four acres. Trustees are planning
that the village will own only
about 25% of the entire area in
the total 14 acres plan.

Parking lots will be located
around the buildings. The archi-
tecture of the two buildings will
be compatible, both being planned
by the MacFadzean and Everly
firm.

North of the two-building area
an outdoor swimming pool, a wa-
ding pool and a hard surface court
will be located. North of this
second area approximately 6
acres of playground will extend
to the south border of the Notre
Dame property.

At the beginning of the meeting
park commissioner Bill Dressel
discussed the need for more
baseball diamonds in Niles in-
fering at the six acres area
north of the proposed buildings
would be desirable for this need.
Trustee John Stanley said about
half the people want baseball
diamonds and about half do not.
He emphasized that "if you sell
this proposal on this basis you
won't pass the referendum."

The two groups agreed that the
selected area for the proposed
plans was centrally located.

Stanley also added that he had
not heard of any adverse comment
regarding the plans to locate the
project in this area.

In other discussions it was
agreed by the two boards that
cement poles would support the
lights which will be located in
the Grennan Heights Park area.

Park Commissioner Bernard
Miller announced that sidewalks
would be built in the Grennan
Heights and Oakton Manor park
areas this spring.
