Niles is popping at its seams these days, unlike any other time in its sixty-one year history....or matter of fact unlike any time in many towns' histories. Never was I more aware of it

than a week ago Tuesday. Early in the morning a public relations man representing Eagle Stores called to remind us of the ground breaking ceremonies Wednesday at Oakton and Milwaukee. An hour later we encountered a businessman who laid out the proposed plans for the Lawrencewood Shopping Center which sketched the locations of Goldblatt's, Red Owl, Walgreen's, Kresge's and several other stores which will be available in the Oakton-Wau-

kegan center. Only a half a block away The Bank Of Niles is making steady progress with an October opening date expected there

date expected there,
Moving back on Milwaukee Avenue and heading north I passed the building of the Shoppers World around 9300 on Milwaukee Avenue which is right alongside the area where a million dollar indoor movie theatre and restaurant wil soon begin building.

Then I drove into the mecca of shopping centers, the Golf Mill area, and encountered representatives from Hillman's. They told me their D-Day has been pushed back six weeks and that they now expect to open about October 15. Moving across the street I spoke to Sears representatives who said they expected to open on that same date.

Driving back south to "old Niles" (any area north of Dempster) I drove down Oriole Street passing the area where the intended community center and village hall may be built if voters approve referendums for the buildings in the middle of October. And amazingly all this activity is taking place within an area no more than two miles

Then Tuesday night I was at the village board meeting which almost kayoed any plans for further expansion to the north. Trustee Nielsen reported that his committee which had viewed the property known as the "Golden Forty" north of Golf Road, recommended that village officials reject annexation plans in this area. Trustee Marszalek backed up Nielsen citing water problems as one of the factors which would create a problem for Niles.

Interestingly, this same faction (which is the sound and fury of the Mayor) also opposed the annexation of the Golf Mill center and sat on their hands when it was

Eleft Hand July Building Off 80% From Last Year's Record High

Niles July building permits decreased 80% from the record high of July 1959, according to Bell Savings and Loan Association. Permits for the Chicago area dropped off a corresponding 40% from last year's. This is the eleventh consecutive month in which permits ran behind the past year in the Chicago area.

In all types of building Niles issued permits for construction of \$682,650 during July, 1960. In 1959 the figure was a whopping \$3,007,095. In June of this year building was valued at about \$1,664,750. Niles fell slightly behind her neighbor, Morton Grove and Park Ridge while surpassing Skokie and Lincolnwood.

Des Plaines passed \$2,000,000 mark in building permits and Park Ridge topped the \$1,000,000 mark for all types of building. Glenview had a figure of about \$250,000 behind Niles' amount.

In home building Niles building-permits were approved for buildings worth \$242,000 for 13 permits. This was in comparison to 143 permits for \$1,643,500 for last July, 1959. Only Glenview and Lincolnwood had lower figures among Niles' neighbors.

Fourteen permits for \$151,000 were approved for apartment building in Niles. Skokie and Park Ridge exceeded 20, Lincolnwood had 2 and Morton Grove and Des Plaines had no apartment permits approved for the




