From The Left Hand

The appointment of Niles new chief seems to be of great interest to Nilesites. Thus, we asked Mayor Blase to let us in on the procedure which is being used leading up to the appointment.

The first step which was taken was the setting up of a three-man committee. Trustee Sam Bruno, who heads the police and fire committee and Judge Smigiel, Niles police magistrate, were chosen to join Blase.

The committee first interviewed Niles 26-man police force. Of the 26, ten policemen indicated their interest in the top job.

Yesterday the 10 men were given a written examination. While the examination is important it is but one of five steps leading to the selection of the police chief.

The three-man committee will then be joined by two of the top men from Northwestern University's Traffic Institute who will review the men with the entire committee. The final choice will be made after reducing the 10 applicants to three men. Blase will then make the final choice and present the selection to the village board for final approval.

What about men outside the department? Blase said applications have been received from such candidates but their applications are being held in abeyance. Blase emphasized that Niles policemen are "getting the first shot" at the top job. He added that he would naturally like to receive unanimous approval from the village board on the appointee but a majority approval will be sufficient.

"From The Left Hand" we find this method of selecting this most important appointee quite refreshing. No crony, who may have rung doorbells in the last election, is being awarded this top job. Rather, an objective and detached attitude is being used which will place the most qualified man at the head of our police force.

Couple this means of choosing alongside Blase's blast at last week's trustee meeting, in which he said he would not stand for any "intimidation" from the big builders for getting their plans hurried past the village board, makes these past weeks look like we have genuinely entered a new era.

Homeowner Groups Oppose District 63 Multiples

Representatives from various home owner groups and civic bodies have taken the initiative in opposing any further rezoning which would permit multiple dwellings in East Maine School District No. 63.

Twenty-six representatives were present at a recent meeting of the Board of Education. Members of the Board and Superintendent E. W. J. Bagg presented a comprehensive study of the effect of multiple dwellings on school population, building program and financial resources. It was apparent from the presentation that multiple dwellings place a burden on a school district and the rezoning which would permit additional multiple dwellings would seriously jeopardize the total educational program in the schools.

The impetus for the information of the committee grew out of a hearing before the County Zoning Board of Appeals relative to a 27 acre tract which the petitioner had requested be rezoned from single family dwelling classification to multiple dwelling classification to permit building 231 townhouse units. The attorney for the petitioner pointed out at the hearing that there were court decisions which prevented any consideration of schools when zoning changes were considered.

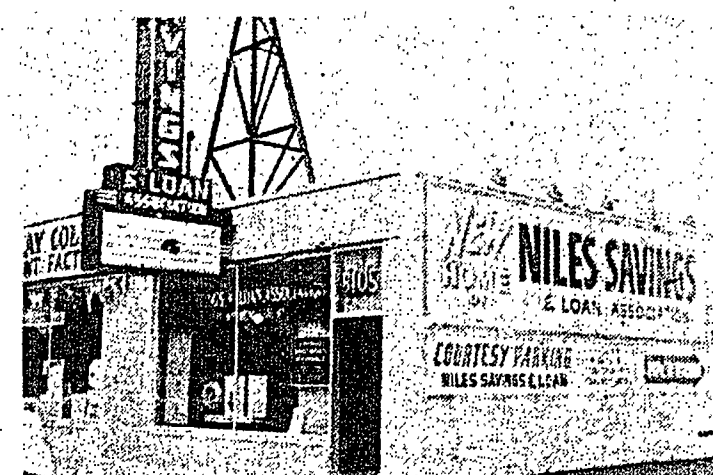
Chamber To Sponsor July 4 Parade

Dear Mr. Besser,

May I kindly submit this letter to you, and hope that I can receive an answer in your next column.

I hold your newspaper in high regard, because it has a way of finding out the truth of the matter in many cases.

The subject of my letter is the small and un-meaning full paragraph taken from your "New Era Begins To Form" column. This paragraph concerns the Police and Five Department members, who at present are employed by the village in various jobs which help to supplement their otherwise poor income levels. The day by day work that these men perform should be, and I feel certain it is, above reproach, however as that may be, I often wonder just how long it will be before we have a situation similar to the one that O.W. Wilson was faced with when he assumed change of the Chicago Police Department.

If the practice of having two jobs to make ends meet is a reality, then evidently our Police force is not receiving adequate compensation for their services. Sooner or later, if a policeman is found guilty of taking a bribe, isn't it foolish to condemn him, when a quick look at his pay scale would make us wonder how he ever does make a decent living.

Possibly this letter may entail some research on your part Sir, as to what the pay scale of a policeman in Niles is from the time he is hired, up to say the third or fourth year of service. My husband and I resided formerly in Chicago, where we ran a successful business for many years. Now that we have both retired, we often look back to wonder just how so much dishonesty got its start on the Police Department. Although we feel that many contributing factors are involved, we both feel one of the principle causes was the law standard of wages, which was the lot of so many good and devoted men.

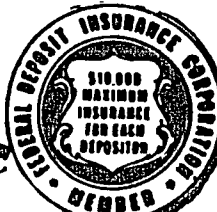

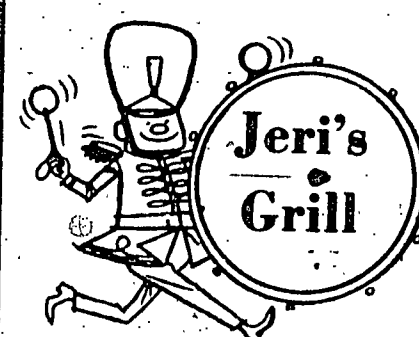

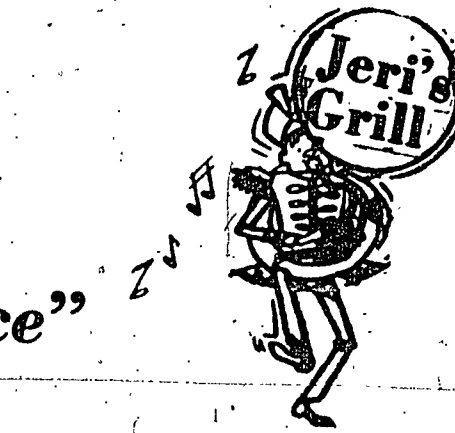

New Phone Customers Will Receive Seven Digit Number

Dr. Plimpton reported to the Board of Education at the regular meeting on May 8 that it would be necessary to transfer a number of students from Jefferson School to empty classrooms at Oakton School. 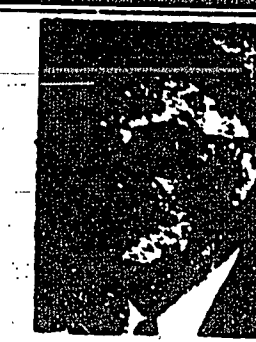

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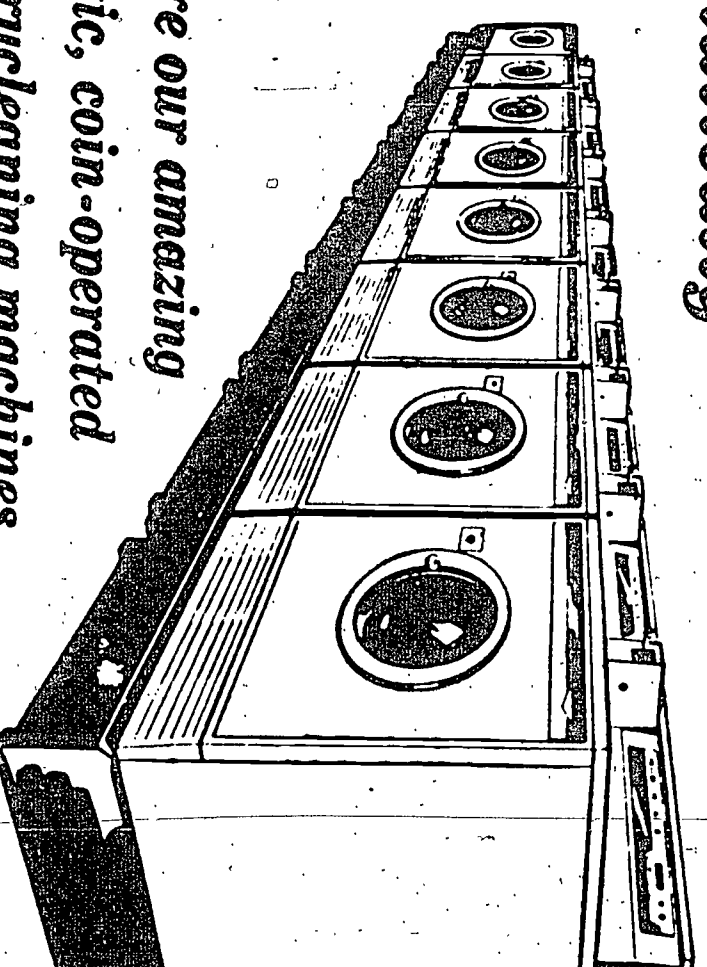

This summer eight teams will be competing in the Niles 16th senior Men's Softball league. These games are fast and fascinating. Everyone is urged to come out to root for their favorites. Play this season will be under lights on Tuesday and Friday evenings at the Touhy and Franks Park.

The very popular Friday night Teen Dances, supervised by the Niles Park District, will continue at the Grennan Heights Fieldhouse. All teenagers of Niles are invited to drop around and join the fun between 7:30 P.M. and 10:30 P.M.

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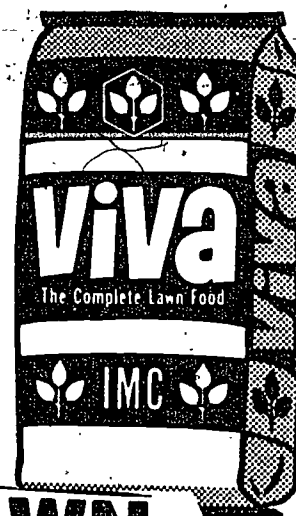
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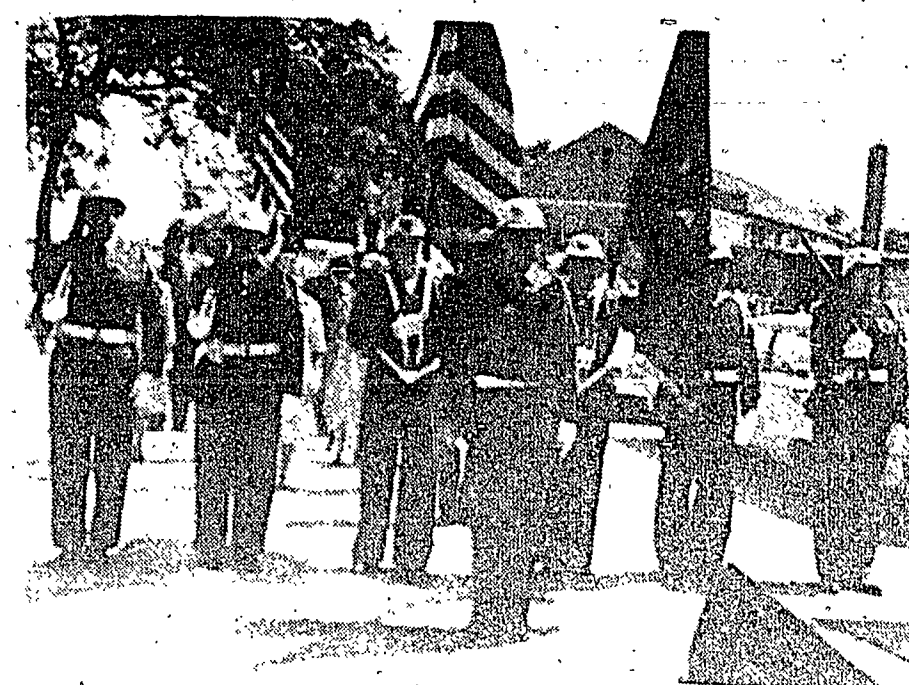


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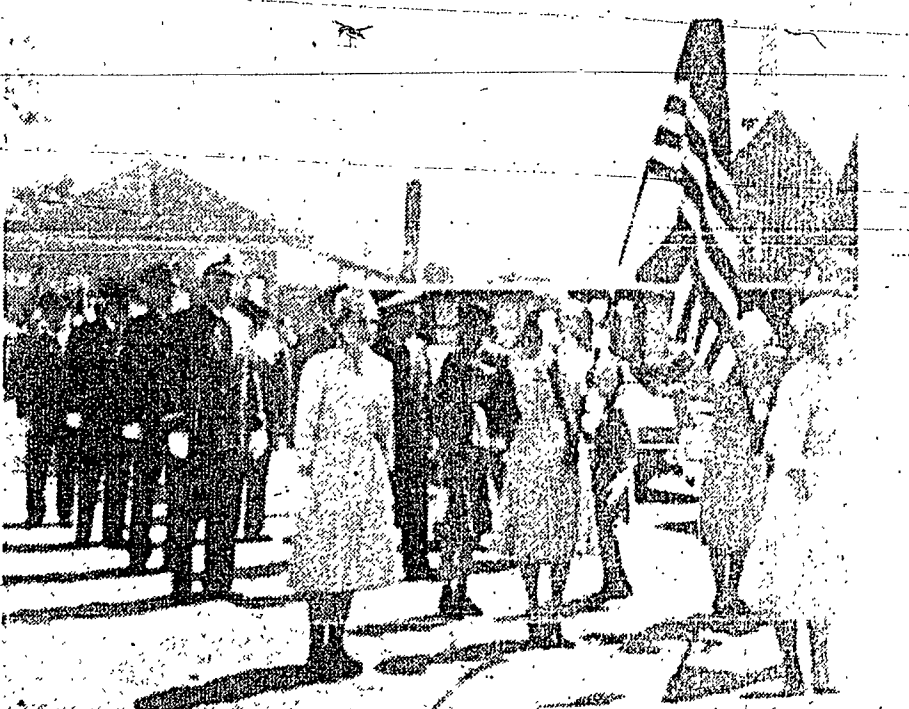

FACTS from the STACKS

African safaris are impossible for most of us, but the wild life in our own backyards can be equally exciting.

In GRASSROOT JUNGLES, Edwin Way Teale has collected information about insects he found in his own backyard. Any of us, granted, with interest and observation, can know such surprising facts as: A caterpillar has nearly four times as many muscles as a man; The most brilliant of tropical butterflies are not colored at all; Some of the moths live so brief a life they never eat, and this has been going on with some insects for so long they are born without mouths or stomachs; Some insects keep cows, have slaves, and raise vegetables. The author has for many years made a hobby of insect photography. He explains the technique of photographing insects with an authoritative knowledge of his subject and with the rare gift of making vivid, real personalities of these insects.

A GUIDE TO BIRDWATCHING by Joseph J. Hickey is the first American book to describe the modern art of bird watching. Beginners in bird study will at once be attracted by its simple language and its central theme that amateur naturalists can explore many aspects of bird life. More advanced students will greatly enjoy its fresh point of view and its extensive quotations of little known achievements in bird watching. The author answers many questions for the novice; how to learn bird names; how to identify birds in the field; how to learn bird songs; how to acquire good field glasses; where and when to look for birds; how to meet other bird students; and how to take notes and keep records. Separate chapters in the book explain the problems of migration watching, bird counting, bird banding, bird distribution, and the general art of bird watching. Fascinating methods, by which amateur naturalists can explore the mysteries of bird life are described in detail.

How do butterflies fight? Or a squirrel and a starling "talk" to each other? These and other questions are answered in THE WONDERS I SEE, by John K. Terres. The author says that in the eight years of observation that preceded the writing of the book "I returned to my garden constantly and in fascination because of the unfolding patterns of the lives of the animals that lived there. The generations of squirrels became known to me individually, and I learned to know individual insects and spiders by marking them with harmless dyes, and the birds by banding them. I proved to my satisfaction that the only way really to learn about animals is to study them as individuals. I am convinced that the small game in my backyard, sparrows, woodpeckers, catbirds and other, lead no less interesting lives than a black bear, an antelope or an eagle.

WINDOW IN THE WOODS, by Heinz Sielmann, is the account of an assignment to record complete life cycles of two families of woodpeckers. With photographic and recording equipment of the utmost sensitivity, a store of stratagems, and limitless patience, the author probed into unexplored corners of nature.

Completes Library Course

Mrs. Book, of Niles Public Library, has just completed a brief course in the use of reference books. She attended an in-service training institute for untrained library employees, sponsored by LACONI, and meeting in the Des Plaines Library. Her participation in the course will enable the Niles Library staff to handle reference queries more efficiently, and will affect the selection of more reference books.

By cutting windows into the backs of the woodpeckers' tree-nests and acclimating the birds to infra red camera lights, Sielmann was able to photograph each stage in the birds' life cycle, revealing characteristics hitherto unrecorded on film. In the course of his year's study, Sielmann and his companions succeeded in deciphering the hammerings of these "carpenters of the forest," as well as getting to know the other inhabitants of the forest as few men do. This account, unveiling the private lives of woodland creatures, offers the

reader an unusually opportunity to escape into the realities that are nature.

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
