The State of Illinois returns Motor Fuel Tax money based on our federal census figure. The amount is about \$4 per head. Since Niles population increases by roughly 2500 a year we are losing about \$10,000 every second year, because the census is not taken during the off year. Our \$10,000 estimate is before costs for the census which amounts to about \$1,000. Thus, the net loss to Nilesites still amounts to around \$9,000 during that second year.

This is just one of the many ways in which Nilesites have been cheated in recent years. There are many other costly errors which are now being looked into by the new administration which will be revealed in the coming months.

One resident complained he has already had to replace two motors in his rain-drenched basement and others cited similar problems. Robert Fike reminded the board that a dam constructed in the Tam O'Shanter area causes havoc to Nilesites and trustee Poeschl told of the need for dredging the river. Blase reminded the audience that an open forum, in which all Nilesites are invited will be held at Bunker Hill June 29, and told those with any problems to meet all the trustees and the Mayor to air them. He also said engineer Olson and P.W. superintendent Bacher would review the complaints and try to find a solution to this problem which affects the entire northwest suburban area.

P. W. Superintendent Bacher then suggested no sprinkling in Niles accept odd number homes on odd dates of calendar and even number homes on even dates. He further suggested there would be no sprinkling at all from noon to 2 p.m. and 4 p.m. to 9 p.m. This was tabled pending further study. Bacher cited the critical problem if a water shortage developed and said the recommended hours of no sprinkling was the period when water was in greatest use in Niles. He said the village could not pump more water to the homes than what was received from Chicago and that the added problem of sprinkling to these peak hours would cause a great burden to our water system.

Trustees then approved attorney Dahl taking condemnation action against the Hawkins Trailer Park area on Touhy in the first steps paramount to building a water reservoir there. Stanley needed the new attorney why this had not already been started and Dahl told Stanley it was born former village attorney Wells and his opinion that they should receive this approval from the board since the initial summons for condemnation might cost \$1000. Mrs. Sally Stankowicz suggested some of the \$236,979 in our water reserve be used to alleviate our water problems rather than be concerned with levying fines if residents did not adhere to a sprinkling regulation. The sprinkling recommendation was tabled and the attorney received permission to begin the initial condemnation proceedings. Blase ended this discussion by saying "we want to do what is best."

All bills were approved except a \$1300 Consoer Townsend bill for their study on the Domestic Water Utility system pending a further study of the bill.

The meeting was then adjourned until June 27.

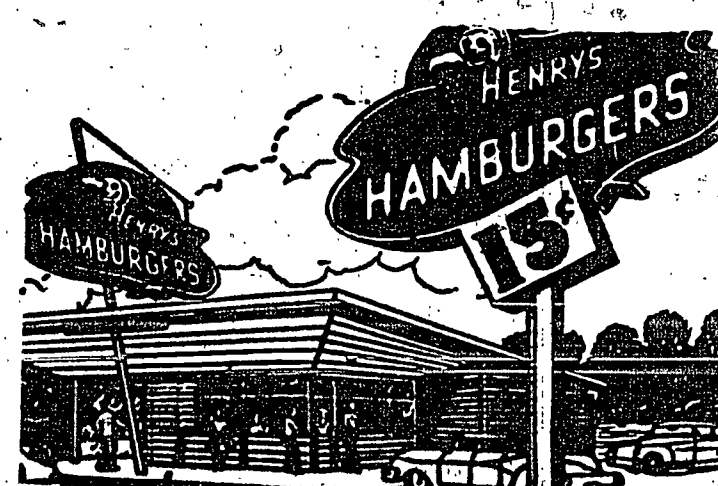

The appointment of Father Van to head Niles Police and Fire Commission is a reflection of the quality of the people placed in public office by our "New Era" officials.

No public body in the village was more in need of a shake-up than the police and fire commission, which is the Niles' equivalent to a civil service board.

The board had been a sanctuary for Mayor Stankowicz cronies and had been little more than a puppet of our former Mayor and police chief. We cited many times the delay of several months in making an appointment on the police department, until the former Mayor's son reached the age of 21, thus becoming eligible for the appointment of the force.

The commission was also a demoralizing influence on members of both the police and fire departments. Preferential treatments were accorded the elite guard surrounding our former police chief, and the chance for advancement for the "outs" on the force was curtailed.

There was much open and outspoken hostility between one or more members of the commission and men in the two departments, which certainly hindered the morale of the two departments.

This "New Era" appointment will certainly be welcome by most of the men on both departments, whose future advancement will be based on ability, rather than on being any member of the "ins".

The park board has also gotten off to a fine start and shows great signs of working co-operatively with the trustees. Park Board officials had recently changed their meeting night to Tuesday night, mistakenly believing their meeting would be on the alternate Tuesday of the village board meeting. However, when they found out they would meet on the same night they immediately changed it back to Thursday night.

Playground Equipment To Go To Jonquil Park Tr.

The Niles Park District has received the playground equipment for the leased Jonquil Terrace Park area located at 7815 Oriole. The modern equipment includes: 2 Composite Swing Sets, 1 Modern Design Slide, 2 Whirl-A-Ways, 4 Riding Spring-Type Animals, 2 Park Benches.

These will be ready for use by July 1st. This is another step in helping develop a better Park System for the residents of Niles.

Work at the Shermer-Waukegan parksite has not progressed on schedule for at least two reasons: 1. Obtaining legal survey description of area was more difficult than anticipated. 2. Slope of land suggested use of retaining wall along Waukegan side. Cost of such a wall is now known to be prohibitive and current planning calls for a gentle West to East and a North to South slope. Contour of land (for drainage) cannot be destroyed and the Park has to work very closely with the County (Shermer Road) and the Village.

Development of this site should now progress quite rapidly.

The Niles Park District will formally dedicate the baseball lighting system sometime next month. At this time, the "Touhy & Franks" Park will be given a new, more meaningful name. The Park District Commissioners invite you to help choose a name. A \$25 United States Savings Bond will be given to the person suggesting the most appropriate name and best telling why - in 25 words or less - he or she thinks this would be a favorable name. 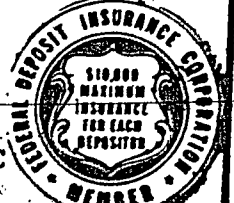

Public Works Newsletter

The Niles Public Works Department wishes to inform residents of vital information pertaining to Garbage and Rubbish Pick-Up Service and Water Department news.

If this letter raises any questions in your mind, we shall be very glad to answer them, if you call Niles 7-7553.

GARBAGE SERVICE

Garbage is picked up from the curb or alley once a week, and it has to be placed outside by 7:00 A.M. Garbage should be in bags or wrapped in newspaper, placed in a 20 gallon regulation metal can, which must be kept in good condition and tightly covered. The word "garbage" shall be taken to indicate any and all rejected or waste household food, newspapers, (tied), flattened boxes and food cans, all of which must be deposited in said can. Grass clippings and leaves must be deposited in bushel baskets. All trimmings from trees, hedges, shrubs, plants and weeds shall be deposited in garbage cans.

RUBBISH PICK-UP

Rubbish defined as old furniture, hot water tanks, stoves, large branches, large boxes or crates etc. will be picked up on Friday of each week by a special truck by calling Niles 7-7553, before each Friday. Calls WILL NOT be accepted on Fridays. All articles have to be placed by the curb or in the alley, and at no time shall a village employee enter any home to pick up any discarded item. Waste building materials due to construction or alterations, (such as concrete, dirt, stone, lumber etc.) must be removed by the owner, contractor, or agent of any said premise. It is unlawful to dump, throw, sweep or deposit any refuse in streets, alleys, sidewalks or empty lots, violators, upon conviction, shall be fined.

WATER METERS

Water meters in the Village of Niles are read consecutively from the 1st through the 14th of each month, according to residential districts. All water meters must be accessible at all times to read or repair. All repairs to meters shall be made only by the Village and at the expense of the owner of said premise. Tampering with, or obstructing any water meter is prohibited. Upon vacating a said premise in the Village, occupants are required to have a final reading taken of their water meter. A five day notice should be given to the Village Clerk's Office at Niles 705485, to make arrangements to take a reading. The following shall be the rates for water supplied to each class of user, payable on the 15th day after the billing date, effective on and after May 1, 1961. RESIDENTIAL: Residential users shall be charged fifty cents (\$0.50) per thousand, (1,000) gallons, payable quarterly.

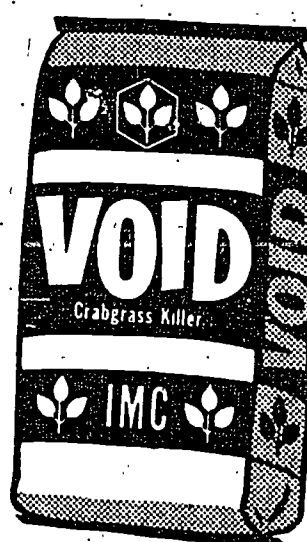

\$854 Collected In Easter Seal Drive

Over 90 per cent of the money collected in this area is kept in this area to operate a program of physical, occupational and speech therapies at the two Easter Seal treatment centers (the Oak Park Center and the Ridge Center) two summer day camps for crippled children, a homebound work program, an equipment loan pool, and a program of occupational therapy for homebound adults.

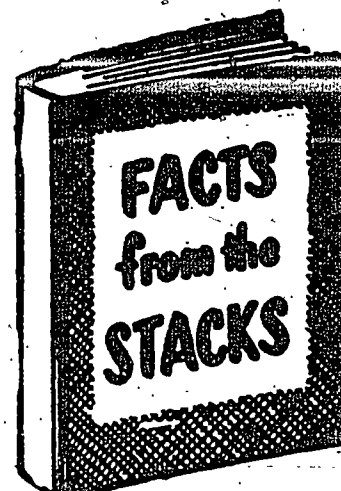

Ideally summer is the season for travel; but for those who can't go far or stay long, there are some wonderful books in the Niles Public Library especially designed for the arm-chair traveler.

AFTER YOU, MARCO POLO by Jean Fox is the story of a young American couple's attempt to follow the seven-century-old trail of Marco Polo from Venice to Peking, Polo's route lies in a no man's land along the boundaries of Turkey, Iran, Russia, Afghanistan, Pakistan, and China. Only a handful of Westerners have crossed these high passes and unexplored valleys since Polo's time. Border skirmishes are frequent, strangers are automatically assumed to be enemies. The Shors' adventures matched in fascination and variety those of Marco Polo. They picked up with the Shah of Iran. The King of Afghanistan personally gave them permission to cross the forbidden and forbidding Wakhan Corridor. They trekked across the Gobi Desert where they found Genghis Khan's grave. They crossed deserts and mountain ranges, were entertained by the great and the savage. Jean was kidnapped by the Chinese Communists; Frank contracted a deadly fever in the snowbound High Pamirs. One of their trusted guides turned out to be a bandit and murderer. They drove off-wolves at night with flash bulbs; they slept in their clothes during sandstorms and snowstorms; they traveled by ancient bus, horse, yak, and on foot. Ultimately tribal warfare blocked their route across the high passes of the Wakhan Corridor in wildest Afghanistan. Unable to cross the Chinese border, ill and hungry, they literally staggered into the fabulous peace and beauty of the Hunza Valley, the Shangri-La in northern Pakistan. Jean Shor writes with humor, warmth, and sensitivity of these strange lands and exotic peoples. Set in the context of Marco Polo's travels and spiced with apt quotations from his travels, this is at once a stirring adventure and a superior travelogue crammed with vivid detail and dramatic contrasts.

In THE LONELY LAND, Sigurd F. Olson tells a true tale of thrilling white-water adventure by canoe down five hundred miles of Canada's wild Churchill River, re-exploring the same rapids, lakes, portages, ancient campfires, and primitive wilderness haunts of the voyagers of an earlier time. Into this land of Cress, Chipewyan, Yellow Knives, and Dog Rib Indians had once come the voyageur, the Hudson Bay trader, and a succession of adventurers, gentlemen and otherwise, who used the mighty Churchill River as a major waterway from Hudson Bay to the Mackenzie. "It was the trail of these voyageurs we followed," says the author, "a trail that led from the height of land where waters flow north to the Arctic and east to Hudson Bay, 500 miles away. Every portage, campsite, and rapids, every mile of this waterway of lakes and rivers was steeped in the drama of exploration and trade. We traveled as the voyageurs did by canoe, paddled the same lakes, ran the same rapids, and packed over their ancient portages. We knew the winds and storms, saw the same
