The park board's intention is to be present at many of the village board meetings, thus, co-ordinating actions of both boards.

The park board's elimination of the police chief post, followed up by their recent request that the village place the one park policeman on the special police roll of the village, attests to the co-operation by the park board. This board has initiated the action for such co-operation and certainly should be commended for their swift action in correcting the main obstacle to its previous actions.

This is the very first step necessary to the success of any future undertakings on the part of the park board, and is the first step in their giving Niles the parks which are so badly needed.

Being ever the optimist we are convinced if the park board continues this co-operative approach they can pass any sound plan for referendums which they undertake. For the major obstacle to past-defeated referendums was not the referendums themselves, but rather the suspicion aroused in many voters' minds, resulting from not being out-in-the-open about what they were presenting.

We look with much hope during the next two years, in which park plans for Niles will change Niles from a parkless community to a village which provides its children with facilities equal to or better than her next-door neighbors.

Last week we mentioned that the village is losing about \$9000 every second year by not taking an annual federal census. And we reported that there are many other measures which can save us money. A second money-losing for all Nilesites was uncovered last week when trustee Ken Scheel told public officials that about \$150,000 of Niles money, in its water account, was laying in the bank, without drawing interest. Scheel immediately took steps to place the money in government notes, which draws about 3% interest. This would give Niles \$4,500 a year. Add that to the previous \$9,000 and we would add \$13,500 to village coffers.

Trustee John Stanley has previously campaigned (and long before tried in vain) for a central purchasing plan for all village offices. Stanley often commented that each separate department buys its own stationery equipment, etc., at its discount, often duplicating efforts, and at a price above which should be received. Stanley's purchasing plan would be another step in saving the village money.

Yet, despite all these suggestions, it all points in one direction, which hasn't been heard from since the election—the obvious need for a village manager.

Despite the efforts of Scheel and Stanley and the other officials in village operations, they are nevertheless hit and run efforts. Since the New Era candidates favored a village manager the time is ripe to seek a man who will obviously save Niles five-fold or more his salary. Obviously, Scheel and Stanley, both operators of their own businesses, cannot devote the time to continuously study ways of running a more efficient village operation. It takes a man who is trained in village management, and who can devote the full measure of his time to this job.

Outspoken Admiral Huan Rickover, speaking about the operation of our U.S. Navy, recently stated that if a man ran his business as the government runs the Navy he would either go bankrupt or would have to become a good forger. Well, this certainly applies to many governments throughout the land, and Niles would certainly be one of them.

Interestingly, the recent 4 party election will likely result in our own advancement in the village, as a result of each one of the four parties. The Stankowicz forces ran on an economy pledge, and the cost-cutting efforts of our present board, bears out the rec-

ognition for the need for economy in government. The Ciccone group led the way for a village manager and this will soon come to pass. Stanley emphasized the need for central purchasing and pointed to the \$300,000 sales tax revenue envisioned from Golf Mill. The recent \$20,000 monthly sales tax figure shows he was not far off. And his central purchasing theme will likely come to pass. The Blase forces' end of corruption and "clean sweep" promises are certainly being fulfilled.

Whereas, we can certainly see the disadvantage in so many parties running in an election we now have evidence that all the campaigning did not go for

nought and that many of the ideas advanced during the campaigns are now being fulfilled, and that you and I, the electorate, are receiving the benefit, which resulted from all the clamor which preceded April's election.

Romey Fined \$500 On Income Tax Count

(CNS)—The former police chief of Niles, Robert A. Romey, was fined \$500 by U.S. District Judge Joseph A. Perry last week for failing to report in his income tax returns \$3,150 received in 1953-54-55 from the Tam-O-Shanter Golf Tournaments, on which Uncle Sam lost \$694.43 in taxes.

When ROMEY pointed out to the court that he would lose his pension rights based on 29 years with the Niles police force as a result of the guilty finding after a three-day bench trial, Judge Perry told him:

"I took that into consideration in only fining you."

Besides paying his fine, Romey is liable for payment of the back taxes with 50 per cent fraud penalties and interest.

He was replaced as police chief May 31 by Nicholas Blase, newly elected mayor of Niles. This was after his indictment.

For the three years involved, the government charged, Romey, who is 62 and lives at 6921 Niles Terrace, Niles, reported total income of \$20,863 and paid income taxes of \$3,400.07.

He should have reported \$23,013.17 income and paid \$4,174.50 in taxes, the government said.

The unreported payment, made to Romey by the George S. May Co. for superintending the police work for two weeks of the golf tournament each year, were as follows: 1953: \$900; 1954: \$1,125; and 1955: \$1,125.

Arrested For Selling Fireworks

Bernard Garber, owner of Robert's Cycle Shop, 1605 Milwaukee Avenue, was arrested by Niles police Monday after complaints were filed against him for selling illegal fireworks and selling fireworks to minors. He was released on a \$100 cash bond (merely a signed statement to the bond).

Police Chief Emilkson said "anything which looks like fireworks will be confiscated" in telling of his upholding the state statutes, which bans the sale of just about all fireworks, outside of caps.

Garber's problems started a week ago when he sold a small flare to an 8 1/2 year old boy. The small-wick flare caused \$90 damage to an auto. Continued on page 3

Pandera Resigns; Appointed Recreation Director

Park Board commissioner Jules Pandera resigned his post and was promptly rehired recreation director for Niles parks at a special park board meeting Tuesday night. He resigned his two month old commissioner's post effective June 30 to assume the \$7500 director's job, which he had previously held for two years prior to his resignation from the post before April's park board election. The park

board was in general agreement that Pandera was "the man for the job" and offered him the post. He had been elected to a six year term as park commissioner and a new appointment will fill two of the years, the post being subject to election in 1963.

Pandera had resigned from recreation director's post before April's election after citing his difficulty in obtaining

authority in the post, which was in conflict with the pre-April park board. Pandera then ran for the park commissioner's post, polling the highest total among the 7 men running for three offices. However, it was necessary for Pandera to go to court, along with Ray Eagan and Carl Broholm, to be placed on the ballot. His petition for his candidacy had been rejected. Two of the commissioners, who

were defeated in the April election, had ruled along with the other 3 commissioners, against the Pandera petition, which they said was on advice of park counsel. However, the court ruled in favor of returning the three candidates to the ballot after noting that there would have been no competition for the open posts if the three men were not included on the ballot.

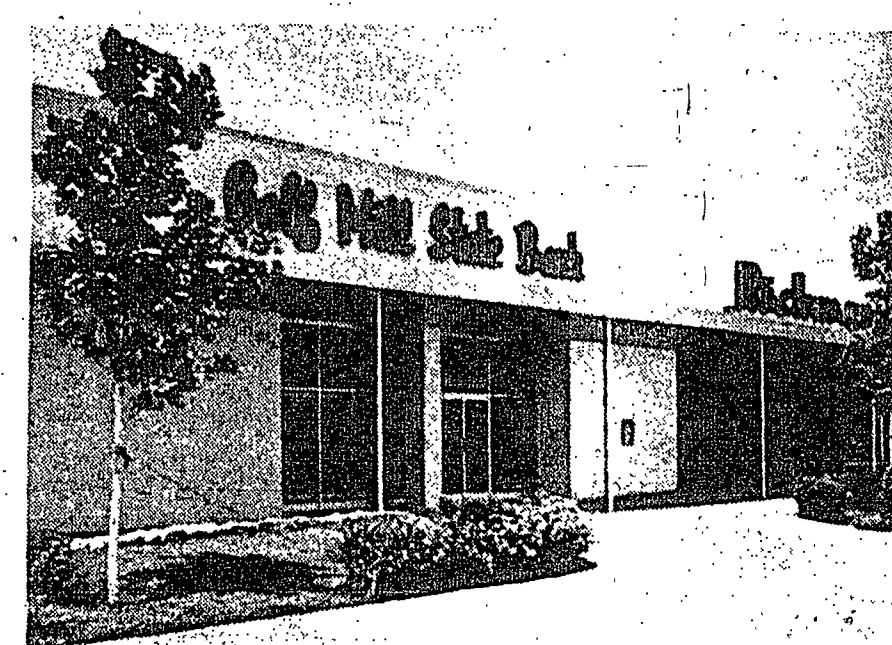

Sprinkling Ordinance Starts July 6

Niles new sprinkling ordinance will be effective July 6, as the result of Tuesday's village board action. Residents living in even numbered homes will sprinkle on even dates, odd numbered homes will sprinkle on odd calendar dates. Engineer Harold Olson said this was a safeguard to the community. He noted Niles has an underground water storage of 2,200,000 gallons of water and that on hot days Niles uses in excess of 4,000,000 gallons daily. He said the increased demands of growing Chicago and Niles, makes this ordinance a necessity. Fines will be from \$5 to \$50 for violations of the ordinance though residents will be duly informed before any such action is taken. This is the first time Niles has had a restrictive sprinkling ordinance though neighboring communities have had them for several years.

Grennan Heights Festival Combats Weather & Thieves

Grennan Heights annual summer festival had to combat the weatherman and petty thieves over the weekend.

Saturday afternoon rain interrupted the opening hour and a second downpour resulted in the closing down of the carnival at 8:30 Saturday evening. A hurried-up meeting between officials of the affair resulted in their re-scheduling the festival for Sunday.

When the evening's festivities ended prizes and gifts not used were placed in the fieldhouse, according to co-chairman Stan Lowe, Monday morning when officials of the festival returned for the prizes. Lowe said between \$200 to \$250 of merchandise was missing, including three radios. Lowe said some of the lost merchandise included a blanket found stuffed in a garbage can; a leather bag was found under the sink, a Coleman lantern

As Dulles has pointed out, America's rise to world power has been comparatively recent. Lack of experience, lack of human resources, and sheer ignorance have made American foreign policy the target of much criticism.

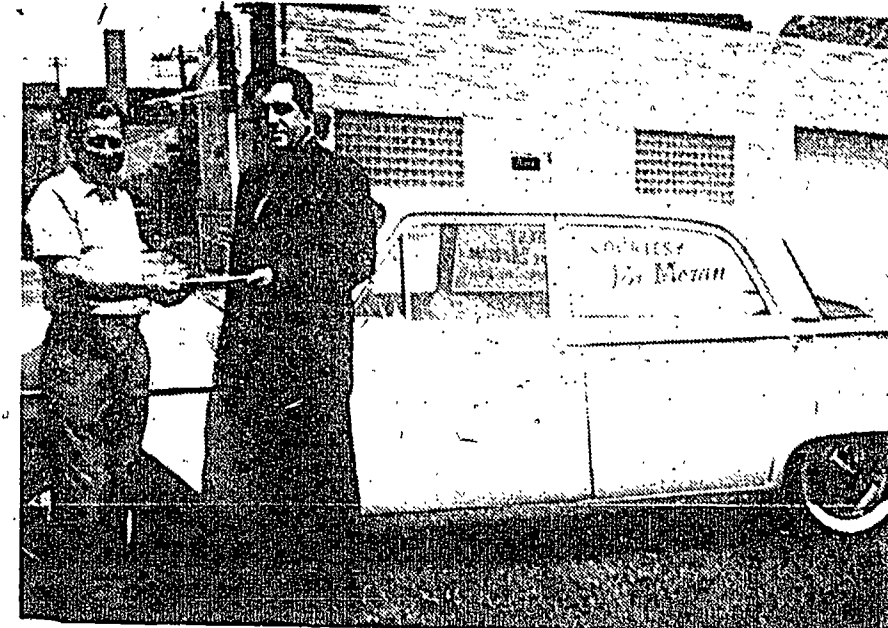
AMBASSADOR'S REPORT, is Chester Bowle's report of his eighteen months as American ambassador to India and Nepal. Recognized as an authority on American foreign policy, accepted in Asia as an understanding friend, Mr. Bowle does not hesitate to criticize American policy and individuals. But, he says, "This book offers no glib analysis, nor does it propose a precise program for America that will guide us through the maze of conflicting pressures, hopes and prejudices which confuse our present relations with the people of the East. Rather I have attempted to describe the underlying forces which today influence Asian action and thinking, and to suggest a few essential principles on which I believe any constructive American policy must be based."

In CHALLENGE IN THE MIDDLE EAST, Harry B. Ellis, Middle Eastern correspondent for the Christian Science Monitor, and resident of Beirut, presents the facts of Communist penetration of the Middle East and his conclusions about effective American policy in this area. The dominant purpose of our policy, Mr. Ellis feels, should be the "safeguarding of legitimate American interests against the steady pressure of Communist infiltration." But our policy in the Middle East, particularly in regard to Israel, has been dictated by domestic political considerations. What our legitimate interests are and how they may be safeguarded are discussed here in an informative manner. The author says particular attention to Egypt and Iraq and cites many hitherto unpublished details of American relations with President Nasser at the time of Egypt's arms deal with the Soviet Union. He believes, "That Arab leaders — notably President Nasser — are far more concerned about the dangers of Communist influence than is realized by many in the West." All readers will be impressed by the author's impartial consideration of the extremely complex problems of the Middle East.

In FOREIGN POLICY: THE NEXT PHASE, Thomas Finletter points out that too much of America's action in the East and the East has been unilateral. He says, "The fact is that United States and other Western policy for Asia is made without the Asian countries having a proper part in the making of it. In Africa there are not even regional pacts." The African Revolution is behind the Asian in time and so are Western arrangements for collaboration with the newly independent states.

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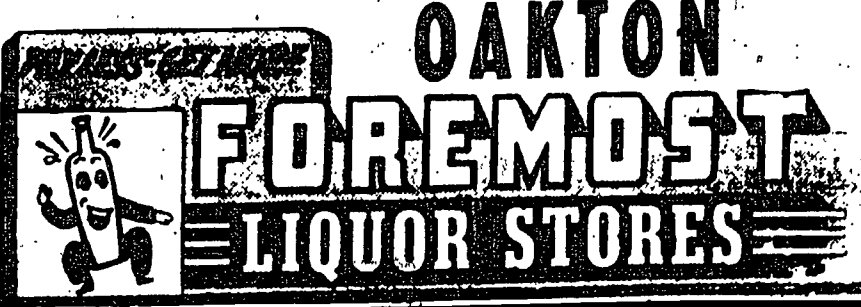

never failed to thrill millions from coast to coast.



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

Down in Springfield the state
legislature has a "BIBB" bill
ready for passage which is of
particular interest to Nilesites.
The bill was aimed at machines
which have recording counters
with adjustable odds and an ac-
cess for shop owners to "knock
off" the free games in exchange
for cash winnings. These ma-
chines are licensed by the fed-
eral government for \$250 a
year as gambling devices and
produce as much as \$500 a
week income.

While the bill before the
General Assembly was aimed
at these type of machines a
Chicago representative, James
Loukas, led the way for an
amendment which would ban all
machines with the right to re-
play. Recording devices could
remain in the machines. Thus,
while the player of the ma-
chine could not get a re-play
the shop owner, still having
the recording counters in the
machines, would more likely
pay off for the games, which
previously had been pre-played.
Twice before anti-pinball laws
were passed by the general
assembly, only to be vetoed
by Governor Stratton. Now that
we have a governor who would
not block such legislation, the
law now has to be watered-
down before it goes up to the
governor's office.

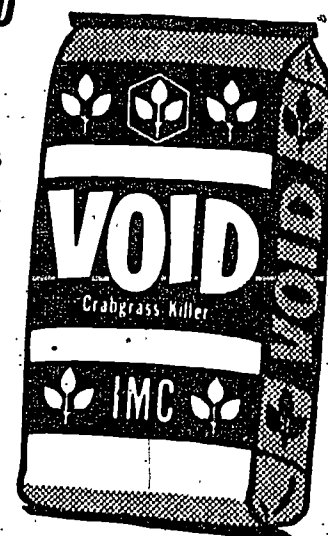
