In THE INTEGRITY OF THE PERSONALITY, Anthony Storr says "Just as too wide a divergence from physiological equilibrium leads to discomfort, disease and death; so the attempt to be what one is not, or the failure to be what one is, lead to internal conflict, neurosis and emotional isolation. I believe the development of personality to be a natural process which, ideally, follows its own course to its own conclusion." This unusual book, written by a leading London psychiatrist, describes in human and lucid terms the therapeutic relationship that must exist between analyst and patient if the full development of the patient's personality is to be achieved. Psychotherapists will find much of value in this thoughtful and thoroughly documented study, but it will perhaps be of most value to the lay reader how is bewildered by the dozens of books on the general subject in which he can never find a clear and simple and comprehensive description of just what the process is and what may be expected from it.

From The Left Hand

Mayor Blase's refusal to provide police protection at TAM last Saturday is certainly the major story of the week. While Niles provided the necessary police for any traffic problems in the TAM area Blase thought it unifying that Niles should provide a police guard to protect the furs and jewels of the "society set" who attended the mobster's wedding Saturday night.

In the "old days" (4 months ago) the old guard in town were much more co-operative. Expolice chief Romey used to work at the country club during his vacation time. During a two week period when the golf tournament was held it was brought out that Romey received \$1000 for his two week stint, acting as head of the police at the tourney.

While linking of Chicago police with the hoodlum-wedding caused a stir among the Chicago-police domos the previous Romey connections with past activities at the CLUB never raised an eyebrow here in town. But then the old guard had things pretty much their own way in those days.

At the opposite end of the pendulum we received a letter from Niles. First library resident, Rudy Hazucha, who will soon move into his new home in Arlington Heights, Hazucha epitomized the new era in Niles many years ago, when it was a losing battle to oppose the reaction and corruption in town. It was with much dismay to see school teacher Hazucha try to accomplish much in the village when he was up against the entrenched forces which held the town in the palm of its hand.

The clean look Niles has today can be attributed to a very few Rudy Hazuchas, whose work on behalf of the library and schools and opposition to many zoning petitions has made Niles a better place for all of us.

This may sound like sour grapes and we don't mean it as such...but the giving a testimonial to our ex-Mayor, while a man of Hazucha's stature moves from the town relatively unnoticed, is certainly ironic.

And speaking of the ex-Mayor the testimonial dinner at Villa Venice was certainly a tribute to him. Trustee John Stanley presented a bouquet to Sally Stankowicz, noting that Sally would find it hard to believe that John Stanley would ever give such a token to Mrs. Stankowicz. The Mayor's speech was brief, and his voice cracked when he emotionally commented on his wife being his partner through the years.

It was a warm, congenial crowd who turned out for the affair, quite likely the last of its kind. Those who've been clawing one another through the years became friends, however briefly. Thursday night, and everyone had a fine time.

Township democratic domo Scotty Krier told us, "You opposed Stankowicz didn't you? Well, you made a mistake.... Frank Stankowicz was for Niles, first, last and always".... Scotty then commented that he was a democrat all the way, he was proud of it, and would 'always' back his men. With these remarks Krier drifted away....As we watched Krier move into the garden outside the main hall we thought we

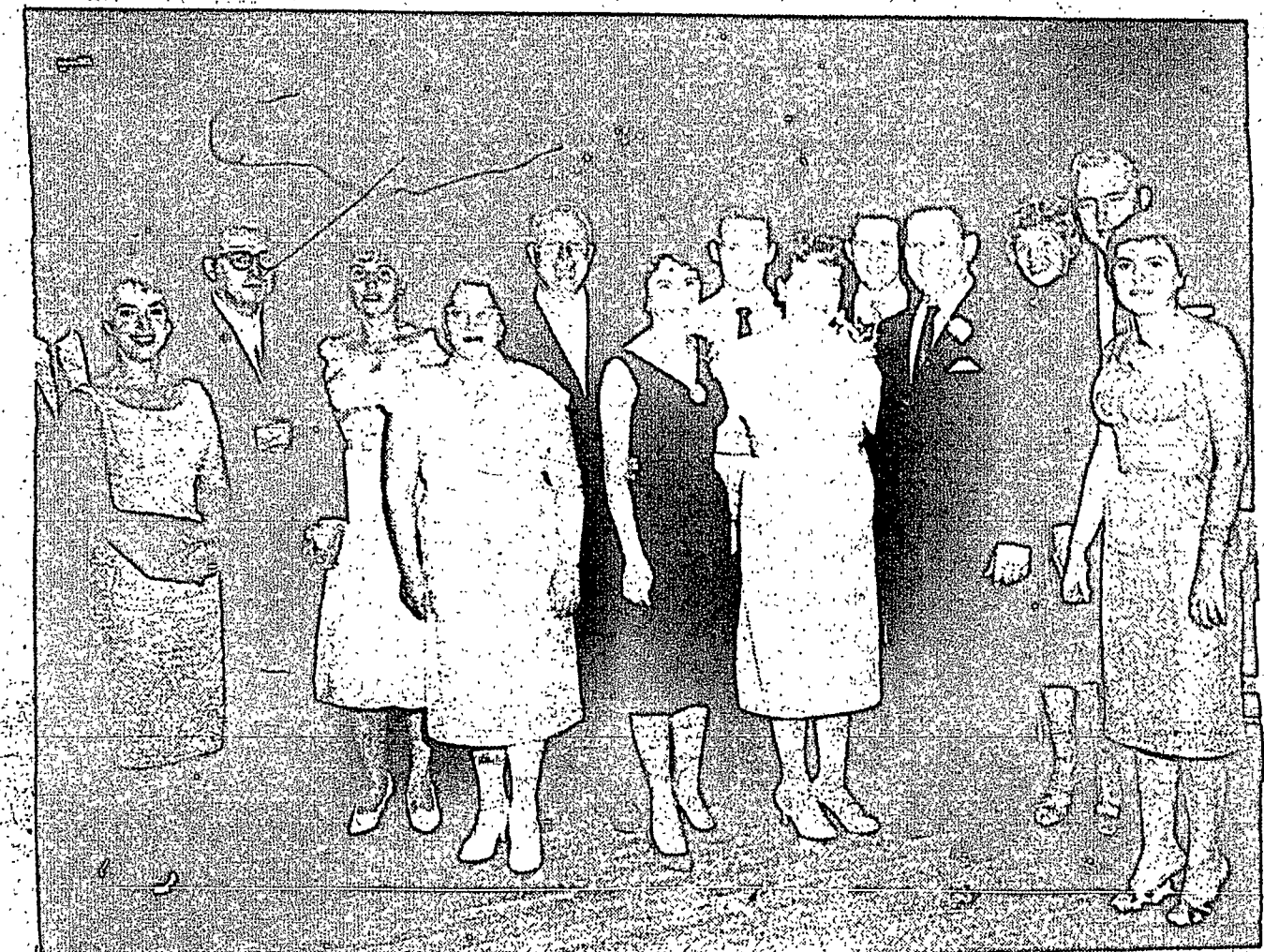

Blase Refuses Niles Police Guard Hoods Jewels & Furs

At Stankowicz Testimonial

Mayor Nick Blase and the village of Niles made page 1 in Chicago's American Tuesday as a result of Blase's refusal to allow Niles police to guard "more than a million dollars worth of furs and jewels" at Tam O'Shanter. It was a wedding given by Jack Cerone, one of Tony Accardo's chief assistants, Saturday night for Cerone's son. Among the guests present were Murray (the Camel) Humphreys, Rocco Fischetti, Joe (Little Caesar) Divarco, Gus Zapas, James (The Monk) Allegretti, Marshall Calfano, Joseph Arnold and Rocco Franno. As the result of Blase's action six Chicago police were used to guard the valuables. The Chicago police are now in hot water for taking this job.

Blase was quoted as saying he turned down requests from both Tam owner George S. May and general manager Michael Akai for police guards. Blase said he did not think it proper for "our police to use their guns and authority to guard this type of thing."

Blase said that Police Chief Emrikson agreed that taxpayers had not spent money selecting, hiring and training policemen so they could guard those who prey on society.

Blase said "We felt we had performed our function when we stationed special details along Howard Street at the time of the reception to keep the traffic moving so this gangster affair would not inconvenience citizens."

After Blase had refused May's phone request Blase said he received a letter sent by special messenger demanding that the Niles police supply guards for the reception at the normal rate of pay, \$20 or \$25 a day. Blase ignored it.

A second letter was then sent special delivery and registered to Blase and mentioned "if anything untoward occurs" the village of Niles will be held responsible. Blase held his ground.

The general manager of the Club, Akai, said they had requested policemen for the affair. He mentioned that they were taxpayers, that a number of clubs had been previously robbed, that many of those previously robbed had been stripped of their jewels and furs and he added he felt there was a definite need for these police.

Akai added that he felt that Blase had no right to refuse

Pinballs Removed; Legal Action Fails

A last ditch legal move to prevent the removal of pinball machines from Niles failed last Wednesday in Superior Court in Chicago. The removal of all machines from Niles has now been completed, Monday, September 4 being the last day for such removal.

Attorney Arthur Zimmerman, representing Harold's Grill, sought immediate injunctive relief in Superior Court before Judge Derringer. Had the injunction been granted it would have upset the ordinance passed by Niles trustees in August banning pinball machines in Niles.

Zimmerman had contended that the action taken by Niles village officials was unconstitutional and that the removal of the machines was without due process of law.

While Derringer did not issue the injunction he gave the village of Niles ten days to answer the complaint. A hearing will then be set at which time a final ruling will be handed down.

Niles Mayor Nick Blase (a lawyer himself) told The Bugle he was not worried about the legality of the ban.

\$6100 Is Niles Days Profit; Up \$1500 From 1960

Despite the inclement weather which wiped out 1/2 of the three-day affair, Niles Days profits were higher than the full three day affairs, either of the past two years.

Financial chairman Ralph Lieske told THE BUGLE that \$6,100.91 was the profit figure for this year's affair. This figure topped last year's affair by about \$1500.

Prior to two years ago the Niles Police and Fire Departments shared in the proceeds. The profit figure was then in the vicinity of \$12,000. Of this figure, 75 to 80% of the money derived from tickets sold on an auto given away. The ability of the two departments in selling the auto tickets was the reason for the difference in the figures through the years.

A breakdown of this year's figures would show that \$16,546.49 was received this year. Disbursements came to \$12,445.33 leaving a net profit of \$6,100.91.

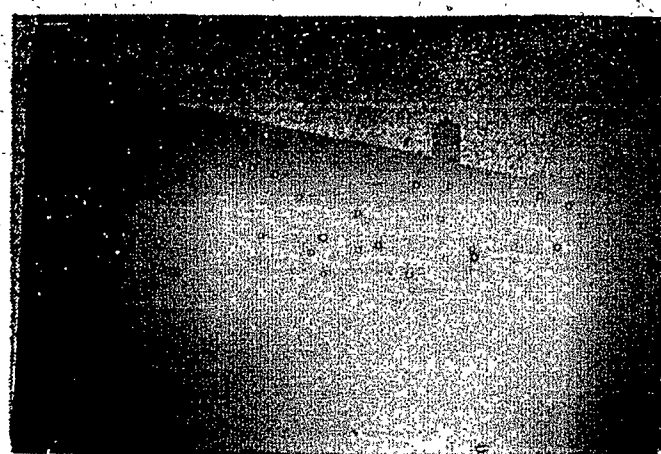
Ticket sales for this year's affair was \$6,264, the cost of the car was \$2,230.42, a \$521.87 cost for a motor boat and trailer and \$474.88 for a color T.V. Total net profit for ticket sales was \$3,037.83.

All Nilesites Must Re-Register

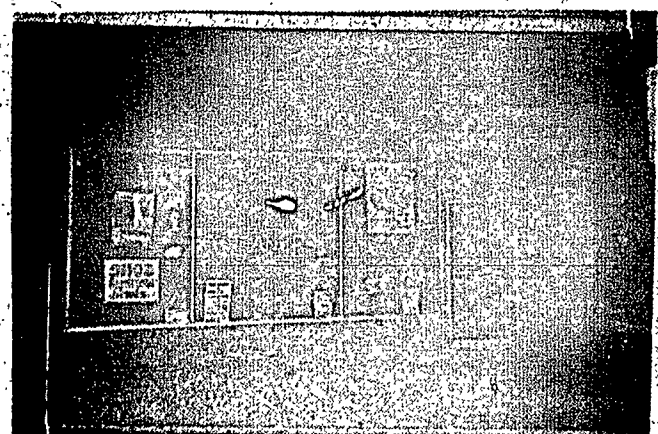

Niles PTA First Meeting Includes Flower Show

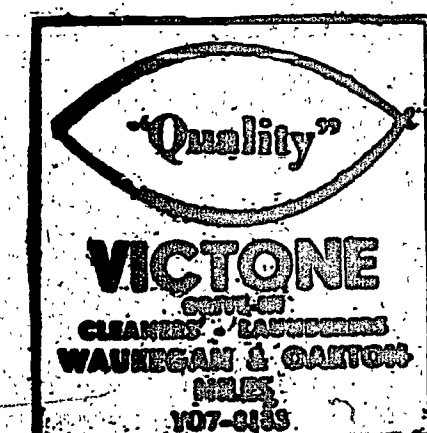

Womans Club Tell Of TB X-Ray Results

The following is an excerpt from a letter which was sent to Mrs. David Nach, Publicity Chairman of The Woman's Club of Niles, in regard to the X-ray program which was conducted in Niles June 26-30, 1961.

"A total of 2,797 x-rays were taken during this survey: 1,114 at the Super City location and 1,683 at Golf-Mil. 49 of these persons were asked to return for diagnostic or repeat 70 mm films because the first films were either unsatisfactory for interpretation or showed findings which the doctors felt needed to be checked on a larger x-ray. The films of 21 persons were reported back to them as indicating other chest irregularities than tuberculosis, such as cardiac irregularities and questionable enlarged thyroids."

The Woman's Club of Niles was in complete charge of registrations for the x-rays during the five days in which the mobile unit was stationed in Niles.

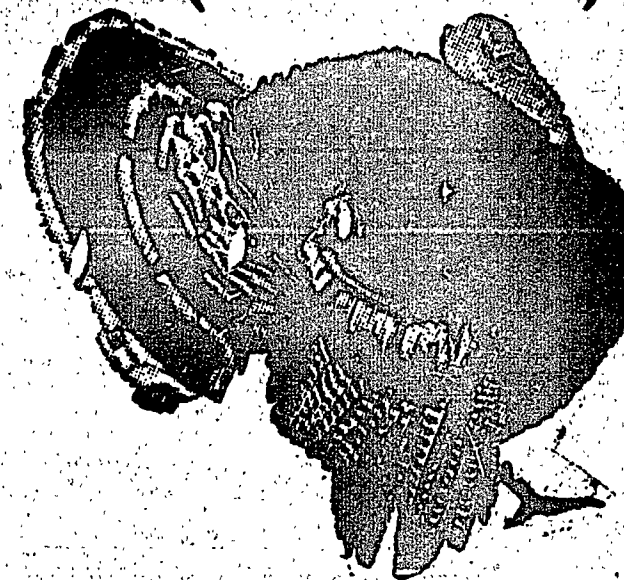

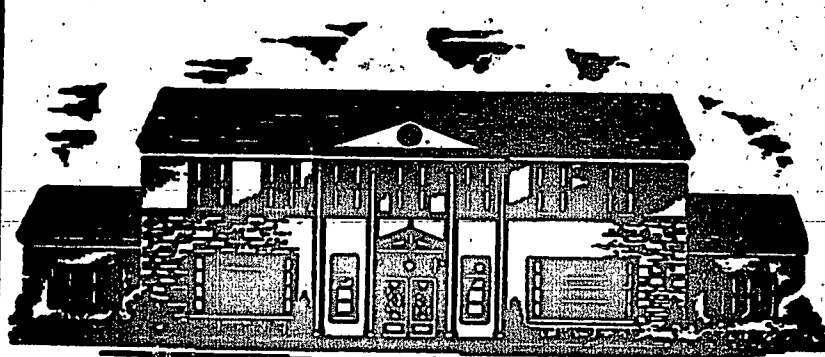

For twenty years people have been asking Roy Chapman Andrews questions about their ancestors. Was there a Garden of Eden? Did man descend from the ape? What of the "Missing Link"? How did Neanderthal man clothe, house, and feed himself? MEET YOUR ANCESTORS is written to answer questions such as these; to show by what steps we came to be what we are today. Dr. Andrews says that the search for the bones of our ancestors is the biggest and most exciting hunt of all, a hunt which provides more thrills and more satisfaction than any other in the world, and he should know, for he has hunted everything from rabbits in his boyhood home in Wisconsin to whales off the coast of Japan and the bones of primitive man in the Gobi Desert. In this book he has covered for the layman the essential facts of man's knowledge of his prehistoric forebears. One of the fascinating features of the book is that each primitive type discussed, from the ape that almost became a man down through the millions of years to Homo sapiens, adds his own particular contribution to the evolutionary picture. The bones of our ancestors come to life and reveal their part in the cosmic drama of mankind.

In THE MOUNTAINS OF PHAROAH, Leonard Cottrell, an eminent Egyptologist and scholar, tells how the pyramids fascinated generations of grave robbers and treasure hunters. Some thought that these great stone piles were treasure houses filled with gold, others that they were hollow and still others found the secret passages into the burial chambers, which they promptly pillaged. It remained for a later age to produce the brilliant, and often eccentric, succession of Western scholars who at last discovered the secrets of the Mountain of Pharaoh. It is with this group that Mr. Cottrell's book is largely concerned. His narrative, written with wit and understanding, is the first book ever written about the actual discoveries from the point of view of the men who made them. It might be called a study of the human side of archaeology. In any case, it provides, with pages of photographs and diagrams, a wholly intriguing picture of the exploration of the most spectacular graveyard in the world.

In LIFE OF THE PAST, George Gaylor Simpson, an outstanding paleontologist, explains this science for the general reader. Paleontology, or the science of reading the records of life, has made rapid progress in recent years; and with its links to other branches of knowledge ranging from geology and biology to archaeology
