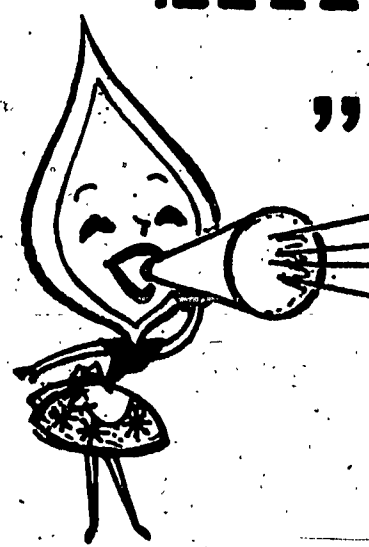

## From The Left Hand

Mayor Blase, who has been a veritable whirlwind these first months in office, is looked upon with mixed emotions, after this past week's actions.

On the positive side, he and his fellow trustees are moving along well on many fronts. The announcement of 1/2 hour bus service on Milwaukee Avenue is certainly good news. Their recent approval of the Touhy Avenue reservoir and connecting sewers, their pushing the Dempster Street sewer, their aim to co-operate and aid the park board in future park activities are all actions which merit recognition.

On the negative side there were disturbing incidents the past week which deserve mention.

Mayor Nick Blase's sound and fury the past week had the hollow ring of "phony" considering his past performance concerning gambling in the village.

The mayor attacked the sheriff's police and NBC for their references to Niles as a village which harbors gambling. While Blase's attack on the County Police, the legitimate in content, nevertheless, was delivered with all the vigorous windy indignation, worthy of some over-plump Senator Claghorn, who was orating at the annual Fourth of July picnic.

Blase's attack on N.B.C. was trivial, and brings to mind the question of whether this guy's on the level or is merely following in the footsteps of past politicians, whose verbal meanderings in Niles have been equally inconsequential.

Blase exploited the gambling issue in Niles BEFORE the election for all it was worth. He, alone, among all the candidates rode into office, by pointing to the gambling stamps which existed in Niles. The week before the election he and his fellow-candidates sent around a brochure quoting a Chicago columnist who had found gambling in Niles. A second brochure duplicated the BUGLE's front page in which the major content of the page concerned corruption in Niles vis a vis gambling. But when Blase got into office he began to soft-pedal the issue. First he told us that he had eliminated it.

## Village, Park Bds. Vow Co-Operation

Niles Board of trustees and park commissioners met Saturday morning at the Public Works building to discuss future plans pertinent to park activities.

Most important: the two groups pledged mutual co-operation in all future park endeavors. Village officials said they would also join with the park board in contacting the Golf Mill interests for the purpose of trying to annex the area into Niles park district.

The groups also decided jointly that all future annexation activities would be worked out together. Also, Niles rather uneven border will be "rounded out" to enable park and village functions to coincide.

The two groups intend meeting a second time in two or three weeks.

## Water-Doused Skokian Slap's Hood's Daughter

An alleged dousing of two bathing capfuls of water over the well-coiffured head of a Skokie housewife who allegedly slapped the face of the douser, a 13 year old daughter of a notorious hoodlum, was revealed in Judge Smigel's courtroom Tuesday afternoon. A jury trial November 7 in this same courtroom will likely settle this civil action.

Thirteen year old Jill Cerone, daughter of hoodlum Jackie Cerone, was reported to have doused Mrs. Marilyn Newman, 31, 9145 Skokie Blvd., while she sat fully-dressed by the Tam O'Shanter Country Club pool recently. After the dousing Mrs. Newman asked the girl why she had spilled the water on her and it was reported the teen said because she wanted to. She then proceeded to dump a second bag of water on Mrs. Newman, who reportedly slapped the child.

The Cerone's, who only recently made headlines with their lavish wedding at the same club, swore out a warrant against Mrs. Newman, who promptly posted the necessary \$200 bond. Niles police served the warrant to Mrs. Newman, which is correct procedure in such a complaint.

Attorney Gerber, defending Mrs. Newman, asked for a jury trial and Judge Smigel set November 7 for the trial. Out-

side the courtroom Mrs. Newman protested to her attorney about the trial and said she feared violence. Gerber said the publicity of this event in the newspapers would prevent any such happening.

The question uppermost in most persons in the courtroom was, "Why did the Cerone's press the charges?" The hoodlum element normally shun such publicity.

## Blase Blasts T.V. Crime Expose

Fire Prevention Week-October 8-14

Accuses NBC Of  
"Irresponsible  
Broadcasting"

Mayor Nick Blase accused Chicago's National Broadcasting Company outlet (WNBQ T.V. Station) of "irresponsible broadcasting" in a letter sent to the station last Thursday for the inclusion of Niles as an area for crime syndicate activities, in a program September 25 on syndicate operations. Frank Jordan, N.B.C. news director for Chicago, told THE BUGLE the script, was meant to refer to "the general area of Niles including the unincorporated area around the village. The script was not meant to imply that there is

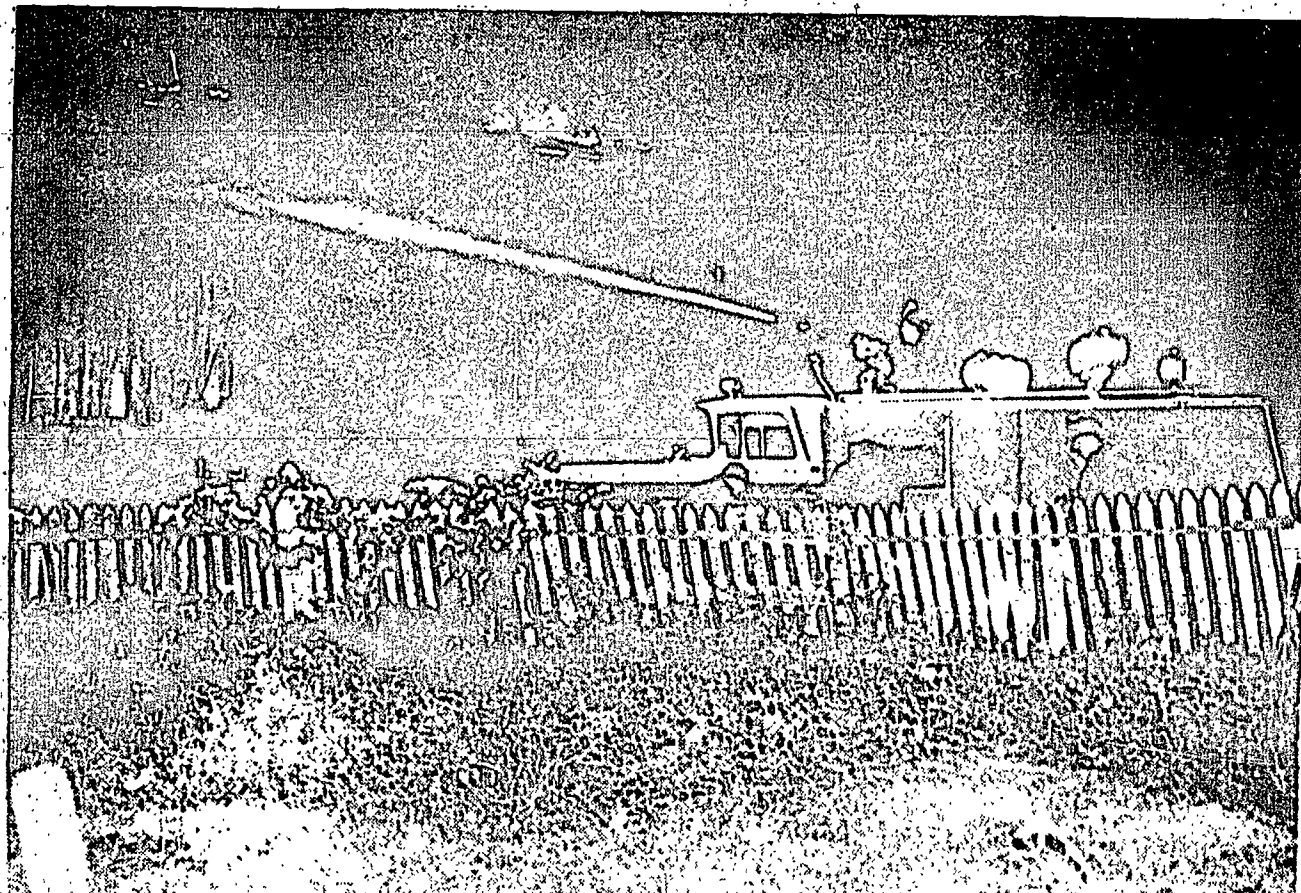
now gambling in Niles, but around the area of the village of Niles.

The controversy arose over a September 25 special broadcast by T.V. announcer Len O'Connor, in which he revealed the operations of the crime syndicate in the Chicago-area. According to Blase, a large map was displayed on the T.V. screen, designating eight suburban towns which had gambling operations. Blase said he took personal affront at Niles being placed on the map, and that it was depicted centrally, giving the impression of it being a gambling center in Cook County. Blase said there is no gambling in Niles and that last month the pinball machines were eliminated.

This was the second time within a week that Blase has shown his ire concerning outside inferences of gambling operations in Niles. Blase had lashed out at Sheriff Sain and the county police after receiving a letter from them asking that Niles give a report on gambling activities for three businesses which are in unincorporated area to the south of the village. Blase said this letter was "salacious" and that it was under the jurisdiction of the very county police, who queried Niles as to why this gambling was existent.

The following is the letter Blase sent to Lloyd Yoder, manager of N.B.C.'s Chicago outlet at the Merchandise Mart.

Niles police had released pictures and a report on them which led to the capture of the trio.

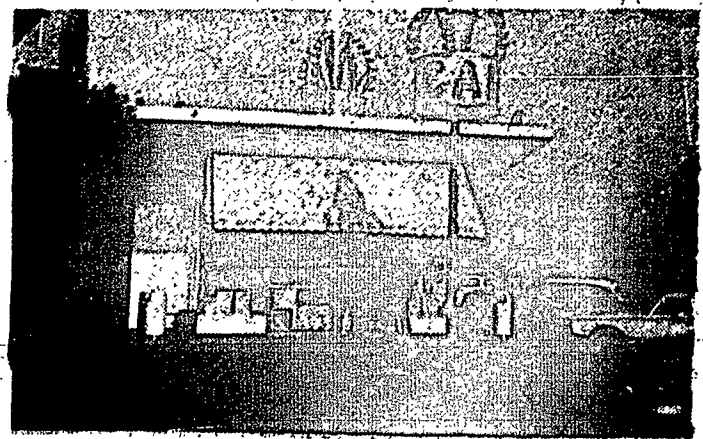
The three children will be tried Friday and can receive a sentence up to five years in prison each.



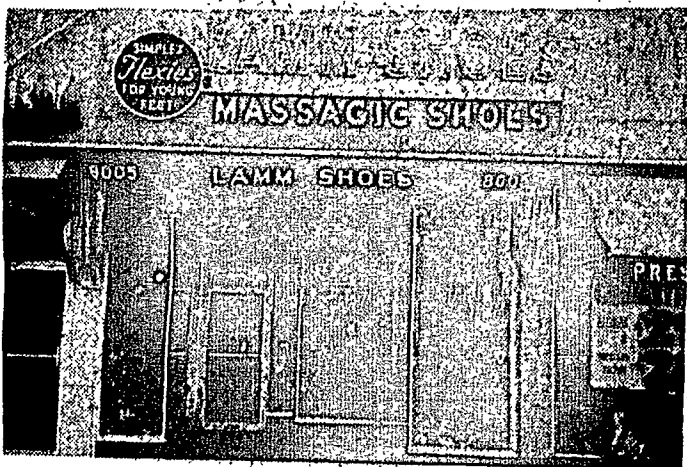

In mid-19th century Boston three fascinating bluestockings became central figures in the major literary-educational controversies and developments of the day. It is of these three sisters that Louise Hall Tharp wrote in THE PEABODY SISTERS OF SALEM. The eldest, was Elizabeth. "Whose vitality was so infectious, her enthusiasm so infectious, her plain face so friendly, that strangers were attracted to her. If they smiled, it was with tolerance. If they did not know her name, they asked; and so wide was Elizabeth's acquaintance in Boston that, wherever she went, there was someone to say, 'Why, that's Miss Peabody!'" For it was Elizabeth who had been the moving force of a new and different school for girls, directing her younger sisters in their teaching, and demonstrating her own brilliant mind by copying Dr. Channing's sermons for the printer while listening to him read aloud. The second sister, was an invalid, mother, until the resourceful Elizabeth managed to send her on a trip to Cuba. She returned to charm Boston with her painting, and to lure Nathaniel Hawthorne out of seclusion. Mary, the youngest, self-effacing, imposed upon and beautiful, married, Horace Mann. But chiefly the book is about Elizabeth, Boston's first woman bookshop owner and publisher, and of the people she met in her business life; that critical English visitor, Harriet Martineau; the Alcotts, with their school on new principles, which would always be able to pay the teacher's salaries next year; and the mysterious Hawthornes.

Mrs. Tharp's latest book, until victory, is about the youngest sister, Mary, and her husband Horace Mann. "Irresistible to women", so Mann was called by an indignant young man who had misconstrued Mann's friendship with his sister. To Mary Peabody, smitten in the early days at Mr. Clarke's boarding-house, he was "the radiant Mr. Mann," "dear Mr. M.," and Mary treasured him in her heart, and in her letters, through the anxious years when Mann seemed on the verge of an "alliance" with her brilliant sister, Elizabeth. To Elizabeth he was fascinating, stimulating, a magnificent personality wavering between fits of depression and moments of exultation, a challenge to her warm heart and to her Transcendentalist belief in the improbability of man. He was witty, a great orator, a spell-binding conversationalist, a man of vision gifted with a quicksilver mind, a magnetic attractiveness for work. Mrs. Tharp writes richly and understandingly of Mann's career as a public servant, a career in which "controversy continued like a cloud around his head like a mountain peak." But she did not have to write a beautiful story of his loves, she let the principals write that story themselves. For through Brown University Mrs. Tharp discovered the touching correspondence between Mann and Charlotte Messer, daughter of the president of Brown while Mann was a student there. These love letters, full of Mann's ardent declarations and Charlotte's shy, cautious, teasing replies, were

## Review Of September 25 Maine High Bd. Meeting

At its regular meeting Monday evening, September 25, the Maine Township High School Board of Education officially approved a resolution for a bond referendum to be submitted to the voters Saturday, November 18, 1961. Seventeen polling places were established. The voters will be asked for permission to build a third high school on the Dee site and to construct a field house at Maine West.

On the same ballot, voters will be asked for permission to increase the levy for the educational fund from the present ceiling of \$1.06 to \$1.27. The increase is needed to provide additional teachers and to defray operating costs of the new South school. Twenty-one cents represents the legal maximum that the Board of Education may increase the tax ceiling at any one time. The board called attention to the fact that the total 21 cent increase will not be levied the first year that Maine South is occupied. Only such portion of the increase will be requested as is needed for the maintenance and operation of the third school. The last time the educational levy was increased was in 1957. The exact amount by which the levy will be increased will depend upon such factors as the increase in the districts assessed valuation and the number of new teachers needed for the increasing school enrollments. The board has declared its intention of maintaining the lowest possible tax rate that is compatible with quality education.

As Mayor of the Village of Niles I wish to formally protest to you for myself, our Board of Trustees, and our 23,000 residents, for irresponsible broadcasting. A formal complaint will follow this letter to Newton N. Minew, Chairman of F.C.C.

Your broadcasting, without first checking out the facts, puts our Village in the public eye as a corrupt Village.

On April 18, 1961, there was an election in Niles wherein a majority of the Board of Trustees has been changed. Since that time we have out-lived pin ball machines and have eliminated any form of operation that could be interpreted as vice or corruption.

Your broadcast has unquestionably hurt the reputation of our Village and of our citizens.

You may have our Village mixed up with an unincorporated area immediately South of Niles, between Niles and Chicago. This is under the jurisdiction of the County Sheriff's Police. Your ignorance of this matter does not excuse the blatant abuse of your broadcasting privileges.

minuted the jar games in town. And he pointed to them as being the major source of gambling in Niles. He told us he was not even sure there was any gambling on the 40 or more pinballs in town. Blase was either naive or was resorting to some good old political euphemism known as double talk. (And knowing Blase we can tell you he's not naive). For in state legislature hearings, it was brought out that pinball activities such as Niles had, netted more than \$500,000 annually. The jar games Blase referred to were operated for the VFW and did not net them \$50 per week.

AFTER the election Trustee Ken Scheel, not Blase, introduced the pinball ban. Blase, who has been something of a whirlwind in other actions, was a real foot-dragger on the very issue which he exploited which led to his election.

The interesting sidelight to the pinball ban centered around Blase's and Scheel's approach to it. When we asked Scheel why he introduced it he said simply, "I felt I had a moral obligation" referring to his past feelings on the matter. Scheel did not campaign on this issue as Blase had, but restricted his campaigning to less emotional issues. But twice we heard Blase mention that in all the complaints he had received from villagers, not one had mentioned gambling. The contrast of the two men's thinking was interesting. Scheel quietly campaigned, but showing much gumption, stood up to the head-syndicate operations when the chips were down, by leading the way for the elimination of gambling in Niles. Blase, milking the gambling issue before the election for all it was worth, then became strangely quiet about it after the election. His remarks "What a nice complaint came from the people over gambling," seemed to justify that he was not an important issue. Scheel felt a moral obligation concerning this problem. Blase inferred that because there was no public complaint that it was not an important issue.

Blase might look more closely at Scheel who has gone to stand up to the heads AFTER the votes are in. Since Blase seems to be getting very political he might note that this same Mr. Scheel was quite a non-gamster in the last election. And since Blase resides in an office on the back of Scheel, he might capture why guys like Scheel get votes. For while Blase may not have received any personal complaints concerning gambling MR. SCHEEL received about 3000 complaints at the polls, which resulted in Blase being where he is now.

Mrs. Tharp's wide knowledge of the period and of the cost help her to make the book come alive. Horace Mann is shown as a husband and educator, idealist and public servant, who was great enough to live as he preached. "Be ashamed to die until you have won some victory for humanity."

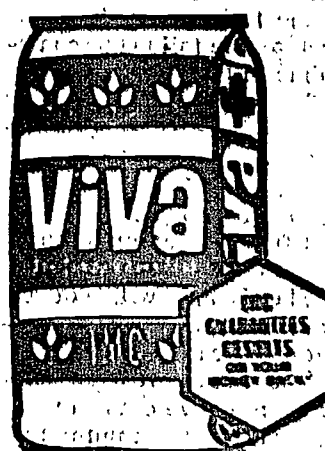
