Against Seizure

Against Seizure

Dear Mr. Besser:

On Tuesday, October 10, Mayor Blase announced that the Niles police had seized the Tropic of Cancer, a book by Henry Miller, from all the bookstands in Niles. No seizure of this type can be justified because it violates a basic idea of our democracy. The opinion of a few individuals was allowed as a substitute for the will of the majority when the police seized the books without consulting either the people or a whole or their representatives. As it turned out, the opinion of the majority was against the books; however it could have been that the public would have felt the book morally sound, in spite of the police department's action to the contrary.

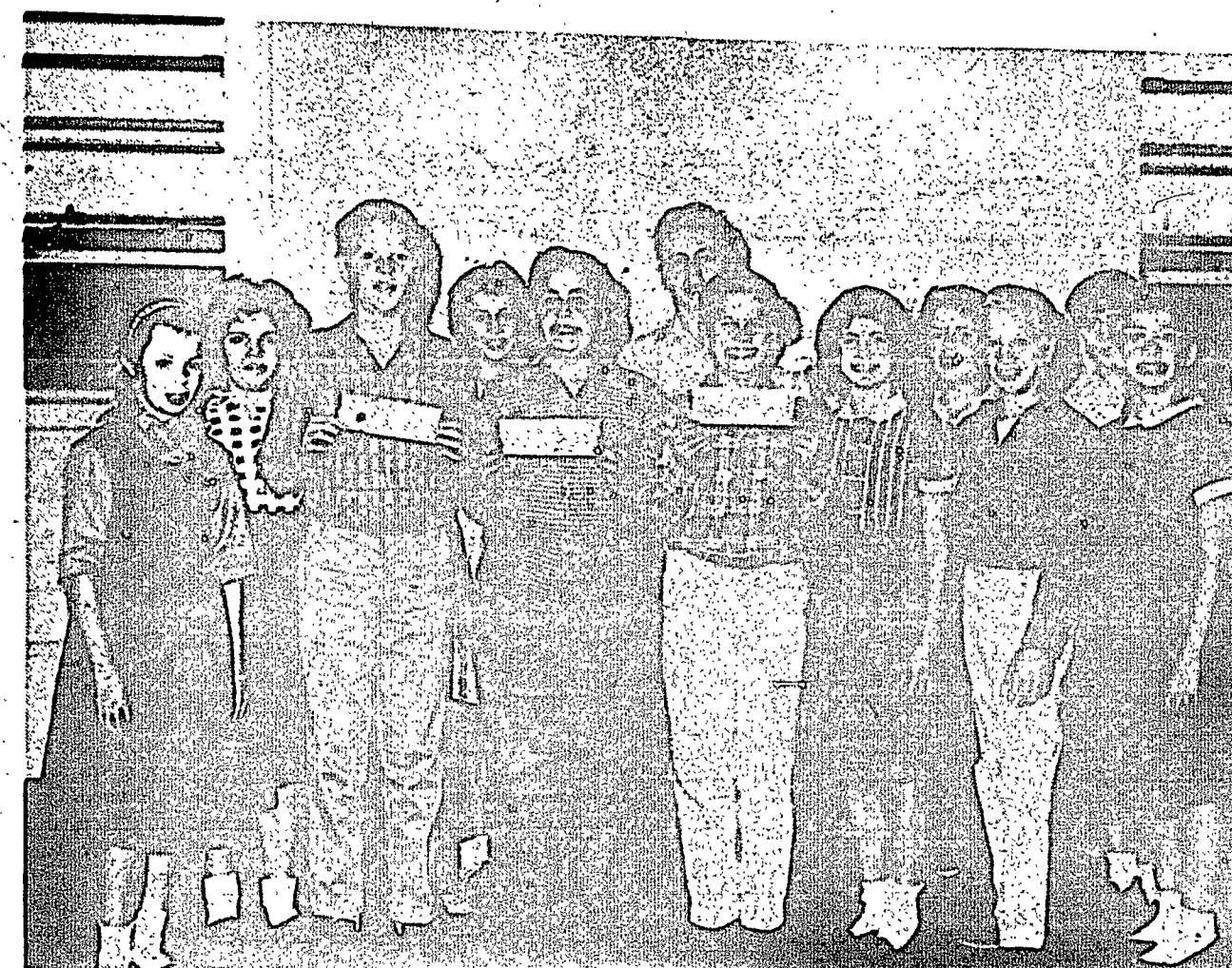
The action which was taken must be criticized simply because it was arbitrary. Our system of representative democracy is set up so that governing officials cannot arbitrarily impose his will on the people. He must be responsible to them to serve their common interest. We cannot allow a policy of government censorship of literature in this community.

However, it will be agreed that some form of censorship is necessary. As Reverend Gish stated in a letter which appeared in the October 26 edition of the NILES BUGLE, "the very function of all civil law is to curtail the freedom of some individuals so that the freedom and well being of all may be protected." Nonetheless, censorship must not be conducted in a prejudiced, arbitrary way, but in an intelligent, rational manner. The Mayor himself has suggested an intelligent approach to the problem: That a committee, which would include religious leaders, be set up in order to read, review, and classify on literature which enters our area. Perhaps this committee might consult a literary critic or a professional writer for his opinion. After all, if we have a question about our health, we see a doctor; likewise, if we have a question about literature, we should consult someone who is intimately concerned with it.

Arbitrary government censorship can sometimes lead to bad situations. In a certain town in California a particular play was closed down by the police because it was "lewd and immoral," and a warrant was issued for the arrest of the author—some guy named Aristophanes. The police were rudely awakened by the fact that Aristophanes wrote this play over 2000 years ago in Athens, and that his plays are considered treasures of world literature.

However, what can we do about writers and publishers who would endanger public morals? The best argument we can give against their filthy books and magazines is of an economic nature. The committee the Mayor has suggested could classify literature which enters our area, and recommend to the public not to buy certain books or magazines which have been judged indecent. If we show the publishers of these books that we do not want their trash by refusing to purchase it, this will influence them not to print it. We must convince them that we desire good literature. This can be accomplished only if we react intelligently to the problem and seek the best solution in this matter of censorship.

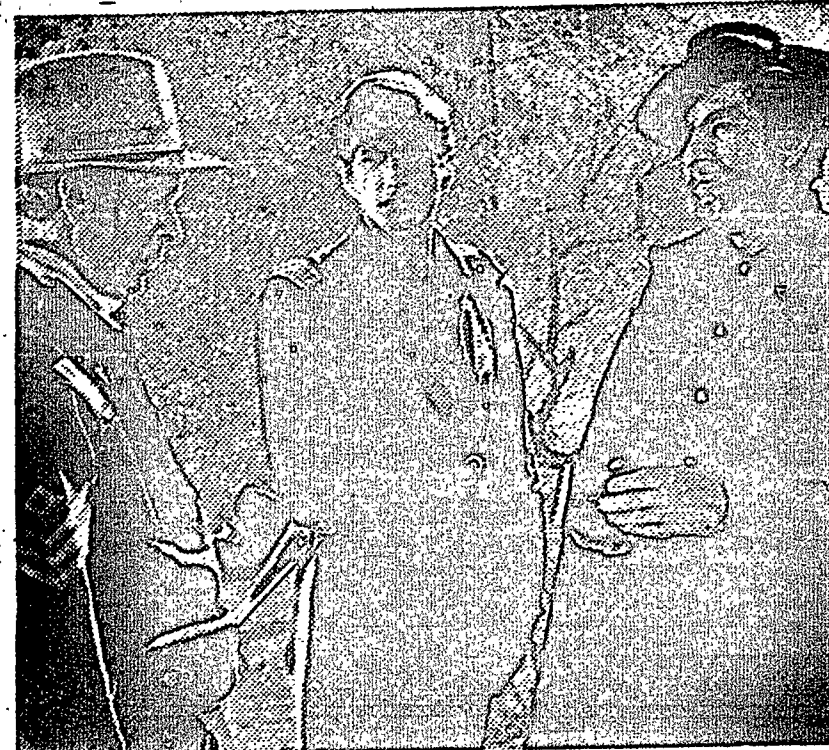

Agree For Joint Use Of School Facilities For Park Use

Agreement has been reached between the Board of Commissioners of the Niles Park District and the Board of Education of East Moline School District No. 63 in Niles which will provide for joint use of playground areas and building facilities.

This agreement culminates three years of discussion and planning. The agreement covers facilities in that area north of Oakton Street and west of Harlem Avenue, which is in the Niles Park District, Playground

and school sites included are the Oak School, 7640 Main St., and the new Viola H. Nelson School, 8901 N. Ozanam St.

Under the conditions of the agreement a lease will be drawn up between the two Boards which will permit recreational activities during after school hours and joint development of playground facilities by the park district and the school district. 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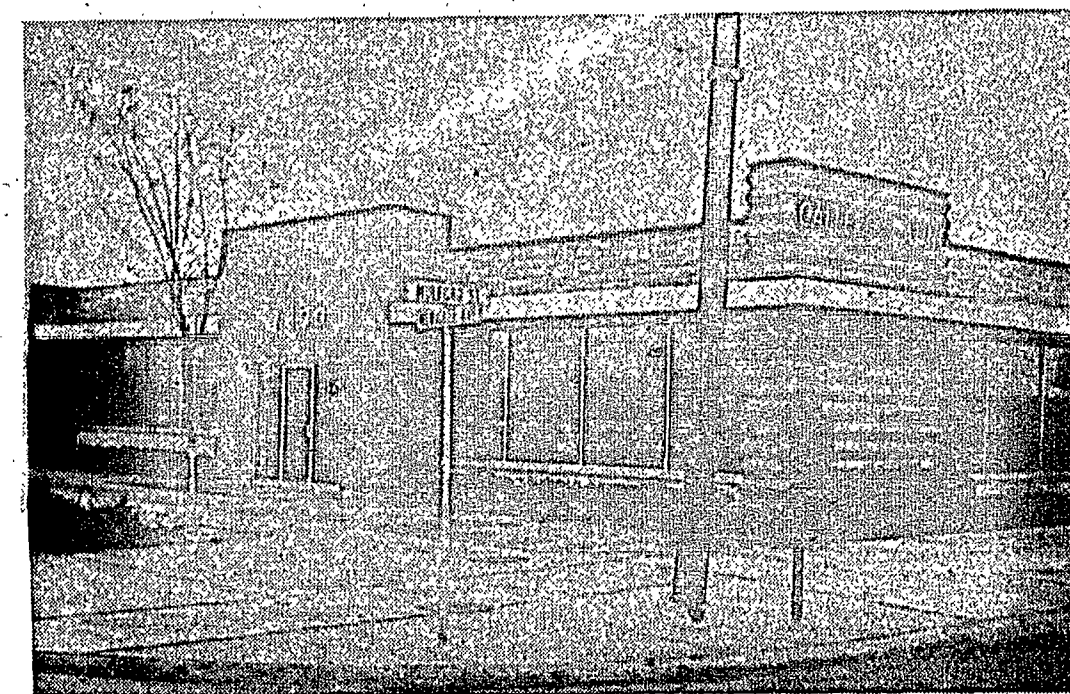
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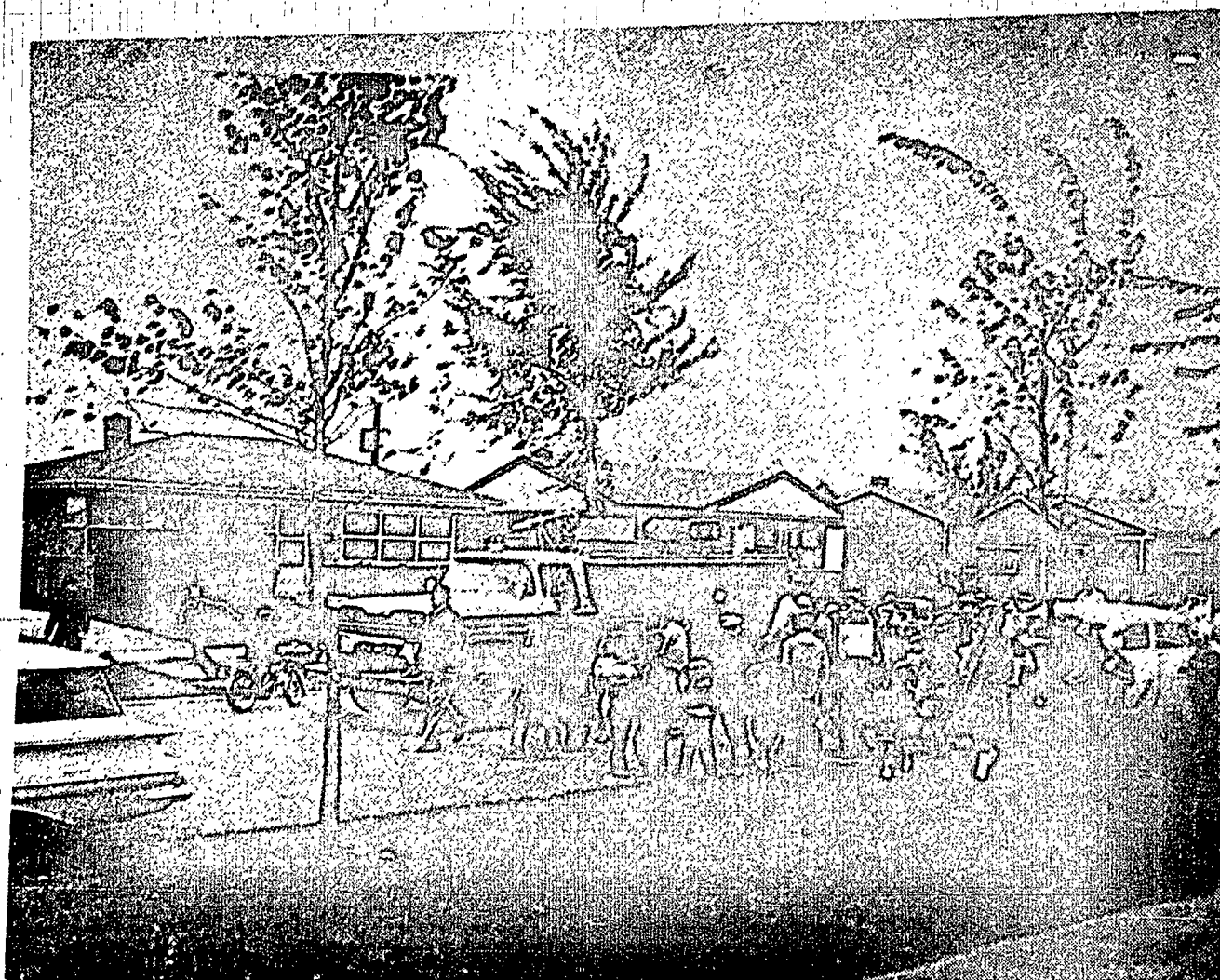

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Post Office Has Openings

The Chicago Post Office has announced that it will need about 200 additional trucks to handle the ever increasing volume of Christmas mail.

The trucks that are needed, range from 1 to 3 ton, 300 cubic feet minimum capacity, adequately covered (panel or stake with tarpaulin) to afford complete protection to the United States Mail against bad weather. The trucks must be equipped with a rear door or gate with locks.

Trucks will be rented on an hourly rate basis for use after December 10. Bidding for hire of trucks will be on a competitive basis and the lowest acceptable hourly rate trucks will be used first.

In addition to hourly rental fees for the trucks, owners or their designated drivers will be employed by the Post Office as Seasonal Assistants at the rate of \$1.96 per hour.

All interested persons should call in person at Room 330, Main Post Office, 433 West Van Buren Street, beginning November 1, for the necessary bid forms. All bids must be submitted no later 2:00 P.M. on November 16, 1961.

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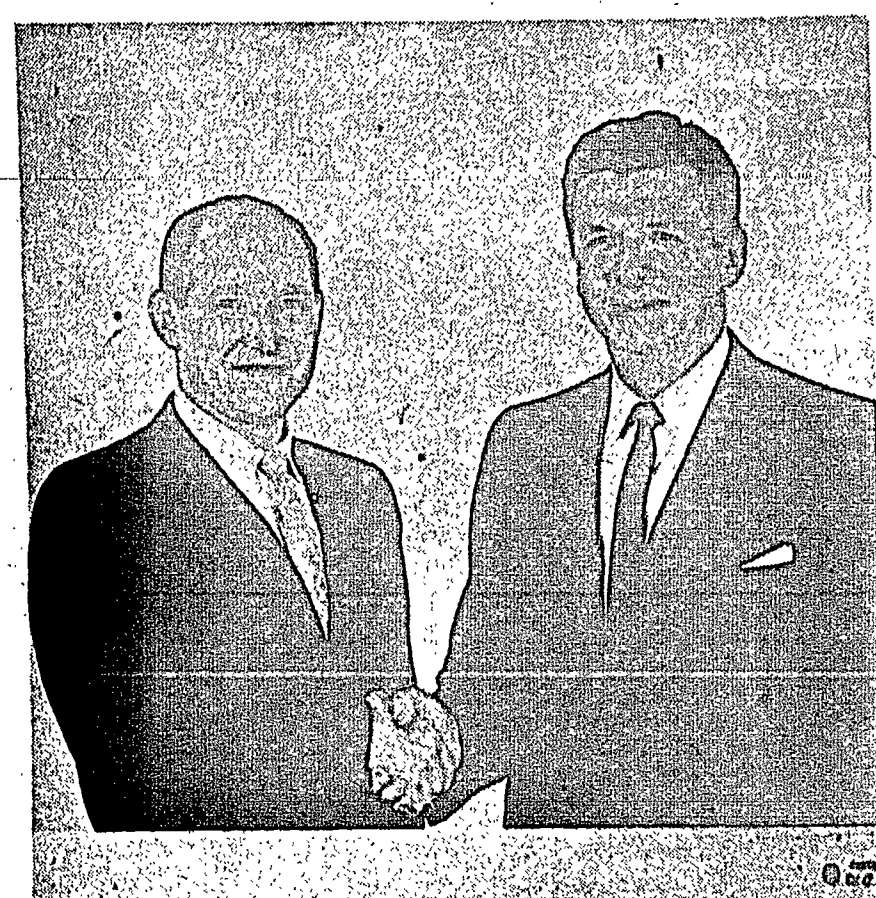


The Niles Regular Democratic Organization takes pleasure in announcing the election of Mr. A. G. Marcheschi as President of the newly created Niles Democratic Organization.

There are in every generation a few books, very few, that profoundly influence their time and change the lives of their authors as well. Such a book was ETIQUETTE, THE BLUE BOOK OF SOCIAL USAGE, by Emily Post, which appeared for the first time in 1922. When her publisher asked Mrs. Post to write on the subject, she said, "It's the most ridiculous thing I ever heard of." After a persuasive mail and telephone campaign of several weeks, Emily Post gave in. "But it will be a small book. The whole subject can be reduced to a few simple rules." Her "small book" of close to 700 pages topped the non-fiction best-seller list the year it appeared, and "according to Emily Post" entered the language as the last word on the subject of social conduct. Despite many requests from her publisher for an autobiography, Emily Post steadily refused to write one. Although a valuable and entertaining conversationalist, she maintained the well-bred woman's reticence about her personal life, and so the job was left to her son, Emily Post was educated by governesses and at private schools in Baltimore and New York, and spent her summers at Bar Harbor and Tuxedo Park, which her father, a prominent architect, had been commissioned to design and develop. After a fashionable marriage to a brilliant Wall Street broker, Mrs. Post lived the life of a young matron in society, paying calls in the afternoon, entertaining at dinner in the evening, and spending summers at Tuxedo Park and abroad, until her two sons were old enough to enter boarding school. It was only after her marriage had been terminated in divorce that she turned her attention to writing in order to support her family. Her romantic stories of European and American society were serialized in several popular magazines and some were successfully published in book form. She became a "traveling correspondent" for a while, crossing the United States by car, and touring Europe on the very eve of World War I. In TRULY EMILY POST, Edwin Post has not only paid tribute to a great woman but, with wit and sharp discernment, he has recreated her whole world and her influence upon it.

A completely different life, lived at the same time in America, is described in MOUNTAIN WOLF WOMAN, by Nancy Lurie, the story of a Winnebago woman, told in her own words and revealing 75 years of American Indian life. Mountain Wolf Woman told her story as a favor to her adopted kinswoman Nancy Lurie, for among the Winnebago a relative must always be obliged if a favor is asked in the proper manner. The result is an unusually candid and authentic account of Indian life, told from a woman's point of view. Mountain Wolf Woman, sister of Crashing Thunder, has struggled to maintain her family against odds that would have defeated a less vigorous and self-confident person. Whether she is describing her wandering childhood days in Wisconsin, her brief stay in a mission school, the marriage arranged against her will, the death of her chosen husband, or the misfortune of her children, she sets forth her views in honest and perceptive terms. Recorded on tape and then translated into English, this narrative gives the reader the rare opportunity of day-to-day acquaintance with a real and remarkable Indian woman.

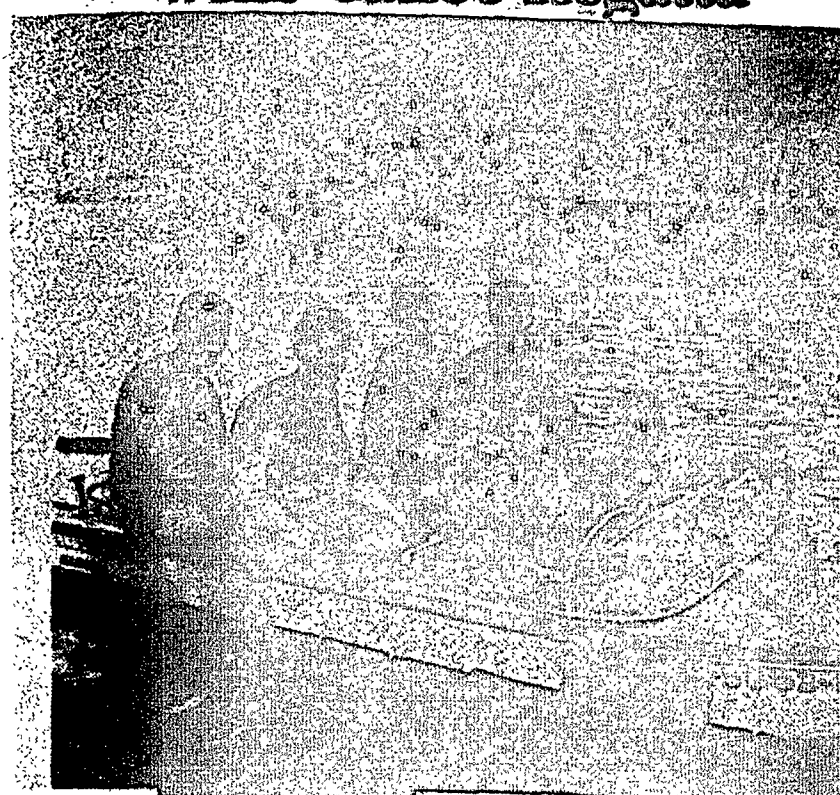

Now comes the funeral home desiring a second floor unit for the attendant, who obviously will have to live on the premises. While the zoning board rejected the petition, it is linked to the mayhem the old board caused in dissecting the proposed new zoning ordinance.

Village attorney Dahl interpreted the new ordinance as being a positive piece of legislation. He contended unless it was so written to allow second floor apartments, which has not been included, he believed they were not intended to be allowed.

Now, the funeral home will go before the village board and ask for a reversal of this decision. And if the village board, the petitioners will then probably request a public hearing for an addition to the zoning ordinance to allow for special use for funeral homes for the second floor addition. This will undoubtedly happen and it will eventually be approved.

Had the old board listened to the man they paid \$12,000 to, as well as to their appointed Plan Commission, then no second floor units could be built and the ordinance would likely hold up. But the "boys" on the inside ruled the roost, and the inevitable havoc is passed on to the future.

And this is the sad story of the pre-April Niles. A patch-quilt type of government hodge-podged this town into a crazy-quilt, which will never be fully rectified.

The landswell of apartment buildings, the park-less village, the night-mare called Milwaukee Avenue, all are burdens we Nilesites must carry, because the old boards listened to those in their inner circles, saving their requests, at the expense of the rest of the village.

Since we can't undo much of what has passed we can at least make sure the Niles of tomorrow gets a better shake from the present board.

Since the 1961-62 appropriation has allowed for a village manager, who can certainly make the road to the future a great deal smoother, we're curious why the new board has not initiated the hiring of a V.M. In pre-campaign days they were very much in favor of hiring a manager. Now that they've moved into the village hall, they've become conspicuously quiet over hiring such a man.

Since the appropriation allows for the V.M. for the next 6 months of the fiscal year, we note that the last six months began November 1. Such inaction is shades of the old board.

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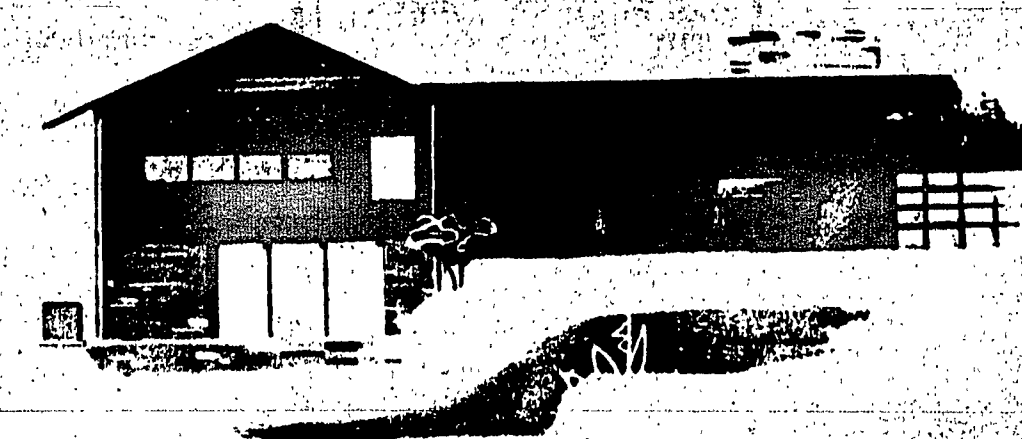
