



The Bank of Niles celebrates its first anniversary this Friday and Saturday, As a token of appreciation to the depositors. two days have been designated for recognition of the bank's customers, namely Friday and Saturday, November 17th and 18th, during which time free registrations for valuable merchandise will be given away, as well as token gifts for every customer who transacts business on those two days, The directors, officers and personnel whish to express their thanks to the people who have made the success of the bank possible and invite them to come in during those two days.

During the first week of November, 1960, the Bank of Niles ened its doors for business n Niles, giving the village its first bank in over thirty years of corporate existance. In May of 1958, a committee of five met to discuss the advisability and possibility of organizing a bank for the Village of Niles after two other efforts failed to materialize, This group of five men were Niles husiness people, all active in civic matters, and particularly active in the Niles Chamber of Commerce. The organization of the bank was presented to the members of the Chamber of Commerce and the Chamber indicated its full operate. Heading the organization of the five organizers was Edward Baumler of Northwest General Insurance Agency and associated with htm were Richard Harczak, Ronald Pankau, Ralph Erickson and Anton A. Smigiel,

Over three hundred \seventyfive people from Niles and the surrounding area subscribed for the stock and on November 6, 1959 the charter was issued to the Bank of Niles, making the Bank of Niles a truly community-owned institution.

## Information For Voters

The decentralized plan which has been proposed for Maine South has evolved from an exhaustive study. It provides a maximum of flexibility for a minimum of cost. The decentralization of buildings makes it possible to eliminate expensive stairwells, corridors, exits. This saying in space more than offsets the cost of additional walls required when buildings are spread apart.

In arriving at the decentralized plan for Maine South, the architects and the board considered and discarded a variety of compact

and decentralized arrangements. When it was discovered that the cost of several plans was somewhat comparable, the board selected the decentralized plan because of the educational advantages it affords. The sloping, irregular nature of the site was also considered. This plan is not experimental. Your board has visited several such schools.

Each building, such as the auditorium or the field house, can be operated individually without the necessity of opening the entire school plant. This results in savings in electricity, heating, maintenance and supervisory personnel. A decentralized plant normally carries reduced insurance rates. It provides for flexibility. It separates noisy areas, such as shops and music from quiet academic and study areas.

When compared with other schools in this suburban area, the cost of Maine South is neither the lowest nor the highest but below the average. The number of square feet that has been provided for each pupil is reasonable but not exorbitant. The cost per pupil, cost per square foot and the number of square feet per pupil at Maine South

is below many other suburban schools.

Part of Maine South, the Academic Building, is adaptable to three story construction. Parts of Maine West, the swimming pool, shops, and gymnasiums, are one story structures. A similar situation exists at Maine East where the classroom wings are three stories while the auditorium, field house, and shops are single story


All cafeterias will be served from one kitchen. Before and after lunch, the cafeteria areas will be converted into classrooms and study halls. This saves money and eliminates wasted space, The goal of the board of education has been to make educational facilities in all three schools comparable, Education is for all. The nation's most precious asset is its children--all of its children. Talents of the brilliant, the average, the below average, and the handicapped are needed. The future of our country requires this; therefore, a program is needed that will encompass every child and that will provide all youth with opportunities to grow according to their maturities, abilities, interests, and needs. A field house at Maine West is needed to make educational facilities in all schools comparable. It was once thought that one field house would serve both Maine East and Maine West, but the demands for the use of this facility at Maine East have been so great that both schools have suffered. Every high school should have its own field house.

A suit has been filed in Su-perior Court of Cook County, by more that 150 homeowners in an unincorporated area of Maine Township contesting a claim of Domestic Utility Services Company to the ownership of sewer and water mains within the homeowners area,

According to Robert Peterson, a representative of the homeowners, the developer of their subdivisions, Greenwood Terrace No, I and Ballard Terrace, installed these utilities and included his cost for their installation in the price that he had charged for the homes. The homeowners, thereby, contend that title to these utilities was yested in them at the time they purchased their property and that the utility company has no right to their own-

"By proying our ownership thru this legal action," states Mr, Peterson, "we would pro-tect ourselves against having to pay for these same lines again by a forced payment of bond issues or an assessment by the Village of Niles in the event that their reported negotiations for purchase of the water company is consummated, or in the event that we are incorporated into that village and acquisition of these lines would be necessary in order to service us with their water.



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
