### No JC Resistance

Dear Mr. Bessert:

This letter is in reference to the lead story carried in your November 9th issue of the Bugle. The headline on this story reads "Support Falls to Develop for the New Maine Hi School—Park Ridge JC's Express Resistance".

I would like to clarify this story and clearly state that the Park Ridge Junior Chamber of Commerce DOES NOT express resistance to the bond issue for the New Maine South High School. Some of our members express resistance, yes, but not as Jaycees, not as an organization, but as free-thinking citizens. As an organization the Park Ridge Jaycees have neither opposed the bond issue nor favored it. Your story however intimates that our organization expresses resistance to it.

Our program at our last meeting, which you covered, and about which the article was written, was an informative program about the school bond issue—to bring our members as much information as possible, relative to the coming referendum. Both Mr. Walter Craigie, school board member, and Dr. Earle Wilcox agreed to answer any and all questions concerning the proposed new Maine South High School to our membership.

If you recall there were about 100 people in attendance at our meeting, approximately 80 Park Ridge Jaycees and prospective members and about 20 guests from other Jaycee chapters. Of the 100 people in the room, approximately 12 asked questions or made statements concerning the bond issue. I felt the questions and statements made were about evenly divided pro and con, although those in opposition to the bond issue were perhaps more vociferous. Perhaps you mistook the statements of those in opposition as mere meandering rather than the arguments of those in favor.

I'm certain you'll agree that there are relatively few issues in our lives that can expect unanimous approval from any organization, be it civic, political, social or religious. We, as Park Ridge Jaycees, feel keenly about our community affairs. If you should get to know us better, I think you would find us seldom agreeing on anything unanimously. But, ours is a democratic organization where the majority rules and the minority is heard.

The case of the new Maine South High School bond issue has been left to the individual member's convictions—all we ask is that our members become fully informed and that they exercise their right to vote as they feel they should in all due conscience.

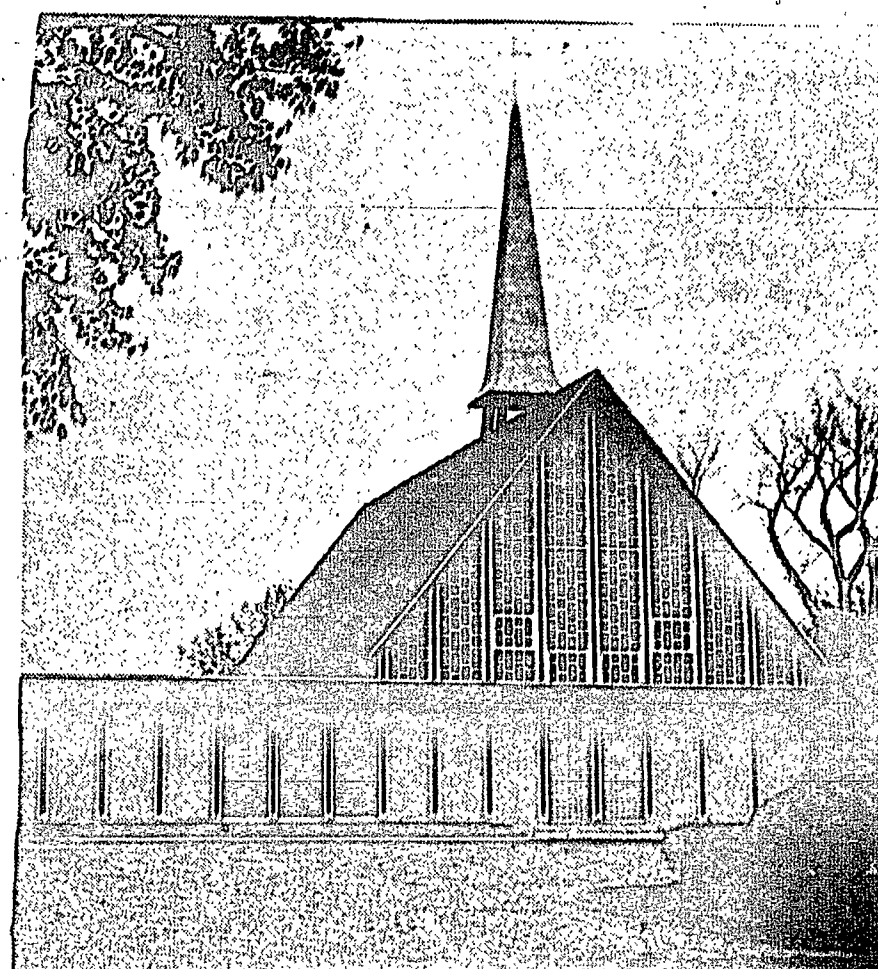

## Maine Hi Referendum Saturday

### St. John Lutheran Church Dedication Sunday

Dedication services will be held at St. John Lutheran (Missouri Synod) Church of Niles, 7423 Milwaukee Ave. (near Harlem) Sunday, Nov. 19. In the morning service at 10:15 Pastor Behling will be the officiant and preacher, assisted by the Rev. Walter Kalbhen of Willow Springs, Ill. In the distribution of Holy Communion to members. The Rev. Carl Abel, First Vice-President of the Northern Illinois District, will serve as the guest speaker in the afternoon service at 4 P.M. This service will be followed by a supper served by the St. John Ladies Circle. In the festive service at 7:30 p.m., the Rev. Otto F. Arndt, Pastor of the neighboring St. Paul Lutheran Church of Skokie, will preach the sermon.

Open House will be held Monday evening, Nov. 20, between 7:30 and 9:30 to permit neighbors and various organizations to view the new house of worship; refreshments will be served.

St. John is the oldest existing church of Niles, having been organized on Jan. 12, 1859. Its first house of worship was erected on the present site in 1860. This edifice was demolished in 1902 to make way for the erection of a newer and larger one. For many years this 1902 church was a familiar landmark in the "country" that Niles used to be until it was destroyed by fire on Jan. 19, 1959—the centennial year of the congregation.

Pastors who have served St. John before and since its organization include the Rev. Francis Hoffman (1848-1849), the Rev. John George Kuechle

(1850-1852), the Rev. Heinrich Bernhard Bauer (1855-1857), the Rev. F.T. Hennicke (1858-1859), the Rev. Gottlieb Simon Loeber (1860-1884), the Rev. Herman Brauer (1884-1914), the Rev. Louis A. Grotheer (1914-1942), the Rev. Daniel Wenz (1942-1946), the Rev. Robert E. Wittenburg (1946-1950), the Rev. Martin H. Behling (since 1950).

The new church, costing \$145,000 with furnishings, is a combination of the new and the old. Measuring 80' by 36', it provides worship facilities for over 300 people. It has a full basement, which will be used for Christian education and fellowship. Its steeple houses the same bell that first added to the 1860 church in 1888. The combination of Mosel stone and colored glass presents a striking frontal appearance. Architectural services were provided by Cooley and Borre, and the contractor was the Stadel Construction Company.

Members of the Church Building Committee include: Alexander Schmidt Jr., chairman; Norman Schiff, secretary; Raymond Baer, Lewis Bush, August Dreyer, Elmer Kamin, Frank Koller, George Loechl, Melvin Ottow, Herman Reber, George Sieferth, Wayne Stocker, and Pastor Behling.

The adjoining school building, dedicated in 1958, is used for the operation of a Lutheran elementary school from kindergarten through eighth grade. At present 117 children are enrolled, and members of the faculty are Mr. Gerhard A. Schmitt, principal; Mr. Ronald C. Marten, Mrs. Dorothy Mueller, and Mrs. Lenore Schmidt.

### Bank Of Niles Celebration Friday, Saturday \$8,800,000 For Hi School, Fieldhouse

The Bank of Niles celebrates its first anniversary this Friday and Saturday. As a token of appreciation to the depositors, two days have been designated for recognition of the bank's customers, namely Friday and Saturday, November 17th and 18th, during which time free registrations for valuable merchandise will be given away, as well as token gifts for every customer who transacts business on those two days. The directors, officers and personnel wish to express their thanks to the people who have made the success of the bank possible and invite them to come in during those two days.

During the first week of November, 1960, the Bank of Niles opened its doors for business in Niles, giving the village its first bank in over thirty years of corporate existence. In May of 1958, a committee of five met to discuss the advisability and possibility of organizing a bank for the Village of Niles after two other efforts had been attempted and had failed to materialize. This group of five men were Niles business people, all active in civic matters, and particularly active in the Niles Chamber of Commerce. The idea of the organization of the bank was presented to the members of the Chamber of Commerce and the Chamber indicated its full support and willingness to cooperate. Heading the organization of the five organizers was Edward Baumer of Northwest General Insurance Agency and associated with him were Richard Haczak, Ronald Pankau, Ralph Erickson and Anton A. Smigiel.

Over three hundred seventy-five people from Niles and the surrounding area subscribed for the stock and on November 6, 1959 the charter was issued to the Bank of Niles, making the Bank of Niles a truly community-owned institution.

Thereafter, plans for the construction of the building were undertaken and on January 15, 1960, ground was broken for the building at 7100 W. Oakton Street. Prior to its opening on November 4, 1960, over seven hundred fifty accounts were opened and on the first day of business the bank raised its footing to \$1,500,000. The reception of the Bank of Niles was inspiring to the extent that after one year of business, over 5,600 accounts are now on the books of the bank. Businessmen, industry, village officials and township officials all have contributed to its growth, and the prospects are extremely bright for the future. The assets of the Bank of Niles at the present time are nearing

Maine Township voters will vote Saturday on an \$8,800,000 bond issue for a third high school at Talcott and Dee Roads and for a field house for the present Maine West High School present Maine West High School.

The board of education is asking for \$8,800,000 tax money to build the high school on a tract of land which was purchased for about \$500,000 in 1957. An additional \$600,000 is being asked for a fieldhouse to be built at Maine West in Des Plaines, which opened in 1959.

The School Board contends the need for the new school is apparent. It contends in the 1962-63 school year the school day will have to be extended one hour, both in at Maine East and West High Schools, to accommodate the additional enrollment. In the event there is no additional school built they point out that a double shift operation will be necessary, and that future accreditation by the North Central Association will be limited to one year under such a split shift arrangement.

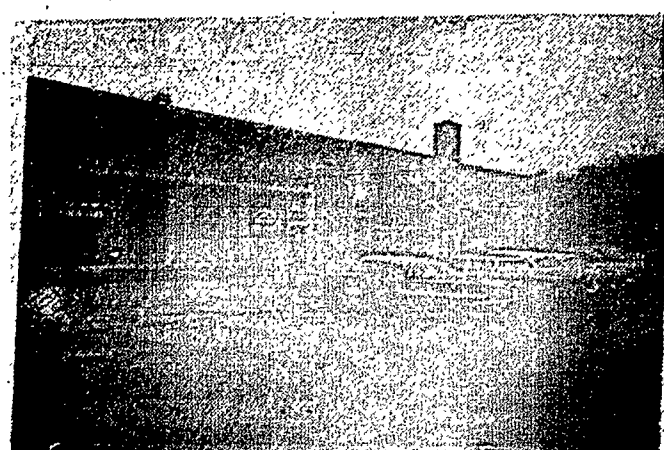
The cost of the school based on a square foot basis is \$15.80. The provision is for 133 feet square feet per pupil, both figures which the Board says is less than some neighboring schools and more than others.

The cost of the bond issue is about \$17.75 per \$1000 of assessed valuation. A \$30,000 home with a \$10,000 assessed valuation would initially cost the taxpayer \$17.50; "it would probably decrease to about \$9 in the 20th year, according to the school board.

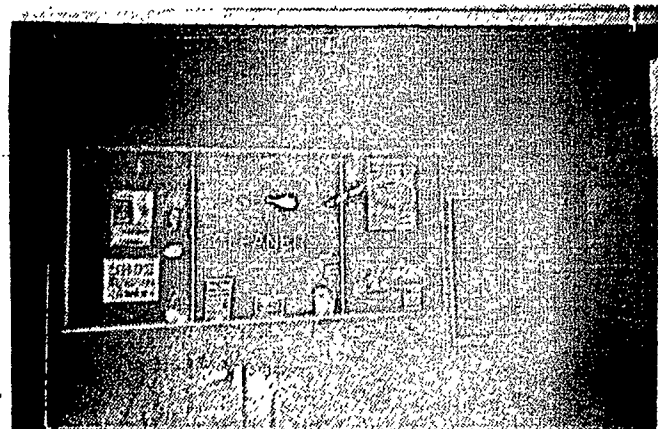
Voters will also be asked to approve an increase in the educational fund levy in order to make up present deficits and to take care of additional costs for the new school. Approximately \$4 can be expected to be added to the above \$17 figure. A decentralized plan of five separate buildings is included in the new school plans. Separate buildings will be a Physical Education Building, a Vocational Arts and Service Building, a Centers Building, an Academic Building and a Performing Arts Building. The separate building construction was decided upon, according to school authorities, because of the irregular boundaries of the area. "which would not allow maximum freedom for the buildings, and because more expensive footings would be required in the Talcott-Dee area, if the buildings had been pulled together (from school board brochure).

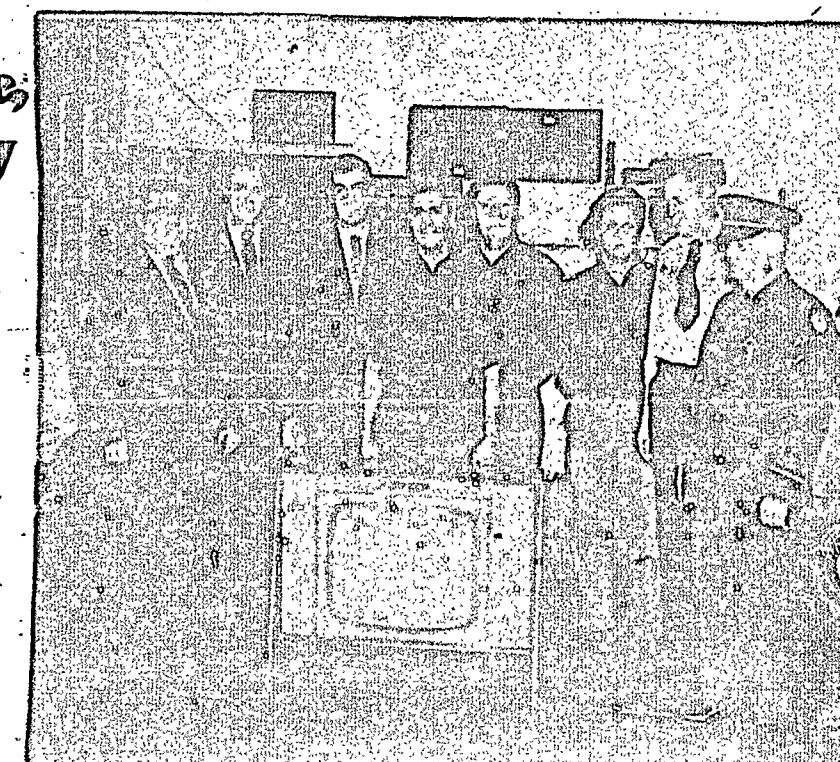

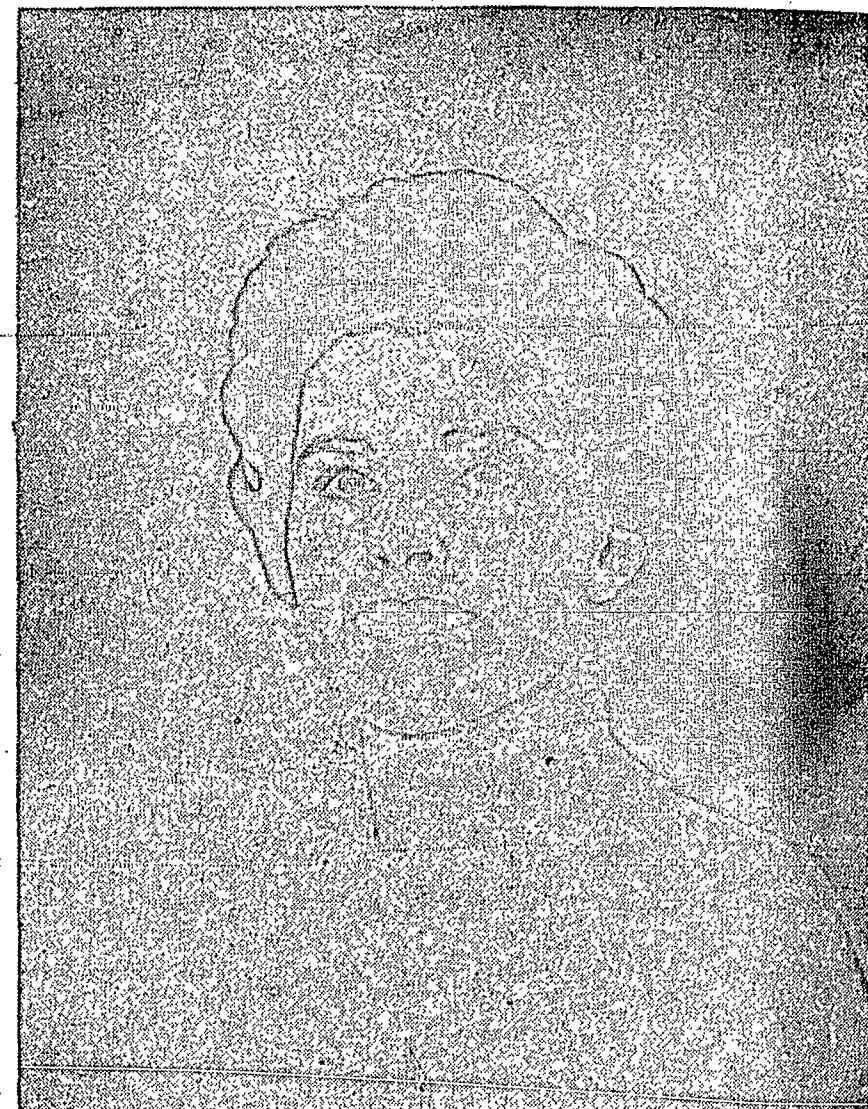
Bradley summarized the accomplishments of the organization under his leadership, including the boosting of the turnout of the Democratic vote in Maine township to close to the 22,000 mark.

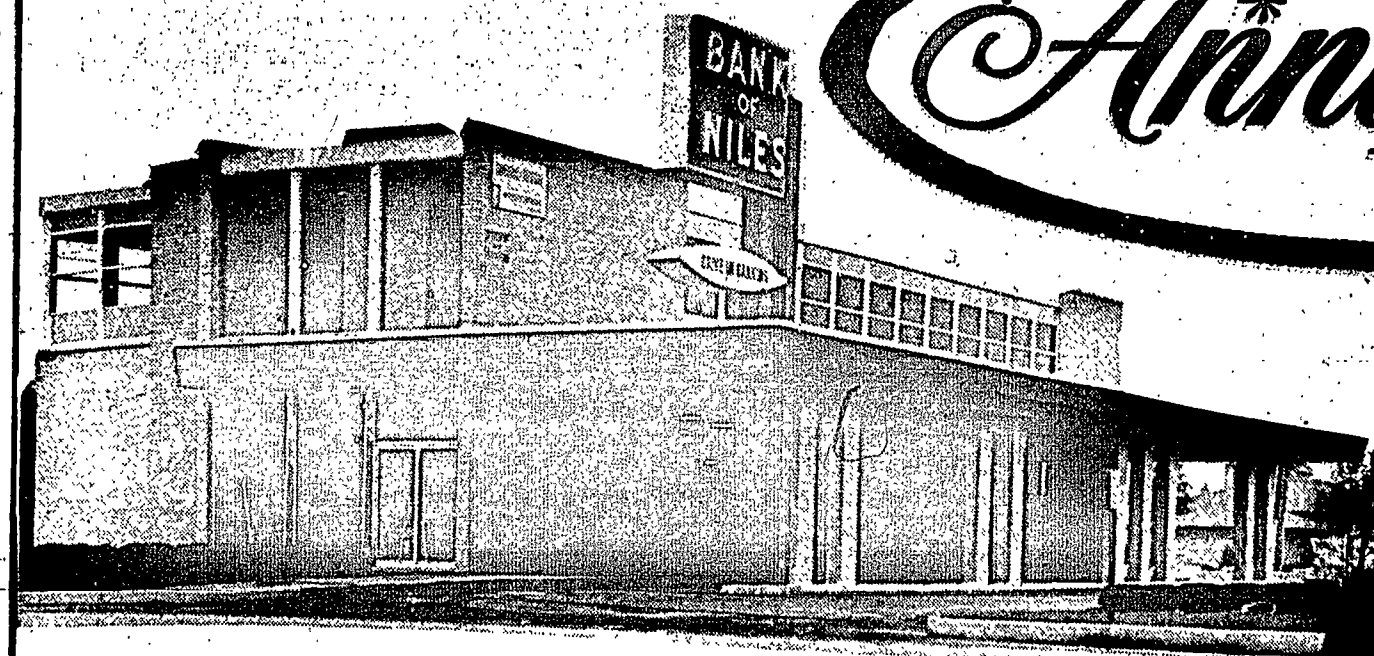

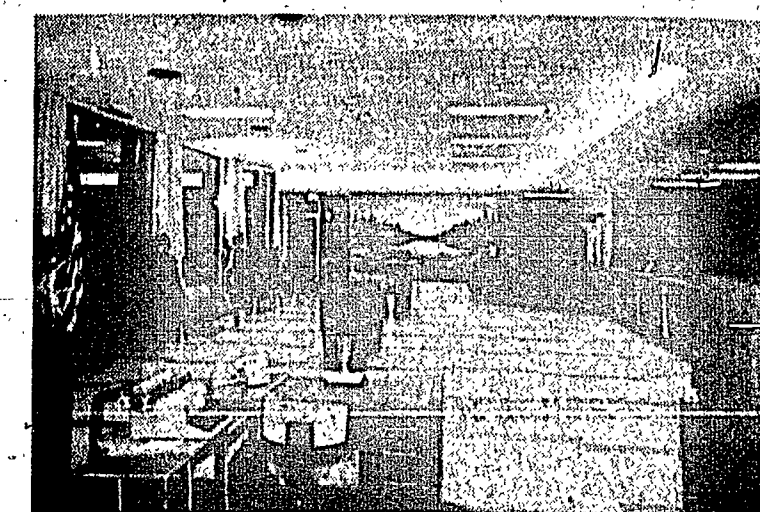

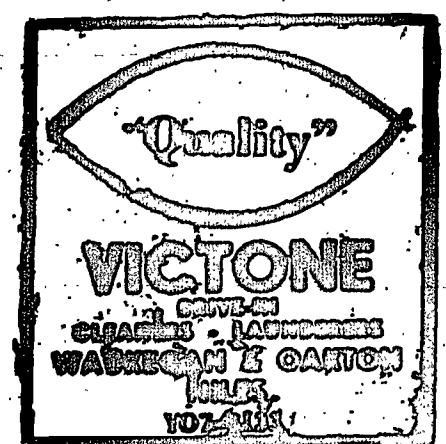

# GOOD SCHOOLS ARE A GOOD INVESTMENT

## TOWNSHIP HIGH SCHOOL DISTRICT NO. 207 PRESENTS FACTS CONCERNING THE NOVEMBER 18 BOND REFERENDUM

## Information For Voters

The decentralized plan which has been proposed for Maine South has evolved from an exhaustive study. It provides a maximum of flexibility for a minimum of cost. The decentralization of buildings makes it possible to eliminate expensive stairwells, corridors, exits. This saving in space more than offsets the cost of additional walls required when buildings are spread apart.

In arriving at the decentralized plan for Maine South, the architects and the board considered and discarded a variety of compact and decentralized arrangements. When it was discovered that the cost of several plans was somewhat comparable, the board selected the decentralized plan because of the educational advantages it affords. The sloping, irregular nature of the site was also considered. This plan is not experimental. Your board has visited several such schools.

Each building, such as the auditorium or the field house, can be operated individually without the necessity of opening the entire school plant. This results in savings in electricity, heating, maintenance and supervisory personnel. A decentralized plant normally carries reduced insurance rates. It provides for flexibility. It separates noisy areas, such as shops and music from quiet academic and study areas.

When compared with other schools in this suburban area, the cost of Maine South is neither the lowest nor the highest but below the average. The number of square feet that has been provided for each pupil is reasonable but not exorbitant. The cost per pupil, cost per square foot and the number of square feet per pupil at Maine South is below many other suburban schools.

Part of Maine South, the Academic Building, is adaptable to three story construction. Parts of Maine West, the swimming pool, shops, and gymnasiums, are one story structures. A similar situation exists at Maine East where the classroom wings are three stories while the auditorium, field house, and shops are single story units.

All cafeterias will be served from one kitchen. Before and after lunch, the cafeteria areas will be converted into classrooms and study halls. This saves money and eliminates wasted space.

The goal of the board of education has been to make educational facilities in all three schools comparable. Education is for all. The nation's most precious asset is its children—all of its children. Talents of the brilliant, the average, the below average, and the handicapped are needed. The future of our country requires this; therefore, a program is needed that will encompass every child and that will provide all youth with opportunities to grow according to their maturities, abilities, interests, and needs. A field house at Maine West is needed to make educational facilities in all schools comparable. It was once thought that one field house would serve both Maine East and Maine West, but the demands for the use of this facility at Maine East have been so great that both schools have suffered. Every high school should have its own field house.

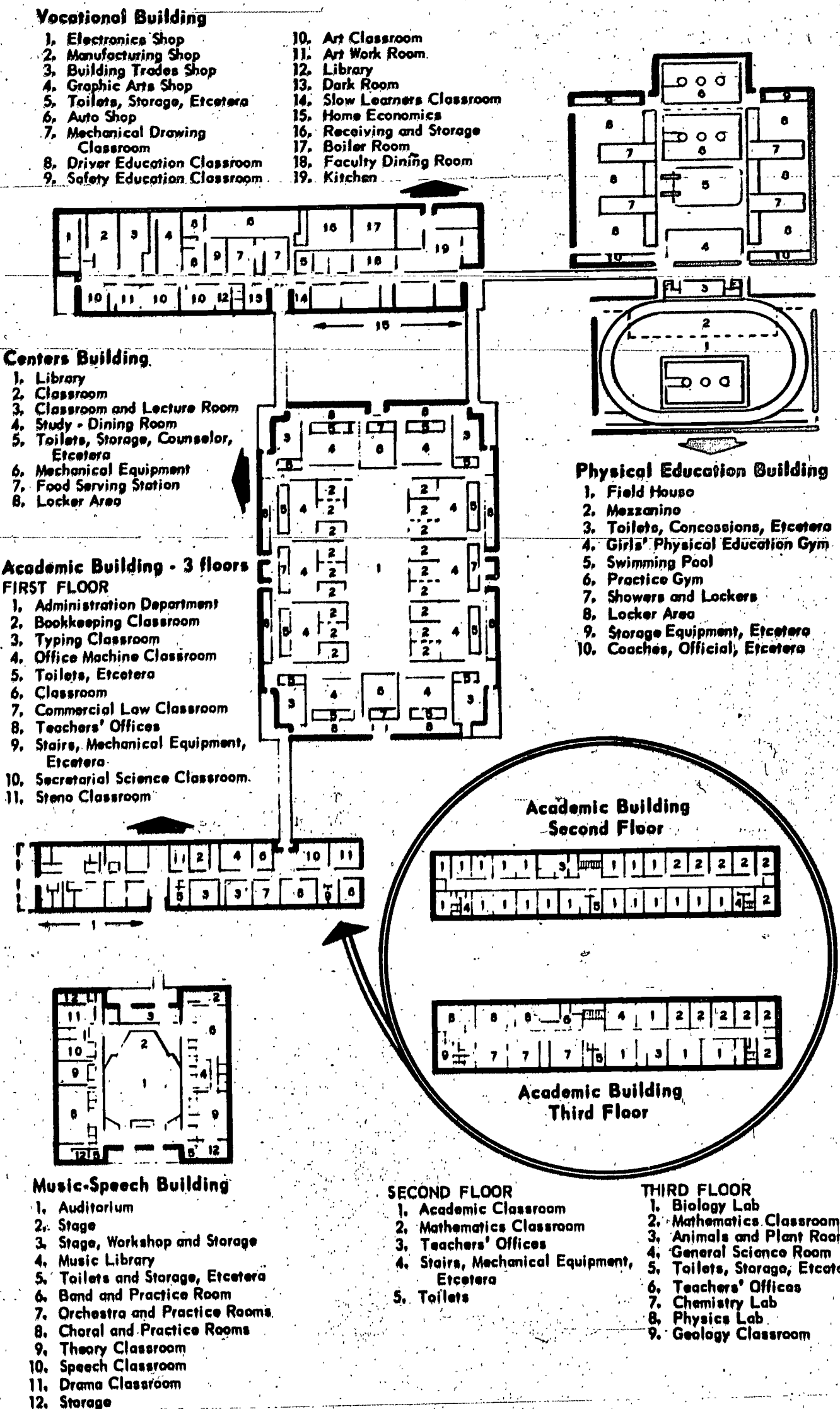

A suit has been filed in Superior Court of Cook County, by more than 150 homeowners in an unincorporated area of Maine Township contesting a claim of Domestic Utility Services Company to the ownership of sewer and water mains within the homeowners area.

According to Robert Peterson, a representative of the homeowners, the developer of their subdivisions, Greenwood Terrace No. 1 and Ballard Terrace, installed these utilities and included his cost for their installation in the price that he had charged for the homes. The homeowners, thereby, contend that title to these utilities was vested in them at the time they purchased their property and that the utility company has no right to their ownership.

"By proving our ownership thru this legal action," states Mr. Peterson, "we would protect ourselves against having to pay for these same lines again by a forced payment of bond issues or an assessment by the Village of Niles in the event that their reported negotiations for purchase of the water company is consummated, or in the event that we are incorporated into that village and acquisition of these lines would be necessary in order to service us with their water."

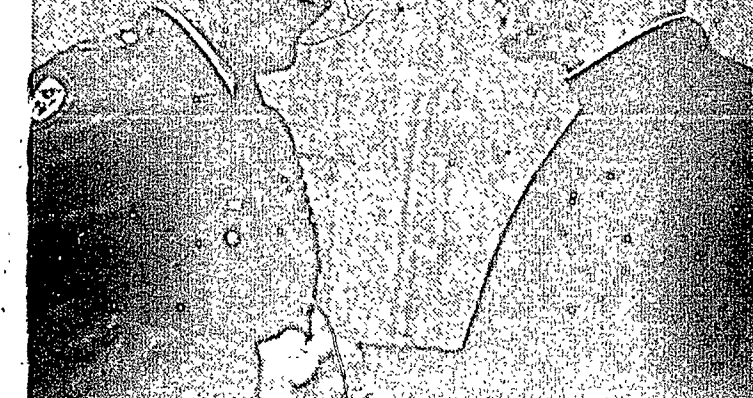
If you still have doubts about the proposed Maine South High School, consider the following questions:

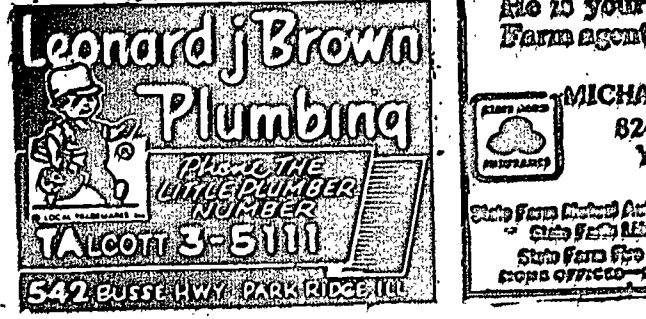
