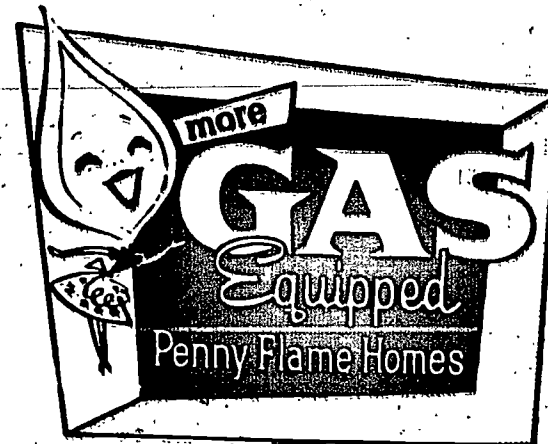
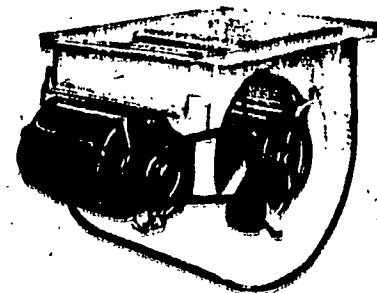

## From The Left Hand

WHAT IS A NICK BLASE?

In the February 23 editions of all the local newspapers a press release appeared asking the lead question, "What Is A Nick Blase?"

The release was written by Edna Walger, who was then handling publicity for the newly-formed village - political group, The New Era Party.

Blase, who was a relatively unknown resident, was written about handsomely by Mrs. Walger.

Nine months later one of the creators of the Blase-image, this same Mrs. Walger, denounces Blase (Letter to Editor Column, Page 5) for his joining forces with the Niles Democratic Party.

Why has Edna Walger been so quickly disillusioned? Is the issue of the independent candidate, who has joined forces with the "old pros" a genuine issue? And is Mrs. Walger's disillusionment shared by other backers of Blase?

Digging back to the March 23 issue of THE BUGLE Blase is quoted as follows: "Our government must have no political affiliations for to do so means that our village will be run by party bosses and not by the people we elected. We do not want Scotty Krier or the likes of him running our village."

"Our problems are peculiar to us and must be handled by people who think only of the best interests of the community."

Wednesday night, November 22, the Niles Citizens Committee invited Blase to state his views on this issue. Blase, who first gained public attention in Niles by being elected chairman of the group, was supported by many of these same persons who've comprised the committee.

Blase stated his case Wednesday night. He said he was well aware that he had been critical of other candidates who had aligned themselves with township political groups. He said he was then a "political idealist" before the election. However, since gaining office he has become more of a "realist". Blase said no one in the audience has any idea of how political action works, and noted his understanding of political alliances resulted in his choosing to join a party. Blase said in dealing with the Sanitary District, the County and the Township, a political tie is essential in getting things done for the village. He cited an example of contacting the Sanitary District for action in Niles. While he was an independent he said he was ignored. But when he joined forces with the Democratic Party, he began getting action.

The Mayor recognizes that both Republicans and Democrats voted for him and he was aware of his responsibility to all Nilesites. But he said he personally "leaned" toward the Democrats and he decided this was his preference. He emphasized it could have been the Republican township groups instead of the Democrats, if he had had personal "leanings" toward them in his past preferences.

Mrs. Walger, who is secretary for the Citizens Committee, said she felt she had been

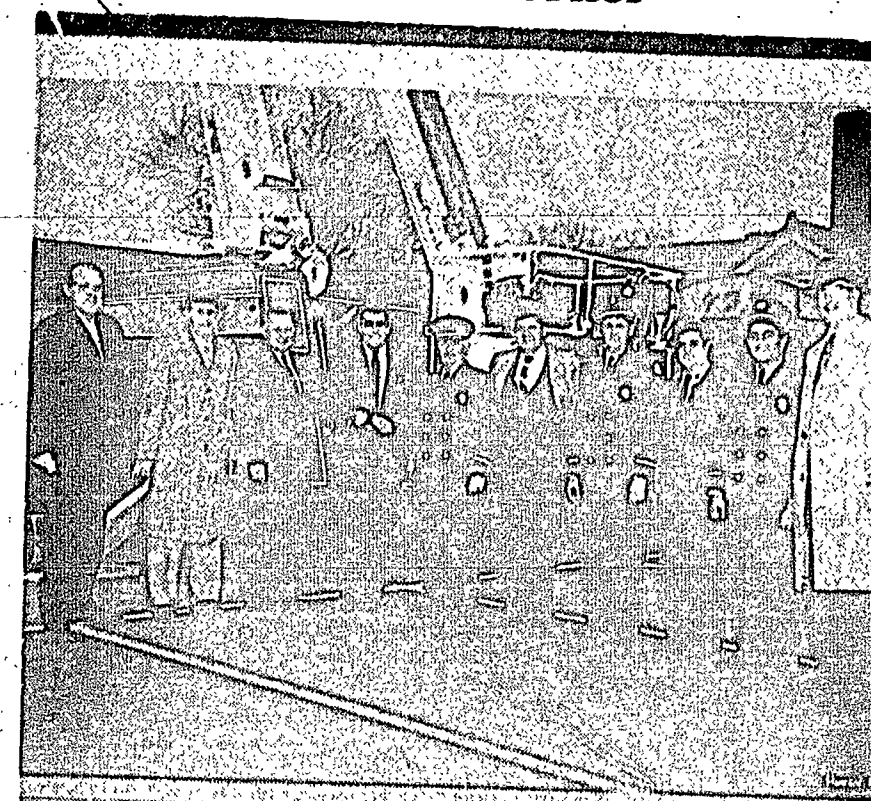

### Will Review Sign Ordinance

Trustee Bob Wentz reported that a committee will be set up to review Niles present electric sign ordinance. Niles Chamber of Commerce will have three of its members on the committee, including Golf Mill's Bill Cronk, Niles Drugs' Al Green and Harezak Sausages, Richard Harezak.

In setting up the committee Wentz said that there has been some honest errors committed regarding the charges on this year's electric sign bills and they would be rectified. But, Wentz emphasized, this ordinance would be enforced. Trustee Poeschl's motion was approved giving Wentz's license and permits committee power to act on rebating and adjusting any errors in this year's bills.

One of the problems centering around the furor, which has been raised over the bills, is that the definition of public and private has been abused in determining the fees set for private businesses.

The electric sign ordinance was revised last year, before the new trustees were elected. Under the direction of trustee John Stanley, the ordinance was modeled after neighboring

### Ilg YMCA To Build 10 Story Building

Trustees referred to the zoning board a petition from the YMCA which will allow a ten story building and swimming pool to be placed in Ilg Park. Marvin Lotz told THE BUGLE it would be built in late 1962 at a cost of \$2,750,000 and that the YMCA would pay \$1,000,000 of that total, while \$1,750,000 is being raised locally. Other facts: it will take a year to build, will include a tenth floor all glass community dining room, and would include meeting rooms, a youth section, 2 handball courts, 2 squash courts, rifle, archery and handicraft rooms, a gym, and a health club.

### Police Cars Will Be Fords

Trustee Sam Bruno reported at Tuesday night's meeting that Niles police would be driving Fords in 1962. Bruno's Fire and Police Committee was given power to act on bids submitted to them, Bruno said. Fergus Ford would receive the six car order.

Bruno noted the committee was in disagreement as to the choice. He mentioned that in 1957 Ford was the lowest bidder by \$100 and received the bid. In 1958 Niles had Pontiacs, in 1959, there was \$300 difference between the Pontiacs and Fords, in 1960, the we received Pontiacs, there was a \$1000 difference in the less expensive Fords. This year the difference was \$2700. The cars will be delivered within 30 days.

The committee to act on the bids included chairman Bruno, and trustees Scheel and Stanley. Despite the \$2700 difference it was Bruno who was in favor of awarding the bids for the Pontiacs.

Bruno and members from the old board had defended their previous actions by stating that repairs on past Fords had been expensive.

### Joe Di Maria Is New Commissioner

Park Board personnel met with the Niles Citizens Group last week and outlined their current goals and activities.

A new park attorney will be announced next week. Final selection to be made before December 1.

### Package License To Walgreens

Niles trustees reversed their decision of two weeks ago by unanimously approving one more package store liquor license which will be given to the Walgreen's Drug Store being built in the Lawrencewood Shopping Center.

Attorney John Loftus, representing the Lawrencewood Center, explained that on August 9, 1960, the former village board had promised to approve an additional license for the Center, if and when it was built. Loftus went on to explain that several leases in the center have inter-related clauses and could hold off coming into the center if Walgreen's was not included there. Loftus said five leases were inter-dependent and they had the option not to open until Walgreen's opens.

Other facts brought out by Loftus and a Mr. Barton, representing Walgreens, was that Niles police has already invested \$6000 on layout plans, the Center about \$9,500. Walgreens is an A-1 store, listed on the New York Stock Exchange, and it will return sales tax returns and real estate taxes to the village.

Mr. Barton added Walgreen's could cancel their lease if they did not receive the license. Trustee John Stanley said that while he was not a member of the board the village had promised a liquor license for that area seven years ago.

In answer to another question by Szymanski, village attorney Dahl said the present village board was not bound by action of the previous board regarding the liquor license. (He later told the BUGLE that the village board has broad powers regarding liquor licenses which are upheld by Illinois State Statutes). However, Dahl said the Lawrencewood Center could look to the village for reimbursement, in the event they suffered as the result of the rejection of a license.

Barton also told the Board that Walgreen's was going to invest \$500,000 in the store and have 1600 of the 275,000 square feet planned under roof for the Center. He also said they had a 25 year lease.

Mayor Blase, who is also liquor commissioner, tried in vain at the last meeting to have the Board approve the additional license. At this meeting he told the board he felt the village had a moral obligation to approve this license. Niles might be subject to a damage suit, which would not be fair to the village, and that the present board should follow through with the commitment of the former board.

The Board unanimously approved to re-consider their

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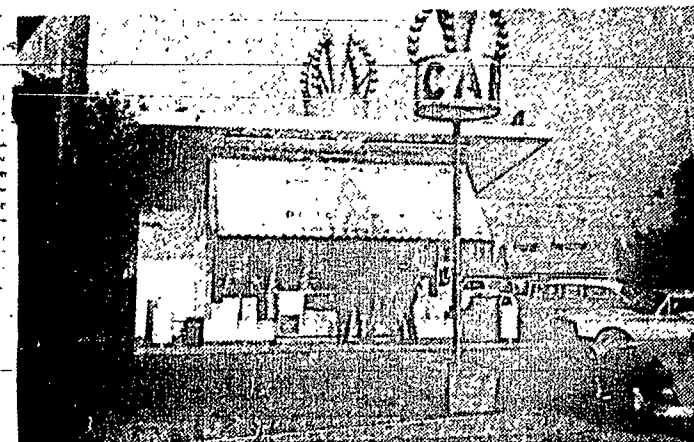

**Diabetic Tests**  
**Show 33 Positive**  
**Reactions**  
Thirty-three positive reactions were discovered during the recent diabetes testing program, of a total of 1,502 who submitted specimens to Lutheran General Hospital, Park Ridge.

Notification of positive reactions have been made by telephone and postcard to those who submitted the specimens. Those who received no notification may be assured that their tests were negative.

The free detection program, the second since the hospital opened, was carried out by the Service League in cooperation with the Chicago Diabetes Association.

Sixteen members of the Service League volunteered a total of 188 hours to the project. Mrs. Frederic Burrows, director of the volunteers and co-chairman of the diabetes testing project with Mrs. Sterling Bassett, warns that those people who were late in submitting specimens (Diabetes Week was from November 12 through the 18th) should see their own doctors for tests, because pickups of late specimens may not have been made at all collection stations.

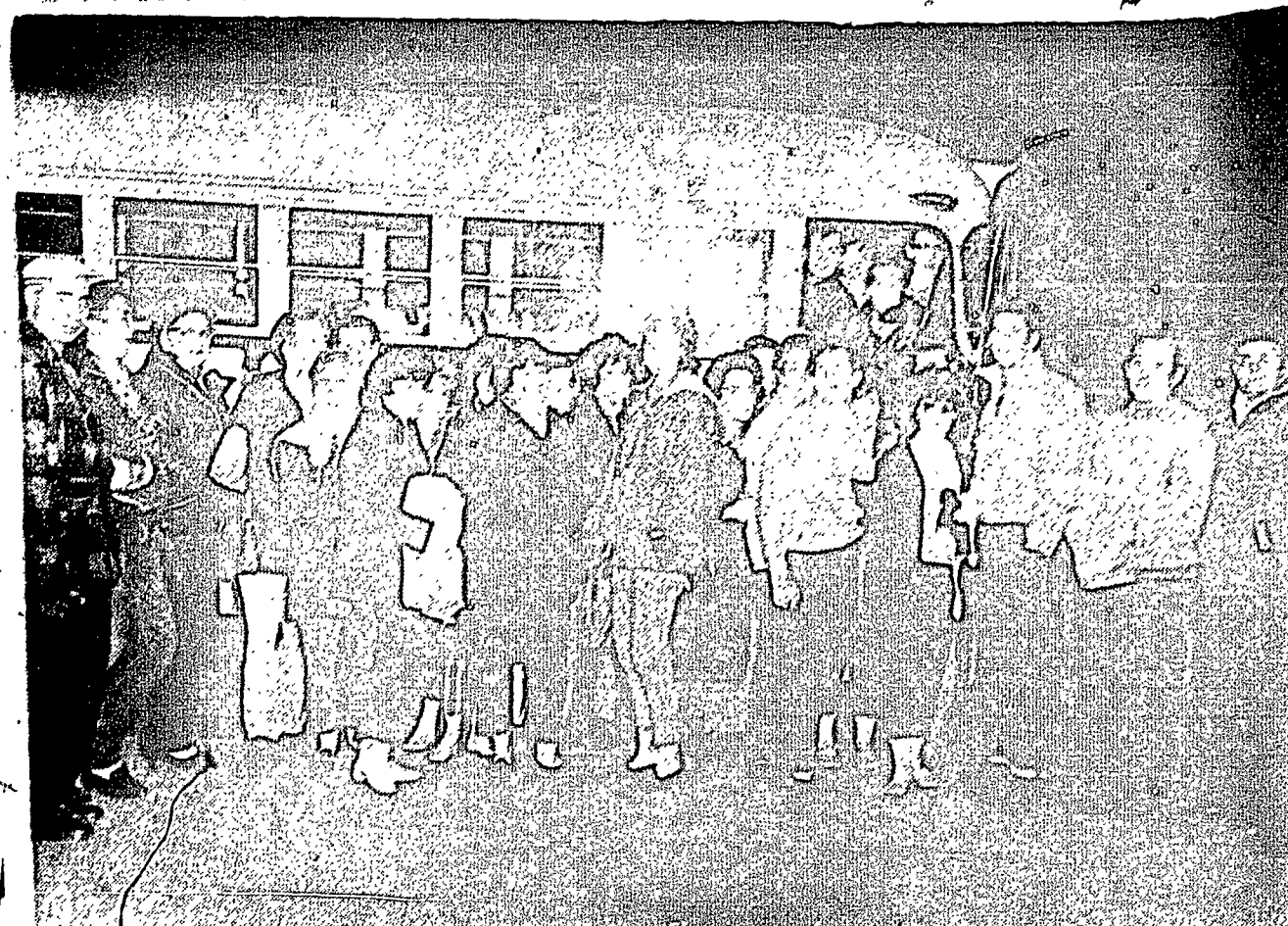

## District 63 Board Meeting December 20

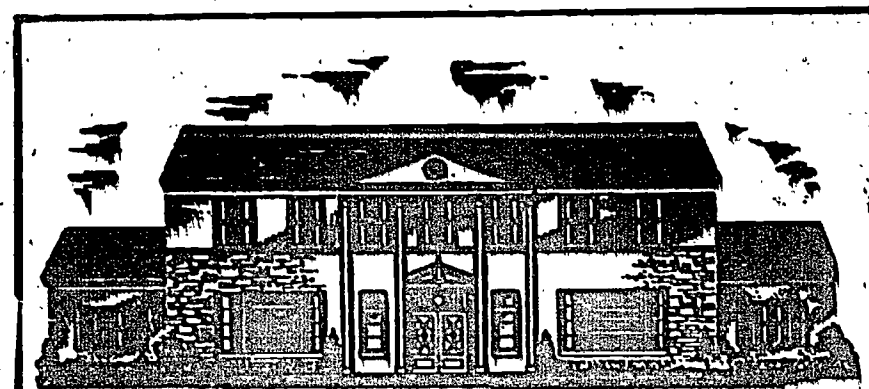

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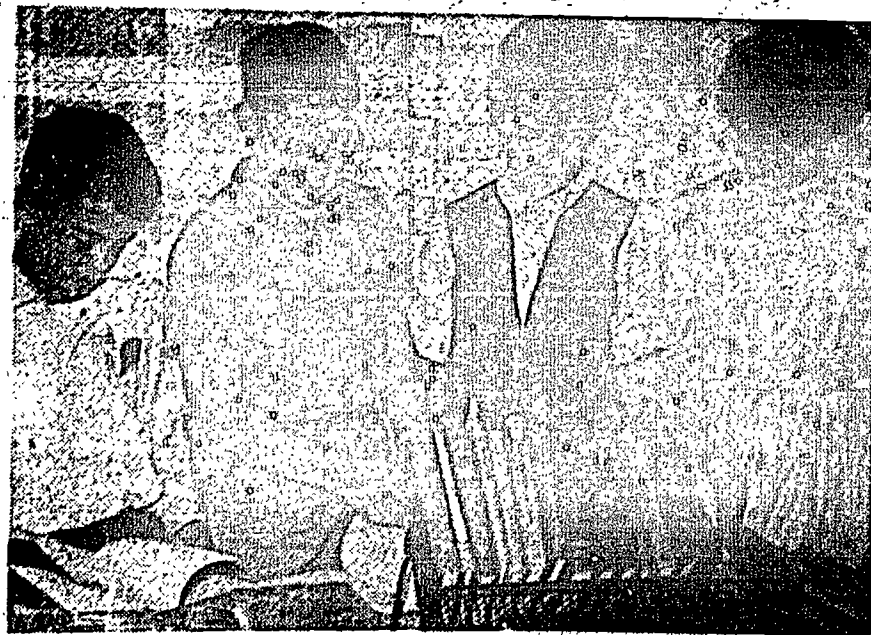


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## Emerson Book Fair

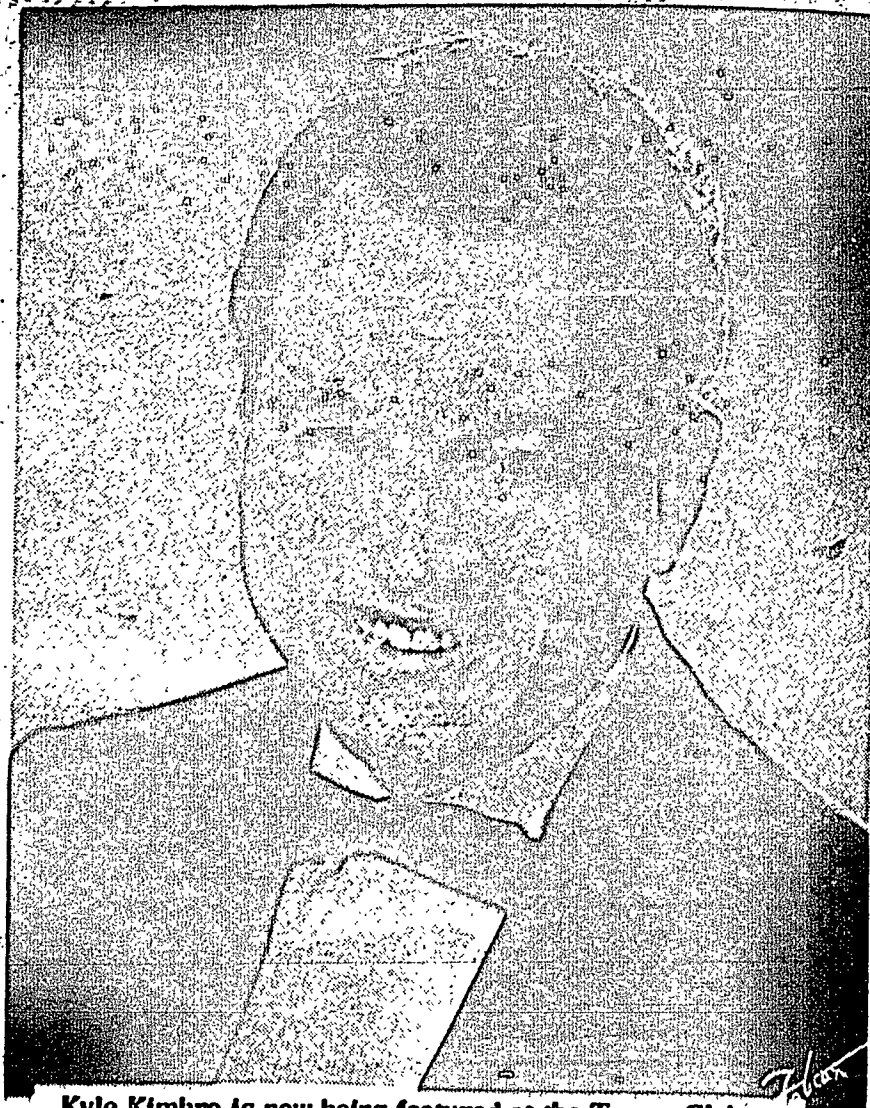

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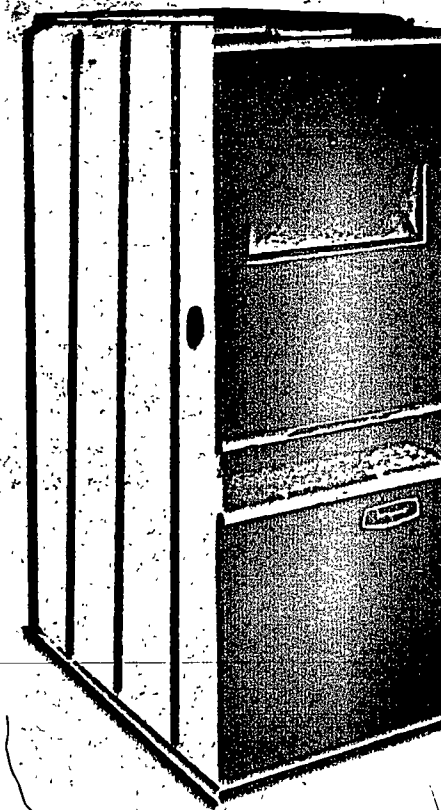

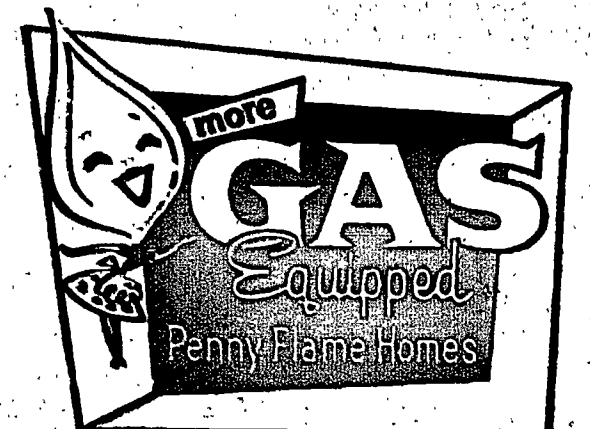

We were assured that the area would be maintained in keeping with the level of the community.

After nearly two years of operation, it is still an unfinished area, and probably never will resemble the original plans that were drawn, namely packages 1. Planting of shrubbery adjacent to stairway from Carol Street.

2. Stockade fence extended to Dempster, not half finished the way it was left.

3. Filthy condition of the premises in general, with the additional annoyances of having litter all over the parking lot, peoples' yards, and the uncovered containers. This has been no improvement, in fact, over the week-ends and holidays, there is a regular mountain of cartons piled up.

4. To add injury to insult, now a trailer truck parking lot has been started. Business was transacted, with trucks being delivered and no trucks parked. But on September 1st, 1961 the first trailer truck was parked, and now there are eight parked along and west wall and rear of the stores, not counting those parked at the National, and there are usually three parked here. We didn't buy homes here to live in a truck trailer parking lot.

5. In checking other shopping areas in the community of Niles, they don't seem to have these problems, so why should we be annoyed by them? If additional storage space is needed by Topps, let them hire a warehouse, and not make the truck distribution points for merchandise to their other stores? Evidently the other villages where their stores are located don't allow such tactics.

## Delinquent Assessments

Since assuming the duties of Village Collector of Niles, I've been concerned with the number of delinquent accounts in the Special Assessment department.

In an effort to protect the investment of the citizens of Niles, I have phoned many of the delinquent parties advising them of their past due installments. Legally, the Village has only to compile a list of past due accounts and forward same to the County Clerk's office.

I'm sure many of our property owners on the assessment roll, do not realize what a precarious position they are placing themselves, when they allow their installments to become delinquent. Accumulated interest charges are added to all past due bills at the rate of 6% per annum. Also, unpaid items are subject to Foreclosure and the Bond Holders are already checking all the delinquent items, therefore, it is urgent that payment be made without further delay or be faced with the added cost of legal proceedings.

previous action and then approved an increase of Class C licenses from 7 to 8.

Trustees Ken Scheel reluctantly reversed his vote of two weeks ago. He said he was voting approval based on the advice from the village attorney. However, he said many persons have come in for licenses before and were turned down. "All of a sudden a certain bidder comes in for a license and receives one, I can't see it". He emphasized that he was displeased with this preferential treatment, which happened in the past. New Era Trustees Wente and Szymanski concurred with Scheel's opinions before casting their favorable votes.

In other actions:  
...Wente reported light survey is completed on Milwaukee Avenue north of Dempster and on Cumberland between Dempster and Ballard. He also mentioned three vapor lights would be installed by the new fire station at Dempster and Cumberland.

...Scheel reported that each month a cash budget report would be given to all trustees. He submitted a six month cash budget. He explained to THE BUGLE that it is likely it will be the first time in nine years there will be no need to borrow money by using tax anticipation warrants. He told the board the budget was "in pretty good shape". He said the budget takes into account anticipated revenues and plans are made accordingly.
