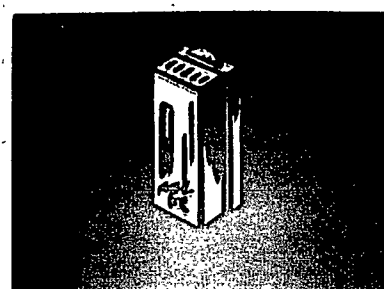

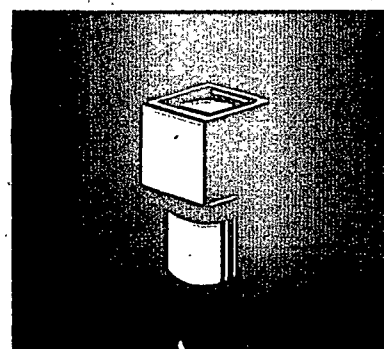

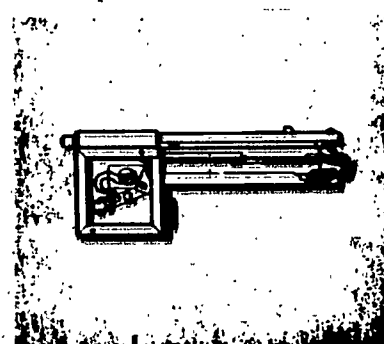

From The Left Hand

The recent action of Mayor Blase's joining the regular Democratic party may prove a very expensive political move, votewise, for both the local Demos and Republicans. Blase's former supporters, very independent in their thinking, might import a local chapter of the Independent Voters League of Illinois to Niles. The group generally attracts a very high-minded thinking group of people, who prefer to judge candidates on their merits, rather than on their party affiliation. Blase's bolting the Independents may be the spark which will jolt the independent Nilesites to action. Such a group would be the vetoing member of a "troika" which might keep both old line political groups from gaining a foothold in Niles.

We now have 4/5ths of a new park board and a new park attorney, so what's new with the park board?

Park Board president Lou Schreiner told us the board is still pursuing the Illusive Golf Mill area, in hopes of bringing it into the park district, and we can expect a park referendum by next summer which will likely include a vote on a swimming pool.

Back in January of 1960, when Golf Mill was annexed into the village, a letter from the GM interests said they would consider coming into the park district after they were in business. At the time it was assumed that after they had been in business for about a year they would re-consider coming into the district. Their reasoning was that they preferred not to pay taxes to the park district while the property was not producing income.

It has now been two years since the annexation, and more than one year since the center has been opened. As yet they're made no overt move to come into Niles P.D.

Schreiner said the park board has tried in vain to get some action from the shopping center people.

Certainly Niles is making a substantial contribution to the welfare of the people involved at Golf Mill. In addition to spending our shopping dollars there Niles feeds the center water and is now building a fire station on the center's border, which will be of great benefit to the Golf Mill interests. Since they spend a great deal of money on creating favorable public relations for the center we're curious why they've been pushing the park board around.

Regarding future park referendum plans Schreiner told us a referendum which will include a bond issue for a swimming pool is favored by the park board for next year. Taking a lesson from the highly successful swimming pool bond issue in Morton Grove, the park board will likely hold the vote during the early summer months. The time factor seems most conducive to aiding a hot pool-less town make up its mind in favor of a pool.

While no definite plans have been announced it is possible that the pool might be placed in the Grenman Heights park. This would hold a lot of interest to the residents of the area.

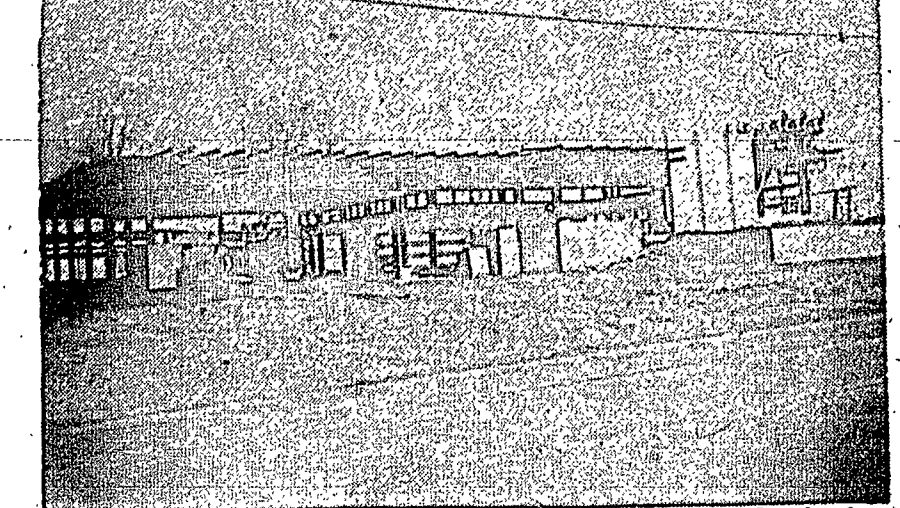

Morton Grove Bank Celebrates Tenth Anniversary

The First National Bank of Morton Grove will celebrate its tenth anniversary December 15. During the anniversary a Shaeffer ball point pen will be given to each customer who opens a \$25 or more savings account. There will also be souvenirs for the children.

A historic display of principle types of U. S. Gold Coins and old gold pieces from the Chase National Bank will be on display in the bank's lobby from December 11 through December 22.

It consists of the principal types of gold coins struck from 1795 to 1933, and representative coins that were privately minted in Carolina and California. Shown are the changing designs in the symbolic head of Liberty and different interpretations of the eagle.

When the Coinage Act of 1792 was passed by Congress, it specified that gold coins should be struck, from time to time, in the following denominations: Eagles, Half Eagles and Quarter Eagles—each to be of the value of \$10, \$5 and \$2.50 respectively. It further stated: "that upon the said

coins there shall be the following devices and legends, namely upon one side an impression emblematic of liberty with the word 'Liberty' and year of the coinage; and upon the reverse of each gold coin there shall be the figure or representation of an eagle with the inscription 'United States of America'. No mention was made of the denomination. Consequently when the Eagles and Half Eagles were first coined in 1795, and the Quarter Eagle in 1796, the value did not appear on the coins. The denomination was not placed on the coins until 1807. In 1834 the weights of these three coins were reduced from that specified in 1792. The new weights of 25, 129 and 64.5 grains respectively, remained unchanged for one hundred years.

Two additional gold coins were authorized in 1849, and these were of the \$1 and \$20 denominations. While \$1 pieces were minted in 1849 for general circulation, it was not until 1850 that the \$20 or "Double Eagle" was available to the public. The \$3 gold coin was first struck in 1854 and this piece, together with the \$1 coin, was discontinued in 1889.

Model Who Slapped Hood's Daughter Fined \$25

A former model who slapped the teen-age daughter of hoodlum Jack Cerone got slapped herself Tuesday—with a \$25 fine in Niles Police Court, after a plea of guilty.

Mrs. Marilyn Newman, 31, 9145 Skokie Blvd., Skokie, pleaded guilty to assault and battery charges.

She admitted cuffing Jill Cerone, 13, of 2000 N. 77th, Elmwood Park, last Sept. 9. She said she had good reason to. Mrs. Newman claimed she

was sitting by the side of a pool at the Tam O'Shanter Country Club when Jill poured two cups of water on her fancy new hairdo.

Mrs. Clara Cerone, Jill's mother, swore out the complaint against Mrs. Newman, the mother of three.

Mrs. Cerone's attorney, Anthony V. Champagne, said a \$10,000 damage suit filed October 13 in Superior Court is pending.

Tonight's congenial pre-Christmas party for Friends and Workers of the Niles New Era Party to be held at Bunker Hill, may lack the usual and cheeriness, of most holiday parties, if disgruntled followers begin questioning Mayor Blase about his joining forces with the Niles Democratic Party.

Nilesites all over town will attend the combined meeting and social affair.

A review of the first months of the New Era officials' terms of office will be discussed and then questions will be received from the audience. The questioners are likely to question Mayor Blase's recent joining forces with the local Democrats, which may spark a donnybrook which could leave the Christmas spirit behind in its wake.

In a letter to local newspapers last week Edna Walger, former publicity chairman of the Blase forces, announced her disenchantment with Blase. After the letter became public, several other workers of the group voiced similar feelings about Blase's joining forces with the local Democratic group in town.

Bill Zimos, campaign chairman for Blase, is reported to be among those who've defected from the ranks of Blase followers. While Blase will follow the dictates of his newly-adopted party, by supporting Ray Krier in Niles Township's Committeeman race, Zimos has joined the ranks of the Jerome Lerner group, for this same post. Normally this split would not be significant. But many persons close to Zimos are aware of his split with Blase since he became mayor.

The pre-Christmas party may become more like a Chinese New Year's party, with plenty of fireworks being the order of the night. Whether Blase will divorce himself, or be divorced by his former followers, will likely become evident before too many ladies have been dipped into the punch bowl.

Safety Council Embarks On Program

The new Niles Safety Council in its awareness of the increase of accidents during the December holidays has embarked upon a planned program of making residents aware of the fact that too much emphasis is placed upon the Merry in Merry Christmas and too little upon the religious aspect of the season.

Through this month releases will be sent to local papers and literature will be distributed through area merchants

Niles Fire Department repeated last year's effort by finishing first in her population class in the annual Metropolitan Chicago Fire Prevention Class. Broadview was given the grand award of all communities in eight Chicago area counties entered in the contest. It is sponsored by the Association of Commerce and Industry.

Niles was also first in the 15,000 to 30,000 population 1C class in 1960, as well as receiving a third place award in the State of Illinois judging. She also received an honorable mention in the U.S. Municipal Class for the entire country.

In 1959 Niles was recipient of the grand award, in 1957 she was first and in 1955 she also gained a first in the Metropolitan Chicago contest. Niles Fire Department has totaled 12 certificates of mention through the years.

Winners in five population categories are: population 30,000 or more, Evanston, first; Harvey, second; population 15,000 to 30,000, Niles, first; Hobart, Ind., second; population 8,000 to 15,000, Winnetka, first; Worth, second; 4,000 to 8,000, Roberts Park, first; under 4,000, Palos Heights, first, Columbus Manor, second.

East Chicago placed first in the 30,000 or more category in a special Indiana contest division, with Hammond second. Independence Hill led in the 4,000 to 8,000 category in Indiana.

Citations of excellence went to Oak Lawn, LaGrange and Bedford Park.

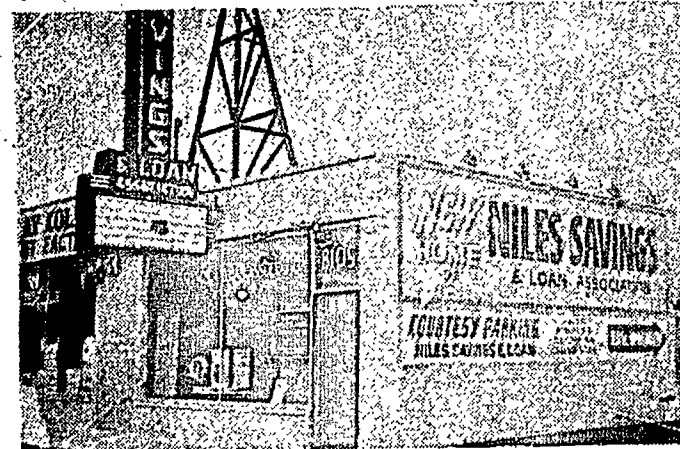

Plan School At Golf And Western In District 63

Preliminary steps have been taken by the Board of Education of East Maine School District No. 63 to provide for a new elementary school on a school site which is owned by the District west of Western Avenue and south of Golf Road.

The Board of Education, in regular session on November 27, instructed Superintendent E.W. Bagg and Building and Grounds Superintendent Fred G. Wetendorf to confer with architect Conrad Kristmann of the firm of McCauley, Erickson, Stillwaghn, and Kristmann to outline necessary facilities, size of classrooms, and related special areas, administrative and storage rooms, in the discussion, the Board of Education indicated that the construction date for the new elementary school would be determined following a comprehensive survey of the pupil population in the area to be serviced. There was considerable discussion of the need for some changes in present boundaries for the five elementary schools in the District to accommodate the increase in school population anticipated for the 1962-63 school year.

In other business, the Board approved the official calendar for the 1962-63 school year. The calendar provides 177 days of school including 3 official Institute Days as well as the normal school holidays and teacher orientation days. Classes will begin on September 4th next year. School will close on June 6, 1963.

The Board appointed Mrs. Joan Stitzen, 8810 Robin Drive, Des Plaines, to teach in the second grade at Oak School. Mrs. Stitzen is a graduate of Loyola University with a Bachelor of Science degree in Education. Mrs. Stitzen will replace Mrs. Dorothy Dechmann who resigned from the position effective December 4.

The Board authorized Building and Grounds Superintendent Wetendorf to secure bids for a black-top play area immediately adjacent to the new addition to the Ballard School. The completion of this all-weather play area will help to relieve parking congestion at the school.

Democrats-For-Lerner Claim 5,000 Signatures In Skokie

Petitions bearing over 5,000 signatures from voters in Skokie were the highlight of a Democratic-For-Lerner party at OLD ORCHARD APARTMENTS in Skokie on November 30. Within the past two weeks, petitions were carried throughout Skokie to have JEROME LERNER's name as candidate for Niles Township Democratic Committee placed on the ballot for the April 10, 1962 Primary.

"Your dedication and hard work at this early stage of the campaign," Lerner stated, "have been most gratifying as well as astonishing to the voters of this Township. No other candidate for the office of Committee has as great a number of representatives as we have in the Villages of Lincolnwood, Morton Grove, Niles and Skokie."

Lerner charged the group with responsibility of "carrying the message of our beliefs to the people of this Township. Remind the voters that the entry of still another candidate in the race for Democratic Committee has aided and abetted Scooby Krier and his hand-picked candidate. But tell them it makes no difference, for we are in this fight to beat the Kriers and with you and hundreds more we will be successful."

Comparing the campaign to a political war, Lerner described the first two-week circulation of petitions as "the initial major thrust against all opposition." He continued, "Now we move into the Villages of Niles, Morton Grove and Lincolnwood. Each of these villages has an organization in addition to those of you here. They, along with you, will let the people of all the villages in Niles Township that we seek and welcome their support and that we intend to have all of them equally represented in the Democratic Party of Niles Township."

FEPC Head Speaks On "Economy Of The Future"

Automation means for many of us increased standards of living and additional leisure hours, but how does it affect the man on the job? Gray asked.

Gray said automation has produced a situation in which the Labor Department is thinking of the five to seven million chronically unemployed. It is a group, he claimed, that has been experiencing discrimination. The statistics of these unemployed, Gray said, are: he will be a negro, he will never finish high school, his age will be between 16 and 24, he will be in a welfare role, and possibly he will become a delinquent if a minor or a criminal if an adult.

Gray pointed out that there is a series of jobs between the totally unskilled and the highly skilled, and these middle jobs are the ones which are disappearing.

The totally unskilled worker who places a product into a box or performs janitorial work will always be in demand, but the semi-skilled worker will find himself without a job because machinery is cheaper than people, Gray said.

"Are there enough jobs requiring no skill to occupy the time of every person desiring a job?" asked Gray. He claimed, "No, and that therefore there will be five to seven million chronically unemployed."

Gray said the negro will be hardest hit because four times as many Negroes as white drop out of school; family pressure to begin contributing to the economic burden; the curriculum is not attractive to these students because it does not satisfy their needs; if the Negro completes high school and college, then later on he may

meet discrimination and question the value of education; and, his parents are frequently not well educated.

The purposes of F.E.P.C. in Illinois is to substantially change the situation of the Negro with regard to the labor market. Within 25 years the effects of the Commission's work might be felt, assured Mr. Gray.

Both appointments were announced this week by John E. Miller, Cook County March of Dimes General Campaign Chairman.

The two leaders will organize the teams of volunteers who will appeal for funds in Niles to finance the research now needed to overcome crippling birth defects and arthritis, provide needed help for local victims for these two diseases, and carry on financial aid to paralytic polio patients from former years.

"The 1962 March of Dimes will support one of the most potent medical programs ever launched against chronic crippling diseases," Mrs. Pionke said.

"Perhaps even more important at this time, we must aid those already stricken by these crippling. Local March of Dimes funds are now being used to help Cook County children crippled by birth defects and arthritis, as well as continuing its financial assistance to those crippled by polio in the past."

"We are faced with a big job, but we know that the people of Niles will not let down the victims of these diseases. We are sure your dimes will do it again," Mrs. Terpinas added.

Mrs. Pionke was formerly active in the local Grains Gardens Community Association, and is past membership chairman of Oak School P.T.A.

Mrs. Terpinas is a member of Niles Veterans of Foreign Wars Women's Auxiliary; Alpha Daughters of Penelope; and Niles Public School P.T.A.

Review Of November 20 Maine Hi School Board Meeting

More than twenty visitors attended the Maine Township High School Board of Education meeting Monday night, November 20. The crowd filled the meeting room to overflowing. The majority of the citizens were present to request the Board of Education to modify and re-submit the recently defeated bond referendum, at the earliest possible date. Mr. Q.A. Otinger, 210 Gillick Avenue, Park Ridge, expressed the hope that another bond referendum might still be submitted in time to avoid double sessions in 1963. He congratulated the Board on waging a good campaign and said, "You should not feel disheartened in losing." The Board gave its blessing to request from Mrs. Walter Christopher for the organization of a high school citizens' committee to promote a second bond referendum after Dr. Earle W. Wiltse, Superintendent, urged the group to include representatives on the committee from all sections of the township, including, Penoyser, Niles, Morton Grove, Glenview, Des Plaines, and Park Ridge. The Board took no action at Monday's meeting regarding future plans for another referendum.

Therefore, a decision on school district boundaries must be made at once in order to enable the principals to determine class sizes and additional necessary teaching staff. High school enrollments in the district are scheduled to increase by at least 500 by September 1, 1962.

Mr. Ray Hollis of the Park Ridge Civil Defense Committee appeared before the Board to request consideration of carefully drawn plans for disaster procedures.

Lt. Richard G. Arthur of the Des Plaines Fire Department attended the meeting to ask the Board of Education to consider the installation of a Klaxon type fire alarm system at Maine Township High School West. The Board authorized Business Manager, Harold Markworth to work with the principals of both high schools in securing bids for satisfactory air raid and fire alarm systems.

A request for the provisions of storage facilities for school-owned vehicles at Maine West was referred to the Building Committee for consideration and study.

The Board approved a position recommending the annexation of Maine Township High School West campus to the Des Plaines District.

Superintendent Wiltse told the Board that conferences are going on between the city librarians and the township high school librarians, which are designed to find a solution to such common mutual problems as overcrowding, shelving library books from shelves, and mutilating books by the removal of chapters containing important reference information. Dr. Wiltse said he feels that some of the problems might be solved at a conference including junior and senior high school librarians and city librarians, as well as school administrators.

Legends, Fairy Tales and Folk Tales always appeal to children. Sometimes exaggeration creates humor and sometimes repetition results in surprise. In particular, Americans should be aware and proud of the uniqueness and variety of their folklore. The folk literature of the United States is so varied and interesting that it includes Indian myths and stories, tall tales, sea chancies, stories of American heroes, and other kinds of folk tales.

A good part of American folklore is peopled not with fairies but with giants. After a hard day's work the cowboys, or lumberjacks, or miners, or apple-pickers sat around and told stories of men who did jobs that just could not be done. The dreams of American workers were big and powerful and the heroes were giants. The giants were named Pecos Bill, Paul Bunyan, Mike Fink, Ol' Stormy, Tony Beaver, and they are just a few of our legendary heroes that were woven into stories by our great-grandfathers and grandfathers. One of the products of America's great imagination is found in the book entitled WHEN THE MISSISSIPPI WAS WILD by LeGrand, in the person of Mike Fink. This is a tongue-in-cheek story of the Mississippi in its wild, Mike Fink days. Mike Fink, of course, was the greatest riverman and keelboat captain ever to sail the Mississippi and Ohio rivers during the days before the steamboat. It was time for the West to be settled, but the settlers couldn't get across the Mississippi because of the storms that Old Al, the chief alligator, thrashed up with his tail. So Mike Fink, champion fighter of the Mississippi, and a genuine alligator hound named Henry went after Old Al. They tied his tail so he could only make a half-tail storm. And this was enough to keep all but the bravest settlers from crossing the Mississippi. "And that," LeGrand ends his story, "is why the West was settled by brave men. And that is why the Mississippi is a river that is not too wild and not too tame."

OLD SATAN, a Pennsylvania folk tale, by Lucille Wallower is a tall tale that will appeal to children in the upper primary grades. This is a delightful legend about Old Satan, the biggest, blackest, most "ornery" mule in folklore, and what happened after he drank half a barrel of soft soap. And, incidentally, it answers the question: Why do mules wear shaving-brush tails? Besides telling a story as funny as one could wish for, it also provides a charming nostalgic quality. The story and illustrations recreate a bygone America—the era of the Saturday night bath and the weekly shave (soap was a luxury until Old Satan reformed); people toasting their frosty toes before pot-bellied cookstoves; driving to church in the farmer's backboard; and enjoying the old swimming hole.

THE WORLD'S MOST TRUTHFUL MAN by Harold W. Felton are tall tales told by Ed Grant in Maine that will appeal especially to boys in the middle and upper grades. A very tall tale may be balanced on a very small fact and Ed Grant, always careful to tell only the "exact precise truth," could weave a tale of considerable tallness. The stories of his exploits in the Maine woods easily rival the legends of Paul Bunyan or Pecos Bill.

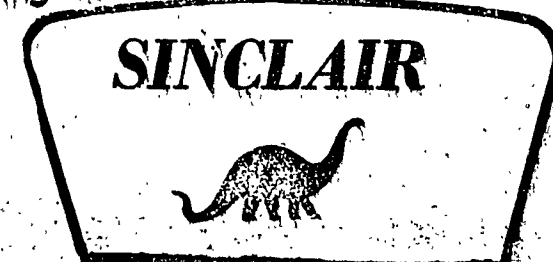

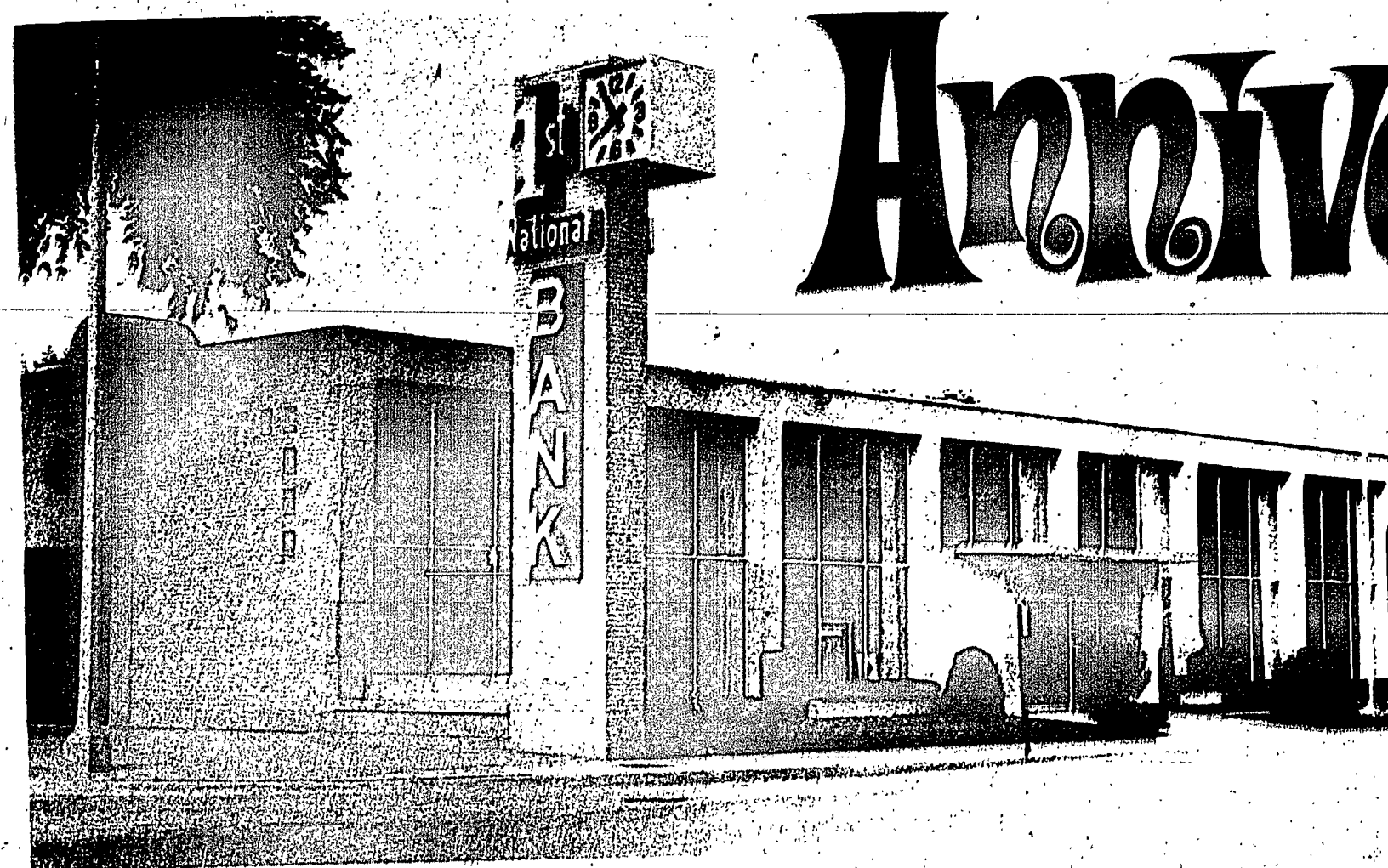

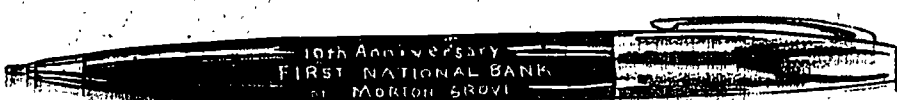

Niles High Schools Add Consultants To Staff

Niles West and Niles East high schools this year have scheduled the visitations and services of several professional persons to serve as consultants to some of the school's academic departments.

Competent consultants used in today's high schools to facilitate the improvement of instruction, and to help school boards, administrators, and teachers evaluate their instructional programs more objectively.

In some areas of instruction, reported Dr. Stuart Anderson, assistant superintendent in charge of curriculum for the Niles high schools, consultants have been used for the past several years. This year, he continued, consultants are being used in the English, guidance, science, mathematics, social studies, music, and foreign language departments.

The work of educational consultants, Anderson said, usually is done in several stages. First, the school must present him with adequate general information about the school as well as specific information on the area being visited. Secondly, the consultant needs to visit the school so that he can observe classes, and speak with teachers and administrators. A final step is the consultant's written report on his findings.

The consultant's report is read by all members concerned with the area studied; both staff and consultant share in making a final appraisal or evaluation of the program.

Having demonstrated professional competence, consultants are specialists in their area of education. However, they are not expected to know all the answers.

Anderson said these specialists are usually obtained from the state department of education, colleges and universities, publishers, suppliers and manufacturers of school supplies and equipment, and professional

organizations. Some are available without cost to the school while others require a fee.

Consultants visiting the Niles high schools usually spend the morning at Niles West and the afternoon at Niles East. A meeting is generally held after school with the consultant, the department chairmen, and administrators. A report by the consultant is mailed later.

Anderson said, "I believe consultants coming into a school help to crystallize thinking about the job that is being done. Very often we get so involved in our day-to-day operation that we fail to sit back to take notice of what good is being done in the schools and it takes an outsider, who is able to report objectively what we are doing, to give us a boost."

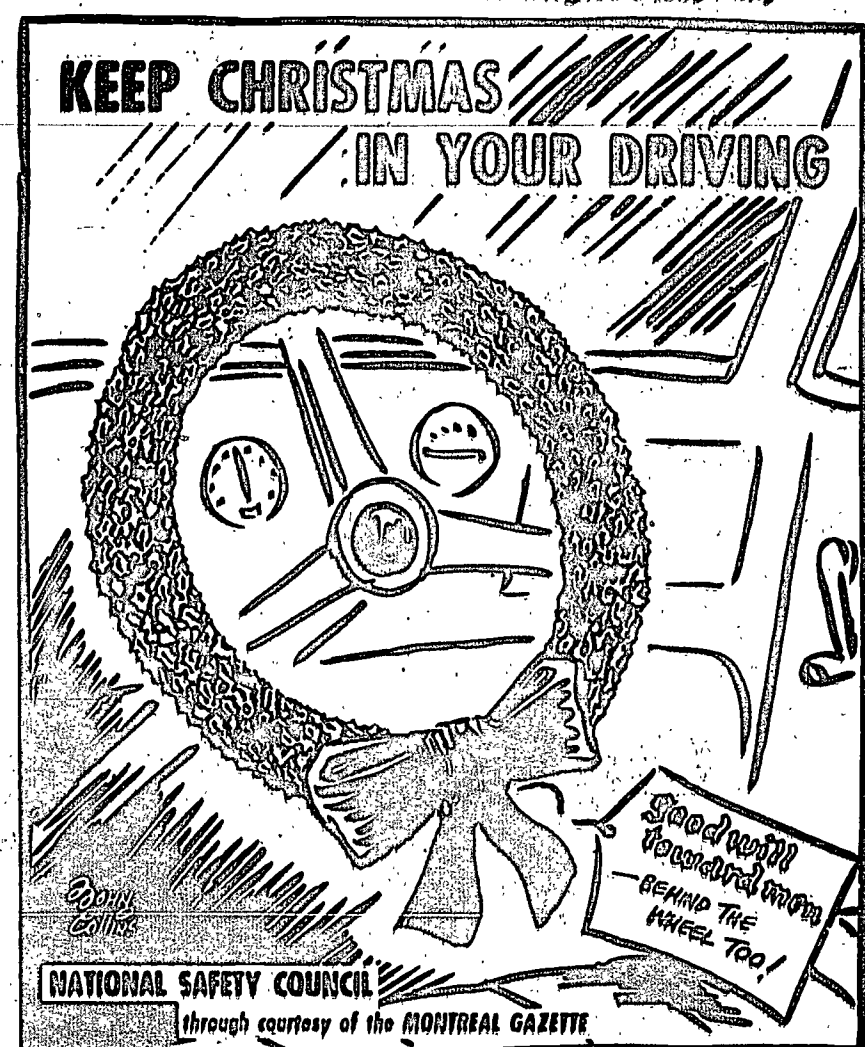

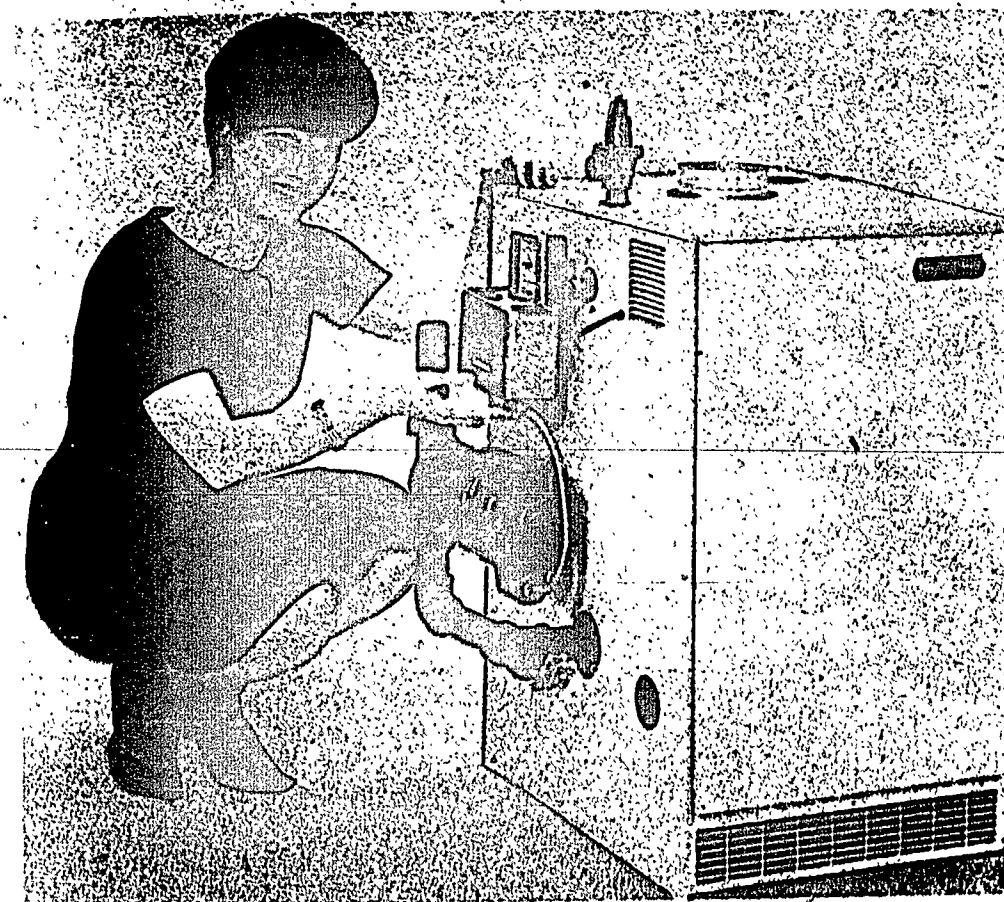

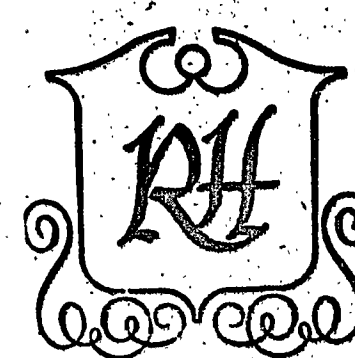
