"Are there enough jobs requiring no skill to occupy the time of every person desiring a joh? asked Gray, He claimed "No, and that therefore there will be five to seven million chronically unemployed,"

Gray said the negro will be hardest hit because four times as many Negroes as white drop out of school: family pressure to begin contributing to the economic burden; the curriculum is not attractive to these students because it does not satisfy their needs; (if the Negro completes high school and col-lege, then later on he may meet discrimination and question the value of education; and, his parents are frequently not well educated.





Legends, Fairy Tales and Folk Tales always appeal to children. Sometimes exaggeration creates humor and sometimes repetition results in surprise. In particular, Americans hould be aware and proud of the uniqueness and variety of their folklore. The folk literature of the United States is so varied and interesting that it includes Indian myths and storles, tall tales, sea chanties, stories of American heroes, and other kinds of folk tales.

A good part of American folklore is peopled not with fairles but with giants. After a hard berjacks, or miners, or apple-pickers sat around and told stories of men who did jobs that just could not be done. The dreams of American workers were big and powerful and the heroes were giants. The giants were named Pecos Bill, Paul Bunyan, Mike Fink, Ol Stormalong, Tony Beaver, and they are just a few of our legendary heroes that were woven into stories by our great grandfathers and grandfathers. One of the products of America's great imagination is found in the book entitled WHEN THE MISSISSIPPI WAS WILD by Legrand, in the person of Mike Fink. This is a tongue-in-cheek story of the Mississippi in its wild, Mike Fink days. Mike Fink, of course, was the greatest riverman and keelboat captain ever to sail the Mississippi and Ohio rivers during the days refore the steamboat. It was time for the West to be settled, but the settlers couldn't get across the Mississippi because of the storms that Old Al, the the chief alligator, thrashed up with his tail. So Mike Fink. champion fighter of the Mississippi, and a genuine alligator hound named Henry went after Old Al. They tied his tail he could only make a halftale storm. And this was enough keep all but the bravest sissippi. "And that." Legrand ends his story. is why the West was settled by brave man. And that is why the Mississippi is a river that is not too wild-and not too tame.

OLD SATAN, a Pennsylvania Folk tale, by Lucille Wallower is a tall tale that will appeal to children in the upper primary grades. This is a delightful legend about Old Satan, the biggest, blackest, most "orn-ery" mule in folklore, and what happened after he drank half a barrel of soft soap. And, incidentally it answers the question: Why do mules wear shaving-brush tails? Besides telling a story as funny as one could wish for, it also provides a charming nostalgic quality. The story and illustrations recreate a bygone America-the era of the Saturday night bath and the weekly shave (soap was a luxury until Old Satan reformed); people toasting their frosty toes before pot-bellied cookstoves; driving to church in the farmer's buckboard; and enjoying the old swimming hole.

WORLD'S MOST TRUTHFUL MAN by Harold W. Felton are tall tales told by Ed Grant in Maine that will appeal especially to boys in the middle and upper grades. A very tall tale may be balanced on a very small fact and Ed Grant, always careful to tell only the "exact precise truth", could weave a tale of considerable taliness. The stories of his exploits in the Maine woods easily rival the legends of Paul Bunyan or Pecos Bill.






