Lieske, Bruno, Marcheschi, Berkowsky Form Ticket

Village clerk Marge Lieske announced Wednesday morning that she will run for office this spring on a ticket named the Candidates For Progress. Trustee candidates will include Edward Berkowsky, 7017 Carol, incumbent trustee Santo Bruno, 7437 Lawler, and Angelo Marcheschi, 7943 Nora.

Mrs. Lieske said she was

asked by several people to join with them in forming a ticket for the April election. She said she chose to run with the aforementioned candidates because she wanted to join with "civic-minded and dedicated people". She added she was interested in "bringing up Niles reputation" and felt it could best be done with these candidates. She emphasized she wanted to "change the stigma" which has

been attached with Niles' reputation in the past raising it to a level with Park Ridge.

She praised her running mates of two years ago, the New Era candidates. Referring to them she said "Nick (the Mayor) has gone to town and the 'boys' (New Era trustees) have been behind him".

Her running mates include

newcomer Ed Berkowsky, from the Chesterfield Garden area, who is public relations chairman for his homeowner group, and whose occupation is a certified public accountant.

Incumbent Santo (Sam) Bruno is seeking election for his second term. In 1959 he was the only trustee from the Frank Stankowicz-backed ticket who was elected for a trusteeship. Present trustees Poeschl (who

will not seek re-election) and Stanley (who will run as an Independent) campaigned successfully on the other ticket to win re-election.

Marcheschi is past-president of the Niles Lions Club and present Lions zone chairman. He is presently chairman of the village-appointed Niles Safety Committee and an officer in this year's Niles Days.

Mayor, New Era Trustees Will Only Back "Marge"

Nick Blase, Ken Scheel, Len Szymanski and Bob Wente declare that "We will not take an active part in the coming Trustees election in Niles. We

are firmly committed to Marge Lieske, whom we will back 100% for the position of Village Clerk. We realize the difficulty involved in running Marge as an in-

dependent and have therefore advised her to try to associate herself with a qualified group of her choosing.

The reason we are not back-

ing any particular Trustee ticket is because there will probably be a number of qualified candidates running and our interest is solely to maintain

the progress initiated in the Village in the past 1 1/2 years with Trustees who are equally progressive minded."

Next Monday, January 21, will be the first day for filing petitions for April's village trustees' and clerk's races. Two years ago Niles Improvement Party (Ed Ciccone ticket) carried on an all-night vigil at the village hall, which resulted in its being placed first on the ballot. Frank Stankowicz team also came into the village hall early on the first morning of the first filing date, but had to settle for second place on the April ballot (Ciccone's quarterbacks believed the first position on the left hand side of the ballot was a definite advantage).

Independent Clerk incumbent Jim Kozak was also first on the ballot in the village clerk race. Obviously, since old pros Stankowicz and Kozak prepared early for filing their petitions, their past experiences must have indicated this action was essential.

For you newcomers in Niles, the results of ballot positions were inconclusive. Kozak, who ran independent, won his race by a slim margin, with Marge Lieske finishing second.

The Ciccone ticket was last in the four-ticket race, getting whumped by all the other tickets. The Stankowicz group finished second behind the Blase-New Era forces.

Last week's announcement that Miller, Peck and Sullivan would run for the park commissioners' posts was not surprising. But there is a behind-the-scenes story which bears mentioning. One of the New Era trustees aided and abetted the three men, in their decision to run. While it would be unfair to say he was the king-maker nevertheless he suggested that the three men run for the park board. And it is the impression here that the three men are intending to join

Smigiel Will Run For Judge Maine Hi Vote Loses For 4th Time Hope Pool Will Be Ready For '63 Use

Judge Anton "Tony" Smigiel, told THE BUGLE last week, he would definitely run for the judge's position, if the January 26 village court referendum is successful.

In answers to other BUGLE queries he said under the new village court, the judge would be an associate judge of the circuit court of Cook County. He also answered that 60 to 90 days would likely be allowed for filing for the judge's race which would follow a successful passage of the proposed referendum.

Smigiel is Niles present police magistrate, and as an elected official his magistrate's term will continue until April, 1964. The magistrate's court will continue to be active after the upcoming referendum.

post by January 1964. The recent Blue Ballot passage would eliminate all village courts at that time and they will be absorbed by the expanded Circuit Court of Cook County, and the judges will then serve as associate judges.

If the referendum is successful, the period following its passage will continue to be served by Niles police magistrate's court. Only after the election of a judge under the village court law, would the magistrate's office be suspended, and then by village ordinance. Since Smigiel was elected until 1964, the office could only be suspended if Smigiel agreed to it.

The superintendent of Niles Twp., School District 207 said Sunday that a proposal seeking to increase the educational tax rate failed Saturday because of a "tax revolt."

The superintendent, Earle W. Wiltse, said he understood the reasons why the measure was defeated by 176 votes. He said many township residents felt they could not afford to support private and parochial schools and increase the educational fund for public schools at the same time.

The increase referendum lost by a vote of 4,691 to 4,867, about 20 negative votes more than were cast last September when the proposal was introduced. The measure would have raised the educational rate from 1.06 to 1.21 cents per \$100 assessed valuation.

Wiltse said the rate increase would be presented to township voters again in the spring.

Boy's Ear Re-Attached

Four doctors at Lutheran General hospital in Park Ridge performed a four-hour operation yesterday to reattach more than half a severed right ear to a Niles youth injured in an auto accident.

Niles firemen and police found the portion of ear at the scene after the victim, James D. Foster, 18, of 8200 Oconto ave., Niles, was taken to the hospital. Foster's car had collided with an auto driven by Miss Kathleen McGarry, 17, of 604 S. Crescent ave., Park Ridge.

Foster was thrown thru the windshield of his new car. More than 250 stitches were required to close his wounds.

Niles Park District and the Schlessers interests agreed to a purchase price for the 4-1/2 acre site in the Milwaukee-Odell-Mulford-Kirk area Friday in Judge Dougherty's court. Park Commissioner Jack Leske told THE BUGLE landowner Schlessers would vacate the property within 30 days and the park board would concentrate on the construction of the proposed swimming pool there. Leske said he hoped the pool would be ready this summer. However, he observed that Morton Grove's new park pool was first under construction January first last year and it was ready for use July fourth.

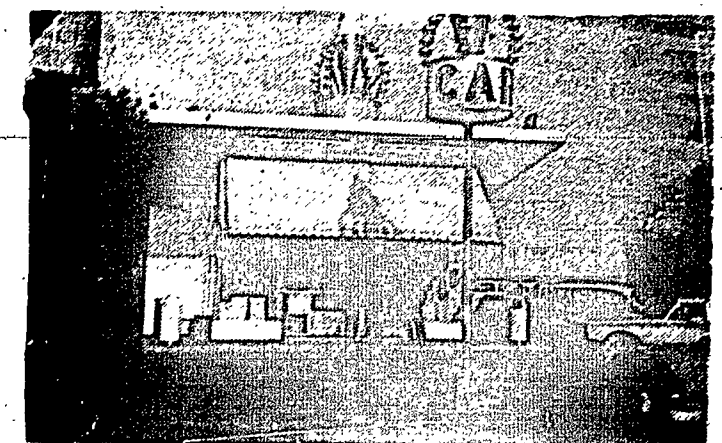
In addition to the swimming pool a community center building will also be constructed on the property. However, Leske's remarks indicated that the swimming pool plans had priority, in hopes of a 1963 opening.

The park board's condemnation action of the property resulted in the two interested parties reaching a decision, which has been under discussion since last summer's referendum. Other property which is still being negotiated includes 1-1/2 acres east of the present NICO Park on Kenney Street, five acres at Ballard and Cumberland, and lots between the Oak and Notre Dame Schools, some of which already have been settled at the latter area. The total cost of the June referendum was \$705,000, which included the park site, as well as the pool and the community center. The amount for the pool and center was \$310,000 with the remaining \$395,000 being used for the purchase of these aforementioned land sites.

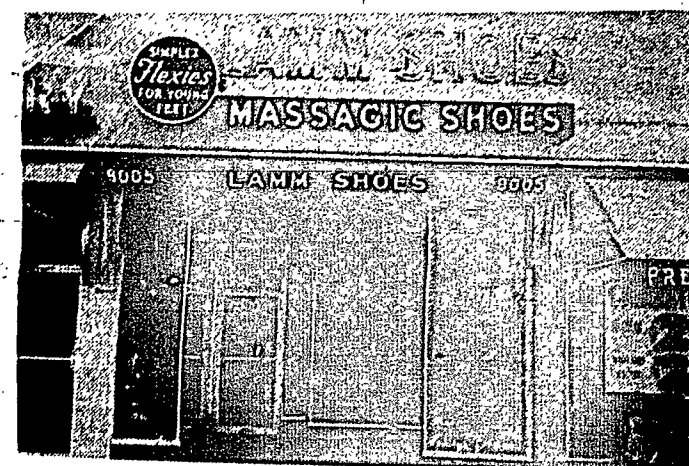

Stockholders Re-Elect Bank Of Niles Directors

The stockholders of the Bank of Niles held their annual meeting at the Bank of Niles building, 7100 Oakton Street on January 9, 1963 and re-elected the following directors for the year 1963: Ralph Erickson, Edward Clacome, Joseph Szodulski, Kenneth Klehr, Richard Haczak, Ronald Pankau and Anton Smigiel.

Thereafter, the directors elected Anton A. Smigiel as President and Chairman of the Board and Ralph Erickson as Vice Chairman of the Board.

The stockholders were advised that the bank had made substantial progress in that its resources increased 66% during 1962 over 1961 which amounted to over \$2,800,000. 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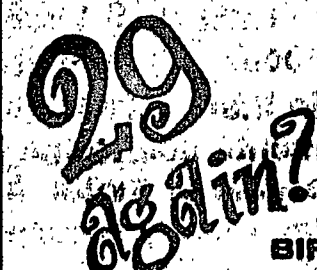

Maine East Band Concert Sunday Afternoon

The new Mark Twain School, 9401 Hamlin Avenue, in the district will open its doors to children on Monday, January 21, 1963. Maine's private teacher of lower brass instruments, Ernest Passoja, will play first trombone in a specially number, Holiday for Trombones, by David Rose, that features a trombone quartet. Students who play the trombone with Passoja will be Art Curtis, Randy Lamson, and Ron Ryden.

Modern dancers taught by Jeannine Monfort will appear in the Prologue from West Side Story, by Bernstein.

The two numbers closing the program will be Rachmaninoff's Italian Polka and highlights from Merrill's Carnival.

When an individual experiences life only in a particular city, in a suburb, on a farm, or in one region, it is difficult to envision the problems, the joys, the needs of those who have different background. Regional fiction and non-fiction books will not only enrich the understanding of our land and its people, but they will also help children to understand people of different racial and religious groups.

CAROL FROM THE COUNTRY, by Frieda Friedman, is the heart-warming story of an eleven-year-old girl who thought she could never be happy again when the family moved from the country to a small New York apartment. Carol's unhappiness, her gradual understanding of the true character of the neighborhood, and her social adjustment comprise the story.

When Carol moved to New York with her family to a small, hot apartment on a noisy crowded street, it seemed more than she could bear. The twins, younger than Carol, thought moving to a big city was lots of fun. They made new friends at once, but Carol did not welcome the friendly advances of the neighborhood girls and boys. Ruth didn't wear pretty clothes. Fat was rude. Christine was the janitor's daughter and scrubbed the stairs. Maria spoke with a foreign accent.

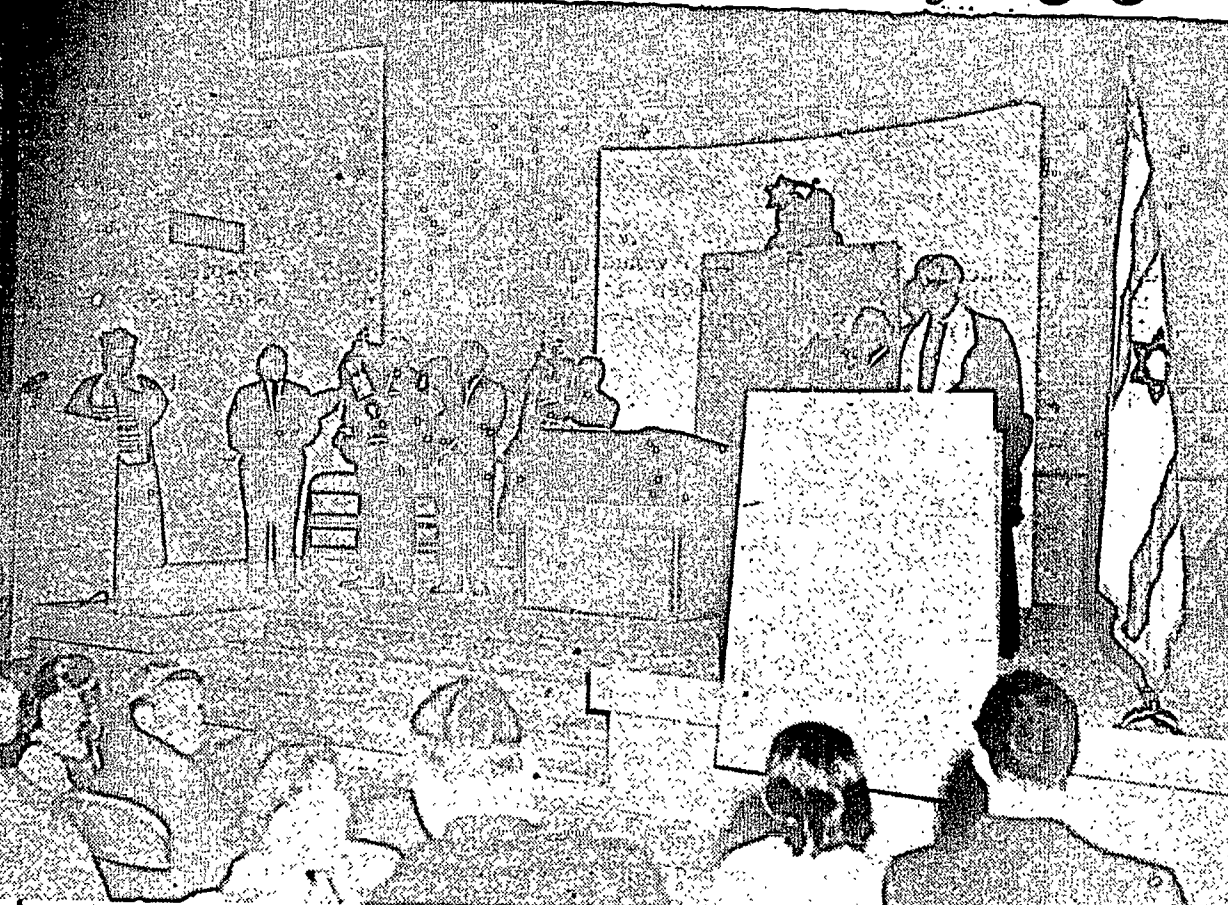
With unflinching pace and direction, this perceptive story moves toward its double revelation: the real character of a city neighborhood, and a little girl's hard-won change of heart.

List Advantages Of A Village Court

He has outlined many advantages of a Village Court in Niles.

1. The Village Court can hear suits in equity, accident cases, personal injury suits and divorce cases.
2. The Village Court will be able to render prompt handling of cases and eliminate for litigants using the Village Court the type of bogging down for years as it is customary in the present court backlog situation.
3. The Village Court will

have jurisdiction over misdemeanors and preliminary jurisdiction in felony cases.

4. The Village Court will have the right to issue injunctions and have powers similar to present Circuit Courts.

5. The Village Court will eliminate many of the needs to go into Chicago for court hearing and thus save time for area citizens, police officers and our own officials.

6. The cost of the judge's salary of the new Village Court will be paid by the State.

7. Village Court Deputy Sheriff and bailiff services will be provided by the County Sheriff.

8. Village Court jurors will be supplied from the Cook County panel and thus no cost to the Village.

9. The court clerk's salary will be paid out of Village funds.

10. With a Village Court, on a change of venue, the hearing

will not be transferred to another jurisdiction but will only require a different judge to come in to sit in the Village Court.

forces, as one ticket, in seeking to be elected.

After being conditioned to past year's hanky panky by the old trustees in the village, who were largely responsible for obstructing the park board's past activities, we can't see where elected officials in one area should stick their noses into a second elected public body's doings in the village. It has always been our feeling that village, park and school boards should be entirely autonomous, and should not be quarterbacked by any other public body or public officials. New Era, old era, or future era—trustees—sticking their noses in park politics is an unhealthy situation. Domination of any one board is not in the best interest of the taxpayers. Certainly the dominating of two boards by the same people is a slow means of strangulating the freedom of movement these groups require.

Last week (again for newer Nilesites) we mentioned that followers of former Mayor Stankowicz actively fought the park referendums of past years. While they condoned the recreation of adults by allowing illegal gambling in Niles, they fought, in writing, the creation of park facilities in the Lawrencewood area. Police Chief Bob Roney and former trustee Leonard Marzalek's wife signed literature which actively opposed this recreation area. And obviously, their efforts would never have been allowed, if not for man, Mayor Frank Stankowicz, did not approve of his team's activity in this area.

If the old era's politicking at referendum time was wrong, than certainly politicking by helping create a three-man ticket for the park board is wrong. Significantly, there are five members on the park board and the election of three men of one's own persuasion constitutes a majority control on the park board, and majority control means a complete control.

It is our feeling that a village hall building should be presented to Nilesites at the polling place to determine if they favor it. No man on the village board, nor behind a typewriter, has the wisdom to spend all the village's money, without knowing whether they favor such a large expenditure of THEIR MONEY. If the officials desire a new building, let's replace these platitudes of malarky, by going to the people, and getting their OK to spend their money.

Blase's year-end report also mentioned that 80% of our tax money goes to support our schools. This point is significant to all of us, and should result in our placing our most able representatives on school boards, at all levels. Since we're shelling out from \$250 to \$500 for school facilities annually, all of us should pay closer attention to our school situation.
