The combined bids ranged from \$41,711 to \$49,300, Thirteen plumbing contractors submitted bids on the combined project ranging from \$36,125 to \$50,154, The bid range from the heating contracts as submitted by ton contracts as submitted by ten heating contractors was from a low of \$74,880 to a high of \$92,000.

Dist. 63 Accepts Low Bond Bid

The Board of Education accepted the low bid of Hornblower and Weeks in the sale of \$800,000 of building bonds on Tuesday, March 12. The bonds were sold at one of the lowest interest rates in the history of the district. Bonds to be retired in 1964 through 1969 were successfully bid at an interest rate of 2 1/2%. The remainder of the issue from 1970 thru 1978 were bid at 8 1/8%. The net interest rate for the \$800,000 is 3,0316%.

As anticipated by the Board of Education, it is highly possible that there will be no increase in the tax rate as a result of the issuance of these bonds.
