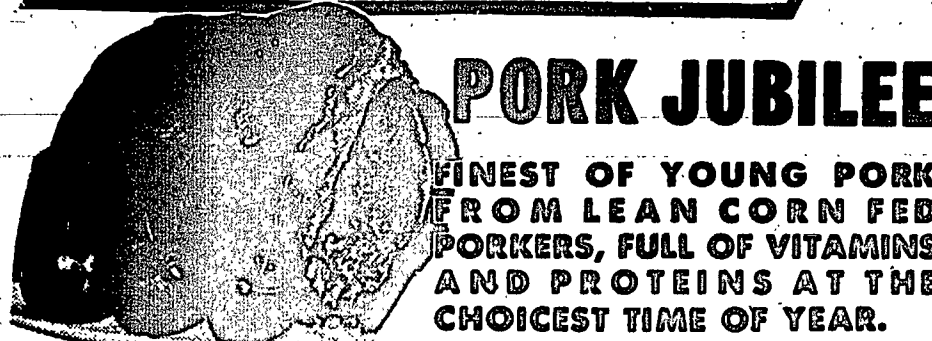

Mid-Month Meanderings

The Niles Liquor Association meets March 25 at Tromba's and all trustee candidates are guests. In past years the old time liquor houses in Niles had a very favorable relationship with Niles public officials. When the pinballs were whirling and ringing their merry tune (about \$500,000 per year) the trustees and police chief were treated most respectfully. But in the past 2 New Era years, since the gambling was eliminated, the old-time tavern owners, have not been well represented at the village hall.

The two incumbents seeking re-election, Sam Bruno and John Stanley, can certainly expect across-the-board support from this group. Mr. Bruno, the Candidate For Whichever Side Has The Majority, helped keep several of these men in the gambling business, when he voted to retain the machines after Uncle Sam made it known that seven taverns in Niles had federal gambling stamps. However, when many of these people came en masse in the village hall two years later, and asked that the Board retain the machines, Bruno was conveniently absent from the meeting. We mention how easily he switched his interests, John Stanley, on the other hand, has a reverse side of coin. It was Stanley who once tried to eliminate the machines, in the days when the older trustees voted in favor of retaining them. But two years ago when the New Era did their spring cleaning, it was Stanley who went to bat for the tavern keepers, and tried to rescind the clean-up order of the New Era. Stanley's stock may be looking up with this group, while Bruno may be given the "back of the bar rag" award by the men who should have given him the "royal order of the pinball" three years ago.

Sunday's new firehouse dedication is looked back upon here with mixed emotions. On the one hand, you couldn't help at being mindful of Niles and Niles firemen for giving this town a first rate department and an edifice which we can all be most proud of. But, on the other hand, the guy who planned this shindig pulled some of the worst boo-boos we've ever witnessed. While the brass from neighborhood

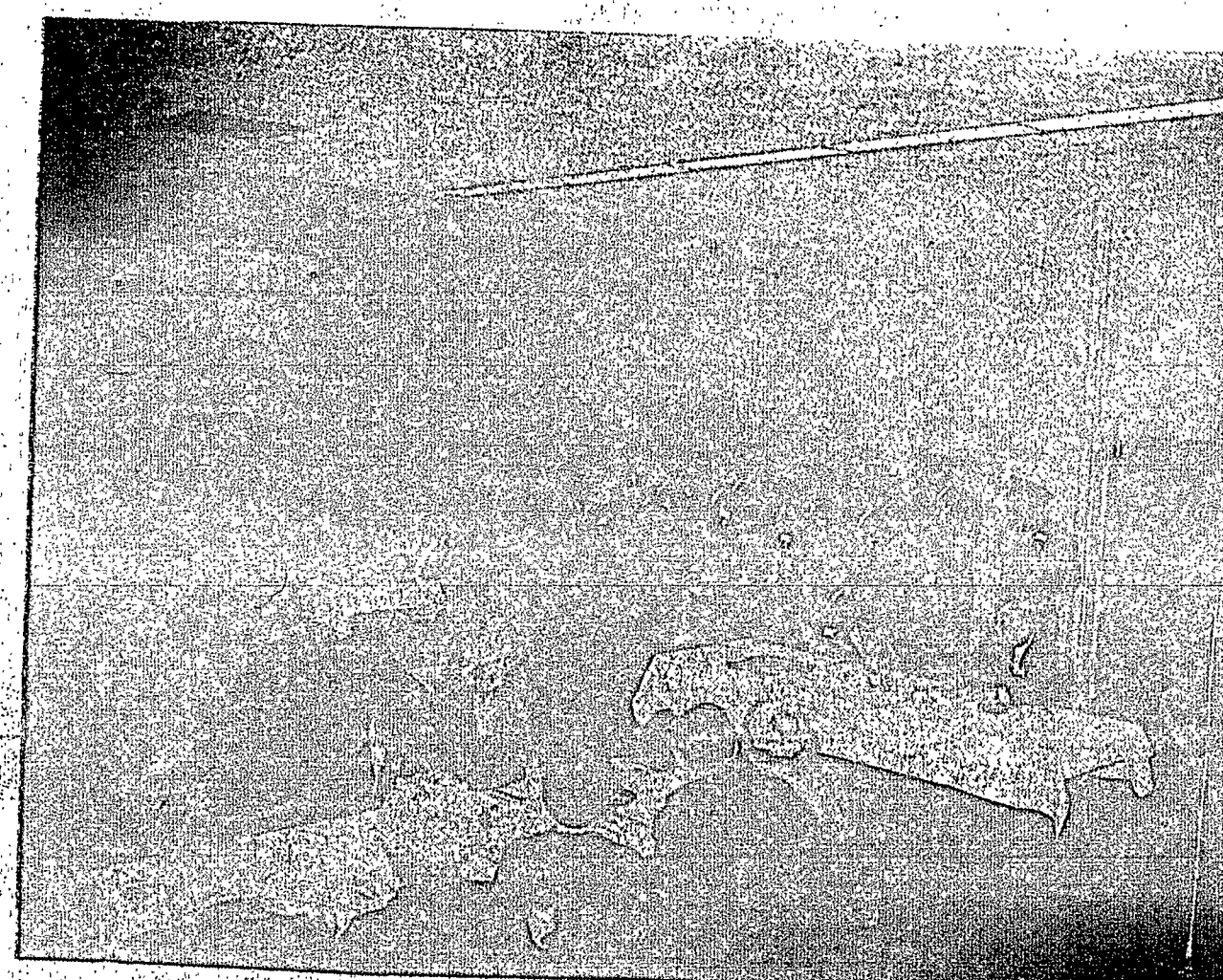
Ground Breaking

Discuss Pool Rezoning



Change Traffic Pattern

A joint meeting Saturday between the village, park and zoning boards attempted to untangle the traffic questions which surround the swimming pool park area at the Odell-Kirk-Milwaukee Avenue site.

The park board had sought zoning for the new park at the last zoning board meeting but recommendations for several changes, paramount of which was the change of the traffic pattern, caused the airing of Saturday's meeting. It is expected that the recommended changes resulting from this meeting would be incorporated in park plans, which will result in their receiving zoning approval at the March 28 zoning board meeting.

A petition with 175 signatures was introduced at the meeting from residents in the area requesting the traffic flow into the park area be redirected away from residents homes, to the east of the park. It was the opinion of the village board because most of Nilesites living east of Milwaukee Avenue, traffic would flow into the area through the west end of this Kirk Lane area, causing a hazard to the children living there. It was their joint belief that ingress and egress to and from the park be located at Milwaukee Avenue.

Review Of School Dist. 63 March 13 Meeting

Bids were opened by the Board of Education at the regular meeting of March 13 for the construction of the new Woodrow Wilson School and the eight room addition to the Mark Twain School. The various parts of the total construction will be divided into bids from general, heating, plumbing, electrical contractors. A total of ten general contractors bid on the addition to Mark Twain School and the construction of Woodrow Wilson School. Bids ranged from a low of \$338,000 to \$360,000 for the combined general construction proposal. Bids were received from eight electrical contractors. The combined bids ranged from \$41,711 to \$49,300. Thirteen plumbing contractors submitted bids on the combined project ranging from \$36,125 to \$50,154. The bid range from the heating contractors as submitted by ten heating contractors was from a low of \$74,880 to a high of \$92,000.

The Board of Education deferred final action on the selection of contractors to the next regular meeting of the Board on March 25.

Featured at the meeting was a report on the grouping program in the school district presented by a panel of principals. An audience of approximately 100 parents and teachers heard the principals present this important topic. The panel was introduced by Ludwig C. Bodzewski, Assistant Superintendent for Instruction, Frank Dagne, Principal of the Oak School, spoke concerning the reaction of children and parents to the program. He reviewed some of the basic theories of learning and showed the relationship of this program to effective learning. Joseph J. Beja, Principal of the Nelson School, presented the need for careful selection of teachers for assignment to the various groups in the program. Willard Harkin, Principal of Melzer School, reviewed the

criteria for pupil selection in grouping. He pointed out that selection is made on the basis of demonstrative achievement and teacher-principal judgment. Peter Roknich, Principal of the Washington School, indicated the need for careful material selection. He showed that printed materials, audio-visual aids, construction materials, and interenvironmental materials were necessary for effective teaching in the grouping program. The positive teacher acceptance to the grouping program in effect in District No. 63 was emphasized by Latney Field, Principal of East Maine Jr. High School.

The Board heard a report from Member Earl Epstein relative to his attendance at a zoning hearing on March 5. Mr. Epstein also reviewed the status of the proposed District No. 207 high school caucus which is in the process of organization for 1964.

The Board amended the regular Agenda to provide time for questions from the floor by citizens seeking information relative to the re-assignment of Henry Alexander, Principal of the Ballard School and the termination of contract for Joseph J. Beja, Principal of the Viola H. Nelson School.

Following the regular business of the meeting, the Board adjourned to Executive Session to consider information regarding the dismissal and reassignment of employees. After prolonged discussion, no action was taken to alter the previous decision of the Board.

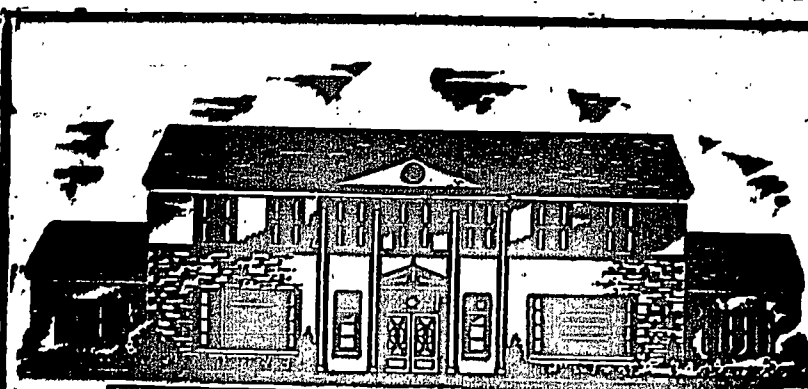

Niles Pony League

The Niles Baseball Pony League is rolling. Two meetings have already been held. One on Jan. 29th and one on March 13 in order to clarify all discrepancies. For example, on Jan. 29th, considerable time was spent discussing a "A" and "B" team setup where boys of different caliber would be assigned to each league. However, on Mar. 13th it was decided that it would be better to enlarge the league from six to eight teams (with twelve boys per team) and add to the rules that every boy must play a minimum of eighteen outs. The thought here was that more time on the field would be more advantageous than to lower the class of ball playing. Since the Niles Baseball League has been formed the one thought in mind has been that the league is for the boys. The record will show that the managers have tried to develop the playing ability and sportsmanship in the boys. Proof of this is the fact that several of our ex-Little League Pony League players have been signed to Professional Major League contracts. The men who have volunteered to serve as Managers this year have all had years of experience in the Niles Baseball League. The League was very fortunate in finding a former Professional ball player to help manage one of the teams. This man has agreed to assist and help all the boys in the Pony League. With this type of leadership it is hoped that a better brand of team spirit and ball playing will be seen. The League this year is curtailed to 96 boys. There is a few openings left for boys who must register before the April 6th tryouts. After this date there will be a period of two weeks practice and then the usual Grapefruit League will continue until the actual season starts.

Judge Smigiel also stated that voters in the Village of Niles should vote for Virginia Badley for Clerk of the new Village Court in Niles.

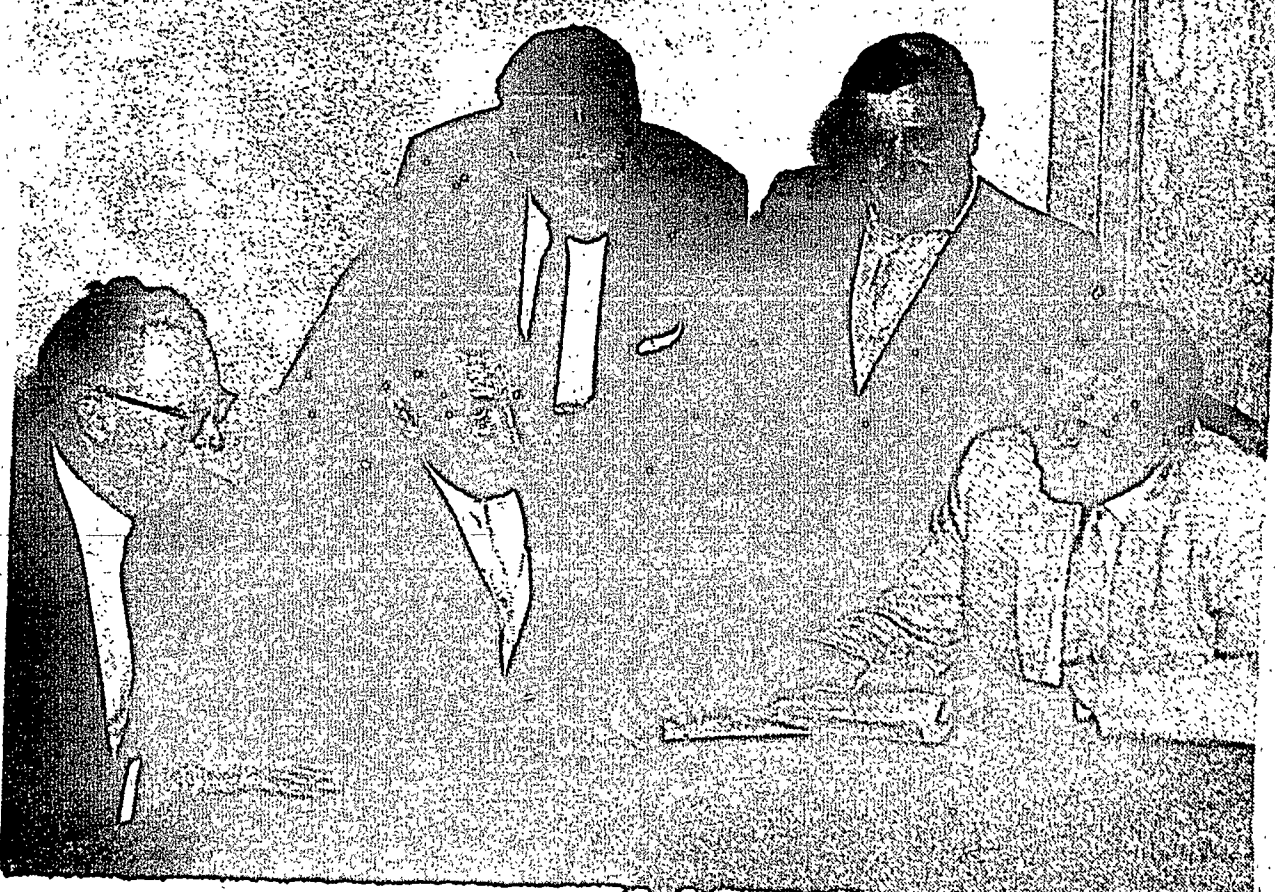
