## East Maine District 63 Elects 2 New Members

The expected upheaval of East Maine school district 63's board began Saturday with the expected win of two new candidates to the Board, Irene Luck of Glenview, and Shelly Nathanson of Morton Grove, easily defeating incumbents Bill Graham of Morton Grove, and Niles' Stan Lowe in a five-man race. Hy Rindler, also of Morton Grove ran a poor fifth.

The controversy centering around two school principals not being re-hired next year left a very discontented electorate expressing themselves at the polls Saturday. Additionally, many Niles' voters, equally unhappy over the failure of the "lunch in school" issue, also came to the polls to express their resentment of the school board incumbents, Graham and Lowe.

District 63, whose growing pains, with its accompanying aches and bruises, can be expected to continue to place new board members on the school board again in next year's election.

## CANDIDATES FOR PROGRESS WIN NARROW VICTORY



### Tearful Climax To Victory

It was a tearful night in Marge Lieske's basement after the final vote tabulations were placed on the two score boards on the north and west house front walls.

Angie Marcheschi, whose high vote total led his party into office, had attended his father's funeral Monday, and the moment of victory released the spent emotion which was sad in its coming.

When the victory whistle blew Angie's very pretty dark-haired wife, Val, hugged her husband, and 12 year old Tom grasped both his parents, as much out of sustenance as out of pride.

### Stanley, Zimos Stankowicz Defeated

Frank Stankowicz and John Stanley, two antagonists who were the number one and two political leaders in Niles from 1955 to 1961, went down to defeat in separate races Tuesday night, which should end their political lives in the village.

Led by newcomer Ann Marcheschi, the Candidates For Progress ticket squeaked into office. Marcheschi's vote-getting power helped re-elect incumbent clerk Marge Lieske and incumbent Sam Bruno, as well as newcomer Ed Berkowsky. Marcheschi led his ticket in 12 precincts, Bruno carried 4, Mrs. Lieske 3 and Berkowsky led in one precinct among his fellow-candidates.

School district 63, alleged to be the second largest district in the state, has been showing growing pains for years. But never was the district's aches and bruises more openly exposed than they were Saturday. Two incumbents, Niles' Stan Lowe and Bill Graham were ousted from office in favor of newcomers. It can be expected that next year the overthrowing of the school board will continue.

Obviously district 71 parents are well satisfied with their school, its board members, and the lack of problems there. But in rowdy 63 the burlers were out in force to express themselves.

The election of the new board members in district 63 may be a healthy symptom, but were disappointed at some of the reasons for ousting the incumbents. If voters were express

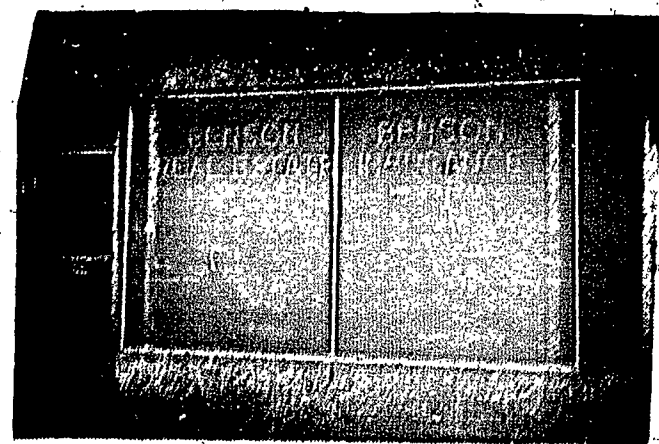
## Polio Clinic Set For May 5

## Post Fallout Shelter Signs

Crews are posting Civil Defense signs on fallout shelters in several Cook County communities this week. Only public shelters are being posted.

Yellow and black Civil Defense signs on the outside of buildings indicate a fallout shelter is inside. Others signs within the building point the way and actually mark off the shelter area.

Local Civil Defense authorities are responsible for planning use of the shelters and administering them. In cooperation with these officials, crews from the Chicago Army Engineer District are posting shelter signs, as part of the engineer service to Civil Defense during the national fallout shelter survey and marking program.

The shelter areas will provide protection against fallout in event of a nuclear attack and will accommodate at least 50 people. It is planned that the Federal Government will provide through Civil Defense, supplies to assure survival of those in the refuge for as long as two weeks.

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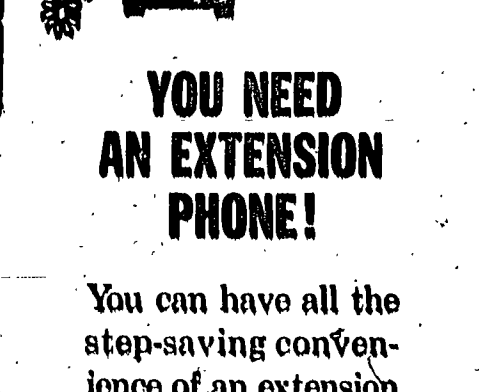
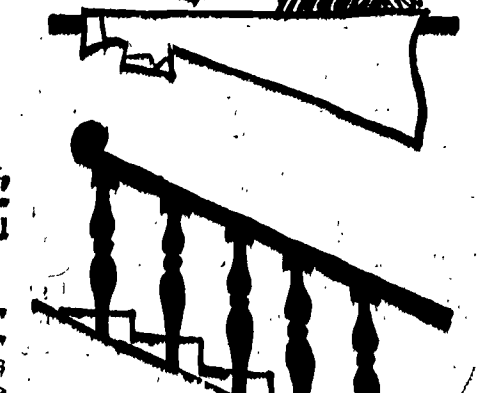

## TB Campaign Nets \$4,597

Response of Cook County suburbanites to the 1963 Christmas Seal Fund Campaign amounted to \$366,622.06, helping to make possible the most successful drive in the 56-years history of The Tuberculosis Institute of Chicago and Cook County.

Yngvar Brynildsen, general chairman of the 1962 appeal, has announced that the total sum raised is \$864,567.28, exceeding the \$825,000 target by \$39,567. In 1961, the \$825,000 goal was overreached by \$4,788.60.

The suburban increase of over \$25,000.00 mainly accounted for the largest sum realized. In 1961 the suburbs gave \$341,379.88 to the campaign, Chicago residents totalled \$497,945.22 for the 1962 appeal, compared to \$488,408.72 for 1961.

The biggest increase of the suburbs came from Cicero where \$18,364.45 was realized compared to \$14,669.00 in 1961. The largest contributor is again Evanston which marked \$28,252.37 for 1962; \$26,859.97 for 1961.

In announcing results of the campaign, Brynildsen praised the work of his suburban and city chairmen. "The results is a vivid demonstration of the efforts they put into the campaign," he said. "At the same time, we know that their work was fruitful because residents

were willing to realize that tuberculosis is everyone's problem and everyone is needed to help fight it. We hope the enthusiastic response to the fund appeal will be repeated in the coming summer free chest X-ray survey."

The success of the Christmas Seal Campaign will make it possible for the Institute to tackle other respiratory diseases, which are increasingly on the rise, as well as continue its pursuit to eliminate tuberculosis.

The chairman of Niles, Mrs. Joseph E. Lindstrom, 7711 N. Oriole, said that a total of \$4,597.08 was collected for the tuberculosis drive. This amount was an increase over last year's total, \$4,112.32.

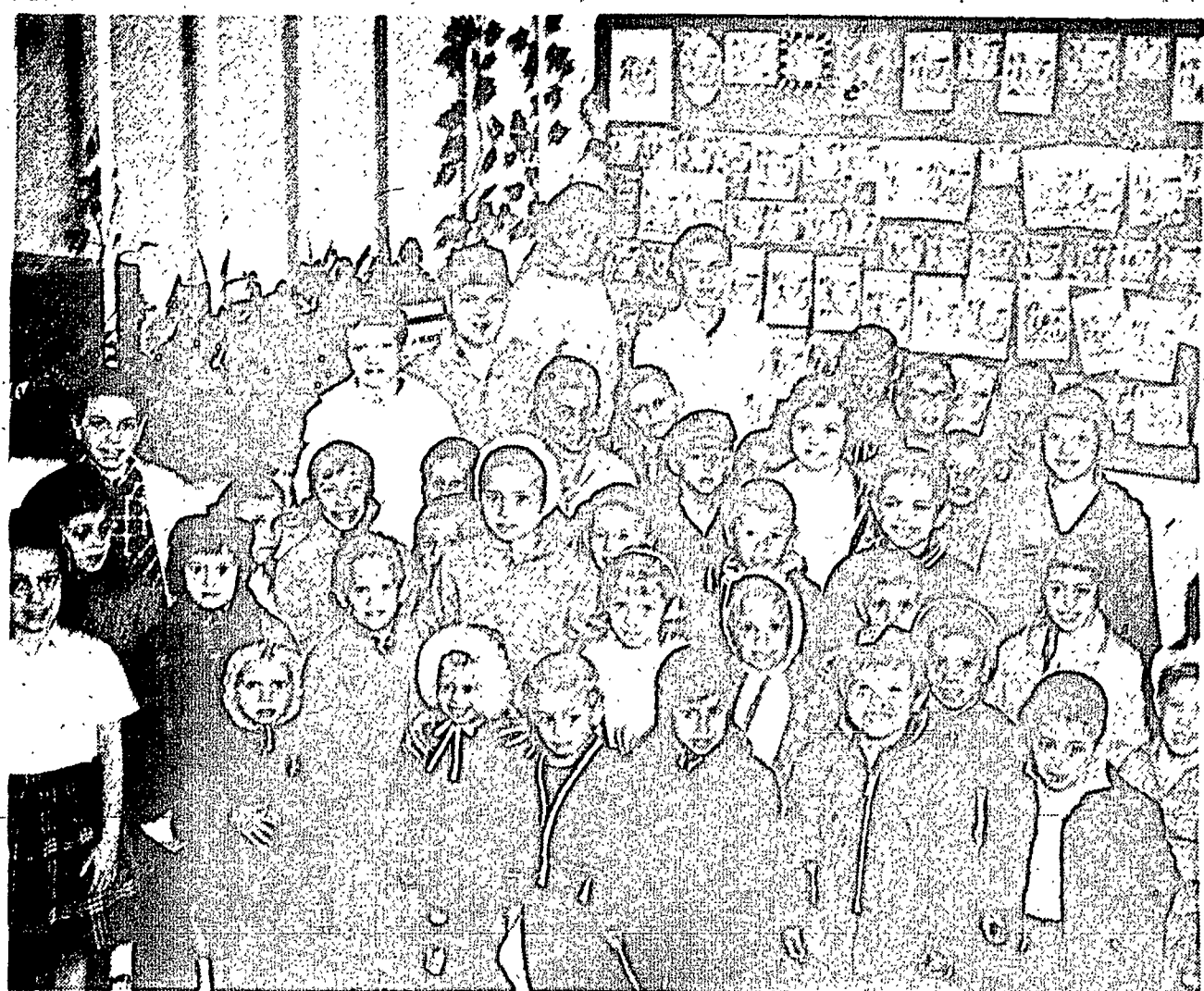

The play dates of the Maine entertainment are May 9, 10 and 11. Music Boosters and the Maine music faculty set the dates last year.

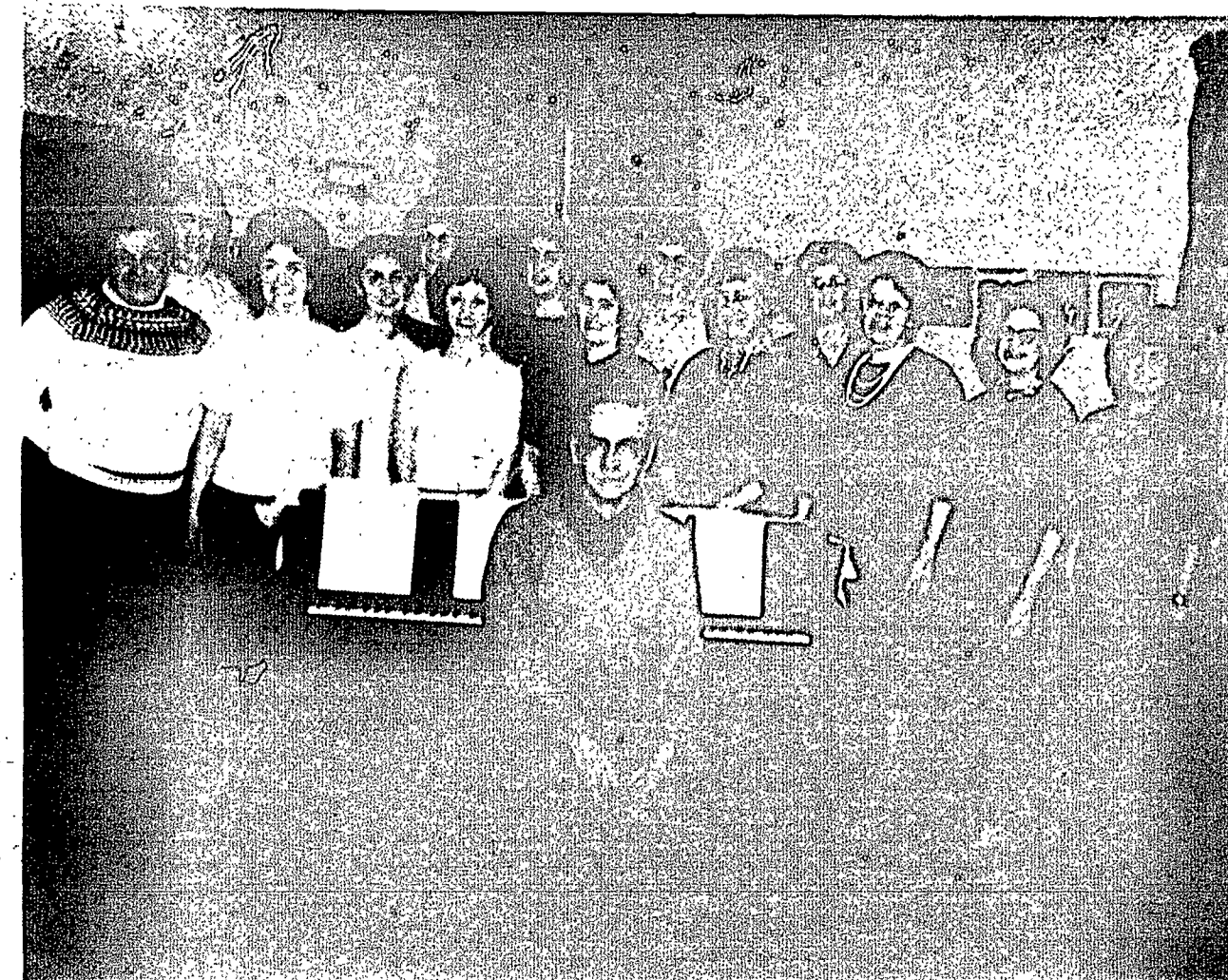
Ray Page, Illinois' superintendent of public instruction, signed a proclamation on March 28 which contains this statement:

disorder of our time. "It is as harmful to personal human dignity as slavery itself was 100 years ago," Frey said. "Legislation of this kind is the only way to right the terrible wrongs that have been, and are being, committed," he said.

Commenting on the opposition to the passage of the bill, McDermott exploded many of the "myths created by fear and lack of knowledge. In the more than 10 states that now have Fair Housing Practices Bills on their books," McDermott said, "the myths of forced social planning, increased intermarriage, increased violence and lowering property values have proved to be just that, myths."

Nelson, discussed the increasing awareness of renters and housing financing institutions in the need of such "open occupancy" legislation, to open up the housing market to many thousands of middle class families now barred from buying homes wherever they please.

Dr. Reed Brockbank, chairman of the Niles Township Human Relations Council, closed the discussion with a plea for freedom of the contagion of fear. "Fear brought on by misunderstanding spreads in epidemic proportions," he said. "It is this fear that can be defeated by the person-to-person contacts this kind of legislation will encourage."
