With the pitching of Thomas and the recent hitting of Larsen, Ugel, Kennedy, Jaegers, Marshall, and Challenger the Niles Bombers under Tom Warda roll merrily along and now lead the Men's Softball league with a 6-0 record. In a game against Blases' Tavern on June 11, Larsen's homer and Ugel's double powered the Bombers to an 8-2 win at Jozwiak Park. Ugel had a perfect night at the plate with 3 for 3 including the double; Marshall and Challenger each batted 2 for 3. Although A. Hoelbi got 2 for 2, his mates garnered only 4 other hits as Blases took its fourth loss.

250 Scouts To Attend Camp Napowan

Over 250 reservations have been made by Niles and Park Ridge scouts for Camp Napowan, the Northwest Suburban Council boy scout summer camp at Wild Rose, Wis. 24 adult leaders will camp with their troops.

Troop 62, sponsored by the Niles Community church, leads with 26 scouts and 4 scouters registered. George P. Niesen, 8131 Elmore is scoutmaster.

Period 1, June 19-29, will find Troops 1 and 50 at Napowan. Period 2, June 29-July 13, brings Troops 17, 24, 45, 77, and 175.

Troops 1, 73, 78, 104, 204, and 33 will have period 3, July 13-27. Period 4, July 27-August 10, will see Troops 62, 76, 105, 201, and 1 in camp.

is an obvious need to adjust the problem. But the planning in Niles is so haphazard, that the voice from the grandstand, you the taxpayer, has to assert itself. Not only are the guys at the village hall fallible, but the goof-ups resulting from the shoddy thinking there have become legion.

Some years ago Carl Gardner was paid \$12,000 for creating a plan for the village. He said the most central area in town was in the Oakton-Milwaukee area. He believed that area to be the most desirable location for a village hall. So what happened? The former trustees had a referendum, which YOU paid for, for a village hall behind the Oak School.

Next the old trustees built the second floor area to the public works building, which could have been used for village clerk headquarters. But the idea was resisted, the second floor addition was still added, and now 80 % of the room stands empty, and part of it is used for a shooting range for the police department.

Then came the fire station goof-up. This location, on the outskirts of Niles, bordering unincorporated area on two sides, has a telephone line which is different from 85 % of the residents' lines. Such an error is unbelievable. But, since Nilesites were not watching the store, such a goof-up resulted.

Now the two year old NEW ERA is settling down to following the old patterns again. Firmly entrenched in office, Blase answered an objection to the new proposal by stating, "If the people don't approve of our actions, they can answer at the polls." This was a smack of arrogance, which can't be ignored. Nilesites put in these amateur politicians, because they wanted a voice in the way their money is being spent. But when the boys try to act like the pros they are not, then it's time to lower the boom on their thinking.

The indictment is not of Blase alone.....Scheel, Szymanski, Wentz and those other guys (we've forgotten their names) are all part of the machine, which was created by the taxpayers.

If the boys choose to keep the doors closed, they may have it slammed in their faces two years from now when Nilesites may heed Blase's suggestion, "that if they don't like it, they can say so at the polls."

Report Leukemia May Be Infectious

A detailed study of a 1957-60 upsurge of leukemia among children in Niles has indicated a possible relationship of an "infectious process," according to the Chicago Sun-Times. Leukemia is a usually fatal cancer of the blood-forming tissues.

The cause of leukemia has not been pinpointed although some research men believe a virus may be involved. While there is no cure for the deadly, modern treatments extend lives of victims.

In Niles, during the period studied eight cases were diagnosed and six victims died. All lived in the same neighborhood, an area corresponding roughly to boundaries of the Roman Catholic parish of St. John Brebeuf. Seven either attended the parochial school or had brothers or sisters going to the school.

The exhaustive investigation of the epidemiology of the cases in this "leukemia pocket" was made by Cook County Health

Department personnel under Dr. John B. Hall and Dr. Clark W. Heath Jr. The latter was with the epidemiology branch of the Communicable Disease Center, U.S. Public Health Service, Atlanta, at the time of the study. Cooperating were Doctors Robert J. Hasterlik and George V. Le Roy, both of the University of Chicago.

The report of the investigation of the Niles cases where the incidence was at the rate of 21.3 per 100,000 population compared with 4.6 for the rest

of Cook County appears in the current issue of the American Journal of Medicine. It is written by Dr. Heath, now at Tufts Hematology Laboratory, Boston City Hospital, and Dr. Hasterlik, professor of medicine on the Midway.

While they write that no common factor was found to explain the cases, they add:

"The eight cases occurred in a particular time pattern and they were accompanied by the

parallel appearance of a 'rheumatic-like' illness among other children attending St. John Brebeuf school.....

"Their epidemiologic characteristics, however, suggest a relationship to infectious processes, in addition to providing material of general interest for the study of leukemia."

The coincidence in dates of the onset of leukemia cases and for cases of the "rheumatic-like" illness.....

Dear Mr. Bessert

In order to criticize properly you must know your subject matter. The same is true of your particular business as is for a music critic who criticizes music but yet does not know too much about music. The following factual points must be made:

1. You yourself admit the need for new village facilities. Therefore, it becomes our problem to find these facilities on the most economic basis for the residents of Niles.

2. It would be nice to have these facilities placed in the center of the village, but, did you consider that it would cost us \$150,000, more than we are paying now, in order to purchase the additional land.

3. The area upon which we are presently planning to build our new facilities is owned by the village. We can, therefore, build these facilities for just the cost of the building. What you are in effect saying is that because it would be nice to have these facilities closer to the center of town we should spend an additional \$150,000, to buy land for this use. I say to you that this is not economical and not practical.

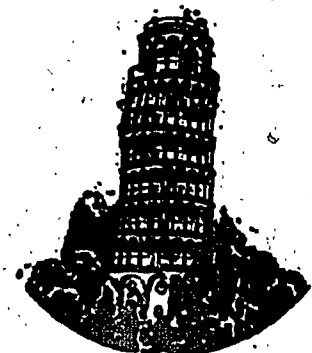
Open Forum Tonight

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FULL YEAR KINDERGARTEN OKAYED IN DISTRICT 63

Classes To Hold 35 Students

School Board 63 unanimously voted for a full year kindergarten at Tuesday's Board meeting.

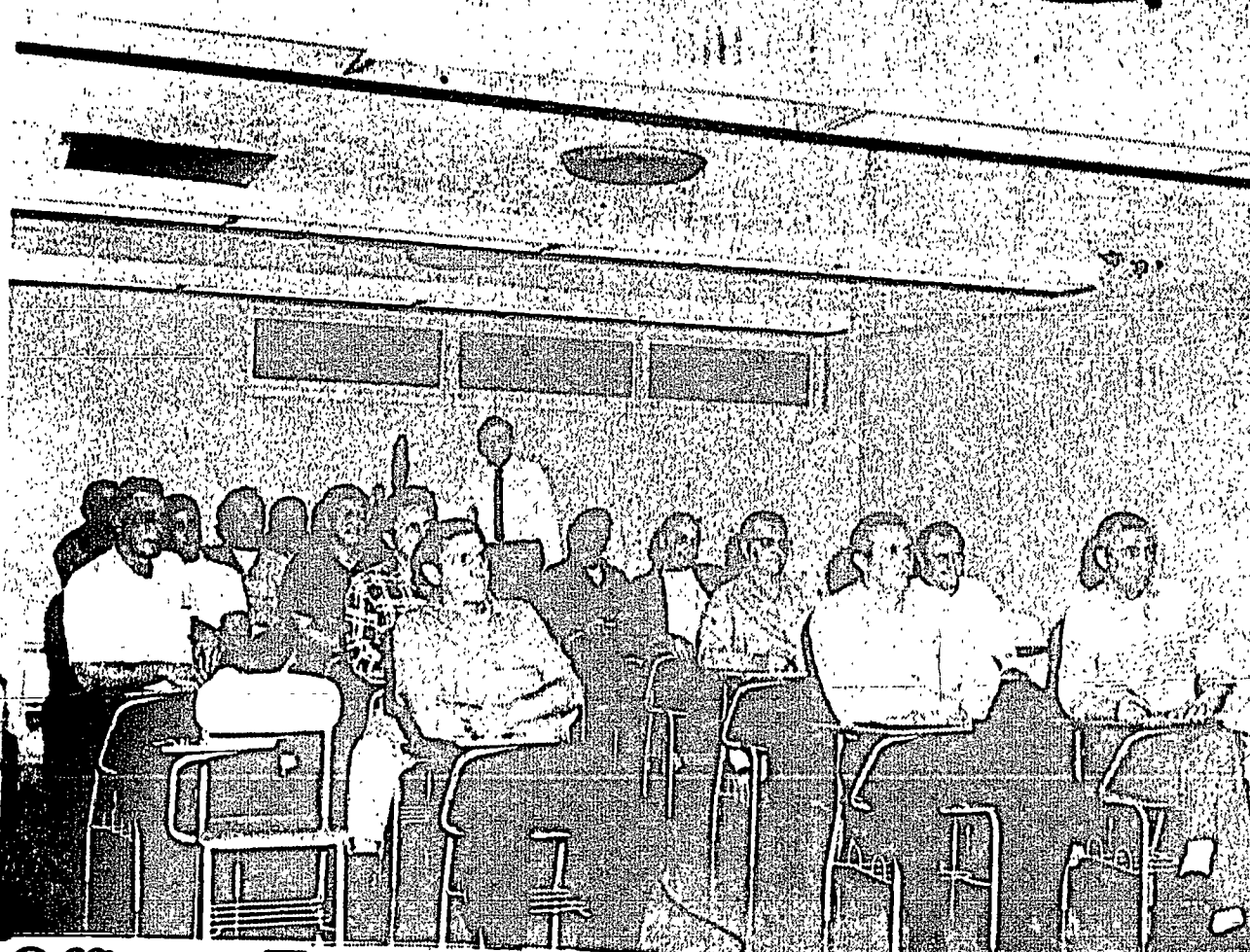
The Board backed up School superintendent Jim Bagg's recommendation for the full year, after Bagg said this should be undertaken for the good of the children. Earlier in the meeting Bagg said there was a "possibility for a full year" adding that there would be problems. Two meetings ago Bagg was less positive that such a program should be carried out, as he mentioned he was wary that the board might have to go back to half-year kindergarten in '64-'65, and he felt such a regression would be an unhealthy situation. However, Tuesday night Bagg wholeheartedly recommended the full year stating that the additional four months preparation would be beneficial to all students.

Before the Board voted on the issue Bagg forecast the problems based on enrollment figures for kindergarten.

He noted at Niles' Oak School six half-day sections of 35 student classes would take place daily, with 2 additional students added to these figures. He said the all-purpose room could be utilized for some of these sections.

At the Washington School 63 kindergartners would be divided into morning and afternoon classes of 32 and 31, until the Wilson School was completed. At the Melzer School, by

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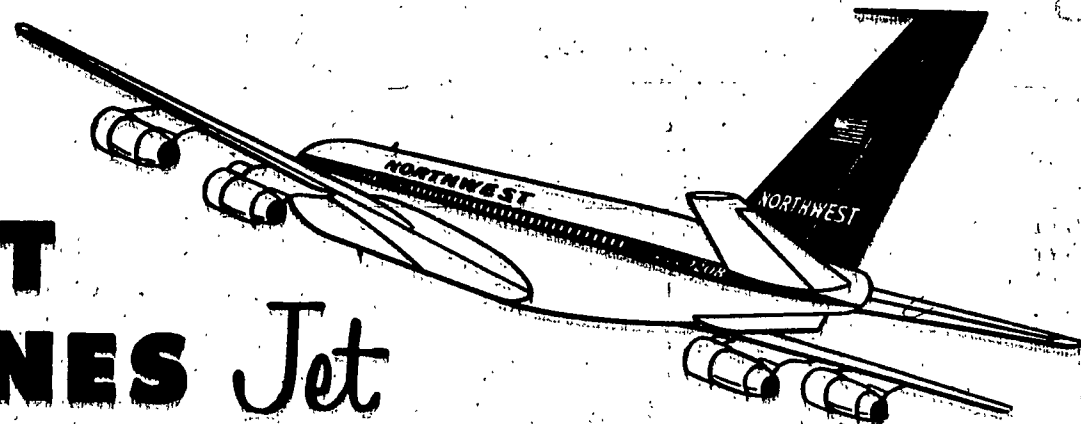

On Epstein

Your June 6 editorial in the "Bugle" on the administration of school district 63 put the stamp of weakness on the school board.

There is merit in this conclusion but to prevent an injustice at least one exception must be made in recognition for the efforts of board member Earl Epstein. His complete dedication to the task has made it necessary to differ with the majority of the board on many occasions. His sometimes dissenting position incurred the displeasures of the board to the extent they refused to support his re-election. There were, however enough informed and interested citizens to assure his continued contribution as a member of the school board.

Mr. Epstein differed with the board on the sequence of building on new school sites as did many of the local civic groups. He strongly advocated, without success, providing legal counsel and assistance at the time the citizens' groups were helping in the fight against saturation of multiple dwellings in the area. Subsequent supreme court decisions have indicated this may have resulted in success. The supreme court did not consider the burden on schools only because the probable effect of multiple dwellings was not specifically presented.

In my opinion Mr. Epstein's efforts should be recognized to encourage his continued service.

We citizens in district 63 now recognize the need of a strong school board and hope to accomplish this end in the next few years. We have strengthened it in the last election.

X-ray Unit In Niles & Morton Grove This Week

Only twenty five per cent (25%) of the adult residents in Niles took a free chest x-ray in 1962, according to information from the Tuberculosis Institute of Chicago and Cook County (the Christmas Seal agency).

A total of 4,062 Niles residents participated in the mobile x-ray survey, either in their town, another suburban community, or in Chicago; or they went to one of the three clinics of the Suburban Cook County Tuberculosis Sanatorium District for a mass survey film.

"Tuberculosis never takes a vacation," said Dr. Julius R. Novak, medical director of the Institute. "That is why the District and the Institute yearly send out the mobile units to help you keep a good photo-image of your lung condition. If you should have contracted tuberculosis we want you to know it as soon as possible. Early detection and treatment can lead to early cure, as well as reduce the spread of the disease," he said.

A mobile unit will locate at Topps, Harlem and Dempster, Niles, July 1 and 2. X-ray hours Monday will be 2-9 p.m.; Tuesday hours will be 10:30 a.m.-5:30 p.m. The unit will move on to the Golf-Mill Shopping Center, July 3 and 4. X-ray hours Wednesday will be 10:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. Friday hours will be 2-9 p.m. There will be no x-rays July 4. Mrs. Joseph Denz, 7908 Neva, will be chairman of the volunteers registering x-ray applicants. The Niles Woman's Club is local sponsor.

Prevent Home Burglaries While On Vacation

This is the time of the year when burglars and prowlers have easy "pickin'" said Chief C. Emrickson of the Niles Police Department. Most citizens will soon be going off on week-ends or vacations and virtually abandoning their homes to burglars declared by the Illinois Police Association as Burglary Prevention Week, a period during which Chief Emrickson hopes to make all homeowners more aware of the precautions they may take to frustrate the attempts of would-be burglars this summer.

The unconcerned and careless attitude of many was largely responsible for all the burglaries committed in our village in the past few years. Although most people didn't intentionally invite intruders to ransack their homes, they might just as well have hung up a sign saying "no one's home, burglars welcome!"

A stroll around your neighborhood any day will tell you at a glance who's away; their porches will be cluttered with circulars, an accumulation of milk bottles on the stoop; an unkempt lawn; an empty garage with the door open; or a building mailbox. Tip-offs that'll broadcast "no one's home" to anyone canvassing the neighborhood.

In the evening, most empty homes can be spotted too; most look for the dark houses. It's a known fact, light is one of the best deterrents to crime, yet most homeowners go out for an evening and leave their houses completely dark. Or, they'll go off for a weekend or vacation and leave the same light burning day and night. No light at all, or the same light burning continuously, is a good giveaway "no one is home."

Chief Emrickson went on to say, home and apartments account for more than four of every ten burglaries. By observing a few simple precautionary steps, you can reduce the possibility of a burglar selecting your dwelling as his target next time you're away:

1. Connect a lamp to an automatic timer to turn lights in the home on and off.
2. Close and lock all doors, including porch, basement, and garage. Use pin-tumbler cylinder locks on outside entrances and safety latches on the windows.
3. Be sure all screens are fastened from the inside.
4. Never leave valuables lying around; keep them in a safety deposit box.
5. Notify your police department when you'll be leaving and how long you expect to be away.
6. Cancel all deliveries, such as the milk, laundry, cleaning, etc. Also, be sure to discontinue the newspaper or arrange to have it sent you at your vacation address.
7. Have a neighbor, or your postoffice, hold all mail until you return.
8. Arrange with a friend to mow the lawn and sweep your sidewalk once a week. Also ask him if he'll pick up any circulars or handbills that may be left on your porch.
9. Leave your shades and blinds as you normally do; closed blinds keep the sun out, but also make an effective screen for the burglars.

Never advertise your departure with an item in the local paper. Give the story about your vacation to the newspapers after you've returned.

There is no such thing as a "burglar proof" home, said Chief Emrickson, but he went on to say, there are steps that everyone can take to keep the burglar's activity to a minimum. By following the suggestions listed above, you'll be helping to protect your home whenever you're away.
