\$1400 Damage At New School

A wave of vandalism caus-
ing \$1400 damage at the new-
ly constructed Woodrow Wilson
elementary school result-
ed in school district 63 hiring
a part-time police officer
to guard all under-construction
schools in the district.

At the July 10 meeting dis-
trict 63 school board details
of vandalism and threats to
neighbors who might report
these activities resulted in the
district taking action, both for
their Niles and Morton Grove
schools. School superintendent
Jim Bagg reported teens drop-
ped bricks from scaffolds two
stories high to break forms,
and generally cause mischief,
which led to the hiring of the
guard. Windows have been broken
and broken water pipes
caused 3 days of pumping of
one building. Bagg also re-
ported that neighbors protesting
the acts of the teens were threat-
ened physically. Others re-
ported that when they protest-
ed the teens threatened to break
windows in their homes if they
reported them to the police.
The Wilson school is in the
village of Niles, boarding
the Glenview.

In other actions Fred Wet-
endorf, superintendent of build-
ings and grounds, said the
Wilson School would be closed
until August 1. He also re-
ported the Mark Twain School
should be completed before that
date and the Melzer School
would be the first completed,
approximately 1 October. Lat
Niles Oak School would be
finished after the Melzer School
and the Nelson School would
be the last completed, near
the end of the year.

In other actions board mem-
ber Earl Epstein had the dis-
cussion pertinent to a second
junior high school placed on
the agenda for the July 22 meet-
ing. It is expected the school
will be built on present prop-
erty alongside the present jun-
ior high school at Ballard Road
and Greenwood.

In other actions Charles
Whitmore, has been hired as
assistant superintendent of ed-
ucation. He held a similar po-
sition in Dearborn, Michigan.
Three accountants were
interviewed pertinent to the hir-
ing of one to audit the school's
books. Discussion centered a-
round the use of a cash or an
accrual system. One account-

Freedom Fighter At Friday Night Meeting

A "Freedom fighter" who went to jail for his convictions in Chicago, Ill., will be featured at an 8:30 P.M. meeting tomorrow (Friday) at the Skokie Area Liberal Democratic Club on the lawn of Chamber Gordon, 5145 Conrad Skokie, a Chicago attorney and club president.

The Rev. John Porter, pastor of the Christ Methodist Church, Chicago, who went on a hunger strike during the six days he was imprisoned, will appear as a three-man panel.

Reason for the imprisonment was a demonstration by northern freedomists on behalf of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference, led by Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.

The Rev. Porter is currently active with the Executive Committee for Community Action on Chicago's southside, where a war against prejudice and segregation.

At the Gordon lawn he and State Rep. Bernard Beason (D-Ill.) and the Rev. Gilbert Weisblatt, Central Methodist church, Skokie, will discuss Civil Rights Freedom Road, North and South.

Voluntary donations of \$1,000 per person will be contributed to Dr. King's organization and the continued fight for equal opportunity.

"The century-long struggle of the Negro," said Gordon, "to achieve full citizenship is not a minor problem."

"We share the Negro people's impatience with gradualism. The full powers of government should be employed massively and decisively to secure full equality under the law at once and in all areas."

"Education of the white man who is prejudiced should follow the flow from the fact of equality."
