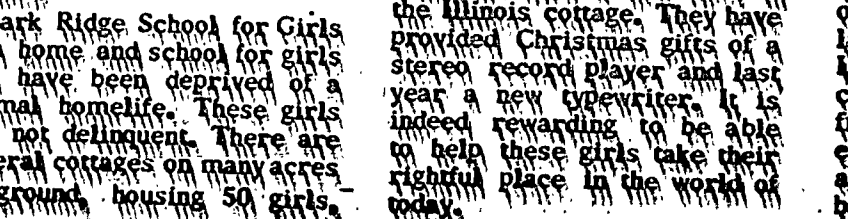

## Sanitary District Crackdown On Marihuana

Sanitary District Supt. Vinton W. Bacon today ordered a crack down on tenants leasing district property to immediately initiate a program to eradicate marihuana growing wild on their property.

Bacon said that in the past years the district never required lessees to take part in the narcotic weed spraying program, altho some did participate.

The district has done a phenomenal job in reducing the quantities of marihuana on its unleased properties from 3,000 acres to 200 acres at the present time, he said.

"But the over-all effectiveness is somewhat negated, due to the plentiful seed acres elsewhere," Bacon declared.

Bacon said all district leases have a "marihuana clause," which requires lessees to eradicate the growth of noxious weeds or plants on properties they rent from the district.

Since 1947, Bacon said the district's board has recognized the marihuana menace along district properties.

He said that spraying must be done annually for at least five or six years in any area to be certain that eradication is complete.

Bacon said the spraying of the narcotic weed is not done to any significant degree by other governmental agencies which have "rather widespread growth on their lands."

In its eradication program, Bacon said the district uses a chemical known as 2-4-D, which kills everything but grasses. It caused marihuana to wilt within 48 hours after spraying, Bacon explained.

Until now, Bacon said, the district has not enforced lessees to eradicate noxious weeds on their leased lands. He added:

"But we will no longer neglect this menace. Marihuana is a hemp and is difficult to eradicate. The seed can be dormant in the ground for 5 to 6 years, germinating any time within that period."

Bacon said the district's real estate department reported the major trouble spots where two lessees, renting a total of 130 acres have not taken an active role in the noxious weed eradication program, are on the far southwest side.

The district itself has an area on the far southwest side, roughly about 50 acres, which is undergoing eradication.

Bacon said that lessees who do not comply with the eradication program will be forced to pay the costs incurred by the district to spray their properties.

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# Review Of July 15 Maine Hi Board Meeting

The Maine Township High School Board of Education at its regular meeting Monday evening, July 15, in room 138 of the school building, devoted a major portion of the two hour session to a report of development in the construction of Maine Township High School South and to the summer maintenance projects. In addition, the Board confirmed the appointment of eleven new teachers, set the date for hearing the 1963-1964 budget and discussed the growing problem of smoking on the part of high school students.

Dr. Leonard Swanson, President of the Board, reported progress in use of the critical path schedule directed by Arthur Anderson and Company for the purpose of keeping construction at Maine South on schedule. Dr. Swanson observed that with a few minor changes in the schedule, all units of Maine Town-

ship High School South should be ready for occupancy by September, 1964 as originally planned. He told the Board that some of the units in the school, namely the classroom wing, the vocational arts department and the library areas, are ahead of schedule. Work in the central heating plant, the performing arts area and the physical education unit need to be speeded up. The heating plant is especially critical since heat will be required for inside construction to continue during the winter season. Dr. Swanson indicated that the over-all schedule shows that the entire school can be finished on schedule in the 395 days of construction time that remain, providing contractors keep their progress in line with the schedule shown by the critical path.

Building Committee Chairman Bert Ball reminded the Board that much remains to be done if satisfactory approaches to ingress and egress to the new site are accomplished. The streets adjoining the site must be widened to accommodate increased traffic. This will require cooperation between city, county and state officials. Mr. William Newport, member of the Building Committee, expressed the opinion that the matter of getting traffic on to and off of the highways adjoining the school site is a matter that should be handled by the proper civic authorities. "The Board of Education should not spend tax money building and widening roads to care for the increased traffic caused by the opening of the new high school," he said.

It was announced that the lens Rosenow Roofing Company, Inc., will begin replacing the roof over the field house at Maine Township High School East before the end of the week.

This company was also authorized to proceed with repair of leaks in the four year old roof at Maine Township High School West. Dean and Sons was authorized to blacktop the field house track at Maine East for a bid price of \$2,350.00. R. E. Russell, sidewalk contractor, was authorized to construct a sidewalk extending from Howard Street to Maine Township High School West, along the east side of the property. The bid price is \$1,148 for the six foot sidewalk.

Request by Lawson Hockey, chairman of the industrial arts department at Maine Township High School East, for the construction of a future consideration to cost \$7,000.00, was deleted from the early summer repair program because funds could not be found in the austerity budget to provide all of the repair work that was requested. The Board expressed desire to have the work done so that the auto mechanics program can be carried out in an effective manner. Mr. Hockey stated that enrollment in auto mechanics has increased for the coming year to seven sections; whereas, last year there were four classes in auto mechanics. Principal Milo R. Johnston reported that students who are trained in automobile painting are able to find work as soon as they graduate. It was also pointed out that the development of the auto mechanics program has contributed to a decrease in the number of drop outs at Maine East.

Business Manager Harold Markworth reported to the Board that the 1963-1964 budget will soon be ready for submission to the Finance Committee. Mr. William Newport, chairman of the Budget Committee, announced that there will be a meeting of the Finance Committee Monday evening, August 5, at which time the

1962-1964 budget will be reviewed. The Board approved Mr. Markworth's recommendation to place the budget on exhibit in the secretary's office August 15 to Sept. 14, in accordance with the law. Approval was also given for the publication of a notice establishing a public hearing on the budget, Saturday morning, September 14, at 9:00 A.M., in the Superintendent's office, room 138, Maine Township High School East.

The problem of smoking among high school students was discussed at the meeting. Under existing policy, students are not permitted to smoke in the school building or on the school site. Those who violate this policy are suspended from school for a period of one week. In discussing this problem of smoking, Dr. Karl W. Witte, Superintendent, called attention to the fact that there is increasing evidence that smoking among teenagers is harmful to health. Research both in Great Britain and in the United States tends to link excessive smoking to such diseases as lung cancer. He also called attention to the fact that smoking among minors is not legal in the State of Illinois. The most serious smoking problem occurs in the toilets at both Maine East and Maine West. He explained to the Board that it is not the policy of the school officials to place spies in those areas in order to catch students smoking. It was generally agreed that there should be an educational program in both schools during the coming year aimed at the elimination of smoking among young people. Dr. Witte noted that the National Congress of Parents and Teachers recently adopted a policy discouraging smoking among teenagers. The practice of suspending smokers from school for one week may be altered in an attempt to secure cooperation from the homes in the campaign against smoking. School officials are considering the possibility of sending smokers

home where the request that they must bring their parents to school for a discussion of the situation before the student will be readmitted. Board members expressed extreme concern at the apparent increase in the amount of smoking among high school students, both girls and boys. It was also suggested at the meeting that since possession of cigarettes in illegal, school officials might be justified in confiscating cigarettes that are carried in school by teenagers.

A leave of absence was granted Dorothy J. Kain, home economics teacher at Maine East, for reasons of health. She expects to return in 1964 following recovery.

With the appointments of the following list of teachers, Dr. Karl W. Witte reported that all the vacancies are now filled. He also called attention to the fact that resignations need not be accepted after July 1. He does not anticipate any additional resignations for the coming school year. Teachers appointed at the July meeting include:

Mr. Richard E. Beard, science, Maine East, Mr. Beard lives in Park Ridge and is a graduate of Northwestern University.

Miss Barbara J. Bolman, English, Maine West, Miss Bolman lives in Chicago. She has a Bachelor's degree from Northwestern University.

Miss Virginia Followell, assistant librarian, Maine East, her home is in Deerfield. She has a Master's degree in Library Science from the University of Illinois. Miss Followell has taught at Oregon State College, Glenbard High School and Limestone High School in Peoria, Illinois.

## Lutheran General Hospital News

A four-year residency program in pathology has been approved at Lutheran General Hospital, Park Ridge. The announcement was made by J. L. Jacobsen, executive director.

The approval was given by the American Board of Pathology and the Council on Medical Education and Hospitals of the American Medical Association.

Under the program, four residents will spend four years at Lutheran General studying to become hospital pathologists. The residents will have completed medical school and internship.

According to Dr. Jonas Valaitis, medical director of the hospital laboratory and chief pathologist, residents will spend two years in pathological anatomy and two years in clinical pathology.

Residents will be working under the supervision of Dr. Valaitis, Dr. Arthur Granston, Dr. James Shaffer, Dr. Sanford Franzblau and Dr. Arthur Dupe.

"We feel that this is very significant for Lutheran General Hospital. This marks an

important step in our medical education program," Jacobsen said. Jacobsen pointed out that Lutheran General is a teaching hospital. Its present program includes nursing education, graduate courses for physicians, pastoral care training, x-ray technician training and other educational programs.

The Lutheran Institute of Human Ecology, which operates Lutheran General, has plans for a medical college to be built in connection with Lutheran General.

## Postal Mail Boxes Need Refurbishing

A check on mail boxes in various post office districts indicate that mailing receptacles should undergo a vigorous refurbishing. Many whose specifications are otherwise of standard quality need paint and repairs. Others need to be replaced.

Make shift boxes for receiving mail are impractical and can result in serious loss to the owners. Cigar boxes, shoe boxes, small wooden boxes nailed to walls, cans and other variations of the same, fall entirely to carry out the final purpose of the mails-safe delivery.

A mail box should be made of durable material shaped to practically defined mail usage. It should easily be identified as a mail box. Boxes should be adequate in size, always in good condition and placed so as to be easily accessible to the name of the tenant should be placed on the box where it can be easily seen and read.

A good lock is an important part of any mail box. So many letters and parcels are delivered nowadays which contain

## Bar Mitzvah

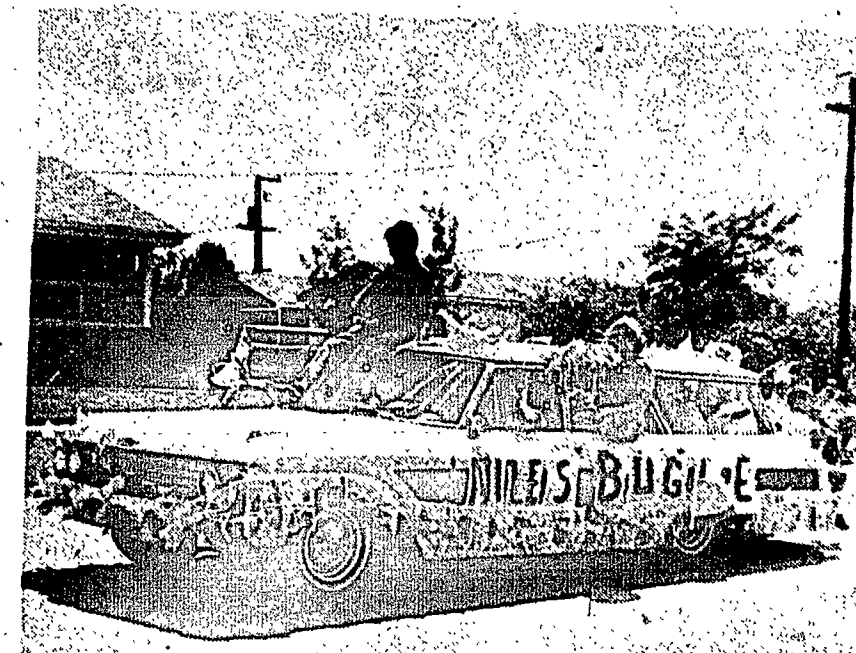

## Five New Precincts Added To Maine Township

It was announced late last week by County Clerk Edward J. Barrett that five new precincts have been added to Maine Township bringing the total to 95. In a letter to GOP Committeeman Floyd T. Fulle it was noted that as a result of a survey of voter registrations within the township it is necessary to divide five precincts, thus increasing the total number to 95.

Those precincts being divided, and their divisions, are as follows:

Precinct 28 in Park Ridge, divided generally north and south along Seeley Ave. The west portion to remain #28 and the east portion to become 91.

Precinct 56 in the southwest Des Plaines and adjacent unincorporated area, divided north and south along Douglas Ave. The west portion to remain #56 and the east portion to become 92.

Precinct 58 in the Niles area, divided east and west along Normal Ave. The south portion to remain as #58 and the north portion to become 93.

Precinct 78, in the unincorporated area in the north central section of the township, divided along an extension of Dee Rd, from Church St, north to and extension of Emerson and Kathy Lane to Western and then north to Golf rd. The western portion to remain as 78 and the eastern portion to become 95.

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


