New Copy Service At Niles Library

Instant photo-copies from book pages, magazines, newspapers, personal and business documents can now be made with the new DOLCLUST self-service photocopy machine recently installed in the Niles Public Library.

The head librarian, Mr. Francis S. Allen explained that the device is a fully automatic coin operated machine which offers students and the public an efficient and completely private method of copying data maintained for public reference in the library. Also, it is expected that the availability of this copying machine in the library will almost completely eliminate any mutilation or damage of books and periodicals due to "tearing out" by irresponsible people. It should also be very useful to the people in this area for inexpensive copying of personal and business papers with no damage whatever to the original material.

In just 30 seconds the unit copies anything placed on its glass top. One or even two pages at a time can be copied from books simply by placing the book on the glass. Pages 825-6207 any time after Sunday, Aug. 18.

pick up or solicit tickets for any organization.

A resolution by the village attorney was passed stating village ambulances be used only in cases of emergency—to deliver people to hospitals only. It also required doctors report if they are available for emergencies.

Wente said the chief of police and he traveled around the village and found at least 30 violations concerning hedge heights. It was found that these 4 or 5 foot hedges extended to the edge of driveways and to street corners. Since this is very dangerous for children, a plan to newspapers was made to play up these violations.

It was found that there are several new 1963 cars without vehicle tags, and dogs without licenses.

Water consumption for July 13 was 8,235,000 gals. of water with a 5,000,000 water reservoir. Village water storage must be increased as village increases, as was pointed out by Tr. Wente. Wente brought up the idea that another reservoir be located on forest preserve property adjacent to village.

Scheel proposed a resolution which was passed allowing Pryde, village manager, adequate expenses to attend an international city manager's meeting in Denver.

A resolution was passed raising the deposit for water bills from \$5 to \$20, also raising the fee for turning water on and off from \$1 to \$5.

Mayor Blase announced the presentation of the Niles Youth Commission, "Stage Struck" to be held Aug. 23 and 24.

So that there will be an ambulance at each station, the bids for a 1964 ambulance station wagon are as follows: Montgomery Olds, \$5,381.77; Park Ridge Ford, \$2,879.76; Highway Chevrolet, \$2,883.20; Courtesy Ford, \$2,877.00; Marconi Chevrolet, \$2,861.32. The bids were referred to the fire commission.

Meeting of Public Agencies Illinois Revised state statutes 1961-Chapter 102

AN ACT IN RELATION TO MEETINGS, Approved July 1, 1957

41. Public Policy Law is the public policy of this State that the public commissions, boards, and councils and the other public agencies in this State exist to aid in the conduct of the people's business. It is the intent of this Act that their actions be taken openly and that their official deliberations be conducted openly.

Lutheran 18, 19 Year School Opens Old Niles Boys September 3 Are Plaintiffs

St. John Lutheran Church - the oldest congregation in Niles will open the fall term of its elementary school on Tuesday, September 3rd. The church has maintained a Christian Day school for about 100 years. For about thirteen years prior to 1959, the congregation conducted a school in association with two other Lutheran churches, St. Paul's of Skokie and Jerusalem of Morton Grove. After the Skokie congregation reopened its own school, St. John of Niles and Jerusalem at Morton Grove continued to operate their joint school at Morton Grove for several years. In the fall of 1959, after a new school building had been erected St. John of Niles reopened its own school with a faculty of four teachers. During the past four years the school has enjoyed a steady growth. Many children had to be refused entry the last two years because the congregation was unable to add to its teaching staff, having suffered great financial loss when its church was destroyed by fire in January 1959.

Ronald J. Wojtas, 18, 7639 Neva and Ralph Schulz, 19, 7654 Nona, charge they were beaten and wrongfully held on February 24, 1962.

Mayor Nicholas Blase told THE BUGLE Tuesday night, the case was "a lot of nonsense," Blase said. "These are ridiculous charges, brought on by an attorney with an ax to grind, perhaps who has a personal problem with the village." Blase said "the village will follow (this case) thru to the end." Attorney Joel Sprayregen, defending the plaintiffs, has been elected counsel for the American Civil Liberties Union in Chicago. Persons whose civil rights had alleged to be violated are defended by the group.

Police Chief "Whitney" Emrikson said the charges were "absolutely baseless."

Emrikson and the police officers were called to a special meeting in Blase's Mayoral office Tuesday night, after Blase was informed of the action. It was assumed the men named in the civil action, were briefed by Blase, regarding public statements.

With the opening of the new school year, a fifth teacher will be added to the present staff. This will permit the school to increase its enrollment by 30 to 35 students. The school is operated and maintained primarily for the children of congregation members, but a considerable number of children of non-members also attend. The school will continue to accept non-member children as long as the classes do not become overcrowded.

Registration of children will take place at the school on Wednesday, August 21st from 2 to 3 and from 7 to 9 PM. Children of non-members may still be registered after that date by phoning the principal (825-6207).

The complaint alleges Lieutenant Dennis, then a sergeant, and plainclothesman, punched Wojtas several times while other policemen held him in the parking lot of St. John Lutheran Church. It was also alleged that the officers threatened to handcuff Schulze and hang him from the rafters of a near-by shack unless the youth told where they had supposedly dropped a bottle of beer in the snow, the complaint said.

A jury in Niles Township (Skokie) last November 30 found the youths innocent of loitering and disobeying a police officer.

Blase told THE BUGLE the village's "side to this happens."

DISTRICT 63 OPENS SCHOOL ON SEPT. 3

School will open Tuesday, Sept. 3, in East Maine School District 63.

All children except kindergarten children will attend a full-day session on the first day.

Junior high classes will begin 8:10 A.M., and school will close 3:20 P.M.

All other schools will begin 8:30 A.M., and will be dismissed for the morning session 11:45. Afternoon classes will be from 1 to 3 P.M.

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


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Maine High Prepares For Opening

Honor Teen Volunteers At Hospital


Teen-age volunteers at Lutheran General will be honored at a special program at 8 P.M., August 28. The program will be held in the hospital auditorium.

The cafeteria will serve a complete luncheon menu and no excursion will be far from the cafeteria or the dining room.

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
