New Copy Service At Niles Library

Instant photo-copies from book pages, magazines, newspapers, personal and business documents can now be made with the new DUCSTAT self-service photocopy machine recently installed in the Niles Public Library.

The head librarian, Mr. Francis S. Allen explained that the device is a fully automatic coin operated machine which offers students and the public an efficient and completely private method of copying data maintained for public reference in the library. Also, it is expected that the availability of this copying machine in the library will almost completely eliminate any mutilation or damage of books and periodicals due to "tearing out" by irresponsible people. It should also be very useful to the people in this area for inexpensive copying of personal and business papers with no damage whatever to the original material.

pick up or collect tickets for any organization.

A resolution by the village attorney was passed stating village ambulances be used only in cases of emergency—to deliver people to hospitals only. It also required doctors report if they are available for emergencies.

Wente said the chief of police and he traveled around the village and found at least 30 violations concerning hedge heights. It was found that these 4 or 5 foot hedges extended to the edge of driveways and to street corners. Since this is very dangerous for children, a plea to newspapers was made to play up these violations.

It was found that there are several new 1963 cars without vehicle tags, and dogs without licenses.

Water consumption for July 13 was 8,235,000 gals. of water with a 5,000,000 water reservoir. Village water storage must be increased as village increases, as was pointed out by Tr. Wente. Wente brought up the idea that another reservoir be located on forest preserve property adjacent to village.

Schoel proposed a resolution which was passed allowing Pryde, village manager, adequate expenses to attend an international city manager's meeting in Denver.

A resolution was passed raising the deposit for water bills from \$5 to \$20, also raising the fee for turning water on and off from \$1 to \$5.

Mayor Blase announced the presentation of the Niles Youth Commission, "Stage Struck" to be held Aug. 23 and 24.

So that there will be an ambulance at each station, the bids for a 1964 ambulance station wagon are as follows: Montgomery Olds, \$3,380.27; Park Ridge Ford, \$2,879.76; Highway Chevrolet, \$2,989.90; Compu Ford, \$2,877.00; Mancuso Chevrolet, \$2,861.32; A resolution was passed that the bids be directed to the fire commission and then reported back to the trustees.

Bids for the resurfacing of streets owned by Milwaukee, Oakton, Niles and Howard are as follows: Arco, \$14,450.85 with a certified check of \$5000; Allied Asphalt, \$19,822.85 with a certified check of \$5000; Mayer, \$50,972.00 with a certified check of \$5000; Monarch Asphalt, \$31,992.00 with a certified check of \$5000; Nacey Co., \$50,082.10 with a certified check of \$5000. The bids were referred to the engineer.

In the matter of old bus-

Shapiro, owner of a partnership, designed for senior citizens, came before the board asking that he be removed for a period from the regulation of renting only to elderly people. Tr. Schmitz denied the denial for this resolution. Bruno suggested that they leave this regulation until the last Thursday of September so that Mr. Shapiro could improve his condition but this was denied. A proposal for 50% of unoccupied units be filled with families of 3 people with pre-school children was also denied. The chairman set up a meeting at 8:00 on Sat. for the Public Works Dept. with Mr. Shapiro, who is requested to arrive at 10:00. This matter was tabled to the next meeting.

Sears, Roebuck & Co. thanked the Police Department for its vigilance, and the Fire Department for the fire of July 16 which they put out.

Permission was granted for a dance to be held by the Fire Benevolent Association on January 25, 1964.

A request was made for the vacation of an alley in the area of Franks Ave. and the forest preserve.

An annexation and rezoning request for property east of Goodiana Curwash and west of St. Isaac Jogues for a driving golf range was made. The matter was referred to the plan commission.

A resolution was passed that money from the motor fuel tax fund be used for a traffic signal at Dempster & Cumberland.

For July, 75 calls for Fire Dept., 681 calls for Police Dept., 456 calls for Public Works Dept., 30 permits issued by the Building Commission, \$3,400 collected by the Judicial Clerk, Treasurer report, \$191,000.72, Accounts payable \$104,334.90.

An ordinance was adopted giving residents a 30 day warning to put in sidewalks on the north side of Oakton and the east side of Greendale and the west side of Washington. It was passed that cement sidewalks be put in on Dempster, east side of Ozark and the west side of Washington.

Sidewalks on east side of Harlem between Main and Oakton not put in because of dirt piled there from sewers on opposite side of street. A resolution was passed for a written ordinance to be drawn up and passed when the sidewalks are able to be put in.

President of Inequal Terrace Association wants to save Jongul Terrace Park, which is up for sale, 65% of the home-owners want the park board to buy the 5 acre property. A resolution is to be drawn to ask the park district that this property be retained as a park.

It was reported that the survey commission has not yet decided to make Keepey a one way street, but it seems very likely to happen.

Dr. Foggers came up with the complaint that if leukemia should become a reportable disease, why shouldn't other killing diseases such as heart trouble and cancer also be reportable diseases? The doctor then asked if patients with serious illnesses costing in the neighborhood of \$20,000 to \$30,000 for hospital care be permitted to use the ambulances for transportation to save extra expenses. He was told to have his patients use Blue Shield insurance plans.

It was reported by the village clerk that \$100,000 was put in 50 bank notes with 2.7% interest.

Mayor Blase expressed sympathy concerning the death of village engineer, Harold Olson's wife.

The meeting was adjourned to August 27th.

Meeting of Public Agencies

Illinois Revised state statutes 1961-Chapter 102

AN ACT IN RELATION TO MEETINGS, Approved July 1, 1957

41. Public Policy. It is the public policy of this State that the public commissions, boards, and councils and the other public agencies in this State exist to aid in the conduct of the people's business. It is the intent of this Act that their actions be taken openly and that their official deliberations be conducted openly.

42. All official meetings to be open to public—Exceptions. 2. All official meetings at which any legal action is taken by the governing bodies of the State, counties, townships, cities, villages, incorporated towns, school districts and all other municipal corporations, boards, bureaus or commissions of this State which are supported in whole or in part by tax revenue, shall be public meetings, except for deliberations for decisions of the Illinois Commerce Commission and Illinois Parlor and Follies Board, meetings where the acquisition for sale of property is being considered, provided that no other portion of such meetings shall be closed to the public, and where the constitution provides that a governmental unit can hold secret meetings.

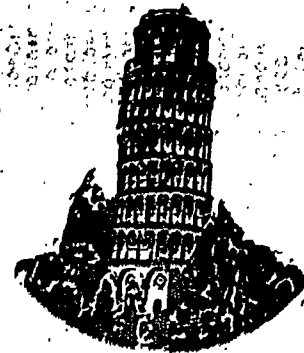
Nothing in this section shall be construed to prevent the governing body of any agency of government from holding executive sessions to consider information regarding employment or dismissal of an employee provided that no final action for employment or dismissal shall be taken in an executive session. Nothing in this section shall be construed to prevent an agency of government from holding an executive session when Federal regulation requires it.

43. Writ of Mandamus. 3. Where the provisions of this Act are not complied with, the court may, in its discretion, issue writ of mandamus requiring that a meeting be open to the public at large.

44. Penalties. 4. Any person violating any of the provisions of this Act shall, upon conviction, be punished by a fine of not more than \$100 or by imprisonment in the county jail for not more than 30 days, or by both such fine and imprisonment.

We've covered several hundred meetings during the past years, and have seen this statute abused consistently. Never has it been more evident than in school district 70 in Mokena.

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Lutheran School Opens Old Niles Boys September 3 18, 19 Year Are Plaintiffs

St. John Lutheran Church—the oldest congregation in Niles will open the fall term of its elementary school on Tuesday, September 3rd. The church has maintained a Christian Day school for about 100 years. For about thirteen years prior to 1959, the congregation conducted a school in association with two other Lutheran churches, St. Paul's of Skokie and Jerusalem of Morton Grove. After the Skokie congregation reopened its own school, St. John of Niles and Jerusalem on Morton Grove continued to operate their joint school at Morton Grove for several years. In the fall of 1959, after a new school building had been erected St. John of Niles reopened its own school with a faculty of four teachers. During the past four years the school has enjoyed a steady growth. Many children had to be refused entry the last two years because the congregation was unable to add to its teaching staff, having suffered great financial loss when its church was destroyed by fire in January 1959.

With the opening of the new school year, a fifth teacher will be added to the present staff. This will permit the school to increase its enrollment by 30 to 35 students. The school is operated and maintained primarily for the children of congregation members, but a considerable number of children of non-members also attend. The school will continue to accept non-member children as long as the classes do not become overcrowded.

Registration of children will take place at the school on Wednesday, August 21st from 2 to 5 and from 7 to 9 P.M. Children of non-members may still be registered after that date by phoning the principal and asking for an appointment (825-6207).

All the members of last year's faculty will return. They are Mrs. Alex Schmidt - kindergarten; Mrs. Dorothy Mueller - Grades 1 & 2; Mr. Ronald Marten - Grades 3 & 4; Mr. G.A. Schmitz - Grades 5 & 6; Mr. Schmitz is also the school principal.

The school was very fortunate in adding to its staff the new teacher, Miss Judy Koch.

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A \$200,000 suit charging false arrest and police brutality was filed in U. S. District Court Tuesday against the village of Niles, police lieutenant Edward Dennis, Police chief Clarence Emrikson, and six other Niles policemen. The suit asks that the plaintiffs receive the \$200,000 for punitive damages and that the police stop harassing them.

Ronald J. Wojtas, 18, 7639 New, and Ralph Schulte, 19, 7654 Nova, charge they were beaten and wrongfully held on February 24, 1962.

Mayor Nicholas Blase told THE BUGLE Tuesday night, the case was "a lot of nonsense." Blase said "These are ridiculous charges, brought on by an attorney with an ax to grind, perhaps who has a personal problem with the village." Blase said "the village will follow (this case) thru to the end."

Attorney Joel Sprayregen, defending the plaintiffs, has been chief counsel for the American Civil Liberties Union in Chicago. Persons whose civil rights have alleged to be abused, are defended by the group.

Police Chief "Whittay" Emrikson said the charges were "absolutely baseless."

Emrikson and the police officers were called to a special meeting in Blase's Mayor's office Tuesday night, after Blase was informed of the action. It was assumed the men named in the civil action, were briefed by Blase, regarding public statements.

The complaint alleges Lieutenant Dennis, then a sergeant, and plainclothesman, punched Wojtas several times while other policemen held him in the parking lot of St. John Lutheran Church. It was also alleged that the officers threatened to handcuff Schulte and hang him from the rafters of a nearby shack unless the youth told where they had supposedly dropped a bottle of beer in the snow, the complaint said.

A jury in Niles Township (Skokie) last November 30 found the youths innocent of torturing and disobeying a police officer.

Blase told THE BUGLE the village's "side to this happen-

All children except kindergarten children will attend a full-day session on the first day.

Junior high classes will begin 8:10 A.M. and school will close 3:20 P.M.

All other schools will begin 8:30 A.M. and will be dismissed for the morning session 11:45. Afternoon classes will be from 1 to 3 P.M.

Parents of kindergarten children will complete enrollment details Tuesday, Sept. 3. Kindergarten children will begin regular classes Wednesday, Sept. 4.

Bus routes and schedules will be mailed prior to the first day to all children for whom transportation is necessary. Bus transportation is payable in advance during the first week.

A quarter hour weekly discussion program sponsored by the Chicago Urban League will be heard at 11:30 P.M. Thursdays over Radio Station WOPA, 1490 on the AM dial.

The program, titled "Face It," will deal with Negroes' problems in the areas of housing, employment, medical opportunities, education, labor unions and welfare, said Edwin C. Berry, executive director of the interracial civic agency. The first program to be broadcast this Thursday, "Bias Behind the Footlights," will deal with the problems which Negro actors encounter. Members of the cast of "The Blacks," the Jean Genet play now at the Studebaker Theatre, will tell personal stories of actors' problems.

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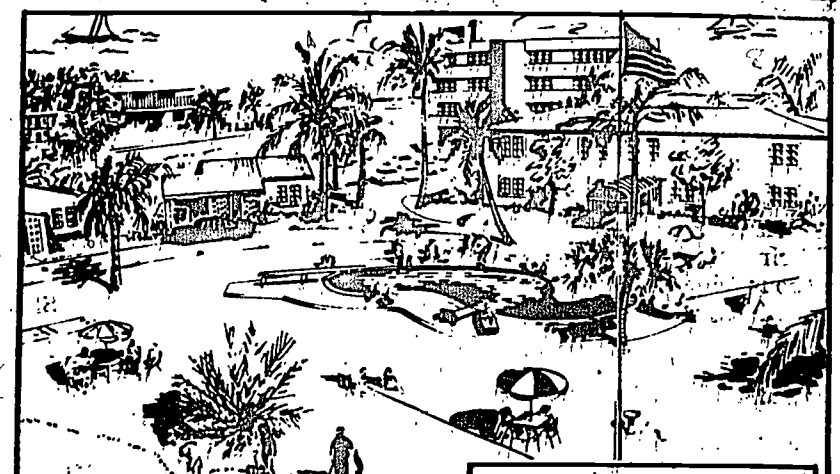
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Maine High Prepares For Opening

Honor Teen Volunteers At Hospital

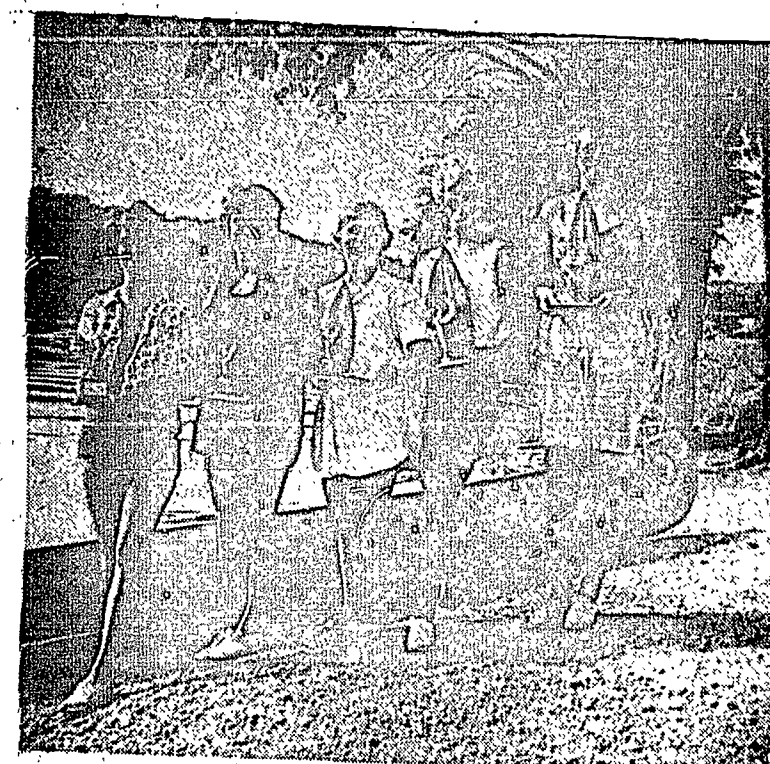
Teen-age volunteers at Lutheran General will be honored at a special program at 8 P.M., August 28. The program will be held in the hospital auditorium.
