sibly tempt anyone enough to want to taste or chew on it. The truth of the matter is that children and adults for some unfathomable reason are tantalized indeed, and chew they will-even though the results are extremely dangerous, and some-times tragic.

How would a parent know if a child suffered from this lead poisoning? The child would experience frequent vomiting stomach pain and headaches; and there may be spasms or muscle weakness. If this should be the case the child should receive medical care AT ONCE.

Although many new paint products are lead free, many more still have a high lead content. However, labels clearly state degree of lead content and the alert consumer notes this. Ideally, lead free paint should be used indoors. When painting furniture, toys or any objects for children's use, lead free paint is a must.

The old adage, "An ownce of prevention is worth a pound of cyre," never was more appropriate than in this simal-ion. Parents should be con-stantly vigilant, NEVER per-mitting children to chew on painted surfaces; and old fla-king painte a number one sus-pect, should be eliminated.

### First Hand Eye View Of Monmouth Fires

( Former BUGLER Owen Gaede, now a student and radio announcer in Monmouth, Illinois, reports first-hand about the rash of fires which broke-out in the town two weeks

Since the Monmouth fires, I've been kept pretty busy at WRAM, All kinds of radio and television stations have been calling WRAM for Beepers' (reports), so I have spoken on radio stations all around the midwest including Milwaukee, St. Louis; Macomb; Moline Springfield and leven appeared on WOC-Ty in Dayenport, Iowa. It has really been quite an experience. I also had to help guard part of the town one night. I'll never forget that Monday night! We had just started our

fraternity meeting and suddenly the fire sirenblew. Nobody paid much attention to it until after the meeting. Then a few fellows went to see where the fire was. I had some work to do, so I ig-nored the fire. Around 12:30 a.m., just as I was about to get undressed, a few of the fellows came running into the house shouting something about a second fire and volunteers being needed. This was too much to fignore. Two fires at the same time in Monmouth! I grabbed my coat and jumped into the car. We drove the eight blocks and suddenly I could see the flames, leaping almost a hundred feetmaybe even more-into the sky. We parked the car, jumped out, and ran. We arrived at the fire just as the fireengines were arriving and they needed all types of help. I found myself pulling hoses off of the truck. I can still see the flames as they

climbed into the sky, still feel the heat on my face, and still feel the chill that raced up my spine when I saw the high ten-sion wires begin to fall. Ten thousand volts, arced across the street, the wires dancing like snakes, whipping all around, and each time it would touch the ground, a spark so bright it would light up the sky and momentarily blind you. It was really like a nightmare. The firemen were confused and helpless. They couldn't turn

It took two hours to get the fire under control. The town never reached the state of panic as some newspapers alledged. but there sure was an uneasy feeling. Everyone who had guns got them out, and many store owners sat up all night guarding homes and stores. One of these citizens decided to take a coffee break about 2:30 a.m. He left the place which he had been regarding the Monmouth Metal Culvert Co., said "goodbye to his neighbor across the street, and drove six blocks
