

Your Health Board Speaks

The recent upsurge in incidence of lead poisoning comes as a surprise to most adults for they reason that anything as unpalatable as a painted window sill or furniture could not possibly tempt anyone enough to want to taste or chew on it. The truth of the matter is that children and adults for some unfathomable reason are tantalized indeed, and chew they will—even though the results are extremely dangerous, and sometimes tragic.

How would a parent know if a child suffered from this lead poisoning? The child would experience frequent vomiting, stomach pain and headaches, and there may be spasms of muscle weakness. If this should be the case the child should receive medical care AT ONCE.

Although many new paint products are lead free, many more still have a high lead content. However, labels clearly state degree of lead content and the alert consumer notes this. Ideally, lead free paint should be used indoors. When painting furniture, toys or any objects for children's use, lead free paint is a must.

The old adage, "An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure," never was more appropriate than in this situation. Parents should be constantly vigilant, NEVER permitting children to chew on painted surfaces; and old flaking paint, a number one suspect, should be eliminated.

ately \$7,500 will be included in this increase, if the recommendation for the increase is approved as anticipated.

Ironically, Niles' Mayor Blase led the campaign last year for Niles village court, even though it was contrary to the feeling of most responsible legal groups throughout the state. Blase spearheaded the drive for the court's passage, but never mentioned about the increased court facilities. About 10% of Niles electorate approved the new court set-up.

When Smigel's new judgeship was in jeopardy, Blase went to Springfield and aided in the fight to make Niles newly-created court, eligible for the new court system, which would enable Smigel to head a village court at the expected \$28,000 per year.

After 10% of Niles electorate approved the new court system Blase announced "The people had spoken." But when he proposed a new village court building, which was not previously mentioned, but necessary for Smigel's new judgeship, he said the people would never approve it, so he led the way for using the people's money, in the form of using surplus accounts, rather than risking losing a new courtroom in a referendum.

As the result of the \$200,000 approval for the court and the police station, Nilesites will be paying for a courtroom, which may be presided over by outside judges, who will be trying cases other than of Nilesites. Nilesites will be footing the bills, the new judgeship will be receiving \$28,000, and Mayor Blase may have built himself a future high-salaried job. He has mentioned he does not intend being Mayor more than one more term. Six years from now there might be a vacancy in the Niles court for a \$28,000 job.

Blase On The Court

Dear Mr. BEASSET

It is a shame that our Village Board can't always agree with you on what is best for the Village of Niles. It is also a shame that you become so cross whenever we seem to disagree with you, and in haste to get back at us, you have again misquoted some of the facts. We are talking now in regard to the new Village facilities which you have been against since the inception of the idea.

1. You state in your paper that there was no notice of the special meeting, and yet you were at the board meeting when we set the date for the special meeting. Don't you listen at our board meetings?

2. You asked me why were we having ground breaking ceremonies in such a rush fashion, and I explained that a cornerstone was to be laid in the near future, at which time a formal ground breaking ceremony will be held including all homeowners' associations.

3. You keep mentioning increased court facilities, which you insisted are geared strictly for Judge Anton Smigel. The fact is, Mr. Beassey, and you are aware of it, the facilities in our present Village Hall will be occupied entirely by the Village Clerk's Office. This includes the present courtroom, and therefore Village Board meetings as well as court hearings will have to be moved to other facilities.

4. You stated because 10% of the people of the Village of Niles voted at a certain election, this was not the voice of the people. It seems to be that the only time the voice of the people is heard is when they go along with you.

5. Again, you are confused about who will pay the salary of the judge of the Village Court. Under the new setup the Judge and the Court Clerk will be paid by the County and the State. The only facilities the Village makes available is the courtroom itself. In the past we had to pay a clerk and a judge, we no longer have to do this. At the same time we are still able to keep certain lines in the Village of Niles.

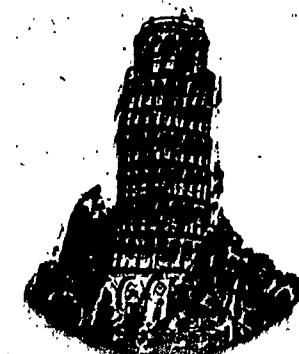
6. You stated that we would finance the building with tax anticipation warrants. I explained to you prior to your editorial that we would not use tax anticipation warrants, but working capital bonds, which will be of greater advantage to the Village and at a less rate of interest.

It seems to me, Dave, that you are not really aware of what the new court system means and because you are unfamiliar with the facts, you are constantly running into the problem of misquoting figures, etc. I agree that not too many people are aware of what the new court system is, but this does not excuse you from quoting as a master when you are not fully aware of the facts.

Residents, trustees and this newspaper, have unsuspectingly been led like lambs by Mayor Blase, by not understanding a complicated issue, and not taking the time to realize Blase's personal efforts will cost every resident money, while he represented a future client of his, to the costly disadvantage of every Nilesite.

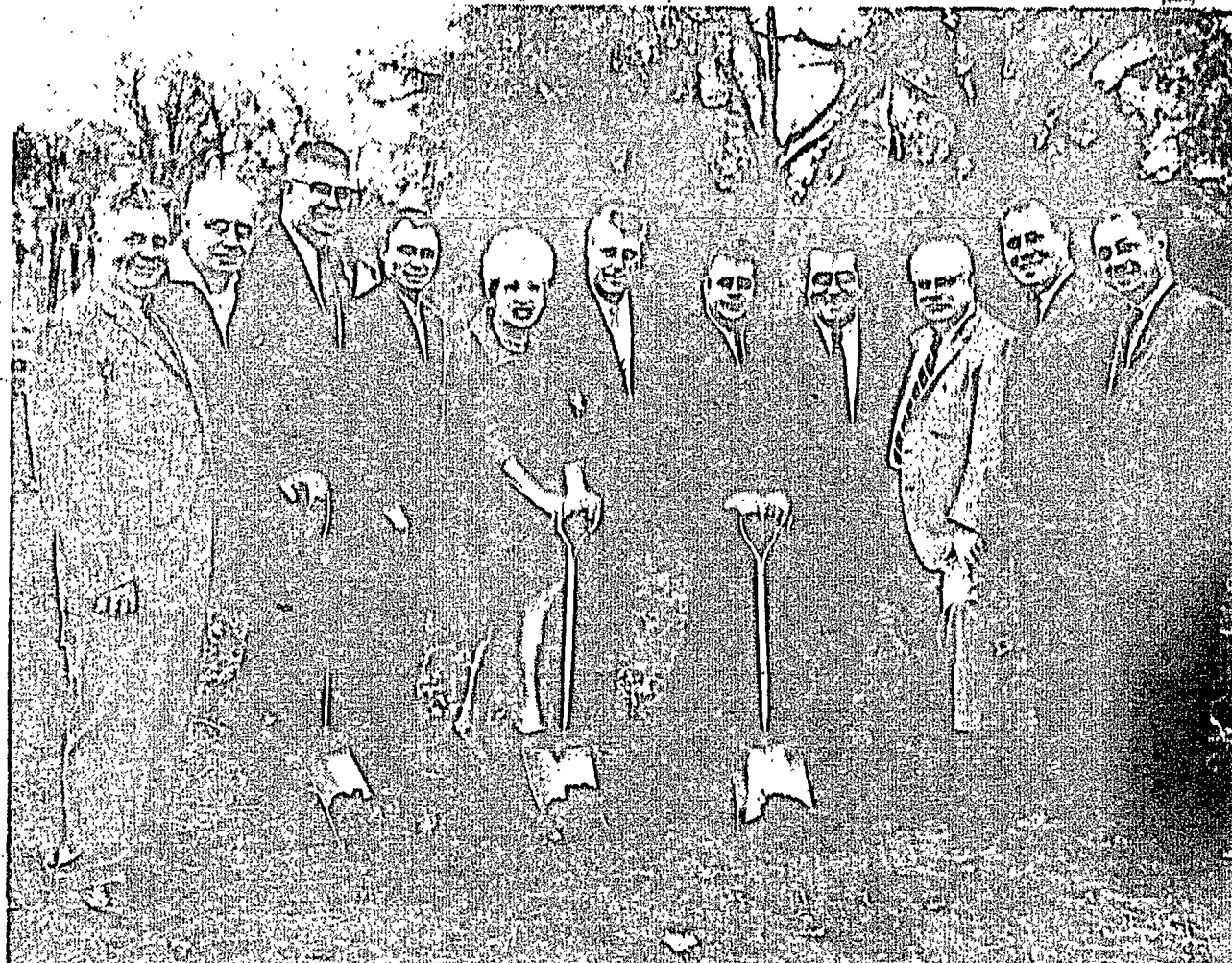
Last week when we mentioned Judge Smigel would receive a bump in his salary from \$7,500 to \$28,000, we were really aware that Blase made a major effort in securing this high-salaried judgeship. While the salary is being paid by all residents in the county and state, the need for Smigel to serve the new court necessitated a new courtroom. At no time prior to the village court vote did Blase, who led the fight for the court, mention that the new court would be needed.

After the court referendum Blase led the way for a new courtroom, by campaigning under the needs for other facilities. He sold this to the obvious need for larger police quarters, and in the process, he led the way for a new courtroom. Trustees, understanding the need for more village clerk facilities and police headquarters, thought the Blase-led plan a good one and readily agreed to it. While it was first explained that the new building would come out of excess funds (the water fund), it comes out that the village will have to pay for it. The estimated cost of around \$150,000 is now up to \$200,000.

Blase contends there will be no tax increase. This is correct. But he does not mention that the use of funds for this purpose, prevents the use of NILESITES' money for other purposes. This is the spending of any village's money, no matter from what source, is costing taxpayers.

You might ask, "What's in it for Blase?" There is one area which has long disturbed us, and which seems to be a conflict of interests. Blase is representing Judge Smigel as an attorney. Normally this is none of my business, nor yours. But when Nilesites have to pay for a courtroom which

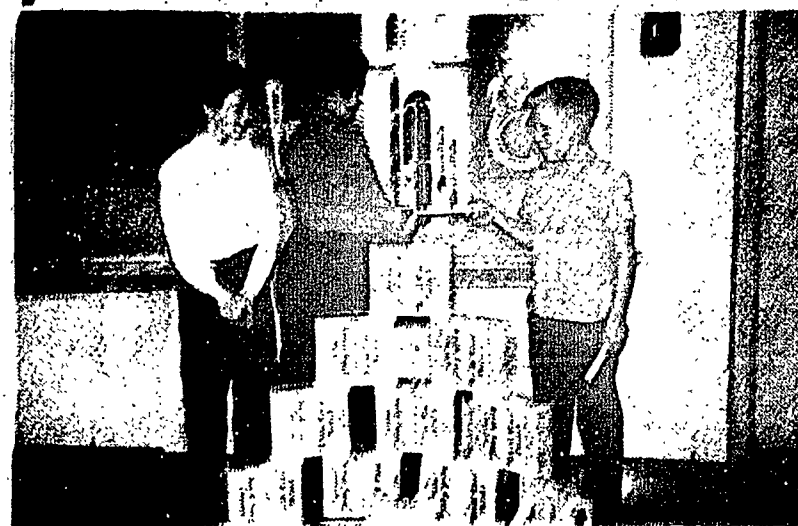
As vice-presidents, they are also members of the Illinois Municipal League's Executive Committee.

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Review Of Maine High October Meeting

New attendance areas for the 1964-1965 school year for Township High School District No. 207 were established at the regular meeting of the Board of Education held in the office of the superintendent at Maine Township High School East on Monday, October 21, 1963.

The Board approved the recommendation of Superintendent Earle W. Wilse and named the center of Oakton Street as the Boundary line separating the Maine South and the Maine East attendance areas.

All children living West of the Des Plaines River will attend Maine Township High School West in 1964-1965. All students living South of the center line of Oakton Street, including those in the Pennoyet area and East of the Des Plaines River, will attend Maine Town-

ship High School South. Those living North of the center line of Oakton Street will attend Maine Township High School East.

In making his recommendation for Oakton Street as the boundary line, Dr. Wilse pointed out three advantages. They are:

- (1) It will recognize a maximum number of existing elementary and Junior High school boundaries.
- (2) It will allow for the future growth at Maine East where growth is sure to come.
- (3) It takes into account distances from schools and equalizes them as far as possible.

The Board approved the appointment of Mr. T. Nathan Pohl as assistant business manager. Mr. Pohl will replace Mr. Frank Zelek, who recently resigned. Mr. Pohl was business manager of North Park College from 1957 to 1962. Presently he is working as a supervising accountant for J. E. Smith Anderson, Inc., industrial land developers. Mr. Pohl is a candidate for the master's degree in Southern Illinois University and expects to receive the degree in June, 1964.

A new policy regarding employment of husband and wife was approved at the meeting. The old policy under which the Board has operated for fifteen years stated that two members of the same family may not teach in the school district. This policy was established when there was only one high school. The new policy will permit the employment of husband and wife, but they cannot be assigned to teach in the same school building. It is expected that the change in policy will facilitate employment of capable and qualified teachers for the coming school year.

A progress report concerning the construction work at Maine Township High School South was made by Mr. Don Stillwag, architect for the building. He said that work is ahead of schedule in all areas with the exception of the auditorium which is approximately a month behind.

Building Committee Chairman W. Bert Ball announced that the paving project along Hamilton Avenue, in connection with Subdivision No. 2, must be delayed. This has been brought about by the fact that the exact boundaries of Hamilton

Avenue have not yet been established. A second survey was authorized in order to determine the exact location of the center of the proposed Hamilton Avenue extension.

The Board considered a communication from a committee of the teaching staff requesting a meeting between the Teachers' Salary Committee and the Finance Committee of the

Board of Education. This meeting will take place Monday evening, November 4, 1963, at Maine Township High School East in the Faculty Study.

There will be a special meeting of the Board on January 13, 1964, for the purpose of receiving, considering, and discussing a report of the guidance program for Township High School District No. 207.
