Fire Department Warns Nilesites Of X-33 Repellent

The following information has been received by the Niles Fire Department from Commissioner George F. Larrick of the Food and Drug Administration.

"Householders and others who have purchased X-33 Water Repellent, an extremely flammable masonry water proofing distributed by the Wilmington Chemical Corporation of Chicago, should return it immediately to their dealers. They should not try to destroy or dispose of the product themselves without first consulting their local fire departments."

The X-33 product first appeared on the market early in 1962. As manufactured up until two to three months ago, it had a flash point (the lowest temperature at which the fumes or vapor from a liquid will ignite when exposed to a flame or spark) of 40 degrees below zero. The product manufactured since then has been changed and has a flash point of 73 degrees above zero.

Labels on the cans do not indicate which product is which.

during this event seek employment elsewhere since they did not understand their jobs. This kind of garbage editorial would befit the days of yellow journalism around the turn of the century.

Balancing the many life-saving, beyond-the-call-of-duty efforts made by these men, against this one error, it leaves a rather top-sided scale. Some underpaid editorial writer, whose greatest danger is balancing himself on a bar-stool,

should spend a week, or a day, racing around Niles on ambulance-duty. His blanket condemnation, so easily done behind a typewriter, was unjust. Arm-chair commandoes should get off their duffers once in a while and get out in the field. The world isn't neatly painted in the black and white that is etched from a typewriter. There's a great deal of black and blue, and a steady run of red, which cannot be seen, nor can it be typed from behind an L. C. Smith.

Ken Scheel filled in for Mayor Blase, chairing last week's trustee meeting. After a shaky beginning Scheel handled himself masterfully.

Blase, who is leading a tour of European capitals with some members of the Olympic team, better stay home next time. Scheel seemed to gain momentum as the meeting progressed, and enjoyed every minute, as the man with the gavel. Earl Epstein, school board 63 member, mentioned that it was one of the best conducted meetings he had seen, comparing it favorably with Glenview's village meetings.

As a trustee Scheel has been pretty much of a hard-nose. He's proven himself to the truculent, bittily-sarcastic, and has shown a red-faced temper, when he wasn't getting his own way. But moving into the number one chair, he was conciliatory, appeasing, firm without showing signs of rancor, and treated the most unfriendly with equanimity.

Blase believes he's ashoo-in for next year's Mayor's election. But if Scheel decides to go for the top post Blase will have his hands full. It would prove to be a real dogfight.

Contrary to the feelings of most suburban snobs, it has long been our feeling that these aborted suburbs are little more than extensions of Chicago. Having separate school districts is a good example of the idiosyncrasy which exists in such areas. The discrimination of district #63 children, who have no industry money, and thus less courses, than neighboring districts, is downright robbing the children of the poorer districts of the advantages of their richer cousins.

Now, with the fire department incident, it would seem that a consolidation of all suburban area fire departments into one autonomous body, would make much sense. This too, applies to public works and police departments. The savings of money in duplication of equipment and in the overpayment of supplies is obvious. The problem concerning districts would long have been resolved if one fire-fighting force represented the entire area. Why Niles, then Morton Grove, then Park Ridge should all buy similar equipment for their departments, is foolhardy, expensive and unnecessary.

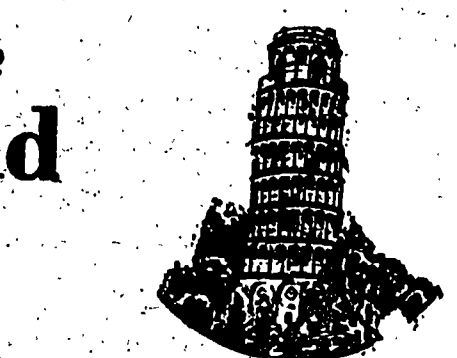

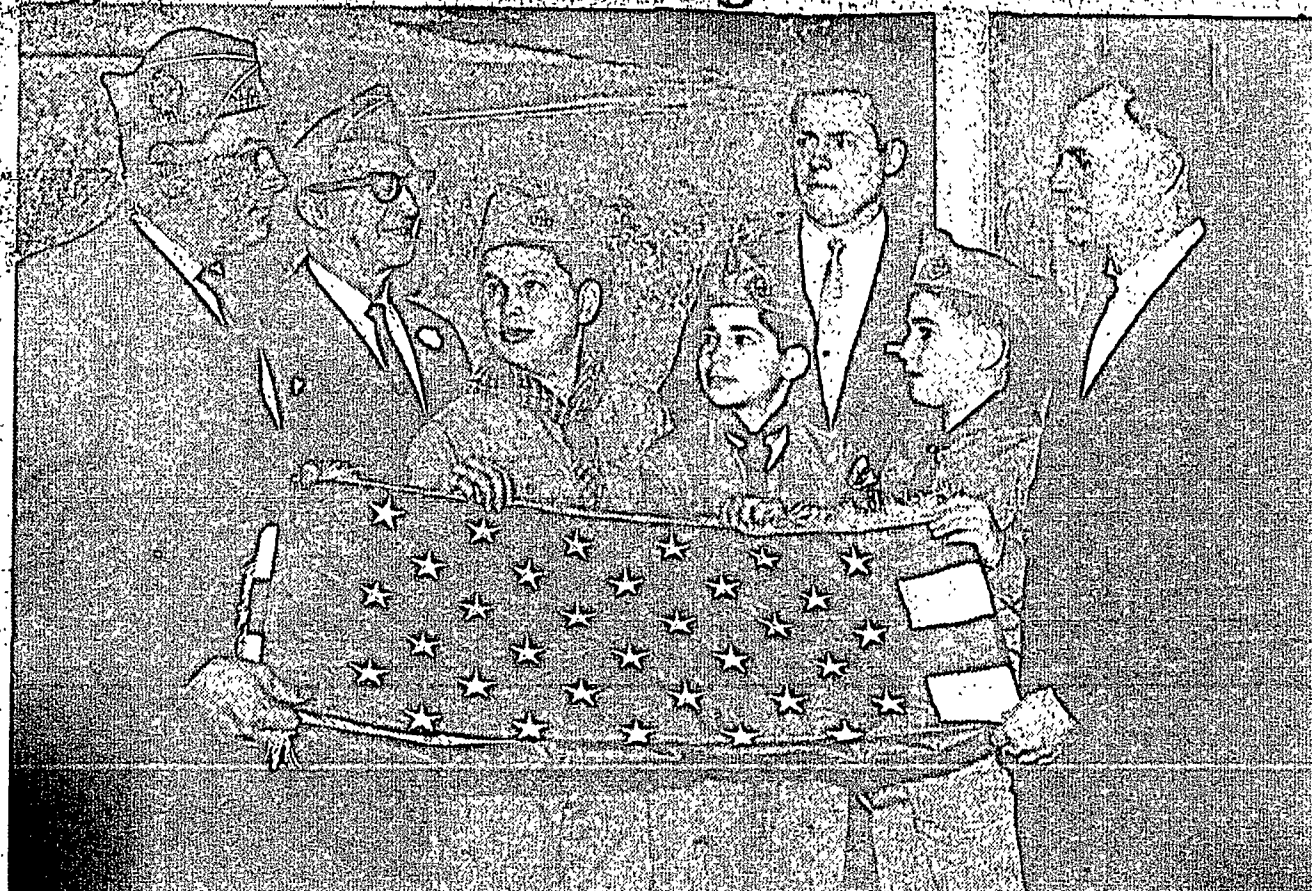

BLASE BLASTS STATE FIRE MARSHAL'S REMARKS

VFW #7712 Gives Flag To Ballard School Cowhey's Remarks 'Contemptuous'



Mayor Blase, returning from a European trip, backed up the fire department, while lashing out at State Fire Marshal William Cowhey, for his statements regarding the recent fire-fatality at Greenwood and Dempster. Blase said Cowhey's remarks were "contemptuous". Blase added Cowhey's blaming the village in this incident "takes the burden off his (Cowhey's) back". Blase said the problem, regarding the fire department's staying within its own district, is the result of state districting policies. Blase said Cowhey lays the blame on the village "without knowing what he is talking about".

Trustee Angie Marcheschi led the way for the backing of the department after mentioning Niles firemen are trained to fight fires and save lives. He noted Niles ambulance was first on the scene, preceding Morton Grove's and Des Plaines' ambulances. Marcheschi said, "I feel the officer on duty at station number 2 used proper judgement, and that this

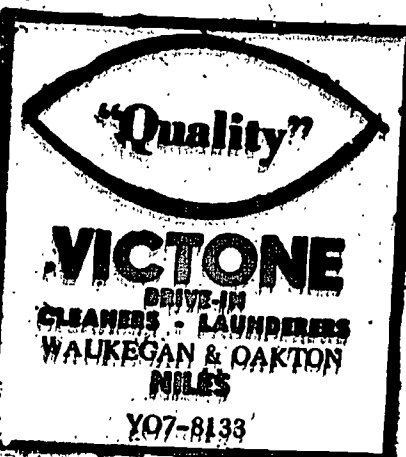
include plenty of time for questions and answers on football and on Galimore's seven years as an NFL star, Dick Les said.

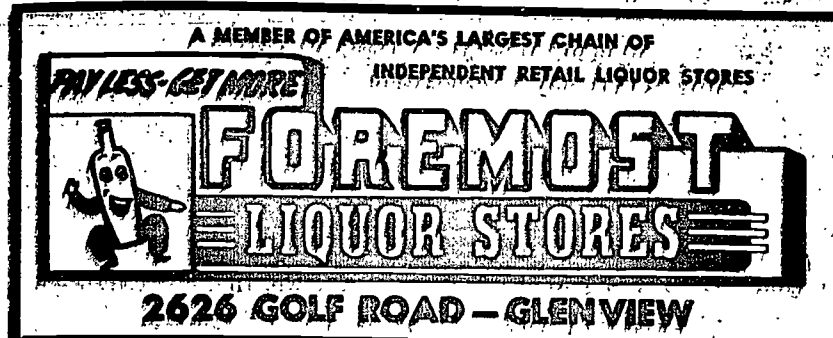

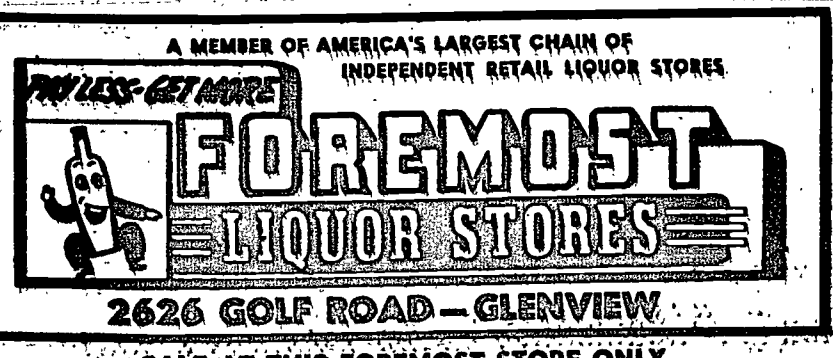

Hyperbaric Center To Be Open

The new \$1 million hyperbaric (high pressure) oxygen research center at Lutheran General Hospital, 1775 Dempster Street, Park Ridge, will be open for public inspection from 1 to 4:30 p.m. Saturday and Sunday, March 7 and 8.

"We are pleased to invite the public to view our new research facility," said T. L. Jacobsen, executive director of Lutheran General and Deaconess Hospitals.

"We hope that all visitors to the center will be able to see the new facility. It will be an important step in the treatment of patients with various types of illness and injuries."

The John A. Hartford Hyperbaric Oxygen Research Center was recently completed at a cost of \$1 million. It houses the world's largest hyperbaric oxygen center.

Included in the center are three large steel chambers up to 42 feet long and up to 12 feet in diameter. Research will be conducted in such areas as blue babies, heart and stroke victims and other types of illness and injuries.

In hyperbaric (or high pressure) oxygen, a person is placed under three times normal atmospheric pressure by means of compressed air. He is then given oxygen to breathe which enables his system to absorb up to 15 times the amount of oxygen he would normally receive.

"We hope the public will take advantage of this opportunity to view the center. After this open house, we will no longer be able to have it open to the public as this is part of our surgical area," Jacobsen stated.

The school population is about evenly divided and the classes are about equal with some 1100 in each except for a freshman class of about 850.
