

Postpone Nilehi Tax Referendum

The Board of Education of the Niles Township High Schools recently decided against having a referendum next spring asking for a raise in the high school district's educational fund tax levy.

Prior to the budget planning meeting of February 13, there was some discussion whether to include in the April 11 annual school board election a request to raise the educational fund tax maximum.

The present tax limit on this fund, which consists of appropriations for salaries and instructional supplies and equipment, is \$8.791 per hundred dollars of assessed property valuation. This current maximum was approved by the voters of Niles Township in 1958.

It is possible that the high school Board of Education may call for a referendum to increase the educational fund tax limit next fall.

School officials have said there is not adequate time now to prepare for a tax raise in the spring election to benefit the budgeting for 1964-65. They believe the schools can manage financially through the next fiscal year.

The present tax limit, school officials said, is inadequate for the educational conditions and demands of today. Although they agree that the schools will be able to manage during the 1964-65 school year without any loss to the education of the youngsters, they believe that the ever increasing high school enrollment combined with the needs for better staff salaries and general upward trend in costs have made it necessary for the school board to consider asking the voters to increase the tax levy limit in the not too distant future.

Richard H. Freeman, 2224 Birchwood Court, Glenview, the original candidate, selected February 24, had to withdraw his candidacy for business reasons. He is being transferred to another area, and would not be available to serve on the high school board.

Candidates who were presented before the full caucus February 24 included Richard T. Pearman, 7441 Churchill St., Morton Grove, and Allen Schwartz, 8940 Church, Des Plaines. Pearman and Freeman were selected by the Caucus nominating committee while Schwartz was nominated by a fellow-caucus member the night of the meeting. Previously, the nominating committee had interviewed several candidates, including Schwartz, before narrowing their choices to Freeman and Pearman.

Monday night the same procedures will take place, with Caucus-selected candidates and those nominated from the floor competing for the high school board seat.

School district 63 now has one resident, Walter Craigie, 8316 Merrill, Niles, serving on the Maine High School Board.

In the by-laws of the new group it states school districts 63, 64 and 62 from East Maine, Park Ridge and Des Plaines respectively, would have two school board representatives chosen, and a third representative would be chosen alternately from the three areas. School district 63 would be the third area to choose the alternate.

week ago Monday their efforts were culminated in the choice of a candidate whose selection was tantamount to being elected. While the candidate has since withdrawn for business reasons, nevertheless, the foresight in the creation of this group will be a benefit to residents in district 63 in the years to come.

Because of the nature of Maine township, Park Ridge and Des Plaines have dominated the high school board. With each town having three representatives, the seventh member has been (and is) Nilesite Walter Craigie. Thus, the make-up of the Board was not dominated by either town. However, with the tremendous growth of school district 63, it was recognized that this area should have another representative on the board. Most fairly, Des Plaines and Park Ridge school caucuses joined with the newly-formed group in our area, and endorsed the plan for a second member from district 63. The Board's composition will now be a 3-2-2 split, with the third board member being chosen alternately from the three areas.

We were most impressed with the democratic process by which the new caucus worked. Representatives from homeowners' groups, and PTA's in the district worked out the machinations, by which the group labored, and resulted in voting for its candidate. It was done with meticulous regard for democratic procedures, and followed scrupulously Roberts Rules Of Order, in the conduct of its meeting.

Always interested in the body politic, it gave us a good feeling to see the democratic process created and maintained. And then to see, in orderly fashion, the procedure work so well is indeed satisfactory. The creation, the laboring over the many orders of procedure, and then the ultimate choice of the candidate, is an exciting and worthwhile experience.

From The Left Hand

While we've paid maximum attention to the running of the municipal government in our local villages, we've often felt guilty that we haven't directed more attention to our schools.

The news of greatest dramatic interest is centered around the village government. Problems relating to zoning, flooding, gambling, licensing and the creations of endless ordinances generally rate the headlines. And yet, the often mundane actions of our many school boards, are of much greater importance to us personally, as well as financially.

In past years in Niles we have been concerned with creation policies and facilities in the community, and have placed much of the spotlight of the news on the men who create these policies. Certainly these efforts are important. But relative to school matters, the focusing of this village news is out of focus.

In the area of village politics, and the meanderings of village politicians, the total amount of wind expelled from this region also is somewhat disproportionate to its value to the average resident.

While zoning matters have a marked importance to the functioning of our schools, still the policies, curriculum and the running of our schools deserves much greater news space than they now receive.

If interest in our schools could get beyond the PTA stage, the better-qualified men and women in our community would serve on school boards. But the general lack of enthusiasm for these posts, can well be traced to their lack of being given more attention by our newspapers, and then by our residents.

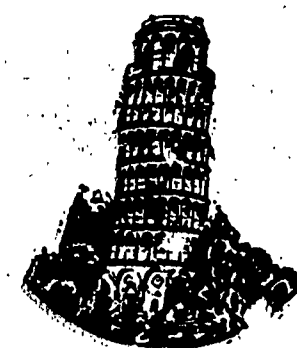
When election time comes for village board posts often as many as 20- to 25 candidates vie for the jobs. Yet, when openings for school boards become available, a search often goes out to seek candidates.

In both Niles and Morton Grove an interesting contrast exists. In school districts 70 and 71, both in industrial-rich Niles township, little effort is made to change the complexion of the Boards. Both areas are relatively static from a population standpoint, and taxes are kept down due to the aid of tax-money from industry. Residents lack of involvement, with their schools seems to manifest a satisfaction with the way school matters are handled there. School board members generally succeed themselves term after term, and little opposition comes from the voters.

A marked contrast to the Niles Township districts can be found in district 63's Maine Township area. Here, the po-

Picks Stan Osri As Caucus Candidate

Stanley Osri, a seven-year member of school board 63, who decided against running for re-election for the elementary school board, became a 12th hour candidate for the high school board, and was selected by the Maine Township Caucus to represent the East Maine area at a special meeting Monday night. Osri, who lives at 9504 Golf Road, in unincorporated area, will likely be elected since he will receive the support of the Park Ridge and Des Plaines caucuses, as well.

Present Maine High School board member Walter Craigie told THE BUGLE Osri's selection was indeed a good one. He said he had often sought Osri's opinion relating to local school matters, and then reported his findings to the high school board. Craigie mentioned that Osri's unincorporated residence

was an additional benefit in the April election. Craigie noted that Robert Winkle, who is an independent candidate from the unincorporated Park Ridge area, has contended a candidate from an unincorporated area should serve on the high school board. With the selection of Osri, Craigie feels that a candidate from such an area is available, and is also a second candidate from the district 63 area who will be a member of the board.

Monday night's meeting was a repeat meeting of the newly-formed caucus group. Two weeks ago the caucus had chosen Richard Freeman, a Glenview-area resident, as its choice for the board. Two days later Freeman withdrew from the upcoming Maine High School election, because of

In view of recently published information citing the relationship between cancer and smoking, the Niles Board of Health feels that a Cigarette Clinic to aid the cigarette smoker who has a desire to stop smoking, is both timely and in the best interest of the good health of the community. Therefore, the Board, in cooperation with the Hinsdale Sanitarium will offer a "5-Day Plan to Stop Smoking" to residents of Niles, the Skokie Valley area and surrounding communities, on March 22 thru 26, at the Jefferson School, 8200 Greendale, Niles, at 7:30 p.m., to be held in sessions lasting 50 to 75 minutes. The Clinic will be conducted by Pastor Willis C. Graves, and Dr. Charles L. Dale, Pathologist. Tickets, which will be free of charge, may be obtained at the Niles Village Hall, or the Fire House, 8300 West Dempster St. or by calling the Health office either Tuesday from 1 to 3 p.m., or Thursday 6:30 to 8:30 p.m., or by calling the Secretary at YO-5-4727.

State Fire Marshal William Cowhey told THE BUGLE the state does not create the fire district lines. He said the districts are controlled by local rule agreed upon by neighboring villages. He also said Niles said it would take in the unincorporated area into its fire district if the area positioned to the county court for such action.

Cowhey also steadfastly maintained Niles used "poor judgment" in not going to the fire. He said a town should investigate "right around the corner (from its station)".

In THE BUGLE interview when told Blase said Cowhey's remarks "are contemptuous" relating to Niles responsibility in this incident, Cowhey said, "It is within Blase's province to protect Niles officialdom".

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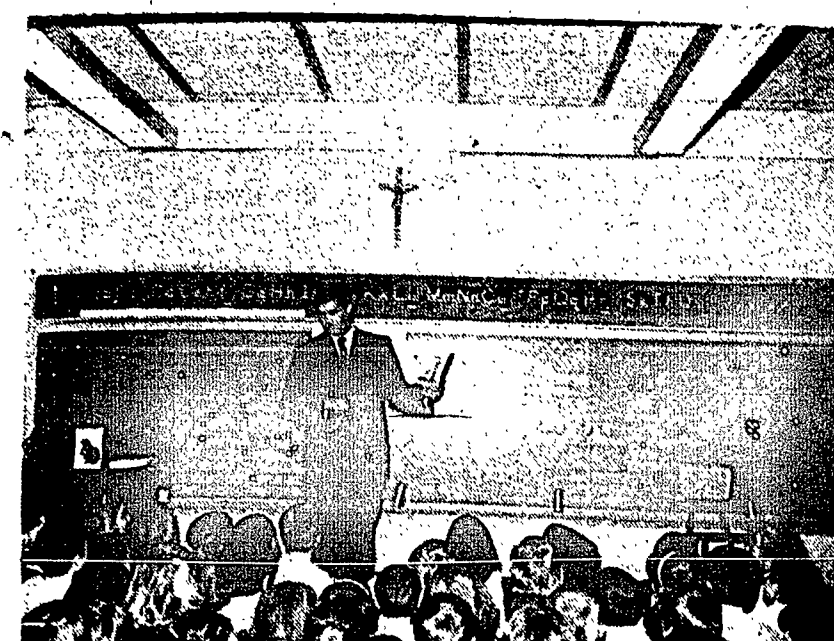
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Story Round-Up Time For Brebeuf First Graders

Story "round-up" time began shortly before Catholic Book Week...February 23-29...for the first grade pupils at St. John Brebeuf School. The boys and girls discussed stories they had heard during literature classes. Paints and pencils were busily employed as posters of favorite stories were made. Each child took his turn being the "Book Wizard" as he donned a large pair of black spectacles made for the occasion and told a riddle about his poster. Although many of the stories had been dramatized after the first hearing, some were dramatized again just for fun.

Stick puppets were made for HANSEL AND GRETEL and THE FIVE CHINESE BROTHERS. The puppets were moved about by several children from behind the teacher's desk as another child narrated the story. Vincent F. Volpe Promoted

Vincent F. Volpe has been named assistant director of the mechanical engineering research division at IIT Research Institute, Virgil H. Disney, vice president, announced.

An Illinois Institute of Technology graduate (1939), Volpe joined IITRI in 1951 as a project engineer. Research in which he has engaged includes the development of improved means of air dropping military supplies, air launching heavy ordnance, and underwater naval weapons. His research activity at IITRI has included ballistic studies, the development of solid propellant rockets and ammunition, techniques for light gas gun hypervelocity projection and impact phenomena and development and utilization of explosive devices for special purposes.

He is a member of the American Ordnance Association.

Lutheran General Hospital Receives \$7,975 Grant

A grant of \$7,975 has been made by the Chicago Heart Association to carry on heart research at Lutheran General Hospital, Park Ridge. The grant was made to Dr. Otto H. Trippel and Dr. Jack van Elk.

The funds will be used to study the effect of hyperbaric (high pressure) oxygen on coronary occlusions. Research will be conducted in the new \$1 million John A. Hartford Hyperbaric Oxygen Research Center at Lutheran General Hospital.

Dr. Trippel is a member of the Lutheran General medical staff and is assistant professor of surgery at the Northwestern University School of Medicine. Dr. van Elk is attending physician in charge of the cardiology section and director of the high pressure oxygen research center at Lutheran General Hospital. He is also on the faculty of Northwestern University School of Medicine.
