west of Washington, in the St. Isaac Jogues area, it would also square off an area north of Golf near the present Golden Acres area.

Directly east of the Niles area Glenview would annex about 500 homes in the largest annexation, behind the Ann's Foods-Community Discount area. This would take in the Glenview area of 300 homes, which had been seeking to incorporate its area. THE BUGLE was told Tuesday the purpose of seeking this self-incorporation was actually to gain annexation into Glenview.

Glenview and Morton Grove this week passed ordinances which will give the immediate unincorporated areas the choice of annexation. It is expected next Monday Niles will follow suit.

The recent announcement of plans for a 11 story high rise in the area aided in precipitating this action, Victor Yacaman, owner of the water distribution company in this area, had announced plans for such a building. Residents have been protesting the action. The incorporation will control the zoning in the area.

Tuesday night Morton Grove unincorporated residents who would annex into Morton Grove voiced objections at the village board meeting. Resident Earl Gubbins and Lewis Baumus voiced disapproval of the plans, stating owners there have property from 1 to 7 acres and desire to remain unincorporated. Mayor Schreiber and trustee Klein explained the advantage of receiving village services. Klein also warned that acreage under 60 acres could be annexed without a referendum if it is surrounded by incorporated area.

## Protest 11 Story High Rise

Forty pickets went to the County Building Monday to protest the proposed construction of an 11-story apartment building on Golf Rd. west of Harlem Ave. in Maine Twp.

Ronald T. Parella, spokesman for the group, said the building which Victory Yacaman of 133 Washington, Glenview, seeks to erect would destroy the concept of suburban living.

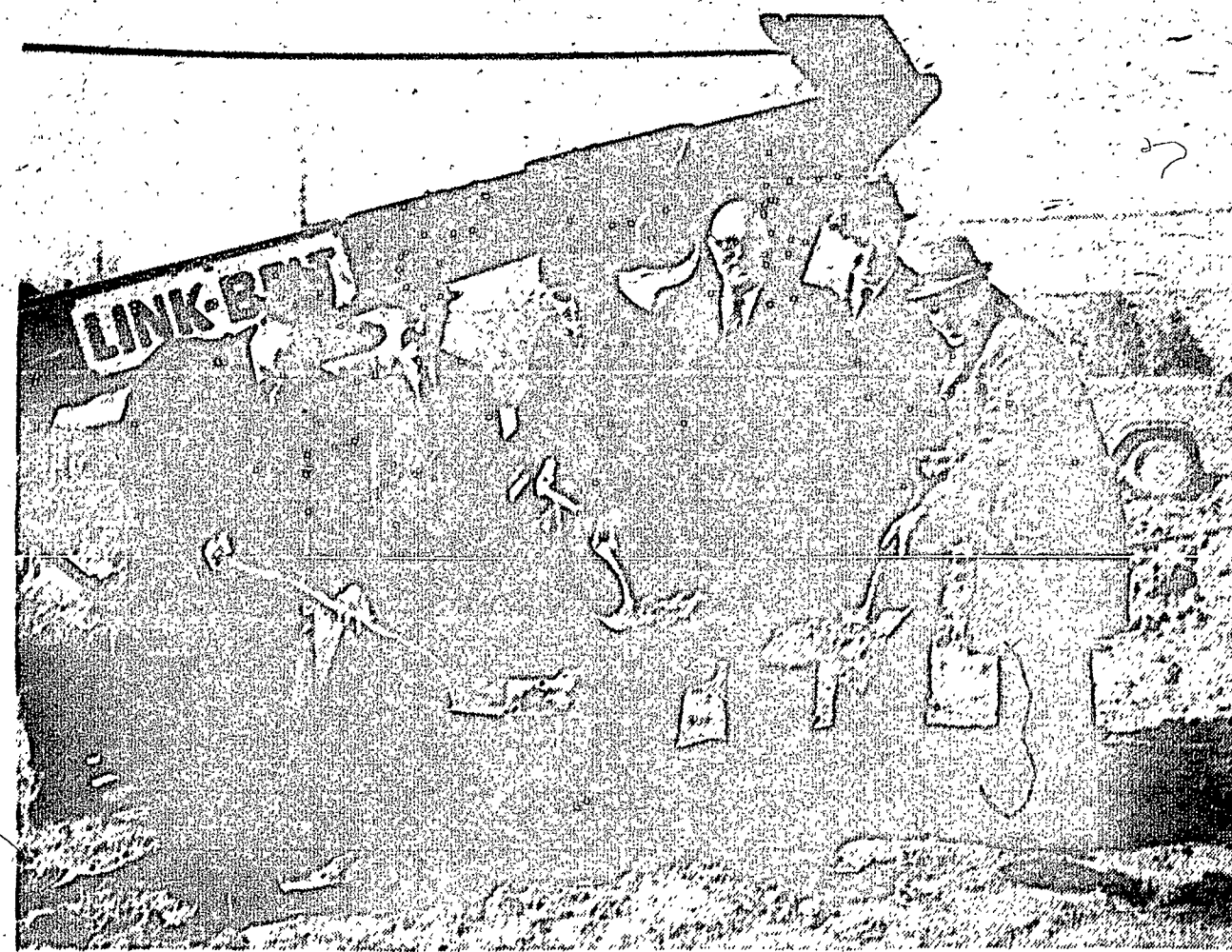
He also said, it would be a fire hazard because suburban fire departments do not have equipment to protect highrise buildings.

At the County Board meeting, President Seymour Simon assured the protesters that no building permit had been issued for the building.

He told them no action on the matter was scheduled for the board's consideration and none would be until it was officially introduced by a board member.

"It will be some time before a decision can be made," Simon added. "I have asked the building commissioner to do nothing until he talks with me."

Comr. Floyd Pulte said that at the next board meeting, March 30, he would present a resolution to amend the zoning ordinance so that the board could decide whether high rises should be constructed in unincorporated suburban areas.

do a "selling job" on the community, to reflect a more favorable image, Blase hastened to add that if liquor dealers could show a decided loss of revenue by a later opening, they had a valid reason for opposing a change in hours.

Attorney Jack Heckinger, representing the liquor dealers, asked Schel about the complaints he received, and the number of them. Schel only said "many had spoken about it" and that some complaints dated back years ago. Schel added that most are "church-going people" and that the desire for a change in Sunday hours is not aimed at any one tavern.

Heckinger told the Board most of the dealers have been in business many years and the marketability of the license would be lessened by any change. He said Niles has not suffered by the hours, and said "You've cleaned up the bad establishments under your reign." He reminded the Board that his clients had suffered a monetary loss by the elimination of the pinball machines, that it was a great source of income for the majority of the dealers, and "they did not fight the issue".

Heckinger went on to say that a 12 noon Sunday opening hour would cause a loss of as much as 60% to dealers. He said stores near industry and cemeteries would suffer the greatest loss. As examples he said the Hi-Way Club would lose about 15% of its Sunday income, House of Tromba, Palmer House, Met's and Niles Homestead would lose 25 to 40% of its Sunday income. He added golfers and fishermen passing thru town would not use Niles stores causing additional income loss. He emphasized about one-half of the liquor dealers open before noon.

Heckinger said Nilesites and liquor-dealers were both church-going, God-fearing people. He added that many Niles taverns are family places, and many enjoy an "after-Mass" drink. He added liquor people are solid citizens who contribute to their community, and pay more taxes than the average residents. He mentioned

Schlaus' Tavern as an example of a business which has a Sunday morning business, both of townspeople, as well as transients, who head for the neighboring golf course.

Heckinger mentioned up until 3 or 4 years ago there was no closing time in Niles. Schel said there was an ordinance on the books for a 5 O'clock closing but it was never enforced.

Lone Tree Inn's Sonny Radeke mentioned Schel does not frequent hrs, and commented church groups are constantly coming in for donations. Schel re-iterated what he said several times that his desire for a change in hours had nothing to do with any church group, and it had nothing to do with the church.

Trustee Marcheschi, Bruno and Wente then questioned Schel about the number of complaints he had received. Bruno said he did not hear of any hue and cry from Nilesites. Marcheschi asked Schel how many complaints he had received and Schel only answered, "Several", but would not ap-proximate the number. Wente asked Schel, "Why, why have you received complaints but no one else? We were elected the same time and I haven't received complaints".

Bruno added this action is religiously-motivated, but added that it is not the intention of the village board to hurt any businesses.

Schel asked the dealers if the Sunday morning business is so lucrative, why are half the businesses closed in the morning?

Mayor Blase mentioned only a small percentage of the 25,000 residents frequent the establishments, and the average person thinks liquor businesses are closed Sundays until noon. Blase said another meeting will be held in two or three weeks and at that time some decision would be reached. He asked the liquor dealers for further suggestions and that they present them at this meeting.

thing illegal about the present operations. But, as Mayor Blase mentioned, we are dealing with a moral problem. And liquor commissioner Blase poignantly remarked that most of us, ex-Chicagoans, have been raised under the commandment, "Thou shalt not buy liquor on Sunday until noon".

Trusting one's so-called morality on a community is an area in which we would tread lightly. In Indiana, Pennsylvania, Michigan and many other states, the booze halls stop selling Saturday night at midnight, and close down on Sunday. In Chicago the area was voted "dry", and no booze-selling goes on. We would like to have anyone who would propose that Niles sites morals are tainted because liquor is sold on our side of Milwaukee Avenue, while residents across the road in Chicago are of a purer strain, because the local beverage houses have been removed from their community.

Nevertheless, Blase's valid opinion that we've lived with a 12 O'clock Sunday opening will likely result in a compromise. Rather than a 6 O'clock opening it is our guess the Sunday opening may be moved up to 9 A.M. It was our feeling Saturday most liquor dealers would be willing to settle for such an hour, and it would likely placate the desire for more stringent hours.

The likelihood of changing closing hours from 4 A.M. until 2 A.M. will meet with strong opposition from the Village Board. There seems to be little issue here, merely an arbitrary desire to tighten the noose around the liquor people.

We admittedly have a prejudiced opinion in favor of the liquor people in this instance, since our family has been involved in the liquor business in past years. While liquor dealers have long been the whipping boys in our society, only a very minute percentage are deserving of this tag. The vast majority of pub, tavern and liquor store owners are of the same breed, as any other businessmen. They make an investment, work long hard hours, run a very tight and strict establishment (or they wouldn't last long) and make only a normal return on their time and investment.

If the booze halls have a record of abuses, then they rightfully should be dealt with. But so long as they maintain a legitimate operation, no different from the corner grocer, or dry goods store, they deserve the same considerations as these other businesses.

## Park District Explains About School District 64's Property

Due to many, many inquiries from residents about the Niles Park District about School District 64 property in Jonquil Terrace area, the commission-ers would like to inform the residents of the efforts that the board had made in the past to acquire all or part of the site for Park use. The following facts and statements have come about in the past.

The Board of Education of Community Consolidated School

District #64 acquired a five acre tract of land at the above location in 1958 for consideration of \$50,000.00 for a future school site. Educational needs of the School District did not later require the use of this site, and approximately six months ago it was declared surplus land by the School Board, and plans were commenced to dispose of it.

Initially, since this area is included in Niles Park District,

inquiries were made as to the possibility of the School deeding the entire tract to our District, but legal and financial objections were noted, as a result of which it was decided by the School Trustees to handle its disposition as follows: A plat of subdivision would be prepared, agreeable to the Board of Trustees of the Village of Niles, with a park-site located somewhere in the vicinity of the south or southeasterly portion of the area, the exact dimensions of the park-site,

cost, method of payment, etc., to be determined at a later time.

A Committee of representatives of the Niles Park District met with School representatives on many occasions over the past six months planning and preparing this subdivision for submission and approval of the Village Engineer of the Village of Niles. Throughout these discussions, it was felt the value of the entire tract would approximate \$85,000.00, and ul-

timately, the School Trustees might be induced into transferring the park-site contained in this area to Niles Park District for something less than the proportional value for the area involved. Such an arrangement would thus net the School Trustees almost 100% profit, or double the return on their 1958 investment.

Approximately six weeks ago, final subdivision plans were approved by the School Trustees. Continued on Page 16

In Glenview, as well as Wilmette, groups of residents have joined together in making a positive statement pertinent to open housing in their suburbs. They signed a public statement publicizing their work in favor of their suburbs being open to persons of all races. This manifests a positive attitude. More important the hate-mongers are not in control of these suburban areas.

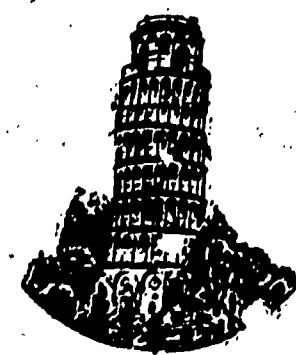
Here in our local communities it is time positive action is taken. It would seem religious leaders should come to the forefront and jointly lead their communities with other local leaders in forming Human Relations Councils. While normally we would expect our political leaders to lead their communities, this is one area where they seem to be inaudibly weak, and unheard from. It is perhaps symptomatic of their not wanting to place themselves in an unpopular position in their communities. We're sure there are many residents whose feelings favor such a group.

Tuesday night it was announced one of Niles two oldest firemen (in point of service), Charley Bachter, will retire from the department. Bachter's long-time service to Niles deserves recognition from the community. Having a "night" for Bachter, as well as one for past Trustee John Stanley, would make a memorable night for these men, who have made great contributions to Niles. It is possible a third name might be added to this list, which would make the evening indeed significant, meaningful and worthwhile.

Tavern owners in Niles are reminding us that several of the pubs are now up for sale. After having a free-wheeling era in which they ran their taverns without being hamper-

## Blase's Vote Proves Decisive

In a meeting reminiscent of the knock-'em-down-drag-'em-out trustee meetings of three years ago Mayor Blase broke a three to three tie vote, approving re-zoning for a small hospital, at the Pleasant View Nursing Home, across from the Public Works Building on Touhy Avenue.

Trustees Bruno, Schel and Wente voted against the re-zoning, which previously had been approved by the zoning board. Bruno said he did not feel he knew enough of the personal background of the people involved. Bruno is an official for Blue Cross. Schel objected to the location, citing the lighted baseball diamond across the street, as being an unsatisfactory location. Wente said the hospital would not have an obstetrics or pediatrics department, thus it would be a part-time hospital. A representative of the hospital group said neighboring Skokie Valley Hospital has 90% of its beds filled by surgical patients, and 10% for pediatrics. They also mentioned that Baird and Warner and Bankers Life Insurance have shown interest in the financing of the project.

It was once more emphasized that the hospital would be a non-profit entity, and Niles would furnish five members on the board, which would be the majority interest administering the hospital.

In a second drag 'em out discussion 75 residents from Kirk Lane came to the meeting to object to proposed 24 apartment building to be built in the Lawrencewood area. At trustee Len Saymansk's suggestion the decision will be held over until
