thing illegal about the present operations. But, as Mayor Blase mentioned, we are dealing with a moral problem. And liquor commissioner Blase poi-gnantly remarked that most of us, ex-Chicagoans, have been raised under the commandment, "Thou shalt not buy liquor on Sunday until noon".

Thrusting one's so-called morality on a community is an area in which we would tread lightly, In Indiana, Pennsylvania. Michigan and many other states, the booze halls stop selling Saturday night at midnight. and close down on Sunday. In the Chicago precinct bordering Niles the area was voted "dry". and no booze-selling goes on. We would take to battle anyone whoe would propose that Nilesites morals are tainted because liquor is sold on our side of Milwaukee Avenue, while residents across the road in Chicago are of a purer strain, because the local beverage houses have been removed from their

Nevertheless, Blase's valid opinion that we've lived with a 12 O'clock Sunday opening will likely result in a compromise, Rather than a 6 O'clock opening it is our guess the Sunday opening may be moved up to 9 A.M. It was our feeling Saturday most liquor dealers would be willing to settle for such an hour, and it would likely placate the desire for more strin-

The likihood of changing closing hours from 4 A.M. until 2 A.M. will meet with strong opposition from the Village Board. There seems to be little issue here, merely an ar-bitrary desire to tighten the noose around the liquor people,

We admittedly have a prejudiced opinion in favor of the liquor people in this instance, since our family has been in volved in the liquor business in past years. While liquor dealers have long been the whi pping boys in our society, only a very minute percentage are deserving of this tag. The vast majority of pub, tavern and liquor store owners are of the same breed, as any other bu-sinessmen. They make an investment, work long hard hours, run a very tight and strict establishment (or they wouldn't last long) and make only a normal return on their time and investment.

If the booze halls have a record of abuses, then they right-fully should be dealt with. But so long as they maintain a legitimate operation, no different from the corner grocer, or dry goods store, they deserve the same considerations as these
