Tuesday night the eight candidates introduced themselves to more than 100 residents who turned out at the annual "Meet the Candidates" meeting. Interestingly six of the eight candidates are residents of unincorporated area which seems to indicate that those areas desire louder voice on the Board. Actually, there have been several present and past board members who have lived outside an incorporated village.

The argument has always been brought forth that representatives should be from the many areas in the community. Niles, Morton Grove, the Glenview unincorporated area and the Des Plaines unincorporated area have all been well represented in recent years. Thus, many interested persons believe all areas should continue to have representatives on the board. They contend it is of paramount importance that bond issues and other school matters can best be handled when a local representative brings the problems back to his neighbors.

This year Niles could easily be shut-out from having any one member on the school board. Interested Nilesites believe Dave Kazan and Sylvia McNair (who lives outside Niles border) should receive united support from Niles voters to insure a local resident serves as a board member.

The argument makes good sense. But the need to have a neighbor on the board is a secondary consideration. The most important need is to have the very best qualified candi-dates serve on the board, regardless of their home address. With this in mind we hope residents in the entire district will cast one of their three votes for William Gurolnick. Gurolnick stood head and shoulders above the remaining seven candidates who presented themsevles at the "Candidates" meeting. He has been in attendance at more than 30 school board meetings over the past year, while the remaining candidates only began attending recently, when they cast their eyes on the school board posts, Gurolnick was the guiding light behind the high school caucus which will be sending a second high school board member from school district 63 to Maine High.







## Announce \$4.6 Million Lutheran General Hospital Expansion

#### A \$4.6 million program to expand Lutheran General Hospital, 1775 Dempster St., Park Ridge, has been announced by the hospital's board of trustees. The expansion will increase the hospital to 519 beds and greatly expand the outpatient depart-ment and ancillary services.

Construction is expected to start this summer with completion scheduled by the end of 1965 according to Dr. N.M. Nesset, president of the board of trustees of LutheranGeneral and Deaconess Hospitals.

"Because of the tremendous. pressures being put on present facilities, it is a feeling of the board and administration that additional hospital beds must be

He pointed out that the ex-pansion has received the ap- **HI Summer** proval of the Hospital Planning Council for Metropolitan Chica-

Plans call for three stories on the present seven-story building and constructing a five-story addition attached to the west of the hospital.

Present size of the hospital is 316 beds... The expansion will increase medical-surgical beds from 204 to 297 and psyhiatric beds from 35 to 81. New features will be a 23 bed intensive care area and a 46 bed chronic care unit.

"Because of high usage, Lutheran General has been operating as high as 110 per centcapacity in psychiatric and over 100 per cent capacity in medi-cal-surgical beds," Dr. Nesset noted. "The intensive care beds and chronic care beds are services which are greatly needed for the area."

A feature of the expansion will be an outpatient department of almost 17,000 square feet. Included in this area will be examining rooms, diagnostic areas, laboratories, X-ray, and minor surgical facilities.

The expansion will also include a doubling of the present emergency department.

"Originally we had planned to get started on the emergency department this spring." Dr. Nesset explained, "However, because of savings in construction we are waiting to build it along with the entire texpansion program."

summer school director, stated

English review is designed for students who are weak in grammar and composition, in any year in school, Freshmen may take the course in prepa-ration for English 1 in the fall and upperclassmen may take it as a strengthener.

Registration for all but two courses will open April 28. Students wishing to take biology may take only that course during summer school and will register in the school personnel of-fice April 9 and 10. An early date will also be set for those registering for U.S. History if they are taking only that course, Rozdalovsky said.

Courses are offered for four weeks, June 15 to July 10, for half a credit, and for 8 weeks, or until August 7, for 1 credit. Unusual cases include certain courses for eight weeks at onehalf credit, and others, such as metal shop, where one-half, 1, or 1-1/2 credits may be earned. Biology is a six-weeks course for 1 credit and both English review and reading development are non-credit courses.



The past four years have seen heated contests in the District #70 school board election. One of the prime reasons for offering a slate of candidates to oppose those selected by the school board, was the school board's repeated refusal to allow the community to participate in any way in candidate selection.

We now find, however, that the school board has yielded and now permits a group known as the School Nominating Committee to select school board candidates. Assurances have been given by the chairman of that group that membership will be open to any interested citizen in the community and that their organization will be run in an open democratic manner.

While as important an institution as our educational system involves many issues, we have always felt that none is as basic as candidate selection by an open community wide organization. Such an organization could be the beginning of a constructive relationship between the of School District #70

### Support Caucus Candidates

Niles Township High School District 219 Caucus urges all voters to support Raymond Kliphardt and Raymond Osborn in the election this Saturday, and thus show approval of the caucus system of selecting school board candidates.

District 219 - Caucus is a democratic body, governed by a published set of By-Laws, operating in open public meetings. Membership is open to all PTA's, public and parochial, and is also open to other organizations which are non-partisan and non-religious. The Caucus is an independent unit, taking direction from neither the Board of Education nor the school administration.

Last October, in an open public meeting, the Caucus voted to amend its By-Laws to remove from consideration those person's who have completed two consecutive three-year terms on the Board of Education. This was done after all delegates and organizations were notified. in writing, a month before the

school board and the community. Such a community wide organization could be effective in attracting highly qualified candidates to serve on the school board who might otherwise hesitate to become involved in a heated political contest.
