

Editor & Publisher

We may be batting at the wind but there's an issue which has cropped up in our com-munities which bears mention.

Last week, at a school dist-rict 63 board meeting, the group discussed appointing a lawyer to represent the district. One name mentioned was Carl Klein, who is a village trustee in Morton Grove. When we were told of the discussion it brought to mind the question. whether a man should be assoclated with more than one public body in a community. On the surface it seems academic, and at best moot. But upon further investigation the question bears scrutiny.

The obvious problem concerns a conflict of interests of a man serving more than one board, whether as an official or as an appointee. Would there ever be a time when the interests of the two groups may be in conflict? And if this time might exist, what position would the two-headed representative serve?

In Niles we have a case in point which sooner or later will be considered by the more thoughtful. School Board #71 superintendent Clarence Culver (a close personal friend of ours) is also president of the Niles Library District. He is a man of the highest public service and of the highest sense of motives. Yet, the nature of his serving two separate taxing bodies may lend him to criticism.

The Niles Library Board will seek to build its own building in July. The property chosen, after many months of study, is located on the north side of Oakton Street, east of Waukegan Road, Across the street from the proposed library building a new school building will be erected which is also, a part of Culver's domain.Dissenters opposing the new li-brary building will note the location of the two buildings, and point to Culver, whose efforts serve both, the school district and the library district, And while Culver's conscious motives were in the best interests of the districts, many will contend unconsciously Culver would lean toward such planning. Thus, a public servant, whose contribution to the community is most noteworthy, will never theless be liable to this criticism. And it is the result of his serving two separate districts, whose interests came into conflict.

Years ago Morton Grove attorney Jim Orphan served Niles<sup>®</sup> and Morton Grove's park districts at the same time. We often wondered what Orphan's position would be if both park districts decided they intended to annex a desirable area which would increase revenue for its district. Orphan fielded this problem well, contending a park district would follow the borders of the village it served,

Long before Niles had a park district the industry on the south side of Oakton Street was annexed into MortonGrove-And during this same period A.B. Dick and other huge tax revenue companies became a part of Skokie's Park District, even though they were within Niles incorporated limits. If an attorney, or a board member

Residents in the unincorporated area in the Golf Road-Washington Avenue area, in school district 63, will go to the polls Saturday to decide whether or not they choose to join annex into 2 neighboring villages in the area. If successful 222 acres of property north of Golf Road would annex into Glen-view, and 22 acres of arca southeast of Golf and Washington would annex into Morton Grove.

If the majority of residents in any one of the two areas favor the annexation, then that area would become annexed into the designated village.

A bitter dispute over annexing into Glenview, has found two groups opposing each other in the area, approximately sur-rounding the Community-Dis-count-Ann's Foods store area, Determination, and the Volunteer Committee For Glen Ter-race, are leading the fight for those favoring the annexation. The opposition, The Committee For Remaining Un-Incorpora-ted, has been holding meetings, and issuing statements opposing the annexation. And Victor Yactman, owner of a water utility company, which distributes water to the area, desires building one or more 11 story high rises in the area, is also active ly opposing the annexation.

A fourth group, the district 63 school board, is favoring the annexation, aiming to combat Yactman's desire to build the multiple dwelling, which the school board believes would burden the school district.

Yactman's plans for the high rise building precipitated the annexation action. Yactman initially had been turned down by the County Board of Comm missioners, when he submitted plans for the 11 story building. The County Board cited 36 building code violations in the plans, which they said did not conform to the County Builder ing Code.

The high rise controversy points to the difference in restrictions in a village's zoning code and the County zoning code. All local villages have a height restriction on high buildings, but the County has not had such a limitation. Only recent-ly Commissioner Fulle has in-Continued On Page 12

# LGH Plans 203 Bed Expansion

The expansion of Lutheran General Hospital, Park Ridge, has received the approval of the Bureau of Hospitals of the Illinois Department of Public Health. Approval by the bureau means that Lutheran General will be eligible to receive fed-eral funds under the Hill-Burton Act to aid hospital construction.

Lutheran General is planning a 203-bed expansion which will include additional medical-surgical beds, psychiatric beds, chronic care beds and intensive care beds. Also included in the expansion will be a large outpatient department.

Total cost of the project is estimated to be over \$5 million. The amount of federal funds has not yet been announced.

Before giving the approval, the bureau makes a detailed study of existing community hospital facilities, population growth and community needs. Although the bureau receives numerous requests for federal grants, only a small number of those making requests receive grants.

Lutheran General received approval on the basis of community needs. Figures released by the Chicago Hospital Council show that Lutheran General is running at over 100 per cent capacity in various areas.

### "We are grateful that the bureau of hospitals has given this approval," said Dr. N.M. Nesset, president of the board of trustees, "Their studies have shown a definite need for this expansion of the community he alth facilities.







(3) Get rid of old paint and solvent containers and those with small left-over amounts. Store paints and solvents only in capped metal containers... glass jars and bottles break easily, creating a definite fire

(4) Safest practice with rags used to wipe up paint or solvents is to dispose of them immediately outside the house. If you must store them, use metal container with a tight cover.

When you fill the tank of that power lawnmover, be sure to treat gasoline with respect. Remember it gives off flam= mable vapors which need only a tiny spark or flame to turn into searing fire or dangerous explosion. Refuel outdoors, keep away from ignition sources, no smoking and keep gasoline in a tight-closing metal

Clean Up Electrical Hazards

While the annual Spring Clean"-Up is in full sway at your home, and you're getting into seldom-reached spots,

This is good fire safety advice from Joseph Salerno, electrical inspector of the Village of Niles, who points out that one out of every seven fires in homes stems from electrical causes.

Here are some points to help vou:

(1) Look for frayed insulation and loose connections on lamp and extension cords, and repair or replace immediately. You may catch these troublecausers quickly enough when they are out in the open, but how about the extension cords under the sofa, the one connecting TV and stereo sets, and others behind bureaus and beds.

(2) If you have any cords under rugs, get rid of this hazard without delay, Traffic and vacuuming over this spot will wear and fray cord insulation to the danger point. Find another, and safe way to serve this lamp or appliance.



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
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
