Open house at the new Municipal building totaled 2000 persons with 1000 turning out Sunday.

Blase announced Niles Art Guild will hold an arts festival at Lawrencewood Center May 23 and 24.

New fire chief Hoelbl has been added to the Electrical Commission.

Harlem Avenue will be resurfaced between Devon and Touhy. Maintenance of the parkway between the street and the cemetery fence will be started.

Callero and Catino four acre plat south of Golf and west of Washington will be considered for residential zoning (R2) from its present manufacturing zoning. It is a part of the 16 acre area which will be used for building single family dwellings.

In answer to a question from the audience, Blase said the Northeast Planning Commission is expected to recommend to the County Zoning Board the area north and northwest of Niles in unincorporated school district 63 area be zoned for industry. Blase was optimistic the county zoning board would be receptive to such a recommendation.

## From The Left Hand

We may be battling at the wind but there's an issue which has cropped up in our communities which bears mention.

Last week, at a school district 63 board meeting, the group discussed appointing a lawyer to represent the district. One name mentioned was Carl Klein, who is a village trustee in Morton Grove. When we were told of the discussion it brought to mind the question, whether a man should be associated with more than one public body in a community. On the surface it seems academic, and at best moot. But upon further investigation the question bears scrutiny.

The obvious problem concerns a conflict of interests of a man serving more than one board, whether as an official or as an appointee. Would there ever be a time when the interests of the two groups may be in conflict? And if this time might exist, what position would the two-headed representative serve?

In Niles we have a case in point which sooner or later will be considered by the more thoughtful. School Board #71 superintendent Clarence Culver (a close personal friend of ours) is also president of the Niles Library District. He is a man of the highest public service and of the highest sense of motive. Yet, the nature of his serving two separate taxing bodies may lend him to criticism.

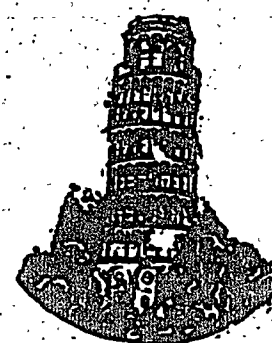
The Niles Library Board will seek to build its own building in July. The property chosen, after many months of study, is located on the north side of Oakton Street, east of Waukegan Road. Across the street from the proposed library building a new school building will be erected which is also a part of Culver's domain. Dissenters opposing the new library building will note the location of the two buildings, and point to Culver, whose efforts serve both the school district and the library district. And while Culver's conscious motives were in the best interests of the districts, many will contend unconsciously Culver would lean toward such planning. Thus, a public servant, whose contribution to the community is most noteworthy, will nevertheless be liable to this criticism. And it is the result of his serving two separate districts, whose interests came into conflict.

Years ago Morton Grove attorney Jim Orphan served Niles' and Morton Grove's park districts at the same time. We often wondered what Orphan's position would be if both park districts decided they intended to annex a desirable area which would increase revenue for its district. Orphan fielded this problem well, contending a park district would follow the borders of the village it served.

Long before Niles had a park district the industry on the south side of Oakton Street was annexed into Morton Grove. And during this same period A.B. Dick and other huge tax revenue companies became a part of Skokie's Park District, even though they were within Niles incorporated limits. If a storage, or a board member

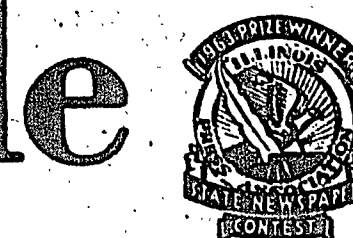

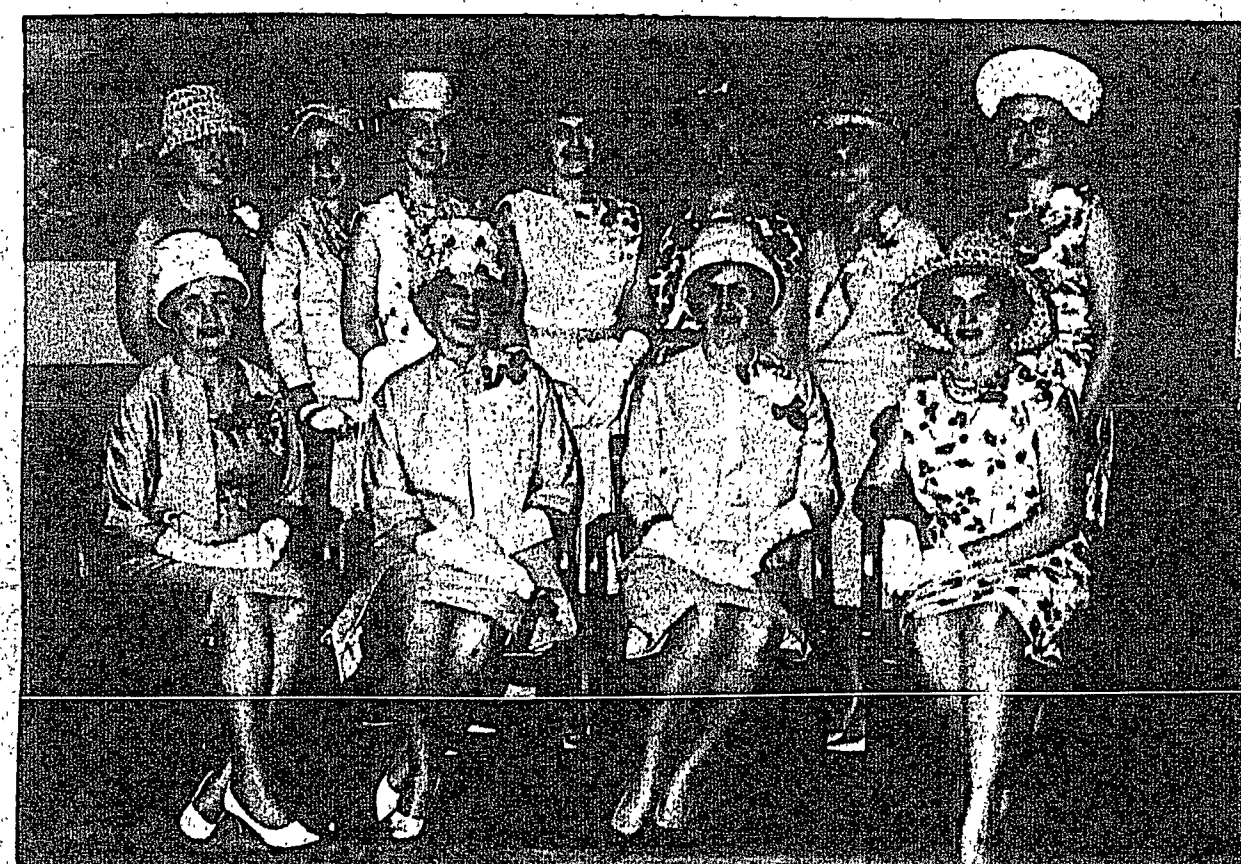

# DISTRICT 63 ANNEXATION VOTE SATURDAY



## Glenview, Morton Grove Involved

Residents in the unincorporated area in the Golf Road-Washington Avenue area, in school district 63, will go to the polls Saturday to decide whether or not they choose to join annex into 2 neighboring villages in the area. It successful 222 acres of property north of Golf Road would annex into Glenview, and 22 acres of area south-east of Golf and Washington would annex into Morton Grove.

If the majority of residents in any one of the two areas favor the annexation, then that area would become annexed into the designated village.

A bitter dispute over annexing into Glenview, has found two groups opposing each other in the area, approximately surrounding the Community-Discount-Air's Foods store area. Two groups known as the Glen Grove Association For Self-Determination, and the Volunteer Committee For Glen Terrace, are leading the fight for those favoring the annexation. The opposition, The Committee For Remaining Un-Incorporated, has been holding meetings, and issuing statements opposing the annexation. And Victor Yactman, owner of a water utility company, which distributes water to the area, desires building one or more 11 story high rises in the area, is also actively opposing the annexation.

A fourth group, the district 63 school board, is favoring the annexation, aiming to combat Yactman's desire to build the multiple dwelling, which the school board believes would burden the school district.

Yactman's plans for the high rise building precipitated the annexation action. Yactman initially had been turned down by the County Board of Commissioners, when he submitted plans for the 11 story building. The County Board cited 36 building code violations in the plans, which they said did not conform to the County Building Code.

## LGH Plans 203 Bed Expansion

The expansion of Lutheran General Hospital, Park Ridge, has received the approval of the Bureau of Hospitals of the Illinois Department of Public Health. Approval by the bureau means that Lutheran General will be eligible to receive federal funds under the Hill-Burton Act to aid hospital construction.

Lutheran General is planning a 203-bed expansion which will include additional medical-surgical beds, psychiatric beds, chronic care beds and intensive care beds. Also included in the expansion will be a large outpatient department.

Total cost of the project is estimated to be over \$5 million. The amount of federal funds has not yet been announced.

Before giving the approval, the bureau makes a detailed study of existing community hospital facilities, population growth and community needs. Although the bureau receives numerous requests for federal grants, only a small number of those making requests receive grants.

Lutheran General received approval on the basis of community needs. Figures released by the Chicago Hospital Council show that Lutheran General is running at over 100 per cent capacity in various areas.

"We are grateful that the bureau of hospitals has given this approval," said Dr. N.M. Nesset, president of the board of trustees. "Their studies have shown a definite need for this expansion of the community health facilities."

The expansion will add three stories to the existing building and will include a west wing of five stories.

## Nilehi West 'It's Academic' Trio Winners

Nilehi West's "It's Academic" trio of Al Karlin, Sue Grigg, and Jim Furzansky last Saturday staged a "photo-finish" victory over Riverside-Brookfield and Downer's Grove high schools in the race for the semi-final berth in the Chicago area knowledge contest.

The show's moderator, Ed Grennan, labeled the May 16 program the most exciting show ever on "It's Academic."

Traffing by 115 points with less than a minute left in the final round, the trio made a marvelous comeback to win at bell time by a scant five points.

Sue became the heroine of the contest when she answered the question "Eight is what percent of 50?" after time had run out in the final round, the "grab bag." Sue's answer of 16 per cent was accepted because the buzzer had been pressed before time ran out.

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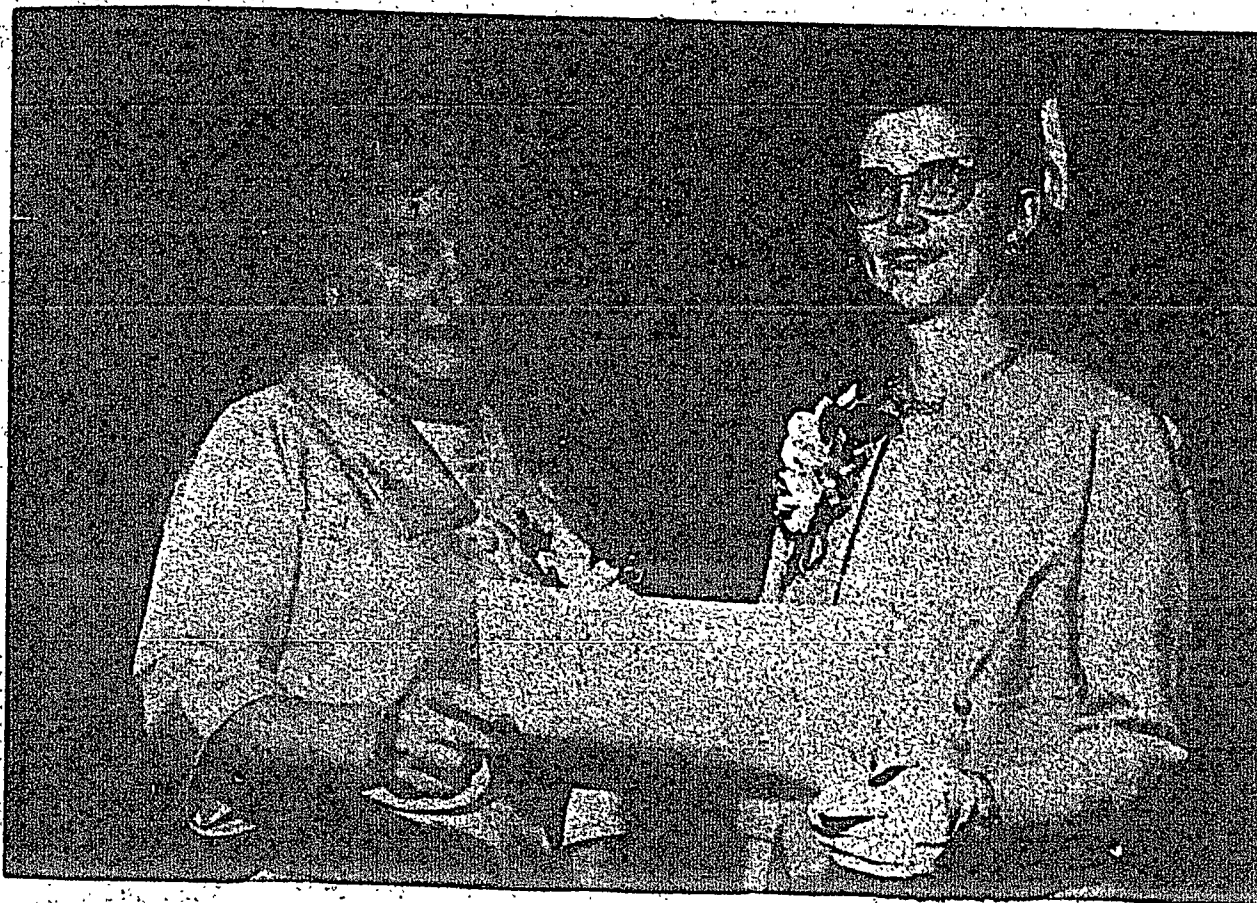

## Niles Citizens Committee To Elect New Officers

Election of new officers will take place at the meeting of the Niles Citizens Committee on May 27 at 8:00 p.m. in the new Council Chambers at Waukegan and Touhy.

Several major issues of interest to residents of Niles will be on the agenda for this meeting.

A review of the history of this committee will serve to acquaint new residents with the purpose and function of the organization. The committee was brought into being in 1959 to unify the many small groups of which Niles is comprised, homeowners associations, civic and service organizations. Each member organization pays a \$5 annual fee and sends one representative to the committee. The Niles Citizens Committee is a non-partisan mediating body to study problems concerning the entire village and in turn suggests recommended procedures for solution to the proper authority. For example, some months back citizens brought to the committee a problem concerning pets allowed to run loose in defiance of the village ordinance. The committee studied the situation and made recommendations to the village board which resulted in a stronger pet ordinance, copies of which are given to pet owners at the time they purchase a license, and the acquisition of a village vehicle driven by an animal warden to pick up any stray animals unattended on the streets of Niles.

The Niles Citizens Committee is working on a plan to receive the cooperation of all organizations to prevent scheduling of two important events on the same date, resulting in forcing those who would participate in both activities, if on different days, to choose one or the other.

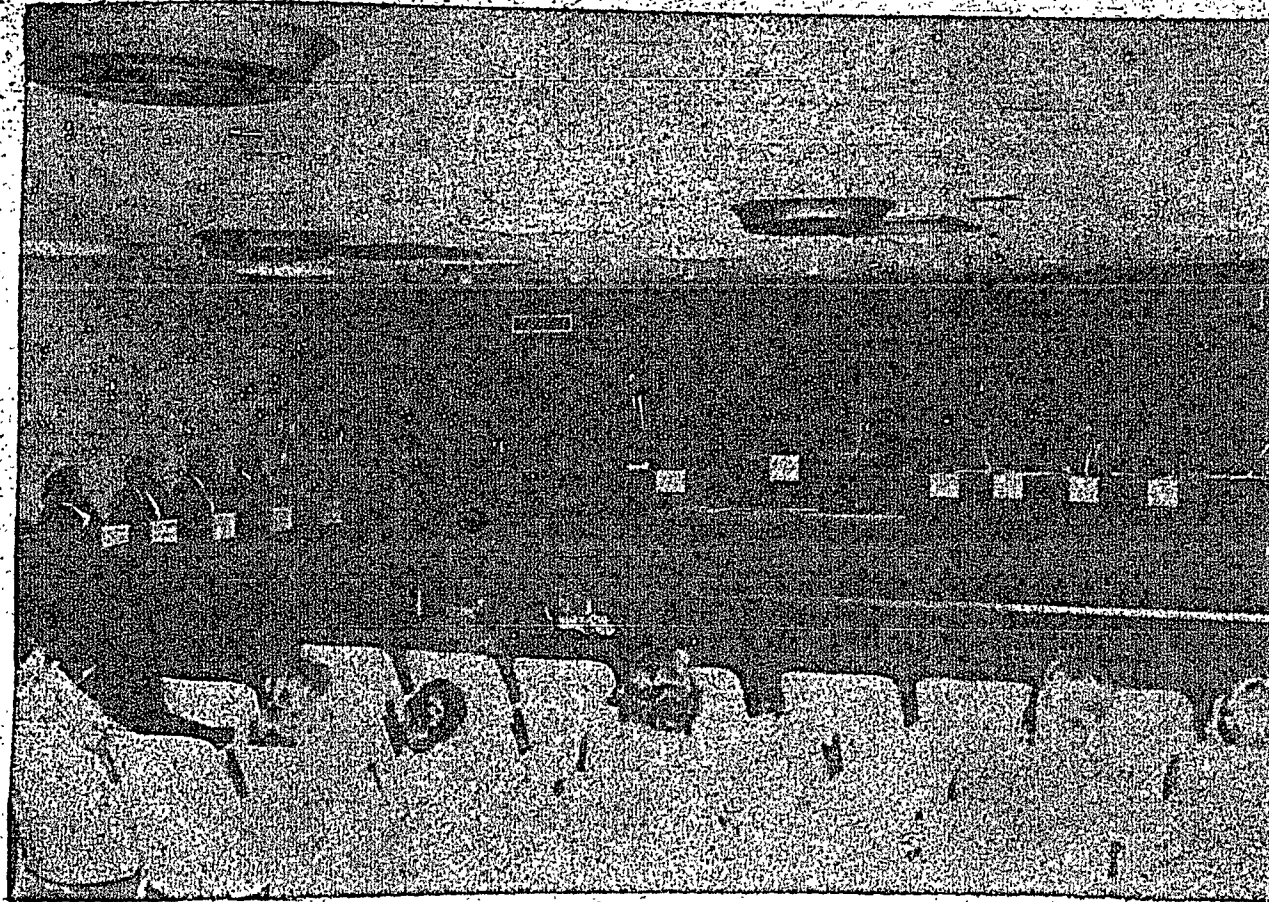

## Paint The Fire Safe Way

A paint brush probably figures in your Spring Clean-Up plans, so keep these fire safety pointers in mind, urges Fire Chief Hoelbl of Niles.

(1) For paint removing and brush cleaning, solvents labeled "non-flammable" are safest. If you must work with flammable ones, better use them outdoors. Indoors be sure windows are open, stoves, pilot lights and other ignition sources are off, and no smoking in the room.

(2) In storing paint materials, keep them well away from furnaces and also away from exits or under stairways. So you will not be blocked from escaping should these highly combustible material catch fire.

(3) Get rid of old paint and solvent containers and those with small left-over amounts. Store paints and solvents only in capped metal containers... glass jars and bottles break easily, creating a definite fire hazard.

(4) Safest practice with rags used to wipe up paint or solvents is to dispose of them immediately outside the house. If you must store them, use a metal container with a tight cover.

Another fire safety tip for homeowners is this:

When you fill the tank of that power lawnmower, be sure to treat gasoline with respect. Remember it gives off flammable vapors which need only a tiny spark or flame to turn into searing fire or dangerous explosion. Refuel outdoors, keep away from ignition sources, no smoking and keep gasoline in a tight-closing metal can.

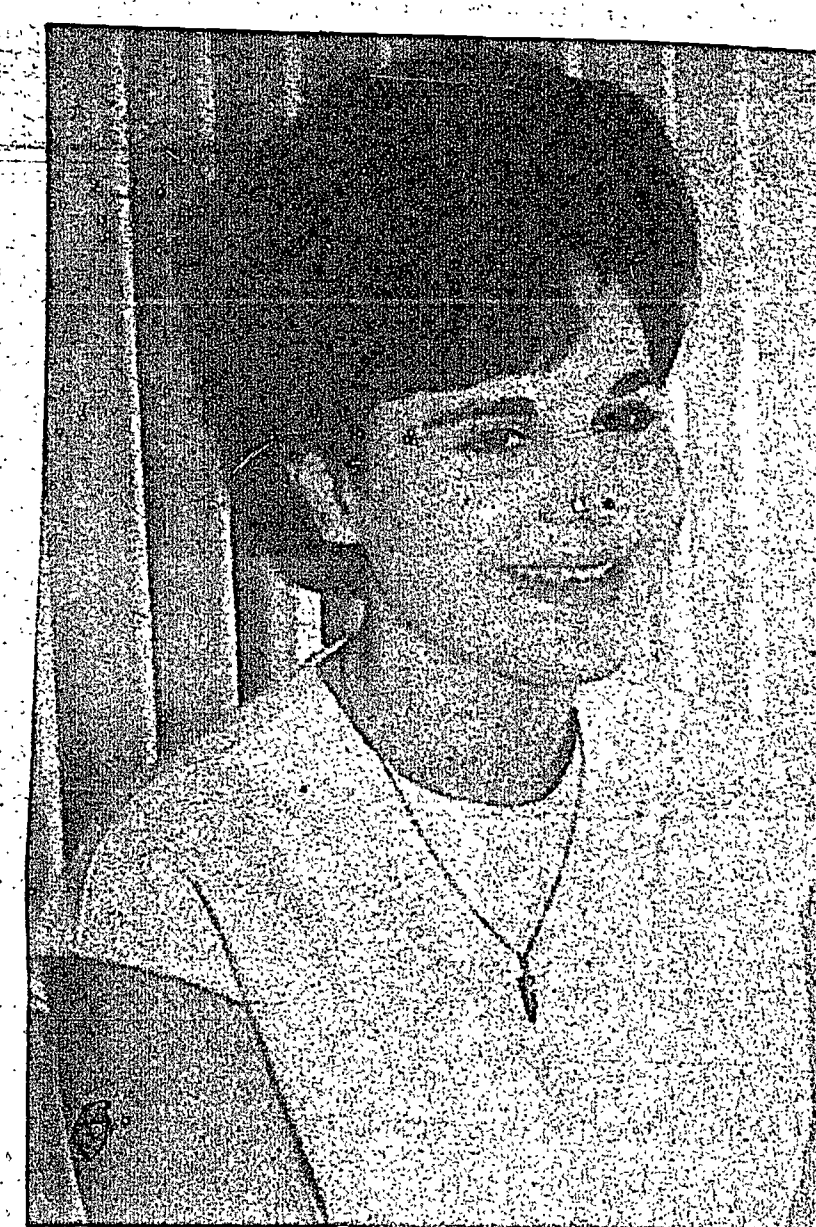

## Clean Up Electrical Hazards

While the annual Spring Clean-Up is in full sway at your home, and you're getting into seldom-reached spots, keep an eye open for trouble-causing electrical defects.

This is good fire safety advice from Joseph Salerno, electrical inspector of the Village of Niles, who points out that one out of every seven fires in homes stems from electrical causes.

Here are some points to help you:

(1) Look for frayed insulation and loose connections on lamp and extension cords, and repair or replace immediately. You may catch these trouble-causers quickly enough when they are out in the open, but how about the extension cords under the sofa, the one connecting TV and stereo sets, and others behind bureaus and beds.

(2) If you have any cords under rugs, get rid of this hazard without delay. Traffic and vacuuming over this spot will wear and fray cord insulation to the danger point. Find another, and safe way to serve this lamp or appliance.

(4) Do a clean-up job on the fuse box in the basement. Toss out the burned-out fuses, and check to make sure you are using only 15 Amp fuses except on special circuits designed for heavier loads.
