served in the two areas in conflict here, his position would have become untenable.

Using another tack, we thought Niles Mayor Blase, elected to serve the village, was way off base when he intervened in school district referendums. Using his position as Mayor he sent out news releases giving "the word" to voters regarding a particular school vote. Using the Mayor's chair, he sought to influence in another taxing area. And while this sage of Kedzie Avenue may have acquired some knowledge of village activities, his wisdom of showing his prejudices in school matters was most unfitting. Each taxing body is autonomous, and as such should not have such conflicts thrust upon it.

Getting back to Carl Klein, the trustee, and a possible school board lawyer, we believe the preceding is evidence conflicts do exist. Placed in a position of jeopardy is unfair to a public man whose service to the community is seldom recognized. It is also unfair to those he serves, who expect total representation, free of any compromise.

The National Multiple Sclerosis Society since its inception in 1946 has spent \$4,125,674 on research. There are over 500,000 victims of M.S. and related diseases in the United States. Five thousand of these patients are in the Metropolitan Chicago area.

Multiple Sclerosis is a disease of the central nervous system. The cause of M.S. is still unknown. It strikes young adults in the 20 to 40 age bracket.

For the next fourteen weeks, every Tuesday and Friday nights will find the members of the various teams in the Niles Senior Men's Softball League slugging it out at Jozwiak Park on Touhy near Milwaukee Avenue. And through the efforts of the League and at no expense on its part, new lighting makes the field a brighter place to play.

Some of the names are familiar; some are new. Romito Plumbing, for example, under the tutelage of Norm Koch is a familiar name; so are Norbert's Garden Center under Frank Samuelson, Blases' Tavern with Frank Morvay at the helm (and he's the new Presxy of the league), and the Niles Majors under Jerry Sullivan. New names to grace the roster are Big Herms' under Maurice Dulitz, Bill Kennedy's Chesterfield Bombers, Dale Cagney's Rust-Oleum team, and Dick Miller's Hawks.

You may be interested to know that the Niles Majors this year are sponsored by Kenron, a name famous in the business of aluminum windows, screens, and awnings. Kenron is now building a new plant in Niles, which, of course, will hire many of the local populace to staff the plant. Mr. Bernard Feld, the president of Kenron, is a Skokie resident, so he'll be able to keep close tabs on his employees in the league, that is, when he's not piloting his plane around on company business or working as a vice president of Little City, a home for retarded children in Palatine.

The first game of the new season was played May 12 between Madsen's Rust-Oleum and Big Herms' with the Rust-Oleum aggregation coming out on top by a score of 7 to 6. For the winners, J. Einsweller got 2 for 5 at the plate, while L. Breden and F. Mangoven each got 2 for 4. For the losers, Friedman's triple and Harrison's double along with nine other hits were just not enough. Blases collected only six hits, among them a home run by Stathach and a triple by Oldeberg.

On May 15, Norbert's Nursery squeaked by Dick Miller's Hawks 12 to 1. For the winners, Pep Walton is back at it with 3 for 4 including a double. Bud Calahan is taking up where he left off, too, with 3 out of 4 at the plate. Frugo and Lemke each hit 2 for 4 in the 12 hit attack. For the Hawks, a new entry this year, Schaumburg managed 3 for 4 at bat while his team mates Barrett got 2 for 4, one of his blows going for four bases; Guza homered in the fifth inning, but the long ball wasn't enough.

In the second game, the Kenron Majors edged Romito Plumbing, 9 to 8. The winners had 16 hits, the losers 13. For the Majors, Sullivan, Brons, Terpinas, and He all got 2 out of 3 for the night at bat; Stakenas, Demeyer, and Thomas each hit 2 out of 4. One of Thomas' hits was a triple, while

roduced a limitation. However, it is believed the passage of such a law would not affect Yactman's present proposal.

Other controversies surround the cost of coming into an incorporated village. While opponents and proponents alike contend the cost for being a part of an incorporated area is about \$50 yearly they differ sharply as to its worth. Opponents fighting the Glenview annexation believe their area now have superior snow clearance, faster police service from the County, which they also believe is closer - and fire protection would not change noticeably. Proponents for annexation mention free library service, quicker action to local problems thru direct contact with village officials, and lower fire insurance rates, as the result of annexation. They also contend the valuation of their property will go up, increasing its value by becoming a part of a village. Dissenters say this may be true, but the very nature of this increased valuation would mean increased taxes.

If the annexation should prove to be a success, the precedent-making action might well affect the entire school district. East Maine district has been fighting multiple dwellings in its school district for the past three or four years. Both the school board, as well as County President Simon, contend annexation into an already existing village is the most effective means for controlling zoning, and thus restricting multiples. Because multiple dwellings bring more school children into the district at a lower proportionate rate of the tax dollar, than the single family home, the district has opposed multiples consistently. The school board fears the building of the Yactman high rise might only be the beginning of more such buildings in the district. However, if the one or more areas should annex into neighboring villages, then additional annexation of unincorporated area in the school district might follow, allowing for the control of multiples in the school district, thru more stringent village laws.

There's a small band of residents in school district 63 who feel about their school district as baseball fans feel about its favorite ballclubs. Their intense feelings for school matters rise and fall with the temper of the meetings. Whether discussions center around curriculum, school personnel, school board members, or new buildings, they rally around the flag like any loyal Sox or Cub fan. However, unlike baseball savants, their heroes are not beyond reproach, and the guy who hit a home run at last month's board meeting, may turn out to be the goat at this month's meeting. And if he's adorned with the goat's whiskers, he's told in no uncertain terms that he played the last board meeting poorly.

When the meeting ends, around 11:30 or so, the small band of followers adjourn to one of the local coffee houses in the area, and re-live the meeting with the board members. It's an amiable get-together, with the very best interests of the school district being served.

The very nature of the interest shown by the ten or fifteen "Ballard Street Regulars" at the board meetings, with the give and take after the meetings with the Board members, is a most ideal situation.

If Socrates and his peripatetic followers were to walk into the school meetings today, and into the coffee klatch that followed, they would be much pleased with what they would see. The endless discussions, high-minded controversies, and the brain-picking which is the order of the day, are in the very best traditions of the Socratic give and take, which he recommended for aiding the democratic process.

Having become almost mesmerized by the endless meetings in the community, we suddenly were re-aroused by the vast difference in public boards, after having been stimulated by a free discussion board such as #63's. On this school board each member is a distinct individual. You can quickly picture each member in your mind, perhaps becoming piqued or pleased, by the impression. In a lesser vein, this also holds true at Niles Village Board meetings. There is an interplay of controversy, sharp disagreements, sarcasm perhaps, wounded egos, but most important DISAGREEMENT, which lets you know the wheels are turning, and lets you know that you are seeing your representatives in the raw, not having previously been dressed in rehearsal. These sharp and strong opinions, sometimes stupid, but more often well-thought-out, transmits to you the voter, just what type of a representative serves you. And since YOU are the most important guy in your school district, or in your village.

The balloting by the high school districts was:

Glenbrook High schools, Northfield township district 225 - yes, 419; no, 4,500.

Niles Township High school district 219 - yes, 296; no, 6,816. Arlington Heights Township High school district 214 - yes, 2,013; no, 1,128.

Palatine Township High school district 211 - yes, 1,375; no, 472.

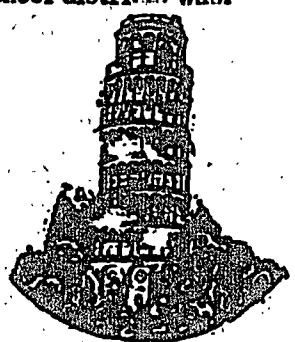
Harvey Schwartz, president of Skokie Homeowners council, which led the opposition to the proposed college district, said:

"The proposal was soundly

defeated because Niles township has no need for another taxing agency. We should continue to support our own present school systems.

Scheel: 'Vote Is Political'

Trustee Ken Scheel's one-man battle to further restrict liquor store-taverns hours, and to hold the line at 21 for stores now holding 4 o'clock licenses, ended Monday night. After proposing three motions, none which were seconded, Scheel remarked the lack of any support from any of Niles officials was "all a political move."

In introducing his motions Scheel warned that someday, something would happen (due to late hours of taverns) which "the people" would propose more drastic action. He said his proposals could not be considered "a moral issue," but he introduced them because Niles' claims this is a year of progress and he believed the good name of Niles could be enhanced by his actions.

Scheel then made a motion that 4 o'clock licenses be reduced to 2 A.M., except for Friday, Saturday and special holiday nights. It died for lack of a second. In the same manner a second motion to keep liquor dispensers closed until Sunday noon had no support.

Blase, Bruno and Scheel then argued the merits of the issue. After Scheel re-iterated "something would happen someday," and the Board should be "clairvoyant" in foreseeing problems, Blase said no Board member (other than Scheel) received a complaint about liquor hours. Blase said aside from 2 letters in the paper (BUGLE) he was not approached, and he saw no reason to change to the 12 noon opening.

Trustee Bruno noted the Board had a responsibility to businessmen, as well as to residents. The Board must be firm in its judgement, and until there is a problem the businessmen should not be hurt.

Another new feature of this year's directory is a listing of telephone exchange prefixes that serve communities in a customer's free-calling area.

As a supplement to this list, there is a list of more than 400 all-number prefixes and the communities in which they are used on the inside back cover. The list includes most communities in northeastern Illinois and Lake County, Ind.

"Just a reminder to those whose calling needs extend beyond the local directory. The Chicago directory and the Suburban North, South and West sectional directories are available from our office at no charge.

The Scouts will place the flags on canopy poles and take them down again during all national holidays. They flags were provided by the Golf-Mill State

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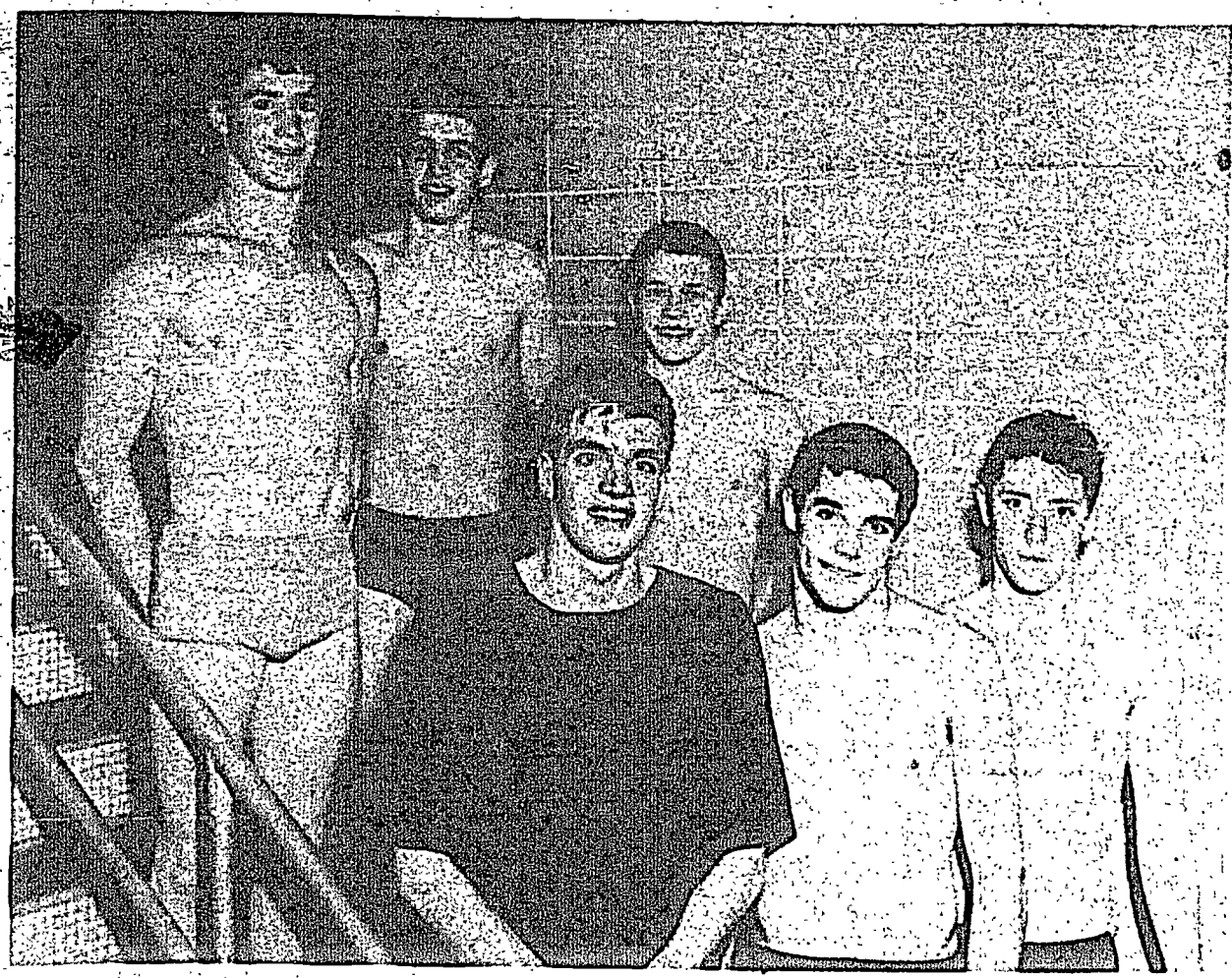
