Each taxing body is autonomous, and as such should not have such conflicts thrust upon it.

Getting back to Carl Klein, the trustee, and a possible sche ool board lawyer, we believe the preceding is evidence conflicts do exist. Placed in a position of jeopardy is unfair to a public man whose service to the community is seldom recognized. It is also unfair to those he serves, who expect total representation, free of any

opponents and proponents alike contend the cost for being a part of an incorporated area is about \$50 yearly they differ sharply as to its worth. Opponents fighting the Glenview annexation believe their area now have superior snow clearance, faster police service from the County, which they also believe is closer- and fire protection would not change noticeably. Proponents for annexation mention free library service, quicker action to local problems thru direct contact with village officials, and lower fire insurance rates, as the result of annexation. They also contend the valuation of their property will go up, increasing its value by becoming a part of a village. Dissenters say this may be true, but the very nature of this increased valuation would mean increased taxes of complete who

If the annexation should prove

to be a success, the precedentmaking action might well affect the entire school district. East Maine district has been fighting multiple dwellings in its school district for the past three or four years. Both the school board, as well as County President Simon, contend annexation into an already existing village is the most effective means for controlling zoning, and thus restricting multiples. Because multiple dwellings bring more school children into the district at a lower proportionate rate of the tax dollar, than the single family home, the district has opposed multiples consistently. The school board fears the building of the Yactman high rise might only be the beginning of more such buildings in the district. However, if the one or more areas should annex into neighboring villages, then additional annexation of unincorporated area in the school district might follow, allowing for the control of multiples in the school district, thru more stringent village laws.

When the meeting ends, around 11:30 or so, the small band of followers adjourn to one of the local coffee houses in the area, and chomp, re-hash, and re-live the meeting with the board members. It is an amiable get-together, with the very best interests of the school district being served.

The very nature of the interest shown by the ten or fifteen "Ballard Street Regulars" at the board meetings, with the give and take after the meetings with the Board members, is a most ideal situation.

If Socrates and his peripate tic followers were to walk into the school meetings today, and into the koffee klatching that followed, they would be much pleased with what they see. The endless discussions. high-minded controversies, and the brain-picking which is the order of the day, are in the very best traditions of the Socratic give and take, which he recommended for aiding the democratic process.
