

Calling all swimmers, you can start swimming next week.



A local high school team's winding up in a state championship game is an event which is treasured by small town residents for their entire lives. It is an event in a small town's life which is unknown, or unappreciated, among big city and suburban residents. And when this very rare event happens, few large urban and suburban dwellers are even aware of it occuring. Thus, the sirens wailing, and the fireworks exploding last Saturday night shook up many in our communities. The reaction from many was a re-run of the 1959 hi-jinks when Chicago and many suburbs greeted the White Sox first pennant in forty years with a similar blowing-off of air raid sirens. The switchboards at the village halls were lit up as they were in the days when basements would start to float. away during heavy rains.

Since we always have a little extra warmth for the guy who takes sides...,we choose to side with the siren-horn blowers. We know it shook up many, many of you...but the kids and the fans and followers of the high schoolers deserved this little bit of fluff, that goes with such a spontaneous parade. We've never been much for flag-waving or phony public patriotism, but when it comes to cheering with the cheerleaders, or tapping a shoe with a local high school band, we must admit we've a soft spot for such hoop-de-do.

Tuesday we had a short talk with Nileshi baseball coach Jim Phipps. Jim is a most candid fellow ... a joy to talk to.

We wondered why this area has such an outstanding record of success in high school bases ball. In Maine Township three state championships have been won in six years, and twice during that period Niles Township has had a representative reach linals. And it you look the league standings in our area, both Niles teams, and Maine Teams won their conference races, and Notre Dame, a perrennial champion, finished second this year.

Phipps said facilities, organization and a fine summer pro-gram are instrumental in this fine record. He failed to mention that the coaching here is also superior.

As a sports buff we mentioned Chicago city teams dominate the state in football and basketball, but they seem to be behind us in baseball. Phipps said Negro boys excell in football and basketball, but you don't find them playing baseball...as they do in other sports. Pointing to the remarkable athletic prowess of Negro athletes he said Evanston's teams are perhaps 50% Negro in football and basketball, yet the Negro population in the schools is only about 10%, He believes football and basketball provide much greater opportunity for athletic scholarships to college and he attributes Negro boys understand this and concentrate on

It seems we've taken this route once before. Six years ago in 1958 Niles and Maine Continued On Page 12
