Where the provisions of this Act are not complied with, the court may, in its discretion, issue a writ of mandamus requiring that a meeting be open to the public at large.

Any person violating any of the provisions of this Act shall, upon conviction, be punished by a fine of not more than \$100, or by imprisonment in the county jail for not more than 30 days, or by both such fine and imprisonment.

Letters To The Editor

Back Open Occupancy

In last week's "Letter To The Editor" column we printed a letter from Reverend Pastor Louis A. Maple, of the East Maine Baptist Church. He is opposed to open occupancy and urged readers to "sign a petition" which would place this issue on a ballot for a general referendum.

This week we received a public statement pronounced and signed by 134 priests, rabbis, pastors and ministers of the North Shore churches and synagogues.

Niles and Morton Grove clergymen who signed the statement include Rabbi Lawrence Charney, Reverend Maldwyn A. Davies, Reverend Robert W. Gish and Reverend Steven Murphy.

The following is the statement:

"We who serve as priests, rabbis, pastors and ministers of the North Shore churches and synagogues are troubled by residential segregation in our communities. We believe this to be a denial of the will of God.

We are glad that increasing numbers of you have publicly said you would welcome all as neighbors without regard to race or religion.

We are glad that Negroes are now claiming rights in our society which belong to them and which they would be wrong not to claim.

We believe that the presence of Negro families among us would attest our common faith that all men are the children of God.

We therefore urge homeowners, if they sell their homes, to do so without regard to the race or religion of the buyer.

We urge realtors to accept non-discriminatory listings.

We urge all to encourage their neighbors if they sell their homes to do so without regard to the race or religion of the buyer.

We speak knowing that silence is not possible for us and not safe for our society. We speak, also, in hope that residential segregation will no longer mar the character of these communities which we love."

Excellent Pool Program

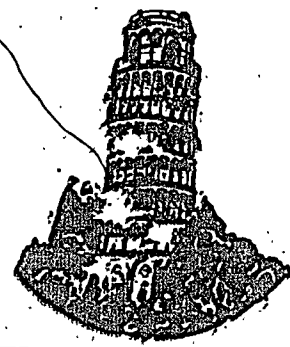
Dear Mr. Bessert:

Lutheran General Has Highest Occupancy

Lutheran General Hospital, Park Ridge, has had the highest daily occupancy in its history during the past week, according to T.L. Jacobsen, executive director. During the past week, the daily census averaged 333 adults and children. In addition, there were 36 babies in the nursery, or 369 total patients.

"Lutheran General is a 324 bed hospital. However, we are able to squeeze these extra patients in by converting our lounges on each floor into patient rooms," Jacobsen said.

The average daily census has been steadily increasing at Lutheran General, Jacobsen noted. He pointed out that certain areas such as the psychiatric floor were operating at as high as 110 per cent of capacity.

"It should also be pointed out that generally summer is regarded as the so-called 'black' season for the hospital," Jacobsen said. "However, patients have to wait up to three weeks

for elective surgery."

To help relieve the shortage of hospital beds, Lutheran General is planning a \$5.5 million expansion. Included in the building project will be 203 additional beds for medical-surgical, psychiatric and long-term patients.

Also included in the expansion will be a complete outpatient department, a new emergency wing and expanded areas for physical therapy, x-ray, blood bank, dietary and laboratories.

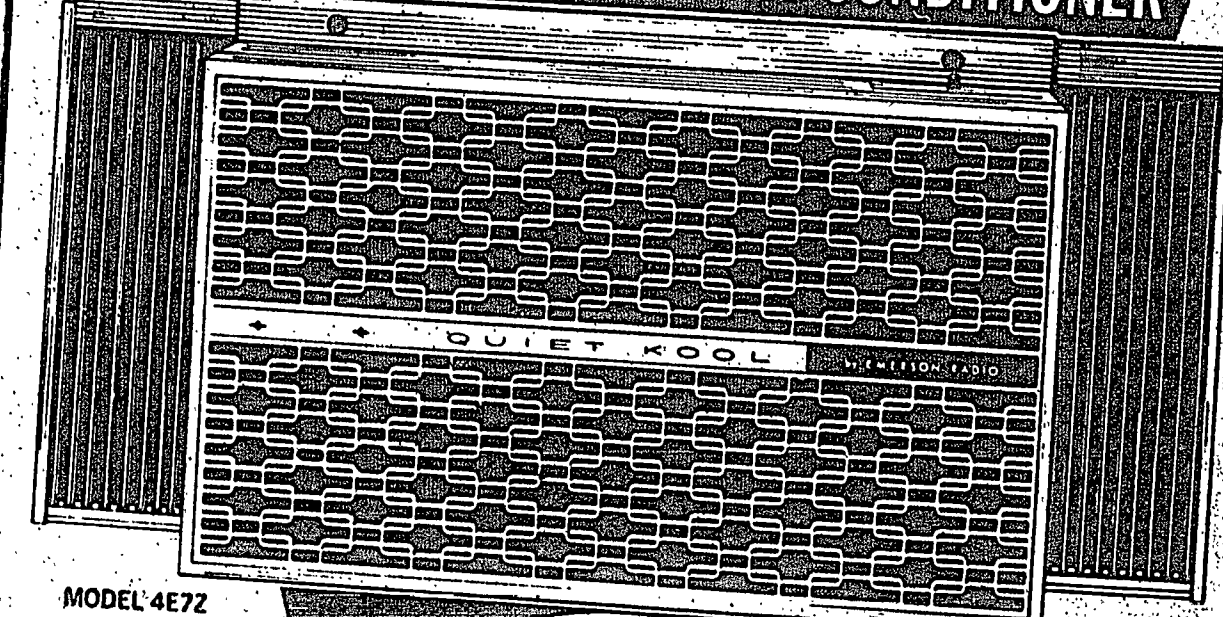
The hospital is seeking to raise \$1,228,000 from the community to help pay for the expansion. "A federal grant of \$212,000 has been received and the hospital will finance the remainder of the cost."

"We hope all members of the community will join in helping to provide these desperately needed facilities," Jacobsen said.

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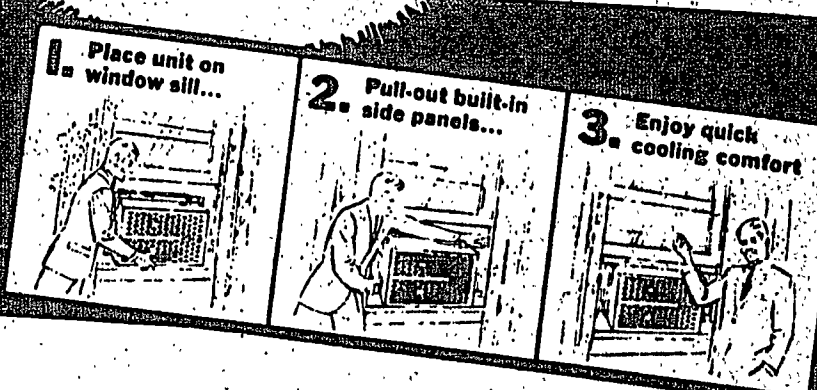
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Legal Notice

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE NILES ZONING ORDINANCE

WHEREAS, the President and Village Board of the Village of Niles, on the 10th day of January, 1964, adopted an Ordinance known as the Niles Zoning Ordinance; and

WHEREAS, the President and Village Board of the Village of Niles referred certain proposed amendments to said ordinance to the Plan Commission for the purpose of holding a public hearing thereon and making recommendations to the President and Village Board; and

WHEREAS, the Plan Commission did hold a public hearing on January 16, 1964, pursuant to notice; and

WHEREAS, the Plan Commission has recommended the adoption of amendments to the Niles Zoning Ordinance;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE President and Board of Trustees of the Village of Niles, Cook County, Illinois, as follows:

SECTION 1: That the Niles Zoning Ordinance adopted by the President and Board of Trustees of the Village of Niles, Cook County, Illinois, on the 10th day of January, 1961, be and said ordinance hereby is amended as follows:

A. Section VIII-C, 2, B is hereby amended by deleting therefrom the words "pool halls."

B. Section VIII-B, 3 is hereby amended by adding thereto sub-section X as follows: X-Pool Halls.

SECTION 2: That all provisions of the Niles Zoning Ordinance in conflict with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

SECTION 3: That this ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage, approval and publication as provided by law.

PASSED: This 23rd day of June A. D. 1964.

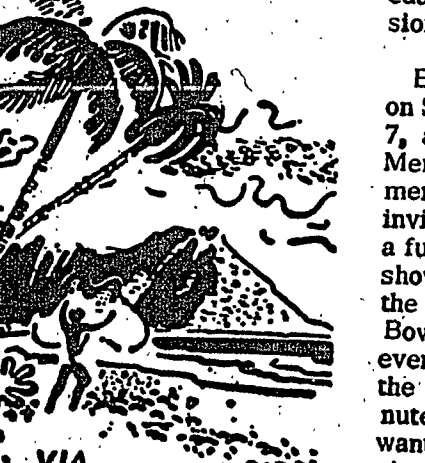

Some Rate Reductions

For Illinois Bell Users

Some rate reductions and a new residence service offering known as Call-Pak Unlimited allowing Morton Grove, Niles telephone users to make as many calls and talk as long as they like to Chicago and Illinois suburbs within 28 miles of downtown Chicago for a fixed monthly charge are included in rates filed Tuesday by Illinois Bell Telephone Co. with the Illinois Commerce Commission.

Commission Chairman James W. Karber said the proposed changes under the tariffs can result in annual customer savings of about \$5.1 million to telephone users in Illinois Bell territory. Negotiations on the new rates were initiated at the request of the commission.

In addition to the new Call-Pak Unlimited plan, the new tariffs include reduction in the one-time charge for color phones, introduction of a new two-line residence service and elimination of the one-time charge on the Bell Chime, a special telephone bell with a musical tone. If approved by the commission, color phone and Bell Chime reductions will be effective immediately; others would be effective August 1.

Karber said the company also is increasing both its capital spending and its operating budgets for customer service improvements by a total of \$22 million for the 1964-65 period. Capital expenditures estimated for this period will total \$345 million.

"Illinois Bell, with its expanded plant construction and improvement program, is responding well to the continuing need to keep the state's economy rolling in high gear," Karber said.

John D. DeButts, Illinois Bell president, said that the longer range effect of increased 1964-65 expenditures is additional work opportunities equivalent to about 1,000 jobs—both inside and outside the company.

Chuck Ball, local manager of Illinois Bell, said present classes of service remain in effect. Residence customers, however, can change to new service classifications. Savings can be realized by choosing one of the new services, depending on individual levels of telephone usage.

Here are details of the proposal:

All new is "Call-Pak Unlimited," an individual line, flat-rate service for residence customers. With this service, customers can call as often as they want to Chicago and Illinois suburbs within a 28-mile radius of downtown Chicago. The monthly charge would be \$20.00.

Other Call-Pak offerings are for customers who do not call so frequently. Savings can be realized by changing to one of the new call unit "packages." With varying call unit allowances, customers can select types of service more closely fitted to their individual needs, it was pointed out.

For suburban customers in this area, there would be three new Call-Pak offerings besides the unlimited service. Each would offer unlimited calling within individual local calling areas, plus allowances of 240, 120 or 60 call units for calls to Chicago and Illinois suburbs 28 miles from Chicago's loop.

This example was given: If an individual line Metropolitan Service customer used 60 call units a month, he could save 70 cents by selecting Call-Pak 60 service.

Another new service is "Call-Pak Limited," an individual line residence service that gives unlimited calling to communities within the local calling area, plus 60 call units on calls to any place with an initial charge of five units or less.

Illinois Bell will make information available directly to customers about these plans. In addition, Illinois Bell has set up a special telephone service "so suburban telephone users in the Metropolitan Calling area can simply dial '511' and be connected with personnel who will explain how the changes can affect their monthly telephone bill. This service will be available during regular business hours, 9:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., Monday through Friday.

The \$3.50 one-time charge on the Bell Chime, a special telephone bell with a musical tone, is eliminated.

The reduction in the charge for a regular or one-button color telephone is from \$7.50 to \$4.00. A similar \$3.50 reduction applies to special types of color phones. The color charge for each additional phone also is reduced from \$5 to \$4.

The proposal also calls for standardizing five minutes as the initial talking period for all Metropolitan Service calls and station-to-station coin calls.

Fire Chief Albert L. Hoelbl, has disclosed that his progressive training program was recently expanded to include a SCUBA diving program, under the supervision of Vern Pedersen, well known scuba diver.

The move was prompted by the ever-increasing deaths due to drowning in the northwest suburban area. Herman Glendon, of Northbrook, Home and Garden Center, 9141 Northbrook Ave., has offered the facilities of his eight and a half foot pool for training purposes.

The four firefighters who volunteered for the assignment on their off-duty time are Lieut. Paul Waldin, Firemen Donald Eckel, Gerald Himmler and Sheldon Mikkelsen. They are currently mastering flipovers and underwater breathing, using tanks and equipment supplied by Pedersen.

Pedersen is one of the founders of the Illinois Council of Skin and Scuba Divers, and currently operates a specialty shop at 3917 N. Ashland Ave.

Chief Hoelbl said that his men undergo a three-hour session once a week. When they be-

come proficient, he added, they will become available to any department requesting their services. Pedersen said that when the four master the basic rudiments of diving, he will take them on a trip to the fireboats stationed on the Chicago River and Lakefront, where they will receive further training on recovery work.

with no increase in rates. There is now a three-minute initial talking period on all calls for which the initial charge is six to nine units, inclusive.

For example, for telephone users in Morton Grove, the unit charge for a 10-minute Metro-Politan Service call to Park Forest is presently seven units for the first three minutes and two units for each additional minute, or a total of 21 units. Under the proposed change, the charge would be seven units for the longer initial period of five minutes, and only one unit for each additional minute, or a total of 12 units.

The new residence service, called the "Two Line Family Plan," is being offered at reduced rates. It would consist of two lines, each with its own telephone number, and equipment enabling the customer to pick up either line at any of his phones. The service also includes a "hold" feature on the first line.

Following are some of the service improvement projects announced by the telephone company:

Additional "after hours service centers" are being established to provide improved emergency customer service during night, holiday and weekend hours. They are reached by dialing repair service.

Transmission improvements on long distance lines will step up "hearing ability." With new maintenance equipment, circuit troubles also will be detected more quickly and the quality of service will be better protected.

Replacement of older types of telephones with new instruments is being accelerated.

Operator assistance services, including those for many of the smaller communities, are being extended and improved. Among the improvements are replacement of some recorded announcements with operator service, and in some communities a simplification of information service.

Construction of underground routes, to replace those on poles, is being speeded up. This increases overall dependability of telephone service.

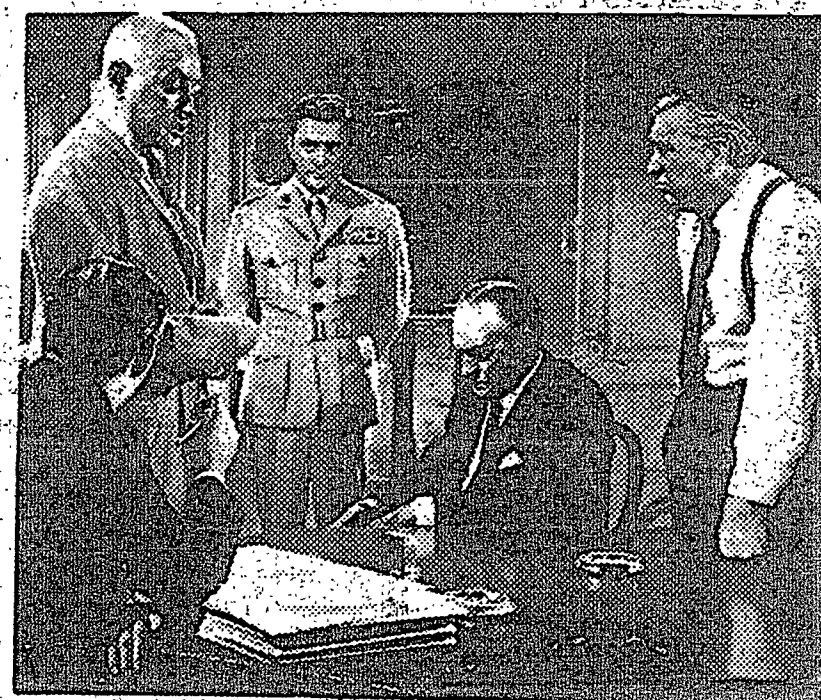
