

We are willing to spend a large amount of money to provide our youth with bigger and better equipped schools, but this money is actually wasted unless we can give them the proper collateral program to go along with their education.

In regard to the acceptability of the site; the Village of Niles has grown tremendously in the past few years to the point where very little land, at reasonable cost, is avail-

The Library Board has done considerable amount of work in trying to find a site that would be adequate and still be accept able to the majority of the residents. During a recent survey devoted to this program, it was found that there is not one site in Niles that would be satisfact. ory to all the residents. The location that has been selected, may not be the best, but it is certainly an acceptable one.

In a recent article, our Planning Commission Chairman claimed the Library Board was wrong in not going to the Planning Commission prior to mam king a report of their program to the people. It is true that the State Statutes of Illinois who Library and Park Boards, do not require them to appear before the official Village Board for approval. It would be a good idea to have these other Boards appear before our planning commission, but this will not occur until the laws in the State are changed. It should also

Tax Rate Increase Approved

Nilesités approved the \$575, 000 bond issue for a library and fees by a 569 to 318 vote and okayed a tax rate increase of .04 mills by a 490 to 395 vote Saturday.

The library building will be located on the north side of Oakton Street, approximately a half a block east of Waukegan Road. It will have 20,500 square feet of floor space and will have shelf space for about 100,000 volumes, almost trip ling the present library's ca-pacity. The building will include an adult room, a children's room and an audio-visual

Niles Library Board already purchased the property, having paid \$21,086 of the total \$74,819. The remaining \$53,733 was included as part of the total \$575,000 bond referendum. The remaining \$531,267 will be used for the building, equipment, landscaping and fees.

Ironically, residents voting at the poll furthest from the library voted greater support for the two issues than residents living closer to the intended building. 66% of the Notre Dame voters favored the building whereas 60% of the Niles Library precinct favored it. Much more strikingly, 60% of Notre Dame voters approved



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
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
