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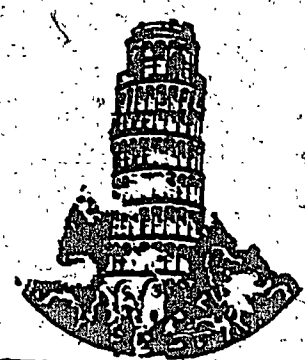

The battle of property rights versus the rights of school children to a good education was the core of an at-larger-heads meeting of the County Zoning Board of Appeals meeting Monday evening at the Des Plaines Village Hall. Attorney Jack Siegal, representing the petitioners, paraded real witnesses which included a real estate dealer, Niles Mayor Blaise, School Board president Epstein and Superintendent Bagg, resident of 18 acres, as well as presenting a petition from 700 residents from neighboring areas, substantiating the need for M1 zoning.

Attorney Haskins, representing some of the landowners, notably Morton Fink, owner of a 50 acre tract, where the Green Lake golf course is located, presented his witnesses, who corroborated residential zoning was more desirable.

The unprecedented meeting was an attempt to give an unincorporated area, what attorney Siegal called "land balance", which would combine residential, commercial and industrial area, to give a more balanced tax equilibrium in this area, thus aiding the school district.

School district 63 superintendent Jim Bagg told the Board of the burdens the school district has. Rumors started when street recommendations plan from traffic survey were interpreted as being finalized, rather than being recommendations from outside traffic firm.

Trustee Marcheschi commented Krilich Builders would be sent a letter to board up property which is hazardous in the Lawrencewood area.

Resident Groneman reminded the Board of the hazards of bike riders in the Oakton Street area, and reminded the Board of the dangers which exist on the street in that area.

The Board adjourned until September 22.

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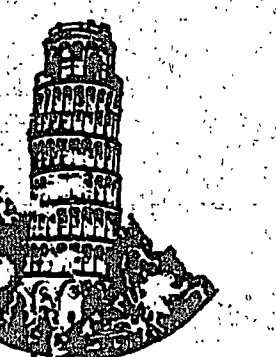
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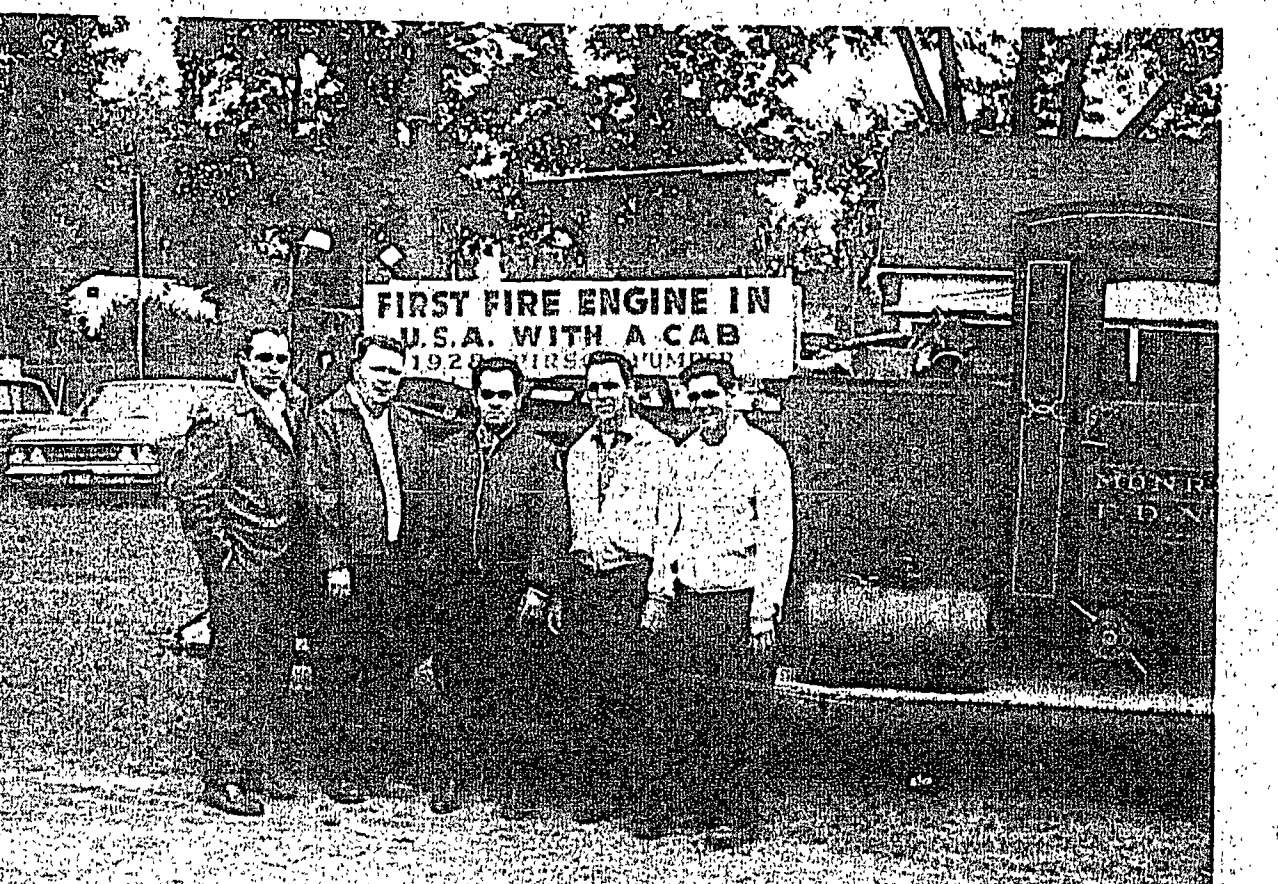

Class rooms will be open and the faculty will be on hand to answer any questions about the busy life of the Patricians at the Academy.

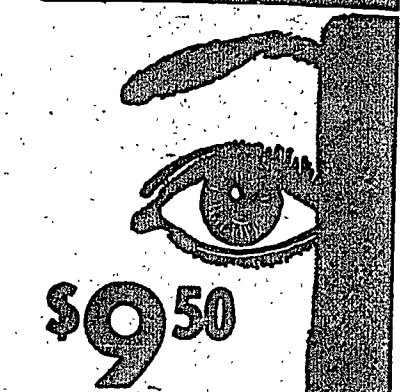

Visitors request cards from their states which give voting qualifications and requirements and illustrations of elections in which only a few votes made the difference.

Contributing to our country's poor voting record are mostly non-voters who are eligible to vote, but simply do not make the effort. They do not believe action individually on their part can make any difference. There is no motivation and thus they do not vote.

The estimated 40 million Americans of voting age who are not registered will give up their right to vote in November unless they see that their names are on the books.

LGH Addition To House Long-Term Patients

A critical need for long-term or chronic care beds exists in the northwest suburban area, according to the Illinois State Department of Health. Based on this finding, a federal grant has been provided to Lutheran General Hospital, Park Ridge.

The \$5.5 million expansion program now underway at Lutheran General provides a complete floor for long term patients. A total of 41 beds will be provided on the second floor of the new west wing.

"This area is basically for patients who do not need our regular nursing care," said T.L. Jacobsen, executive director. "This includes patients in the final stages of recovering from heart attacks, strokes, from broken bones and from other long term illnesses."

Jacobsen noted that the cost of care on this floor would be less than the cost on regular medical-surgical floors.

Each room on this floor is built so that wheel chairs can be accommodated through all doors. A large day room and lounge will be provided for use by patients.

Since many patients will not have to remain in bed, a large dining room will be included. Rehabilitation facilities are included.

Facilities will be provided for occupational therapists and physical therapists. Also included on the floor will be a visitor's lounge, a treatment area and a laboratory. All corridors will have handrails.

Four elevators will service the floor.

"The community has a critical need for these facilities," Jacobsen stated. "We feel that Lutheran General is serving a real need by providing these long-term patient facilities."

The expansion at Lutheran General Hospital is expected to be completed by the end of 1965. In addition to the chronic care and rehabilitation center, the expansion also pro-

vides 46 psychiatric beds and 116 medical-surgical beds. Also included will be a new emergency department, an outpatient clinic, new service areas, enlarged lobby, seven additional elevators and parking for 1,000 cars.

The \$5.5 million total includes a \$712,000 federal grant for long-term beds, psychiatric beds and outpatient facilities. The hospital is financing \$3,560,000.

A public fund drive is now underway to raise \$1,228,000.

Telephone Cable, Accidentally Cut Monday, Quickly Restored

Two telephone cables were accidentally cut Monday, causing service to be interrupted on more than 1000 telephone lines in Niles and Chicago's Newcote area. Affected were business and residence phone users in the area bounded approximately by Milwaukee Avenue on the west, Lehigh Road to the east, Touhy Avenue south and Howard Street to the north.

The interruption occurred when a contractor digging a trench for a new lighting system severed the two cables at about 1 p.m. in the Bunker Hill Estate area of the Chicago Forest Preserves between Hartz Road and Devon Avenue.

Telephone repair crews were rushed to the scene to locate the break, excavate an area large enough to accommodate ten workmen and begin the time-consuming task of splicing in a new section of cable. Some 6000 separate connections had to be identified and made before all customers were returned to service at about 8:30 a.m. Tuesday.

Maine Registration Tonight

Registration for classes in the Maine Adult Evening School continues tonight, 7 to 9 p.m., at Maine East according to Alexander Kruzel, director of the program. The program is beginning its 27th year of conducting educational classes, lectures, seminars and travelogues. Currently more than 200 different courses are available in the area of humanities, business, commerce, language, homemaking, science, technology, art and physical education.

Last year more than 10,000 adults participated in course work at both Maine East and West. Another 2,500 persons regularly attended the two travelogue series sponsored by the adult program. Maine's program was the largest public adult school in the state and was one of the largest in the United States.

Fifteen new courses are being offered amongst the 204 courses offered. Maine East will offer ten new courses including Fencing, How to Find the Right Job and Hold It, Medical Terminology III, How to Conduct a Meeting, Chess, Chinese Cookery, Interior Decorating III, Humanities and Numismatics. The five new courses scheduled at Maine West are Instructional Gymnastics, Short Story Writing, Product Design, Tailoring and Flower Arranging.

Classes at Maine East will begin next Thursday evening, September 24. Maine West will begin on Monday, September 28. Further information can be obtained by calling 825-3435 or 296-3400.

Telephone trucks with loudspeakers toured residential areas out of service explaining what had happened and giving the location of four telephone cars in the areas equipped with mobile phones from which emergency calls could be made. Businesses were contacted by telephone men with some arranging to have their calls transferred to other locations.

"We certainly regret the inconvenience caused out customers while their phones were temporarily out of service," said Chuck Ball, Illinois Bell Manager. "Our crews worked through the night Monday and repairs were made as fast as humanly possible."

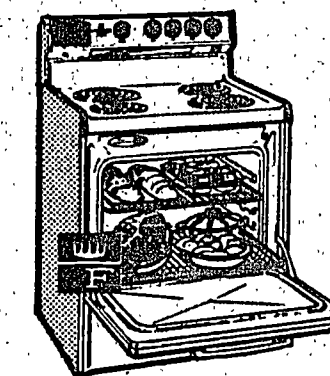

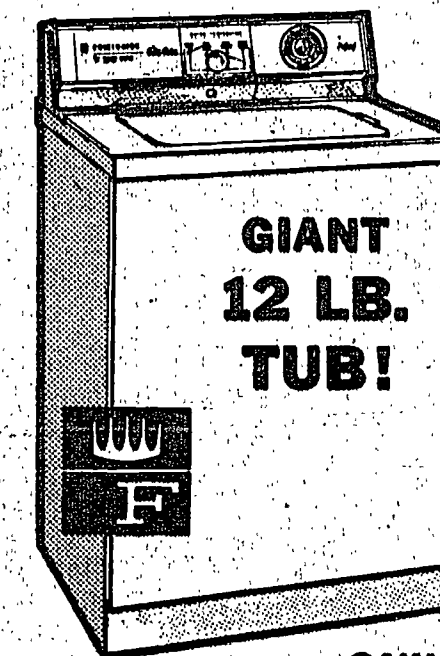

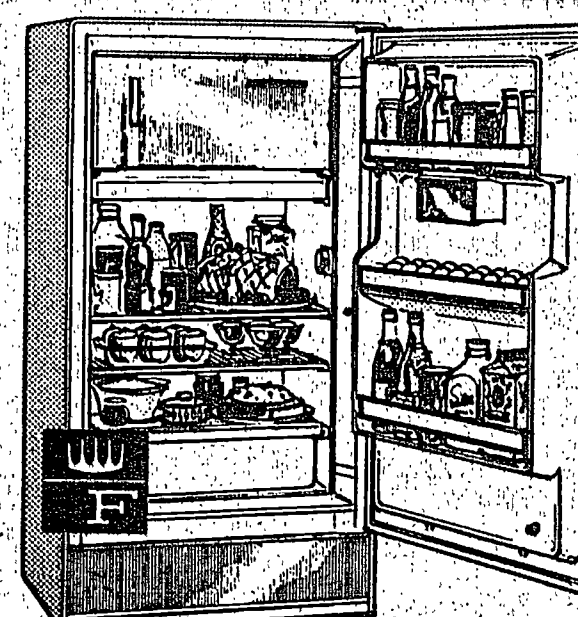
