
Niles Lions Club Expresses Gratitude

The annual campaign which opens Nov. 16 supports the program of TB control offered by the Tuberculosis County. Seals help provide chest x-rays in communities and industries, tuberculin testing in schools, medical research projects, as well as public and medical education programs.

"Seal funds are also engaged in a counterback against respiratory diseases which affect the breathing system, " Mrs. Lindstrom said, "This includes the potentially deadly forms of lung ailments such as asthma, emphysema, chronic bronchitis and certain fungus infections of the lungs."

Two co-chairmen will assist with the campaign activities, They are Mrs. Stephan Ciesol of 7635 Osceola, and Mrs. John Annas, 7727 N. Oriole, This is the third year for Mrs. Ciesol and the second for Mrs. Annas.

Mrs. Lindstrom, a past pres-ident of the Park Ridge Homemaker's association is current-ly social chairman of that group, She is also active in church work.

"Tuberculosis is a long way from being a conquered dis-ease," Mrs. Lindstrom said. "Many people have TB without knowing it. Unless these people are found and treated, they can go on infecting others.

District 64 Studies Future Building Needs

the Building Committee of the Board of Education of School District #64 held a special meeting to discuss a recent survey which was made of comnunity growth and school needs.

This projection assumes that all of the empty land in the district will be used for homes or some form of community development within five years.

Along with increases school population the question of esablishment of school buildings in safer areas was discussed. The idea was explored whether the present Oakton building could be disposed of and at what figure, allowing a new building to be constructed using the funds obtained from the sale of the Oakton School, This school is located in an area which is becoming commercial. A widening of Oakton Street is being planned. These develop-ments will increase the danger of multiple and hazardous school crossings. However, be-cause the school is located in a commercial area, the value of the land is increased and a sale of such property is estimated to be likely to produce enough money to erect a new building on a safer site north of Oakton on Western Avenue, with only \$75,000 additional monies being needed.



Audio-Visual Approach In Teaching

Nilehi North has been designed around a modern concept in teaching - that of the audio-visual approach.

As a result, the audio-visual center is equipped with more than \$31,000 worth of capital equipment to help the teacher communicate more effectively with his students, reported Hal Cress, audio-visual co-ordina-

Equipment includes 16mm sound projectors, Thermofax duplicators, and a full range of audio equipment. Provision for closed circuit television has been made for possible installation in the next few years.

During the first six weeks of school, Nilehi North teachers checked about 300 motion pictures alone, reported Cress, recordings.

Niles North, designed on the "school within a school" plan, has four separate halls, or small schools. Each contain and small group instruction.

Large multi-purpose rooms are equipped with modern audio-visual materials, including opaque and overhead projectors, and translucent back-proiection screens. Tiered seating for the students in these rooms is designed for a better learnsituation.

When a special demonstration is to be scheduled, the teacher and his class report to the multi-purpose room alone or with other classes. At the conclusion of a demonstration. the classes return to their own classrooms for a discussion of what has taken place.

According to reports from the faculty, the situation offers many advantages over traditional methods; among them is the saving of classroom time, more efficient distribution of audio-visual materials, and improved quality of presentation.

Cress emphasized that the chief purpose of audio-visual aids is to upgrade the relationship between teacher and student by presenting curricular material in ways that can be understood more readily than is possible in alecture-discussion class.

The handling of equipment is done entirely by the student body, under the administration of Cress. Students are specially trained to operate the equipment, and they are always available to aid the teaching staff in any audio-visual presen-

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League Of Women Voters News

Public support for additional funds and personnel for Family (ourt was asked by the newly appointed court administrator John P. O'Brien at a meeting of the Cook County Council of the League of Women Voters November 17 in Chicago. The Morton Grove League has studied I amily Court quite intensively under the leadership of Mrs. Oscar " Liskar and Mrs. Phillip Gould and is always interested in the new developments taking place in the Court.

O'Brien said Family Court exists to deal in "individualized justice" and must have properly qualified staff in order to provide the judges with background and recommendations on children before the court. Charging that Cook County lags behind in providing competitive salaries for professional workers in Family Court, O'Brien also noted a shortage in trained personnel and commented on plans to recruit people to fill positions already budgeted.

In addition, he 'announced plans for a work-study program in cooperation with schools of social work, under which graduate students would work in Family Court while completing their studies. An "internal merit system" is-being developed by his office.

The need for additional "foot soldiers"----the probation officers---is particularly vital, O'Brien said, because good probation work is far less costly and more successful in rehabilitation than custodial services.

However, he called on other community agencies, especially the public schools, to carry on the work of prevention of de-

Speaking at the afternoon session of the all-day meeting Morris Wexler, President of the John Howard Association which works in the field of prisoner rehabilitation, outlined plans for a "legislative package" to improve correctional procedures. Number one is a unified department of corrections for Cook County, com-bined with establishment of a full-time parole board for the state, continuation of the new bail bond provisions, and the beginning of work release programs and halfway houses.

"Accomplishment of this program," Wexler said, "will advance Illinois beyond our dreams of ten years ago,"

Work release programs, exemplified in the Huber Plan in Wisconsin, permit prisoners to work while serving time. Halfway houses introduce about-tobe paroled prisoners to the urban setting and give counseling in finding employment and making adjustments.


