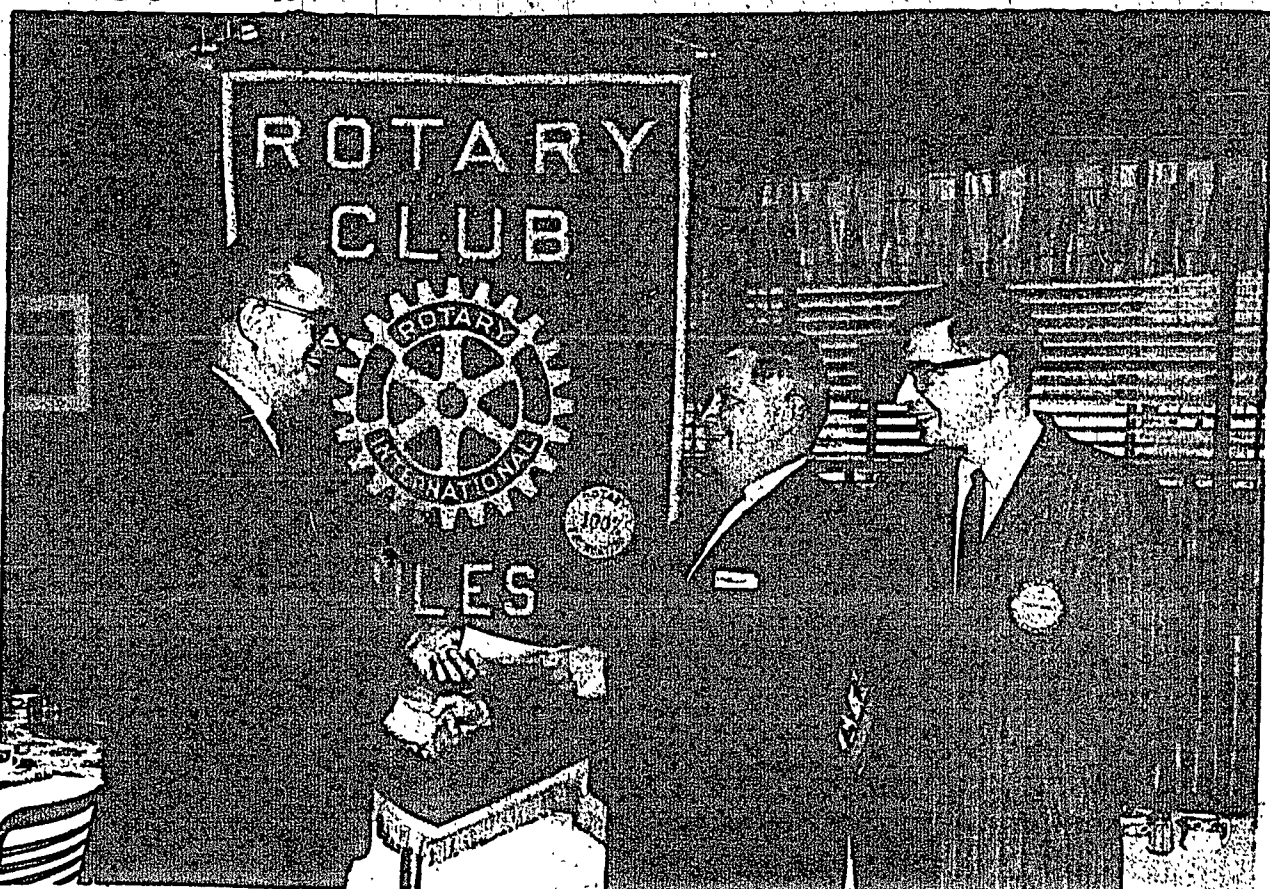
## Niles Lions Club Expresses Gratitude

Mrs. Joseph E. Lindstrom of 7711 N. Oriole, has been named Christmas Seal Chairman for Niles.

Her appointment to the 1964 Christmas Seal team was made by H. Ferris White Jr., general chairman of the campaign in Chicago and Cook County.

The annual campaign which opens Nov. 16 supports the program of TB control offered by the Tuberculosis County. Seals help provide chest x-rays in communities and industries, tuberculosis testing in schools, medical research projects, as well as public and medical education programs.

"Seal funds are also engaged in a counterattack against respiratory diseases which affect the breathing system," Mrs. Lindstrom said. "This includes the potentially deadly

forms of lung ailments such as asthma, emphysema, chronic bronchitis and certain fungus infections of the lungs."

Two co-chairmen will assist with the campaign activities. They are Mrs. Stephan Ciesol of 7695 Osceola, and Mrs. John Annas, 7727 N. Oriole. This is the third year for Mrs. Ciesol and the second for Mrs. Annas.

Mrs. Lindstrom, a past president of the Park Ridge Home-makers association is currently social chairman of that group. She is also active in church work.

"Tuberculosis is a long way from being a conquered disease," Mrs. Lindstrom said. "Many people have TB without knowing it. Unless these people are found and treated, they can go on infecting others."

## District 64 Studies Future Building Needs

On Wednesday, November 4, the Building Committee of the Board of Education of School District #64 held a special meeting to discuss a recent survey which was made of community growth and school needs.

This projection assumes that all of the empty land in the district will be used for homes or some form of community development within five years.

Along with increases school population the question of establishment of school buildings in safer areas was discussed. The idea was explored whether the present Oakton building could be disposed of and at what figure, allowing a new building to be constructed using the funds obtained from the sale of the Oakton School. This school is located in an area which is becoming commercial. A widening of Oakton Street is being planned. These developments will increase the danger of multiple and hazardous school crossings. However, because the school is located in a commercial area, the value of the land is increased and a sale of such property is estimated to be likely to produce enough money to erect a new building on a safer site north of Oakton on Western Avenue, with only \$75,000 additional monies being needed.

Another proposal to meet the expected increase in school population is to build a new square dance club.

pulation in other parts of School District 64 was to construct a library and a classroom at Carpenter School; three classrooms and a library at the Edison School; two classrooms, an auditorium, a library, and a teachers' lounge at the Madison School; and a shop and art wing at the Emerson Jr. High School.

Various methods of financing this construction (if such construction is approved) were discussed. These included the possible sale of Oakton School, site and building, and the possible sale of four acres presently owned by District #64 at Oriole Avenue, and a possible bond issue.

These questions will be discussed further by the Board of Education at its regular meeting on Wednesday, November 18, 400 S. Western. The public is invited to attend.

## Niles Dogs Must Be Licensed

All dogs, kept, harbored or maintained by their owners in the Village of Niles shall be licensed and registered. Dog licenses shall be issued by the Village Clerk for each calendar year upon payment of a Two (\$2.00) Dollar license fee. Said fee shall become due and payable on January 1st of each year. All licenses shall be valid for not to exceed one (1) year after issuance. The owner shall state at the time of application for such license and upon printed forms provided for such purpose, his name and address and the name, breed, color, and sex of each dog owned by him or kept by him. No license shall be issued unless a current rabies inoculation certificate is presented when the license application is made. (Sec. 1)

## Milwaukee Ave. Lights Go On December 14

At Tuesday's abbreviated village board meeting Mayor Blase announced ceremonies dedicating the new Milwaukee Avenue Street lights will take place at the Milwaukee-Oakton corner. On this Monday night Blase will pull the switch which will light up Milwaukee Avenue.

In other actions Tuesday night Trustee Ken Scheel reported 75% of homes visited have been inspected in the first phase of

the fire inspection program for residences. School said Niles had 761 alarms in 1963 which led to the new fire inspection program. The 7000 block on Keeney and the Oakton Court area have been inspected as of Tuesday.

Trustees voted 5 to 1 denying annexation for five lots on Maynard Road alongside the northerly Golden 40 acre property after village department heads recommended against the

annexation. Only Scheel voted against the rejection.

Berkowsky motion approved waiving \$75 re-zoning fee for Lutheran Church of Resurrection for property on north Sherman Road.

Blase reported 100 acre unincorporated area industrial zoning request has been heard by the County Board and a decision is pending.

Bids for a tractor and a 21/2 ton truck were referred to committee.

Milwaukee-Dempster special use zoning for gas station were formally approved.

Attorney Geocaris reported the petition for disconnection for the Golden 40 acre area from a North Maine (East Maine) fire district has been filed. A North Maine area already has completed such a disconnection.

Resident Mike Wozniak questioned the Board about receiving a brochure reporting on

the All America city bid of Niles and Blase said a report will eventually be distributed. However, presently Blase did not believe such a brochure would be wise to distribute, likely not until after a decision has been received by the All America Committee.

## Caldwell Zoning Stays Residential

Trustees unanimously approved the October 29 zoning board decision denying manufacturing zoning to the residential area on the east side of Caldwell Avenue between Gross Point Road and the Harcourt, Brace Company to the north.

The decision ended, for the time being, a battle between residents in the area, who were about equally divided on the zoning matter, half favoring to remain residential, while the other half favoring the manufacturing zoning. It also was the climax to a one-woman battle by a local resident, Mrs. S. Johnstone, who fought the battle to retain the residential zoning in the "blue blood" area.

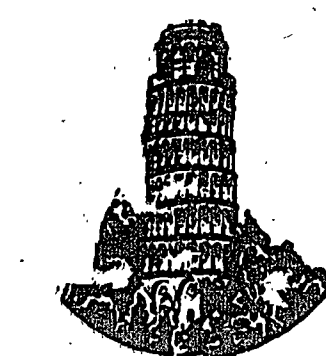
After the vote was completed Mayor Blase lashed out at an anonymous letter-writer who distributed a letter thru the community which Blase said reflected on the Board. He termed the non-signed letter "petty", said it was unfortunate it was written, and "this Board judges on the equities of a case, and it would not be intimidated (by such a letter)". In the letter Blase said it "inferred the decision of the Board was pre-conceived and reflected on some of the Board's members. Blase called an unsigned letter "cowardly" and said he hoped it wouldn't happen again.

Citizens in East Maine School District - 63 have organized a committee to assist the Board of Education in informing the public of the needs of the schools.

A committee of 63 has been organized to work with representatives of the Board of Education. The committee is unique in that there are eight sets of husband and wife co-chairmen. The co-chairmen for the various school attendance areas include Mr. and Mrs. A. L. LeTourneau for Ballard School area, Mr. and Mrs. Stan Lowe for Oak School Area, Mr. and Mrs. Arnold Kapp for Melzer School area, Mr. and Mrs. William O'Brien for Washington School area, Mr. and Mrs. Roy Makela for East Maine Jr. High School area, Mr. and Mrs. Stephen Hoffman for Nelson School area, Mr. and Mrs. Eugene Tarkoff for Mark Twain school area, and Mr. and Mrs. Thad Hoppe for Woodrow Wilson School area.

The committee plans to distribute informational material to the residents of the school

district between now and December 12, when the referendum will be held. Parent groups will be organized by the committee to serve as telephone representatives, transportation helpers, and clerical helpers to assist with distribution of materials.

At a meeting of the Committee of 63 held last week, complete organizational plans were made to assist the Board of Education in the campaign. "We must place the welfare of our children foremost in our thinking," said E.W.J. Bagg, Superintendent, addressing the group. "The need for additional classroom space is evident. An increase in the tax levy is also imperative in order to meet the rising costs of education."

Earl Epstein, president of the Board of Education, told the group that the growth in the district was phenomenal. He explained that the bond referendum would be used to build a new school on the site owned by the district at Potter Road and Church Street. He also indicated that additions were

planned for Melzer and Nelson Schools to serve the Morton Grove area of the school district.

Arnold Kapp, co-chairman, pointed out to the group that if the tax levy is approved, no levy can be made until 1965 and any increase will not be added to the tax bills until 1966.

Following the general meeting, the co-chairmen met with parents from their area to formulate additional plans for informing the parents of the problems of the district.

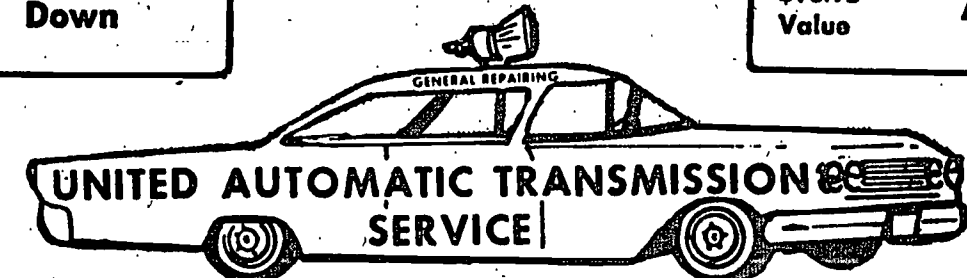

## Another Morn 'nother Yawn.

Charles Dickens "Tale of Two Cities" had its modern counterpart last week, proof that the classics never die, merely move into contemporary living. The young German boy who fled East Germany, leaving his wife behind and then returned with a look-alike girlfriend, and used the girls' identity card to retrieve his wife, this time leaving the innocently betrayed girl behind, must have great appeal for James Bond followers. But the 18 year old girl who spent six weeks in prison, simply because she was duped by the man she loved, had doubtlessly had enough of romantic intrigue to sour her on men for a long, long time, if not forever.

We can be proud of our Catholic Bishops, led by Albert Cardinal Meyer of Chicago, who demanded of Pope Paul VI to allow the vote for religious freedom to be taken, at the Ecumenical Council, in Rome. They were defeated in their demands, but it is such a tremendous step forward, towards better understanding between Christians and non-Christians.

My volatile nature, fortunately kept subdued by daily pressures, erupts occasionally and involves me in binges of escapism. This time the interlude is an intellectual one—would that it could last! Shall I name drop a bit? Thank you, I will. Leon Uris—Armageddon; Thomas Hanna—The Lyrical Existentialists; James W. Silver—Mississippi, the Closed Society; Voltaire—says from the pen of the immortal one; Sigmund Freud—A General Introduction to Psychoanalysis. Being perfectly democratic even during my intellectual binges, I also am reading "None dare call it Treason" a vitriolic book promoted by the John Birch Society, assailing the so-called internal communistic dangers the government is infiltrated with and "Danger on the Right" a book sponsored by the Anti-Defamation League, of the B'nai B'rith Organization, warning us of the destroying influences the John Birch Society and allied groups are using to promote hate and fear. How do I work this into my schedule? Who has a schedule? I surround myself with all these books, spread the vacuum over one of the rooms, to pretend that I am in the middle of my daily routine, allow a dust cloth to peep through here and there, then lock myself in the den and pursue the study of these books, systematically. A page, a chapter, the whole book—as the mood prevails, until 3 P.M. Then I become the mother, the wife, and drudge that those titles allow me to be. ## Audio-Visual Approach In Teaching

Nileh North has been designed around a modern concept in teaching — that of the audio-visual approach.

As a result, the audio-visual center is equipped with more than \$31,000 worth of capital equipment to help the teacher communicate more effectively with his students, reported Hal Cress, audio-visual co-ordinator.

Equipment includes 16mm sound projectors, ThermoFax duplicators, and a full range of audio equipment. Provision for closed circuit television has been made for possible installation in the next few years.

During the first six weeks of school, Nileh North teachers checked about 300 motion pictures alone, reported Cress. This is in addition to numerous film strips, records, and tape recordings.

Niles North, designed on the "school within a school" plan, has four separate halls, or small schools. Each contains facilities capable of both large and small group instruction.

Large multi-purpose rooms are equipped with modern audio-visual materials, including opaque and overhead projectors, and translucent back-projection screens. Tiered seating for the students in these rooms is designed for a better learning situation.

When a special demonstration is to be scheduled, the teacher and his class report to the multi-purpose room alone or with other classes. At the conclusion of a demonstration, the classes return to their own classrooms for a discussion of what has taken place.

According to reports from the faculty, the situation offers many advantages over traditional methods; among them is the saving of classroom time, more efficient distribution of audio-visual materials, and improved quality of presentation.

Cress emphasized that the chief purpose of audio-visual aids is to upgrade the relationship between teacher and student by presenting curricular material in ways that can be understood more readily than is possible in lecture-discussion class.

The handling of equipment is done entirely by the student body, under the administration of Cress. Students are specially trained to operate the equipment, and they are always available to aid the teaching staff in any audio-visual presentation.

## League Of Women Voters News

Public support for additional funds and personnel for Family Court was asked by the newly appointed court administrator John P. O'Brien at a meeting of the Cook County Council of the League of Women Voters, November 17 in Chicago. The Morton Grove League has studied Family Court quite intensively under the leadership of Mrs. Oscar Liskar and Mrs. Phillip Gould and is always interested in the new developments taking place in the Court.

O'Brien said Family Court exists to deal in "individualized justice" and must have properly qualified staff in order to provide the judges with background and recommendations on children before the court. Charging that Cook County lags behind in providing competitive salaries for professional workers in Family Court, O'Brien also noted a shortage in trained personnel and commented on plans to recruit people to fill positions already budgeted.

In addition, he announced plans for a work-study program in cooperation with schools of social work, under which graduate students would work in Family Court while completing their studies. An "internal merit system" is being developed by his office.

The need for additional "foot soldiers"—the probation officers—is particularly vital, O'Brien said, because good probation work is far less costly and more successful in rehabilitation than custodial services.

However, he called on other community agencies, especially the public schools, to carry on the work of prevention of delinquency.

Speaking at the afternoon session of the all-day meeting, Morris Wecker, President of the John Howard Association which works in the field of prisoner rehabilitation, outlined plans for a "legislative package" to improve correctional procedures. Number one is a unified department of corrections for Cook County, combined with establishment of a full-time parole board for the state, continuation of the new bail bond provisions, and the beginning of work release programs and halfway houses.

"Accomplishment of this program," Wecker said, "will advance Illinois beyond our dreams of ten years ago."

Work release programs, exemplified in the Huber Plan in Wisconsin, permit prisoners to work while serving time. Halfway houses introduce about-to-be paroled prisoners to the urban setting and give counseling in finding employment and making adjustments.
