

A local family in Niles, the husband burdened by overwhelming hospital expenses, was aided by many, One family we know paraded up and down our street gathering can goods for this family, They received a meat donation from a butcher, money from some residents, and devoted all day Sunday bringing this bounty to the peom ple in need, Because hospital dressings were also needed a contact was made and they too will be provided. This effort was made by one family. We're sure there are many examples of kindnesses by many who sought out those in need, and made the load a little less,

But there was sadness and tragedy in the area as well. A local resident, who is a friend of ours, allegedly stabbed his

les court when the husband was arraigned. He was haggard, utterly exhausted from his night of trial, Standing before a judge, he only asked about who would care for his children. He then asked to speak privately to his mother and was directed to a room off the main courtroom, Placing his arm around his elderly mother, he led her very slowly from the courtroom.

A Chicago newspaper photom grapher, one of those hard-bite ten newsmen, waited impatiently for them to emerge from the private room. He was worried about meeting a deadline. Finally, after about twenty min-utes, the defendant led his mother from the room. He told the photographer he did not want any pictures taken of his mother. The photographer agreed. He, himself, hid his face from the camera as the flashbulb went off. The photographer said he would not take a second picture and the defendant removed the hat which hid his face from the camera. After he left the courtroom, the photographer turned to the bailiff and said, "I had to take the picture, but they'll never use a picture like this,"





Vikings Beat Niles West 70-25



3 Day Postal Vacations

Most of the netion's 590,000 postal employees will get a three day Christmas weekend and at the same time the government will save an estimated \$3 to \$4 million, Postmaster General John A. Gronouski an-nounced today,

In a directive to all postmasters, Mr. Gronouski suspended normal mail deliveries on Saturday, December 26, This will give an extra day off to most of those employees who normally work that day,

Ordinarily, those regular employees who work Saturday would be due a compensatory day off the following week, By granting them relief from work December 26, the necessity to pay substitute employees to replace them during their compensatory leave day is elimin-

Past experience has shown that by noon on December 24, post offices throughout the na-tion have been cleared of holiday and business mail,

The Postmaster General said regular holiday schedules will be observed by all post offices on December 26, with two hour service being provided for firms that normally call for the mail, With this exception, no on ther post office window services will be provided, Post office lobbles will also be open on a holiday schedule,

Deliveries of gift parcels, and special delivery mail, and perishable articles will be provided, Mr. Gronouski said, and a sufficient number of employees will be retained to per-form the necessary distribution of incoming and outgoing mail. The order does not affect deliveries by rural route carriers.

All mail deposited in lobbies and collection boxes will be picked up on a holiday schedule and dispatched as usual.
