Cecily Syputl Park Recreation Supervisor

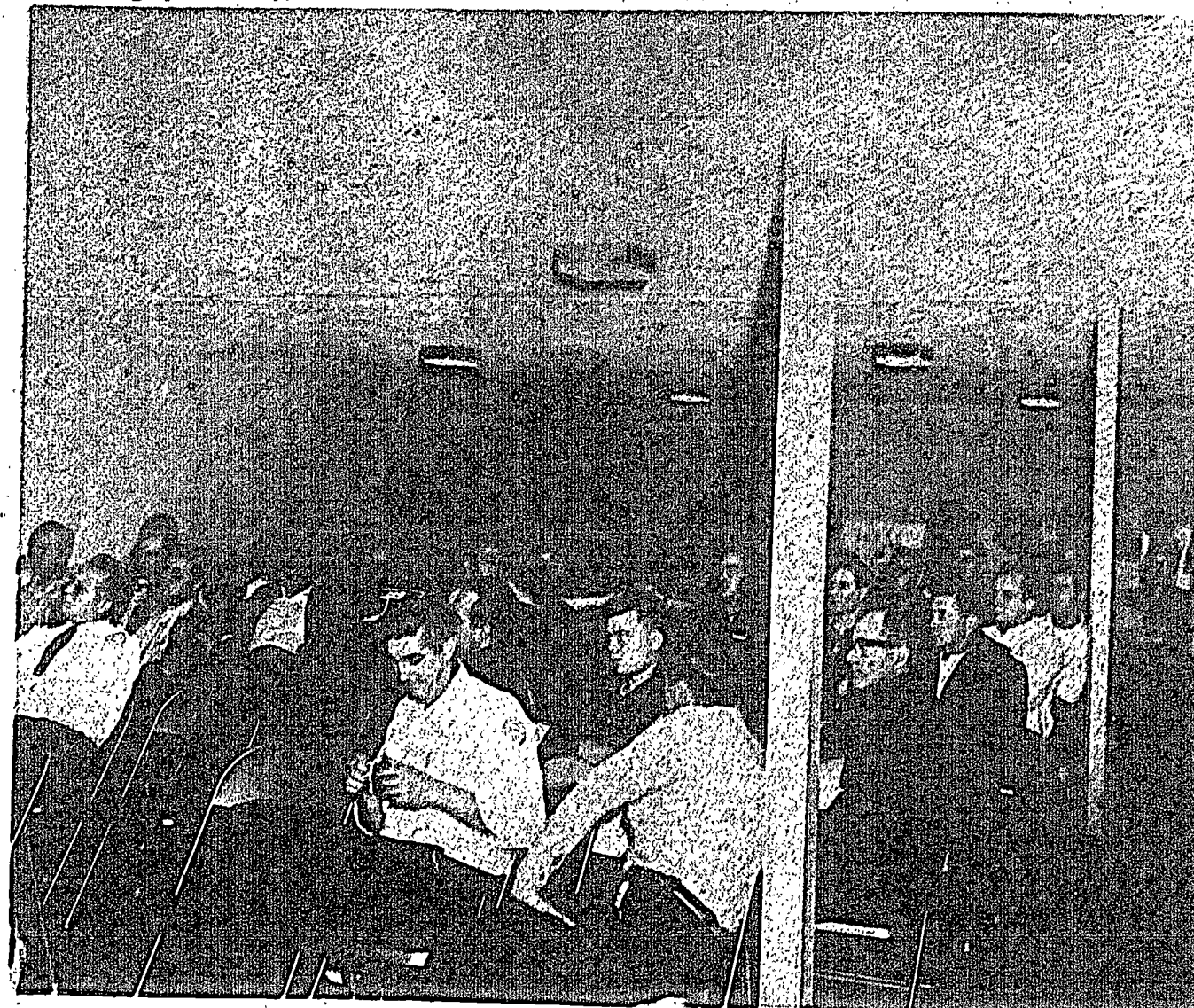
The Niles Board of Park Commissioners wish to announce the appointment of Cecily Syputl as the new supervisor of Recreation for the new Niles.

Expert advice was offered by Viator Dionne and Paul Tinsley, safety directors for the northern division of the Public Service Company. Dionne is a 29-year veteran with the public utility company while Tinsley has spent 20 years with the firm.

On December 1, 1964 Vehicle Stickers and Dog Tags went on sale for 1965. To obtain a dog tag, you must show proof of rabies inoculation (certificates or tag).

Voter registration is now being taken for those residents who have not yet registered in the Village.

Village Clerk's office is located at 7166 Milwaukee Avenue, Niles, Illinois. Hours are Monday through Friday, 8:30 A.M. to 5:00 P.M., Saturdays, from 8:30 A.M. to 12:00 noon.

The group of 33 firemen, 11 policemen and 5 public works employees, hosted by Fire Chief Albert L. Hoelbl, were shown slides depicting the "do's and don't's" of electricity. Dionne said that there will be times when public servants will be called to the scene of an emergency where as much as 24,500 volts of electricity will be in question. He also explained firefighting methods in various electrical installations.

Dionne also extended a word of caution to both the emergency workers and the general public. If an auto accident occurs where the car comes in contact with live wires, the passengers should remain inside the auto until the electricity is cut off. Do not attempt to leave the vehicle, he emphasized.

Dionne and Tinsley train approximately 1,000 Public Service employees in the northern division four times each year. In addition, they visit crews in the fields to observe their safety habits, check equipment, and teach vehicle accident prevention.

Since the toys are being collected by the Marine Reserve at the Naval Air Station in Glenview, the girls are planning a tour of the base when they deliver their last toy.

Smigiel Is Benched In Niles Open Letter

Hon. Nicholas B. Blase, Mayor
Village of Niles

My dear Mayor:

This will serve to formally advise you of an advancement in our Judicial System which, with your permission, will affect the operation of the Courtroom in your Village of Niles.

I am pleased to advise that Judge Boyle has now assigned to the third district two additional Associate Judges—Judge Anton Smigiel and Judge James Felt.

As you know, Judge Smigiel has in the past served the Village of Niles as its Police Magistrate, and later, as Judge of the Niles Village Court. It is indeed a pleasure to announce his return to the Village of Niles after having served with credit in the Divorce Division of the Circuit Court based in Chicago.

With your permission I have designated the Niles Courtroom as the residence Court of Associate Judge Anton Smigiel, and for that purpose have, subject to your permission, assigned to him the Chambers in that Courtroom as his regularly established office. By this action, your Police Department and your Village Officials will have available, full time, the assistance of a competent Associate Judge to perform all necessary judicial functions. He will preside in the Courtroom on three of the five Court days, hearing, among other things, misdemeanor cases arising in Niles, Park Ridge, Harwood Heights, Norridge and surrounding areas.

I again express the gratitude of Judge Boyle and myself to you, the Trustee of the Village of Niles and the Officials of the Village for the most gratifying cooperation which any Court System could expect from a municipality.

From The Left Hand

In the Class C movies of the thirties, newsmen were depicted as fast-talking wisecracks, hard-bitten cynics, who were not easily moved by the human scene which surrounded them. It might have been story material on the celluloid, but the myth never carried weight among those who knew better.

Here in our small area of the world two stories passed our way this week and the kindness and joy, sadness and tragedy, would move any man.

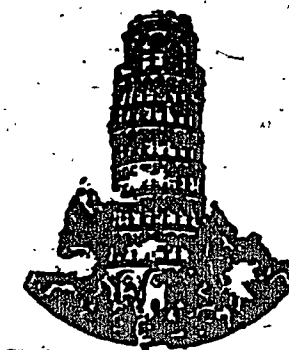
Quietly, and without fanfare, individuals and groups have been working for days, aiding several families whose misfortunes seem so disheartening this time of the year. Woman's Club, Lions Clubs, Legion groups, and individuals quickly aided several unfortunate families in Niles. At St. John Brebeuf, one class chose a Negro family across town to aid, and delivered clothes and food to them. A local family in Niles, the husband burdened by overwhelming hospital expenses, was aided by many. One family we know paraded up and down our street gathering can goods for this family. They received a meat donation from a butcher, money from some residents, and devoted all day Sunday bringing this bounty to the people in need. Because hospital dressings were also needed a contact was made and they too will be provided. This effort was made by one family. We're sure there are many examples of kindnesses by many who sought out those in need, and made the load a little less.

But there was sadness and tragedy in the area as well. A local resident, who is a friend of ours, allegedly stabbed his wife to death after a quarrel Monday night.

Tuesday we were in the Niles court when the husband was arraigned. He was haggard, utterly exhausted from his night of trial. Standing before a judge, he only asked about who would care for his children. He then asked to speak privately to his mother and was directed to a room off the main courtroom. Placing his arm around his elderly mother, he led her very slowly from the courtroom.

A Chicago newspaper photographer, one of those hard-bitten newsmen, waited impatiently for them to emerge from the private room. He was worried about meeting a deadline. Finally, after about twenty minutes, the defendant led his mother from the room. He told the photographer he did not want any pictures taken of his mother. The photographer agreed. He, himself, hid his face from the camera as the flashbulb went off. The photographer said he would not take a second picture and the defendant removed the hat which hid his face from the camera. After he left the courtroom, the photographer turned to the bailiff and said, "I had to take the picture, but they'll never use a picture like this."

With mixed emotions, the photographer packed his gear, and turning to the bailiff repeated, "It's my job, y'know... but I'm also a Christian."

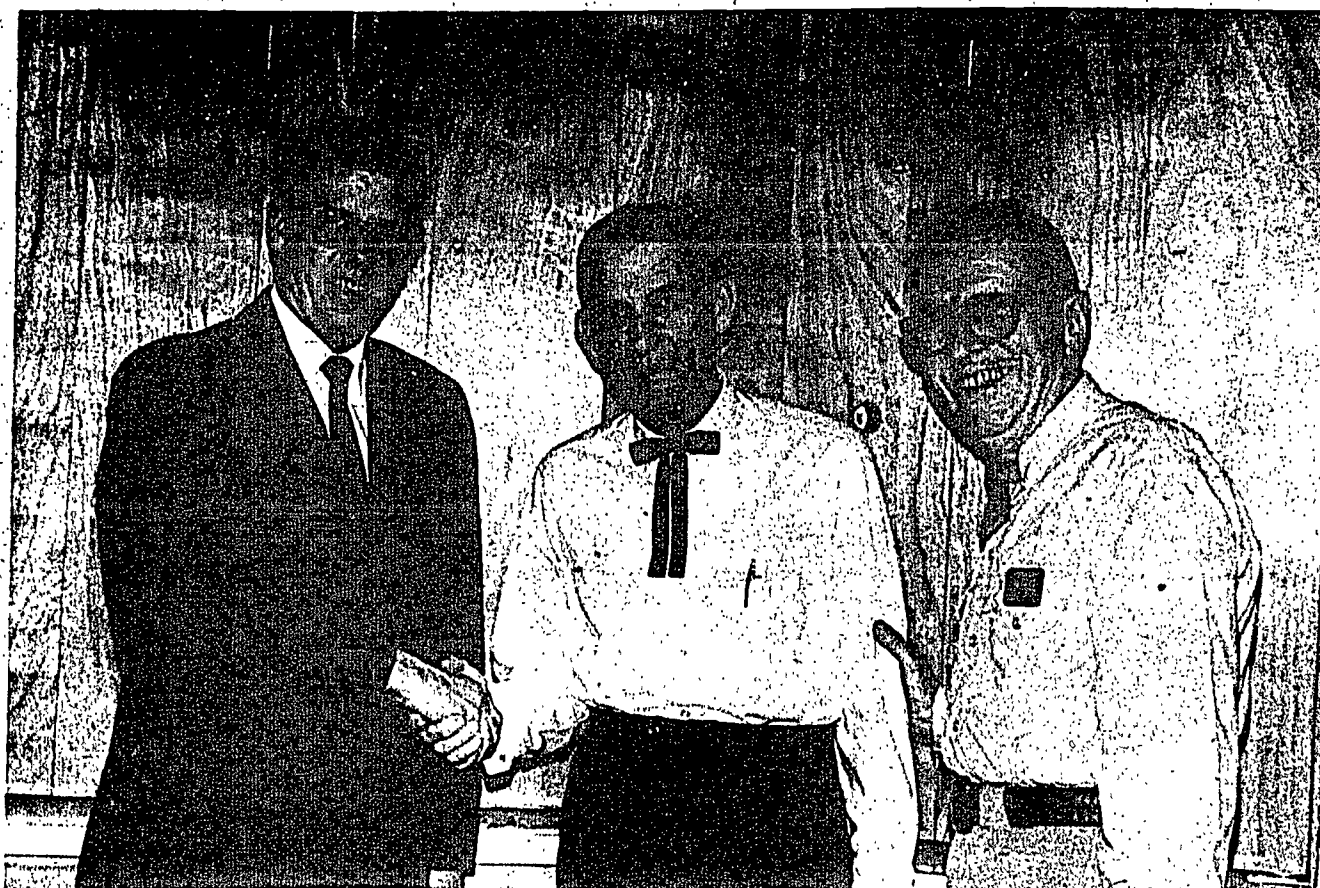

Tickets Still Available For Legion Party

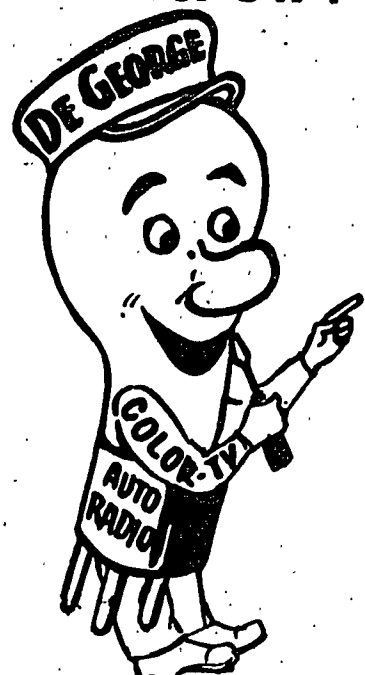
There's a few tickets available yet for next Thursday's annual New Year's Eve Party at the Morton Grove American Legion Post #134, 6140 Dempster St.

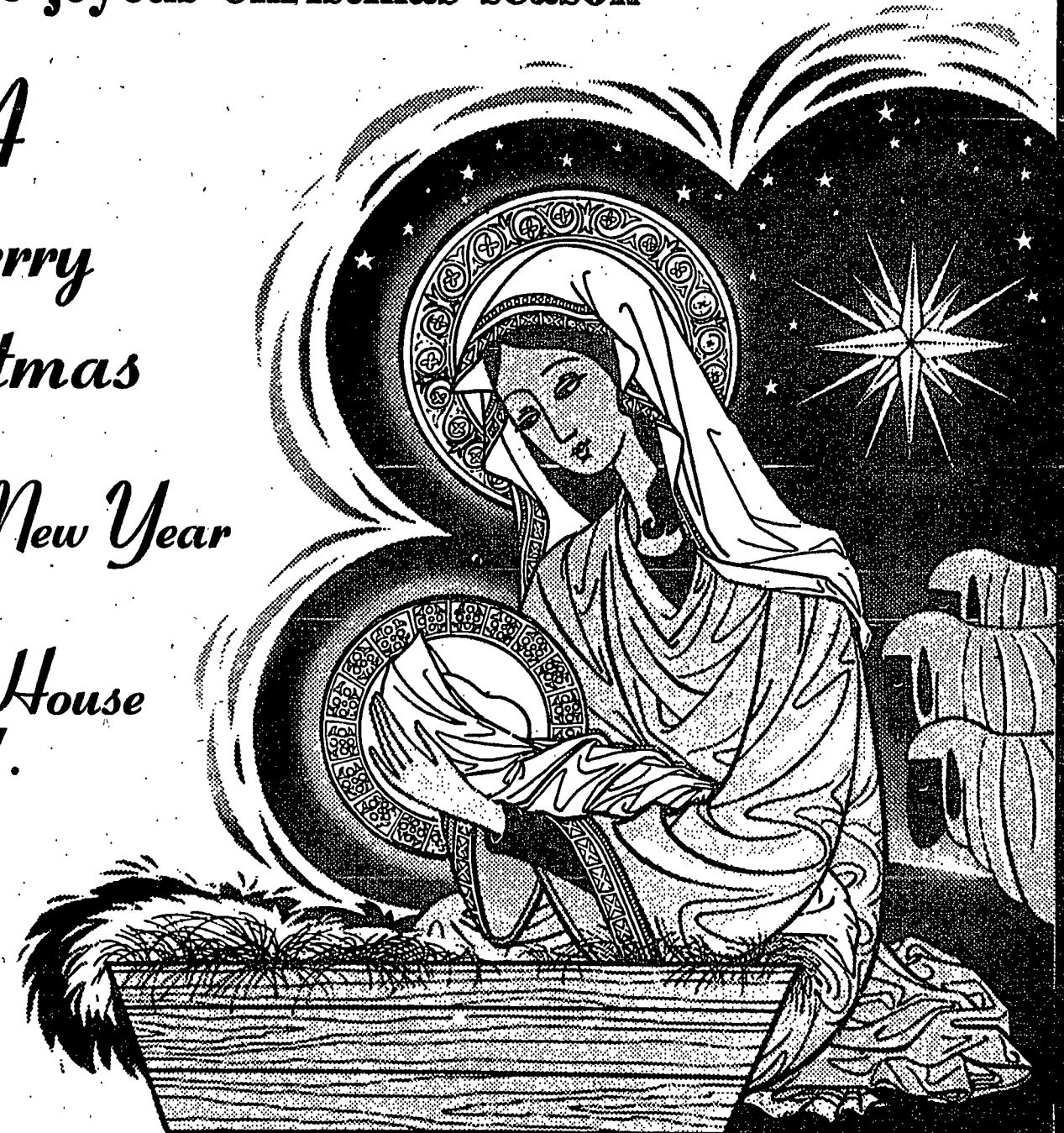
trekking, William Barker. Other committee chairman appointments, will be made shortly.
