told THE BUGLE he would like "to sit down" with Blase and straighten out some past grievances, before making a final decision. The very nature of such a consideration points to the likelihood Scheel will come back into the fold.

Szymanski, who briefly had falling health while a village board member, is mulling whether or not to run again. Szymanski has served in some civic capacity for the past ten years, and the public service seems to be a way of life for him. Few persons think he will withdraw from office this time.

Presently, only former police officer Bill Reed has received petitions from the village clerk's office. Reed, who has become disenchanted with the present administration, has made it known to many that he will seek the office of Mayor in April. He has been beating the bushes in search of running mates, asking several well-known residents to join with him in political battle.

Former 12 year trustee John Poeschl is vacationing in Florida for the next two weeks, prior to deciding on his political future. Poeschl, candidly admits he would be interested in returning to the political wars. However, while he has been friendly with Mayor Blase there seems little opportunity for him running with Blase.

Other likely candidates, who have not committed themselves, include Bill Zimos, Blase's chairman in 1961, who chagrined at not being slated with the party in 1963; ran independently, losing by little more than 100 votes.

Other interested residents include Frank Troiani, of Acro Builders, who worked on behalf of Ed Ciccone in 1961, and perennial candidate Ben Sosnowski, of Kirk Lane, who lost a close race six years ago when running with Poeschl and John Stanley, losing narrowly to present trustee Sam Bruno.

One other name looms on the political scene when political pundits look into their crystal balls. Former Mayor Frank Stankowicz, a 20 year veteran at the political helm, may be studying the field prior to committing himself. Stankowicz always had a strong core of loyal workers, whose vote-getting ability was noteworthy south of Oakton Street. If three or four tickets were to emerge in April it can be guessed the name Stankowicz would be heading one group. The hypothesis that one well-gearred and organized machine could run right by the feuding other tickets might prompt the former Mayor to try again.

No Business With Public Employees Resolution Defeated

Trustee Ken Scheel's resolution expressing disapproval of village officials soliciting employees was defeated by a 4 to 2 motion, in a vote which could prove meaningful in April's village election. Two weeks ago Scheel suggested an ordinance be created for this purpose but village attorney Geocaris said such a law would prove invalid. Scheel said while he does not necessarily concur with Geocaris, nevertheless he accepted his opinion, and then suggested the resolution, which is merely an expression of

the Board and not legally binding. Only Trustee Len Szymanski supported Scheel's resolution.

Trustee Ed Berkowsky carried the ball for those opposing it. Berkowsky said such an expression would prevent businessmen from serving on village boards and these men are often in the most favorable position for serving communities, both from a standpoint of qualifications, as well as having the available time necessary for such a position.

Berkowsky also said he knew of no local, state or federal law defining such a restriction. Szymanski countered Berkowsky by saying few communities have anti-pinball laws but he knew of one town which has (Niles).

Trustee Ang Marcheschi heatedly said the law implied that someone on the Board was harassing village employees, and it applied to only two men (attorney Blase and insurance man Marcheschi). He added

since Blase's profession bars such solicitation the resolution must be aimed at him.

Scheel answered he had mentioned 2 weeks ago a general election is coming in April and he was aiming at preventing men who might do business with village employees from having this intention in running for office.

In later questions from the audience zoning board member Bill Zimos, a likely candidate for village office, told the

Board, "If Board members are innocent of this practice, it would be a credit to its members to pass such a bill".

Trustee Sam Bruno repeated no statute from the state mentions such activity.

Noticeably, Mayor Blase, who normally makes comment remained silent during the discussion. The vote was 4 to 2 against Scheel's resolution.

If the Niles Public Works Department ever received recognition for its many battles, a medal for the campaign of the ice age would be its due. The past weekend's offensive against the never-ending ice problems showed again the mettle of the P.W. guys, who are the real "All Americans" in the village.

Over the weekend, "Bacher's Mules" worked 266 hours of overtime to keep this community alive. By Sunday evening they had spread 175 to 200 tons of salt on local streets, and every street in Niles was salted and cindered by nightfall. There wasn't a neighboring community which had a record comparable to this.

Fifteen men worked sixteen hours straight, according to Betty Bacher. Many worked all night on the broken water main at 8307 National, and then when morning came, they reported to work for their regular eight hour shift.

While live wires laid in alleys around town and 200 to 300 trees had badly damaged branches, the Public Works men concerned themselves with all these attendant problems. It was Trustee Ken Scheel who mentioned he would like to see these men have the security of being on Civil Service. The great work these guys do merits this recognition, and promptly.

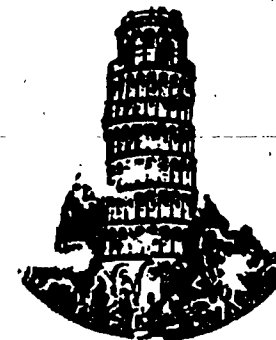
While the PW guys did their yeoman's work the Fire Department aided the Public Service Company in the area. The light truck, with its portable generator, and nine 500 watt lights, aided the electric company, whose burden increased with the winds and the heaviness of the ice. Fire Chief Al Hoelbi said area superintendent Boyd noted Niles was fortunate in its relative few problems compared to the suburbs to the northwest.

Hoelbi mentioned the Public Service Company was flying men in from Minneapolis to aid in the problems in the suburbs. The men in the Niles area came from Harvey, Illinois. Hoelbi made a most apt comment when he said, "Niles must be an All American City" since it was spared much of the havoc which invaded our neighbors' areas.

Nevertheless, in sections of Grennan Heights lights were blacked out Sunday and Monday and part of Oakton Manor was also without light. Monday night the Our Lady of Ransom-Greenwood Estates area was also without light, but after one hour they regained light.

Bob Wente Officially Announces Candidacy

The Forward Era Party of Niles has announced the name of the first of the three candidates for Trustee who will complete the ticket headed by Mayor Nicholas Blase. He is the incumbent Robert H. Wente.

\$14,000 In Furs Stolen From Sears

Golf Mill's Sears store was burglarized for the third time within the past year Monday night-Tuesday morning when burglars escaped with \$14,000 worth of furs.

Niles police reported full length coats, stoles, and fur-trimmed sweaters were taken from the store, while less expensive merchandise was left untouched.

It was assumed one or more persons remained in the store after the Monday closing, and broke a glass panel in the fur department to gain entrance to the furs. The burglar escaped thru a window in the front side of the store.

Police noted the burglars were most selective in their choice of stealing the merchandise, showing a similarity to recent fur thefts at Bonwit Teller, as well as Sears stores at Oakbrook Center and at the Harlem-North Center store.

Police surmised one or more persons remained hidden in the store until after the evening closing Monday night. Tuesday morning at 6 A.M. maintenance men cleaning the store noticed the broken window panel and notified Niles police.

About six months ago a burglary took place in the camera section of the store. After "hitting up" the merchandise, it was assumed the police arrival "scared off" the burglars, leaving the merchandise in the

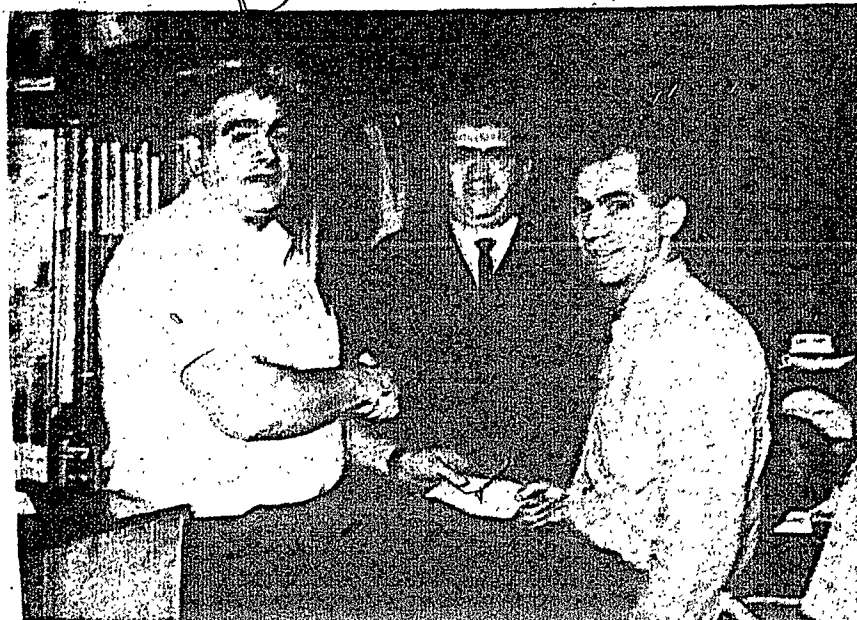
Only Scheel Remains Silent

Niles Trustee Len Szymanski told THE BUGLE the past week that he would not run for a second term this April. Szymanski said he was withdrawing to enable him to devote more time to his family. He has two children; a son seven years old, and a daughter, five. Szymanski is a senior research engineer for Borg Warner in Des Plaines.

In reporting his decision, Szymanski said the past four years' work as a trustee was a "tremendous experience" and he noted he worked with "fine people" and found the inner working of government fascinating.

The withdrawal of Szymanski from the political scene leaves at least one opening on the Blase Forward Era slate. This week the group officially announced trustee Bob Wente would seek re-election for a second term. Only incumbent trustee Ken Scheel has not yet announced his plans.

While Szymanski did not relate who would be chosen to replace him on the Blase ticket it can be expected an appointed official in the village will likely get the call. Since the zoning board seems to be the "farm system" which leads to a trustee job it can be assumed Szymanski's replacement will come from there. While Szymanski did not mention his successor he left the impression the Forward Era Party had already chosen its candidate.

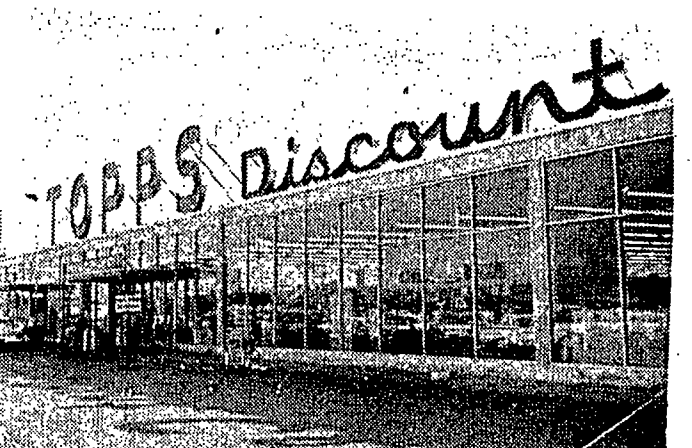
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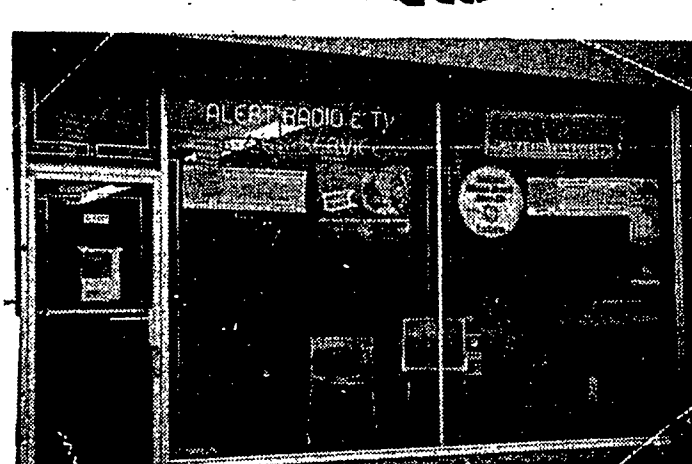
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Another Morn 'nother Yawn..

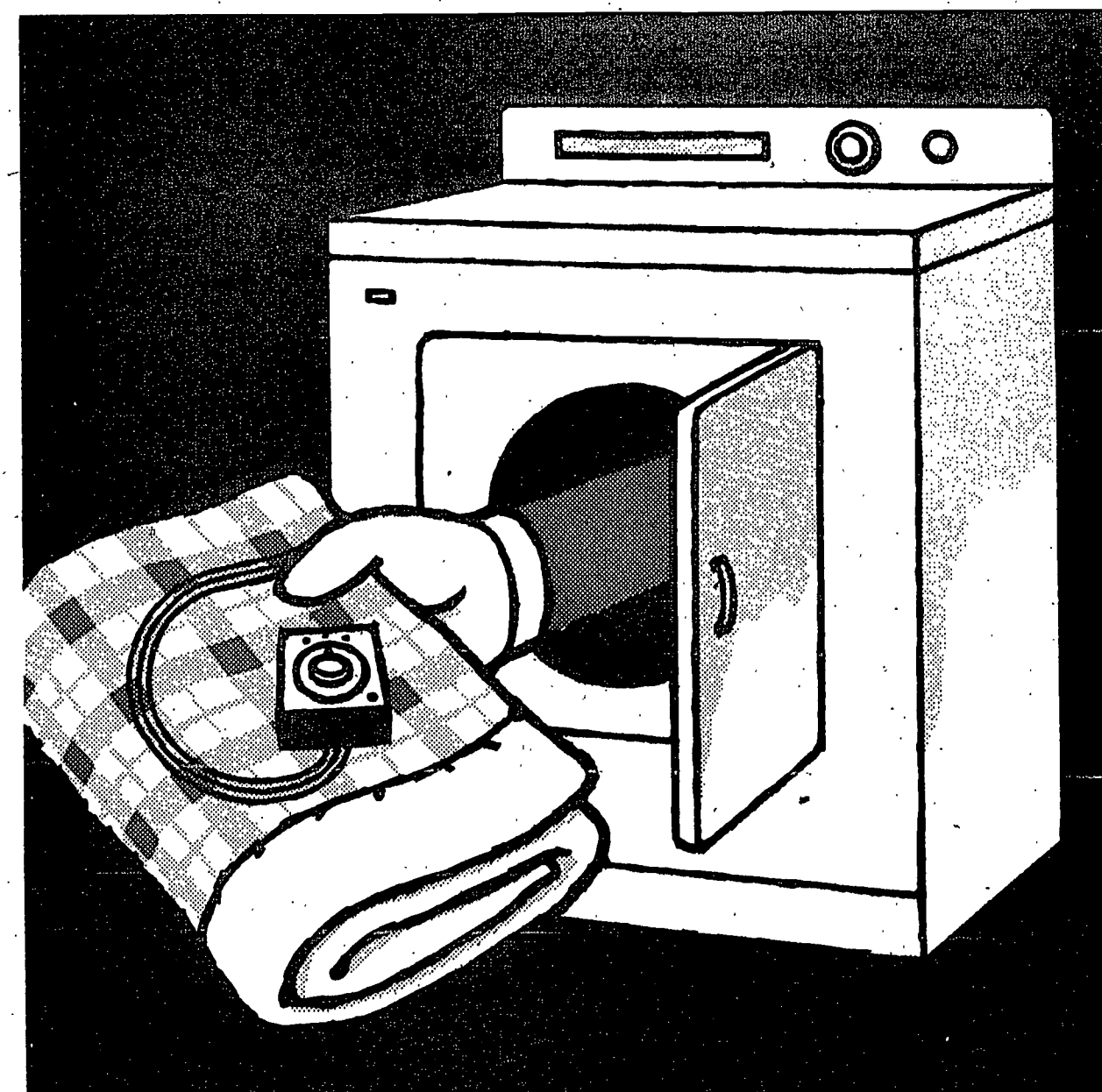
