In Morton Grove the very routine meetings go on without a hitch, with seldom any controversy, and without even a dissenting vote. The very nature of the outward agreement of seven officials, week after week, month after month, manifests the meetings have been ironed out before meeting time.

In Niles the sound and fury of public officials can be heard on Saturday mornings when the officials settle their problems before their Tuesday, And while Niles still has occasional give and take at the Tuesday meetings, still the spark of controvery is left on the floor at the Saturday meetings at the Public Works Building.

Even though a full airing of all problems on meeting night would lengthen meetings, perhaps three-fold, nevertheless, the public meeting is where all shades of argument and discussion should take place.

In Morton Grove, Mayor Schreiber was a former member of school district 70, which in the past notoriously sat in private session, when they had a sticky problem confronting

Perhaps the idea of placing your best foot forward may be uppermost in public officials' minds, but it shows they have little faith in the democratic practice of holding public meetings in public.

To see the road show of a well rehearsed production, which is what these pre-planned and pre-decided meetings are, does not give the voters a chance to see their public officials in action. To merely see them vote, without any previous discussion, or at most minimal query, means they're well-cued in, they have nothing to offer, may have been led in private by others, or don't care to show their abilities publicly.

Mr. Voter has a right to a full hearing of all issues, and to a complete picture of the officials who represent them. Hearing only the linished product is cheating the very people who place these officials

This is a genuine issue, and is one which should be thoroughly aired during the preelection discussions.
